COTTON Everyone Having Cotton Will Please Read At the farmers' meetings held in Barstow February 10, and in Pecos February 18th, it was agreed that all cotton seed on hand would be disposed of by March 15th. You have complied with this agreement in a very satisfactory manner, as the bulk of the cotton seed has either been fed to live stock or shipped to El Paso for crushing. But it has been learned that some still have small quantities of seed and bollies on hand. All this must be disposed of immediately in order to prevent any probability of an infestation of the pink bollworm occurring in this district next season. This seed must either be shipped to El Paso for crushing, or the seed and bollies must be fed or burned immediately. This applies to anyone in town who has seed or bollies for cow feed and everyone on the farms. The house where the seed was stored should be cleaned thoroughly, too, and all trash burned.
