TIMBER AND MACHINERY FOR TWO MORE DEEP TESTS ARRIVE

Interest in the Pecos oil field continues unabated, the past week witnessing the arrival of timbers for two more deep tests in this territory.

Timbers for one of the rigs was unloaded at Quito, just east of Pecos, and will be taken to a site on land owned by Pat Wilson. Further information in regard to this particular project is unobtainable at the present time.

Timbers for the other rig were received by the Sunshine people, and with it the machinery necessary for operation. This rig will be erected on a site located by geologist Dr. Hugh Tucker, its exact location being about three miles north of the Laura Well in the western end of section 2.

The recent strike of oil in the Laura Well of the Sunshine Corporation has given an impetus to prospect work in the Pecos field, and several companies have assured The Enterprise that timber and machinery will soon be items of daily shipments to Pecos, as the result reached in the Sunshine company's well has put the stamp "Proven" on the Pecos field.

Repairs on the boiler of the company have been made and drilling resumed. The intention is to shut off the oil already found and go on down to the heavy oil bearing sand. The strata just pierced is twelve feet thick, and the oil found is of a very fine grade for lubrication and it is the intention of the company to erect a Star rig on the site and go down to this depth and develop this oil to be used for many purposes.

OIL FIELD PERSONALS.

J. G. Cooper, of Deming, N. M., is in town in the interest of the Pecos Co-operative Lot Owners Association. It is expected they will be drilling at an early date.

Sam H. Kyle of Bisbee, Ariz., was here Wednesday. Mr. Kyle is attorney for a \$200,000 corporation of his town and in company with another member of the firm was here to secure leases on which to put down a deep well. They were well pleased with our oil prospects and provided they can secure 35,000 acres of leases will begin at once work on a deep well. They left yesterday morning for Eastland county, where they

have interests, but will return to Pecos in a few days to see if they can secure the acreage desired.

Jas. E. Russell of Deadwood, S. D., mining engineer, is in Pecos for a few days. He is interested in investigating oil land and was in Pecos before.

C. J. Colden, a former Missouri newspaper man, now a resident of Los Angeles, stopped over in Pecos Thursday to inspect the oil field.

J. M. Somers, one of the promoters of the Pecos-Toyah Oil & Gas Company, was a Pecos visitor for a day or so this week and says their prospects for drilling operations in the Pecos field look bright.

Ira M. Evant was in Pecos for a few days the past week looking over this section of the country in the interest of a Wichita Falls oil concern. Mr. Evant stated that the prospects were much better than he had any idea of, and that there was no doubt in his mind but that Pecos would develop in the very near future into an oil center second to none. His report to his company will be a flattering one, it is stated.

STRIKE GOOD SHOWING OF GAS NORTH OF TOYAH

H. B. Cox, of the firm of Couch & Cox, operating in the Toyah shallow oil belt, came in from Ozona, Texas, on his way to the wells. Mr. Cox states they have been having trouble with their machinery and is here to see just what they need and will at once order new rigs and machinery all around for their project. They have struck some good gas showings but no oil as yet, but are yet hardly deep enough to expect oil.

They are cutting up a section of land into two and a half acre tracts in order to let the small fry into the oil game in their field.

TOYAH METHODISTS FIRST OVER TOP

The people of the progressive little bourg of Toyah never do things by halves. They always respond liberally to every good cause. They have gone over the top at every liberty loan drive and now the Methodist congregation there, though small in number, is the first reported as having gone over the top in their centenary-quotas. Rev. Fred B. Faust, Prof. P. J. Rutledge and Messrs. Albert Sisk and Sid Lasley were invited to Toyah Monday night to participate at a banquet given by the church, and by their oratory in speech-making help make plans for the centenary drive. The banquet was all that could be desired, as is always the case, and when the speech-making was concluded all were convinced of the feasibility of the purpose and the whole amount, and more, was subscribed without plans having to be made to raise it later.

