PECOS ACTIVITY OF WHIRLWIND KIND

Two things are plainly brought out in the following article from the Midland Reporter. One is, that the eyes of the country in general is focused on Pecos, and momentarily they expect the announcement of a strike—and its coming—that will place Pecos indelibly on the oil map of the country. This interest is not only manifest in Midland. Scores of letters reach The Enterprise office each week bearing postmarks of cities and towns in every State of the Union. It is impossible to answer them or give them space in the paper. Interest in the Pecos field is universal. The other phase brought out by the following article is the part The Enterprise is playing in keeping Pecos before the public at large. Its statements in regard to the activities in this section are conservative. No one knowing the facts will deny this. The fact that the statements are conservative is one reason why interest is keen about what we are doing. For these reasons alone The Enterprise should have the unstinted support of every citizen as it is doing a work that helps each individual—a work that would be impossible for individuals to do.

Here is the Reporter's views on the subject:

The Midland country has had just as favorable geological reports as have the Big Spring and Pecos sections, on the east and west of us. Big Spring and Pecos have commercial organizations. Midland has not. Big Spring and Pecos are today wildly excited over oil activities, with their streets crowded with no less enthusiastic and eager visitors. Midland is not at all disturbed, for her usual modicum of activity is not calculated to set fire to our own enthusiasm, and much less to attract any attention from the outside. look is very promising to say the least.

One of the things that looks good to our people is the fact that several of the companies who have operated their main offices in the east are now moving to Pecos and in a very short time their principal offices and books will be in Pecos, where the principal portion of their business will be transacted. This is believed by our people to be a sign not only of greater activity in developing the oil fields, but is strengthening the belief that these companies expect to reach the coveted oil sand and liquid gold now in a very short space of time.

Ira J. Bell will move his general offices and that of the Dixieland Syndicate to Pecos within the next week or so. They are now located in Springfield, Ill. This is just now one of the most active companies operating in the Pecos oil field. The Enterprise is informed that the Santa Fe is now busy putting in a siding for water and fuel for the benefit of the various companies operating in the Dixieland anticline. Mr. Bell has also ordered steel storage tanks to be used there for the storage of both water and fuel for the various concerns operating on this anticline.

Drillers at the Bell well have been busy the past week and have gone down 150 feet further into mother earth and are that much closer to the liquid gold. They are now in blue shale and grit and the oil indications are looking exceedingly good. They are busy this week putting in new and additional shacks in which to house their additional drilling force which will be put on as soon as these houses are completed.

Coming to Pecos today with Ira J. Bell is Captain Mahan of the Pecos Valley Oil Company, a company composed of New York capitalists, who will put a well down, it is understood, on section 27, block 2. This gentleman is coming, so the Enterprise is informed, for the purpose of starting work and getting ready for the big rig which will test the matter as to whether their holdings contain oil or not.

Representatives of the Tekeiland Company are also on their way to Pecos. This company will drill on section 7, block 2, and will start work as soon as the machinery, which is now on the road, arrives.

The Toyah Basin Oil Company, composed of New York capitalists, and with a capital stock of \$300,000, have made four locations and have two rigs ordered to date to test out their holdings on the Dixieland anticline.

The Citizens Oil and Gas Company, section 17, block 2, have an 84-foot derrick up and have secured the services of Mr. Nash to do the drilling. They have ordered the Armstrong drilling machinery, which will be driven by a gas engine, burning fuel oil, thus eliminating the use of so much bad water. Mr. J. L. Leonard, treasurer of the company, will return here this week. His wife, child and mother are here now and have apartments in the McCarver home and will make Pecos their home. They are splendid people and Pecos people are glad to have them.

B. C. Lanier of Toyah, and one of the organizers of the Toyah-Alabama Oil Company, was in Pecos this week and stated that he expected they would resume drilling on the Troxel well in the Toyah Basin within the next day or two. Mr. Lanier says the Toyah-Alabama Oil Company is now getting in ship-shape and will soon be drilling. They have large holdings in the Toyah Basin. He also stated that there is quite a lot of activity in the Toyah Basin just now and that the shallow wells are being pumped and the first shipment of oil ever to go out of Reeves county in commercial quantity will be shipped this week from Toyah and will come from the shallow wells in the Toyah Basin. There are many wells now drilling and preparations are being made to start several other deep tests there at an early date.

President Alfred Tinally of the Sunshine Oil Corporation, is here to look after the cementing of the Laura well. This work was to have been commenced today but will be delayed on account of the freezing weather, which makes it impossible. Mr. Tinally assures the Enterprise this work will be done as soon as possible and actual drilling begun on this well.

The Victory well is now going down rapidly and the Enterprise is informed they are making splendid progress and have the best string of tools to be had anywhere—all new at that.

The following is an excerpt from a grand jury report to the district judge of Erath county and published in the Empire of last week. It is good sound logic and if headed would greatly reduce crime and suffering. You just sometimes can't tell and it's a safe bet that a child is just as safe or a little safer under the care of its parents. There are many parents all over the country who realized when it was too late that had they exercised the proper control over their offspring all things would have been better for themselves as well as the children. Read this excerpt, which follows:

"We find that petty offenses of the class of malicious mischief is very prevalent in this county. There seems to be among certain classes of youths and young men utter disregard of the property and rights of other people. This condition, if not checked, lead in our judgment to serious consequences and we admonish parents to be more careful and particular about the association and the whereabouts of their children, especially after night. It seems to us that there is a great laxity existing among the people generally in regard to exercising supervision over the young girls. We feel like they are given too much freedom and permitted to go where they please and when they please without any restrictions. In our judgment most of the offenses we have investigated concerning young girls could have been avoided had their parents exercised more care and caution and more restraint over them. It seems that the people ought not to be admonished about the vital necessity of the care and training of young people, especially young girls and we call upon parents to take heed of this warning."

DISCHARGED MEN EXEMPT FROM POLL TAX

The following is an excerpt from the Bill passed by the Thirty-Sixth called session of the Texas legislature and exempts soldiers and sailors from the payment of poll taxes levied for the years 1918 and 1919:

Section 3 of the bill reads: It is further declared that it shall not be necessary for said discharged sailors, soldiers and marines, in order to exercise the privilege of suffrage and vote at all elections held within the State of Texas during the years 1919 and 1920, to hold a poll tax receipt, showing any poll tax paid before the 1st day of February, next preceding such election, or paid at any time theretofore or thereafter, as provided in Article 2942, Chapter 4, Title 49 of the Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas of 1911.

Section 4. All such discharged sailors, soldiers and marines, coming within the terms and provisions of this Act, when they present themselves at the proper place, which proper place shall be the place of residence of such person at the time of enlistment, or the place of residence acquired since his discharge, and who is otherwise a qualified voter at such place for voting; that is, at the place of their residence at the time of joining the Army, Navy or Marines of the United States, shall exhibit to the election officers their discharge from the military or naval service of the United States, showing their service in the present war, or if such discharge is lost, misplaced or in the hands of the Federal Government, then they shall make a written affidavit to such fact, stating, in the face of the affidavit, the unit in which they were serving at the time of their discharge, and, as near as may be, the date and place of their discharge and present place of residence. Said affidavit may be made before any officer authorized to administer oaths or by the officers of the election authorized to administer oaths. Upon presentation of such discharge or the making of such affidavit, if