CONDITIONS AND PROSPECTS IN THE PECOS SECTION

It is with bright faces and high hopes that the people of this section of the country face the future, and this is the result not only of the big things in the way of oil activities, but also, and largely from climatic conditions. Never in the history of the country, or, at least, within the recollection of the oldest inhabitant, has weather conditions been more favorable. Supplementing the fine snows of winter abundant rains have fallen throughout the spring and up to the present time. Stockmen, who suffered greatly during the past few years, are in fair way to come back strong, while the farmers will this year harvest the banner crop in every line.

MURDERERS OF REUBEN CAUGHT

Sheriff Bob Buchanan of McLennan county, and City Detective Boyd of Waco, were here Wednesday for the purpose of taking home with them Jewel Hale and Eugene Spencer, arrested in El Paso, charged with the murder on May 1 of a storekeeper of Mart, Texas, by the name of Max Reuben.

These young men are about 18 and 20 years of age and prepossessing young men of good families, but while here made full and free confession of the murder before County Clerk Vaughan, which was taken down and sent to the proper authorities.

They had gotten into the store when one of them struck the keeper of the store in the head with a hammer and then beat his head into a pulp, so the statement goes, when they appropriated the trunk of the deceased, put it into a waiting auto in the rear of the store and carried it about four miles in the country before breaking it open. After it had been rifled of all valuables it was set afire and burned.

Mr. Vaughan stated to the Enterprise that these youths expressed their regrets at their rash tragedy. They showed very little concern and no emotion.

HOW THE STATE WOULD PROFIT FROM THE HOBBY LAND SETTLEMENT PLAN

(By Upshur Vincent, Special Correspondent.)

Austin, Texas, May 14.—Where would the State of Texas profit from the Hobby Land Settlement Plan incorporated in the constitution? That question has been asked by the uniformed ever since Governor Hobby first proposed that the State lend its financial aid to the landless man in acquiring a farm home.

In the first place Texas would profit by securing a large number of home owners—contented citizens, with a deep interest in their state and its government.

That alone would be worth more than the cost of the plan's operation—for it will not cost the State very much to put into successful operation this plan. Indeed, it is likely the small expense will be taken care of in the selling price of the improved farms.

But the State will have a real profit in the increased taxes paid on the lands so improved and sold to actual settlers under the terms of the amendment.

Lands that are now taxed at from five to ten dollars an acre would be assessed at three and five times these amounts after their improvement and sale—and the home owner does not and cannot escape his taxes as does the owner of vacant land.

But that would not be the only means of increased revenues to the State. The home owner builds towns—and towns pay taxes. Also, the improved condition of the farm homes sold by the State under the terms of this amendment would force other land owners to improve—at least to some extent—the lands they rent; and this would bring in more revenue.

The Hobby Land Settlement Plan is not intended as a revenue raising measure, but those who have watched the operation of similar plans in other countries and in California, believe the State would at the end of a ten-year period be receiving more than half a million of revenue as a result of its operation in Texas.

REEVES COUNTY RUNNING TRUE TO FORM OVERSUBSCRIBES VICTORY LOAN

It was no surprise to the Enterprise to learn that Reeves county "went over the top" in the Victory Loan drive which ended Saturday. They have never learned the word "fail" in anything yet undertaken. They never fall short of their duty in anything—they are there with the goods. This is not only a fact as to Pecos but Toyah and Balmorhea as well.

In nine cases out of ten Toyah citizens first find out what is expected of them and without hesitancy get together and do their full duty and then do some more until they surpass the balance of the county. They did this in the late Victory Loan drive.

The following figures show plainly what Reeves county people did and how nobly and generously they performed, and the amounts are shown as representing the purchases taken through the four banks of the county, the two Pecos banks combined showing what Pecos did, the Toyah bank representing Toyah's part and likewise the Balmorhea bank representing the amount subscribed by Balmorhea and Toyah Creek citizens. Read the figures:

The quota for Reeves county was approximately \$87,000, so it is easily seen that she went over the top in fine shape.

Judge Ross, W. W. Camp and Judge W. A. Hudson deserve special mention for their labors in this drive. They worked faithfully from the start and only quit when the full quota was oversubscribed.

RECOGNIZES VALUE OF NEWS-PAPER ADVERTISING.

I want you to know that I appreciate the general publicity you have given to Liberty Loans and as Federal Reserve Chairman of the Woman's Liberty Loan committee, I especially appreciate the publicity you have given to women's part in the loans.

When through the press the fact was brought out that the government found it necessary to take the revolutionary step of enlisting the services of women to sell bonds, the men were spurred to greater achievements, and to women all over our country it gave a new sense of responsibility while it quickened their patriotism, and, thanks to the press, the Nation's call to women to help finance the war reached not only the women who were free to give their time to the work, but it reached the "home guard" also, the women who stayed at home and "kept the home fires burning," thereby releasing other members of their family for active duty.

Letters by the score have come to this office from women too occupied with home affairs to do active war work, but who were inspired to subscribe because of stories they read in the press. Ofttimes they inclosed the magic clippings while they wrote "If the government needs all of my savings, I am ready."

In all of the loans, women have sold bonds. In the Fourth Loan, more than \$36,000,000 was secured by the women of the Eleventh District and in the fifth, while the figures are not all in, we have reached more than \$25,000,000 for the women's committee. When the final figures are compiled it will no doubt be found that the 50,000 women workers of this district have secured fully one-third of the subscriptions.

Without the inspiration and help of the press, no such result would have been attained, and so, while there is glory enough for all, all honor to the press who "told the story," to the press which quickened the consciousness of responsibility of our people, and who made possible the song of Victory for the Liberty Loans which we may sing today.

COTTON ACREAGE REDUCED.

Dallas, Texas, May 15.—"The cotton acreage reduction campaign in Texas has been successful," said Judge W. F. Ramsey, chairman of the State committee, today. "With approximately one million bales of last year's crop remaining unsold in the State, and with the increased demand for other crops, especially food and feed crops, Texas farmers have cut the cotton acreage fully 20 per cent, according to reports from county agricultural agents, farmers and bankers in 147 of the 175 cotton-growing counties of the State. A few counties in the western and extreme southwestern parts of the state have increased their acreage, but on the whole most of them have reduced the acreage from 5 to 50 per cent.

"A part of this reduction is due, of course, to a greatly increased acreage in small grain which was planted last fall, and a part is due to a larger planting of corn, the acreage of which has been greatly increased this year.

"While not more than 20 per cent of the farmers have signed pledges to reduce their acreage, fully 80 per cent have reduced.

"An increase of 15 per cent in the number of cattle, hogs, sheep and poultry is indicated by the reports we have received, and as a consequence the farmers have substituted feed and forage crops to a considerable extent. Crops that have been planted in place of cotton, besides wheat, oats and corn, are the grain and sweet sorghums, beans, potatoes, alfalfa, velvet beans and cowpeas.

"In all probability, Texas will pro-

duce this year 78 per cent of its requirements in food and feed crops. A 20 per cent reduction of the cotton acreage means not more than 9,500,000 acres have been planted to cotton.

"In this connection I am pleased to announce that Governor W. P. G. Harding of the Federal Reserve Board, has accepted an invitation, extended by the Texas Chamber of Commerce, the Texas Industrial Congress and the State Farmers' Union, to come to Texas and explain the object in forming a one hundred million dollar cotton exporting corporation. Governor Harding will speak on this subject in Dallas on May 28, and I hope to see a large representation of cotton growers and others who are interested from every part of the State."

The trustees of Simmons College, together with the local alumni and ex-students, are planning to entertain the many friends of the institution with an old-time barbecue and "home-coming" on the college campus June 2. A large crowd is expected to be present for the big celebration, many coming from throughout Texas and a large number from out of the State. More than three thousand are expected to be present.

Many of the Simmons men who have been in the service during the world war are daily returning and this celebration will be in the nature of a recognition of the noble part these "Sons of Simmons" have taken towards the downfall of Bill the Kaiser. A fitting tribute will be paid the many whose stars have turned to gold.

The regular commencement day for the senior class of the present year is June 2. Governor Brough of Arkansas will deliver the address to the outgoing class and will be the main speaker of the day. It is indeed fortunate that the many friends of the institution will have the pleasure and opportunity of hearing this gifted speaker.

Immediately following the address of Governor Brough a regular old-time West Texas barbecue will be served the many visitors under a beautiful grove on the campus. A band will help furnish the amusement and will be assisted by a "College Carnival," which will be worth the trip to Abilene alone.

COMMISSIONERS' COURT.

Commissioners' Court met in regular session Monday with the county judge, all commissioners, county attorney, county clerk and sheriff present, and transacted the following business:

The Pecos Valley State Bank submitted two bonds to cover the school funds of Reeves and Loving counties in the sums of \$19,000 and \$12,000 respectively, which were accepted and filed.

The returns from the election in precinct No. 2 for the purpose of increasing the school tax levy in said district were canvassed. There were cast for said issue twenty votes, and none against, and the school tax can be increased, if needed, to 50 cents on the \$100 valuation.

The increase in the pay of farm demonstrator was increased from \$200 to \$500 per year.

The clerk's quarterly report was presented, examined and approved.

The quarterly report of the county treasurer was approved.

The court ordered that R. N. Couch be reimbursed in the amount of \$200 for work on a levy that would protect the county road from the overflows of the Pecos river.

Accounts against the several road districts were ordered paid.

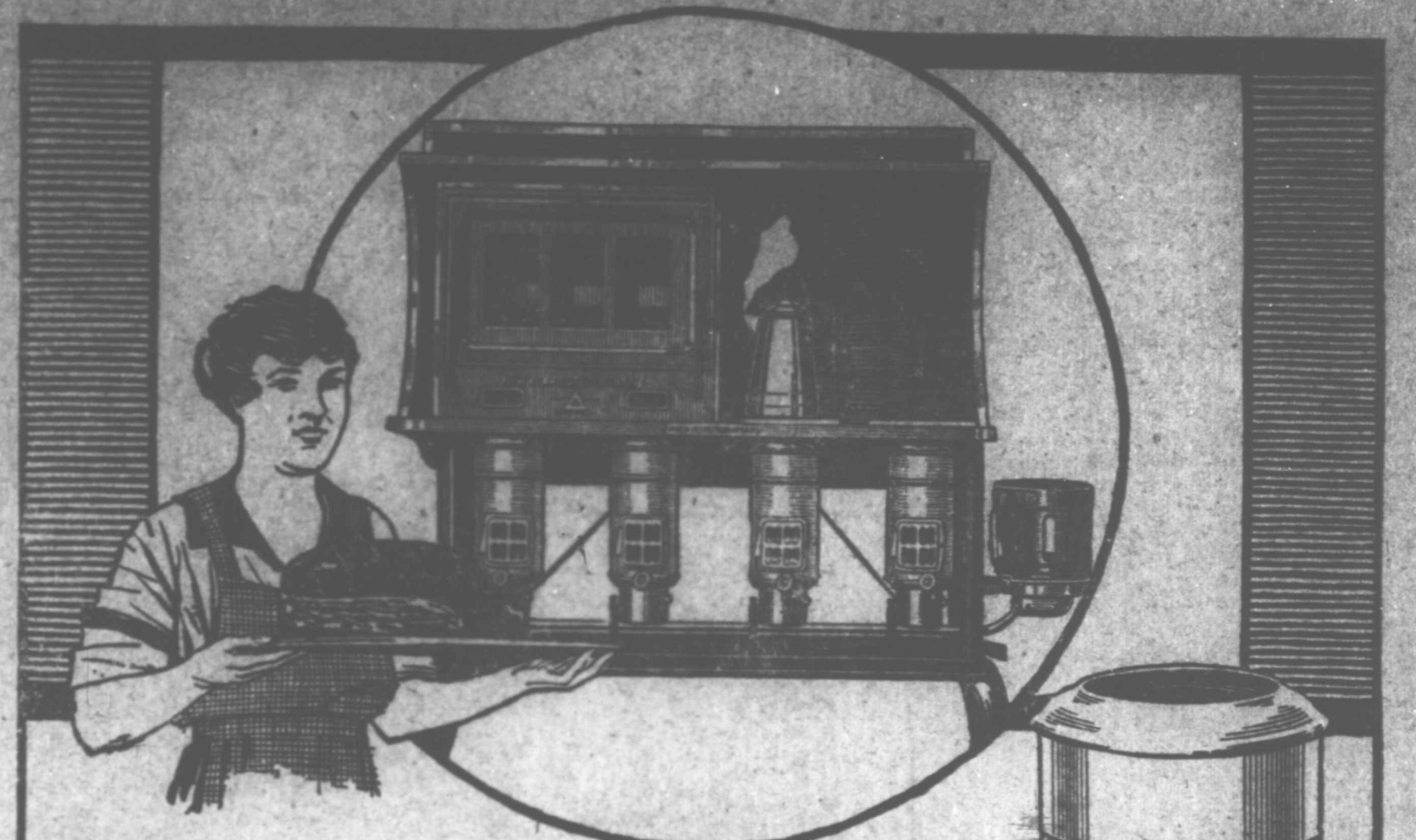

TEXAS GOVERNOR BACKS UP CHURCH

GOV. W. P. HOBBY OFFERS HIS SERVICES TO METHODIST CENTENARY DRIVE

'TO MAKE WORLD CHRISTIAN'

Gov. W. P. Hobby of Texas is taking a personal interest in the Methodist Centenary campaign for \$35,000,000, of which more than \$5,000,000 is to be contributed by more than 200,000 Texas Methodists.

In a letter to Rev. Dr. S. H. C. Burgin, pastor of First M. E. Church, South, Dallas, the governor not only offered his personal services, but gave his personal opinion of the ob-

jects of the drive, which he summed up as "a serious attempt to make society Christian the world over."

His letter to Dr. Burgin was as follows:

"It is a waste of time to ask the nature of the greatest movement ever undertaken by the Methodist Church. It is a movement which has clearly captured the imagination of many on the outside, as well as those on the inside, the rank and file of the great Methodist denomination. The danger, in my judgment, is that the conception of not a few may fall short of the real meaning of the movement.

"In my judgment, your leaders will do well to show the people that the Centenary Movement goes far beyond any other enterprise heretofore undertaken.

"As I understand it, the raising of the Centenary Fund of \$35,000,000, is really a preliminary to your real work.

"The Centenary Movement is, in reality, a scheme of world reconstruction. It is really a serious attempt to make society Christian the world over.

"In all your foreign fields, where your brave, consecrated missionaries are working, in the hard places of the homeland among negroes, mountaineers and immigrants, in the devastated lands of France, in reeling Russia, these are the places, doubtless, where you will project your World Movement and blessing, with great power and effect.

"The influence of America in these other lands, as well as in the waste places of the homeland, you will perpetuate and enhance.

"America has given them democracy and liberty.

"Methodism, through the Centenary Movement, measuring up to her predestined mission, will give orphanages, schools, hospitals, literature, and Christ.

"You have a great appeal to liberality and service, and you will not dwarf the Call.

"It is a great movement, in a great day, appealing to great minds. Only such movements can succeed now.

"Speak unto the Methodist people that they go forward and command when I can serve.

Yours sincerely, W. P. HOBBY, Governor of Texas."

Gov. Hobby proved his words by his action, recently when he left the state capital to address 400 Methodist business men in Dallas on the Centenary Movement.

CONGREGATIONS WITHOUT HOMES

Over two thousand congregations of the Methodist Episcopal Churches in the South are without buildings in which to hold their services. Meetings are held in homes, barns, town halls, any place that can be used for the purpose. It is to help and encourage congregations that part of the funds collected through the Centenary Campaign during the latter part of May will be spent.

TEXAS PARSONS BEING POORLY PAID

SAYS SENATOR SHEPPARD IN INTERVIEW ON METHODIST CENTENARY DRIVE MAY 18-25

APPEALS ON THEIR BEHALF

Is a preacher worth as much to society as a Ford?

Many in Texas do not think so, apparently, because at least 200 out of 850 Methodist preachers in Texas are drawing less every year than the price of a Ford.

The Southern Methodist Church recently made a survey of salaries paid to 6,150 preachers and discovered the fact that \$19 of them received less than \$400; 1,268, or more than one-fifth, received less than \$500; and 1,585, or more than one-fourth, received less than \$600 a year.

It was these figures that United States Senator Morris Sheppard had in mind when in a recent interview on the Methodist Centenary, which will make a drive for \$35,000,000 in eight days, May 18-25, he said:

"The small remuneration allowed so many American preachers of the Gospel, who are also teachers in the highest and holiest sense, is one of the handicaps on the spread of knowledge and progress, which the Methodist Centenary campaign will help to remove."

The Senator also said:

"The Centenary Campaign of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, should have the earnest, practical and prayerful co-operation and support not only of every Methodist, but of all other citizens as well. The funds raised by this campaign will do more for humanity, civilization and democracy than can be measured in words.

"If the world is to reap the benefits of the war that has been fought and won for its emancipation; if the cause for which so many million gave their lives and blood and treasure is to be made of concrete value to mankind, men, women and children must be given a spiritual and educational basis on which the structure of liberty and progress may be permanently based. The inhabitants of the stricken regions will be unable to catch the spirit of the new time. If they remain strangers to Christianity. Neither will the inhabitants of those parts of our own country be in position to receive or to understand the meaning and the message of true democracy, with such low standards of knowledge and education as too frequently prevail. The Methodist Centenary is a movement born in heaven, and dedicated to the noblest, purest interests of the human race.

CHURCH IS BUILT BY CANNIBALS

The only Christian church in the world to be erected by cannibals has just been completed in Africa. The king of the community, having come in touch with some missionaries of the M. E. Church, South, decided a school would be a good thing to have in his village. The king wasn't a cannibal himself and had announced that he would punish any of his own people found guilty of cannibalism. Soon after he issued his proclamation forty men were found guilty of the act, and, as punishment, the king put them to work on the school house for the children in his village. When the school was finished, the king, deciding the men had not been sufficiently punished, made them build a church which the missionaries said they could use to advantage.

LABOR PROVIDED BY ERECTION OF CHURCHES

Nearly a million dollars will be spent by the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in the erection of churches, schools, and settlement houses in the South during the next few months. This announcement was made at the office of the Board of Missions of that denomination today.

Dr. O. E. Goddard, Secretary of the Department of Home Missions, stated the money would be spent as follows: For foreigners in this country, \$70,000; mountain work, \$800,000; textile workers, \$150,000; foreign population in New Orleans, \$115,000. The spending of this money on buildings in the South means work for laborers in many places. It will be the direct result of the Centenary Campaign of the M. E. Church, South, the financial drive for which will be held May 18-25—Paris News Advocate.

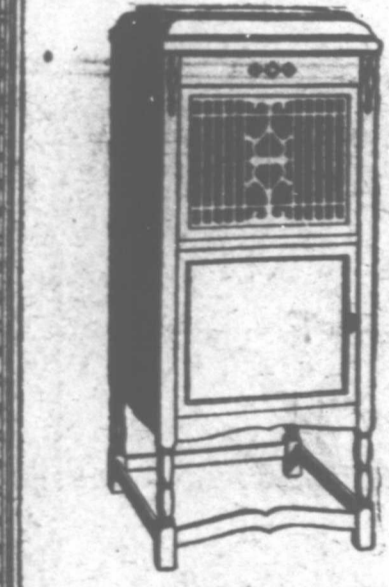
ANTI-SALOON LEAGUE LECTURE

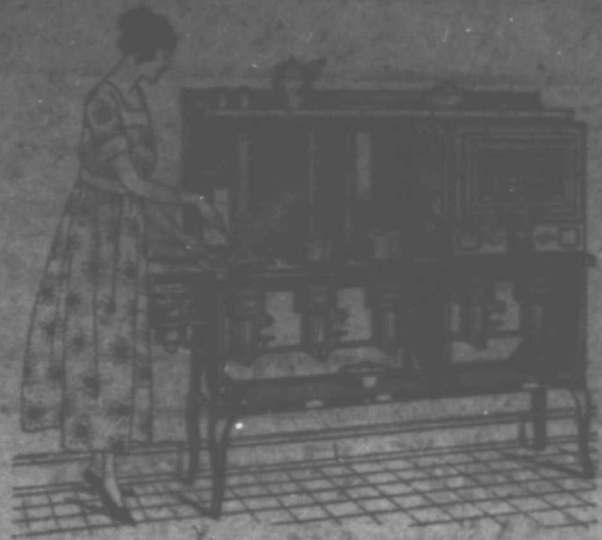
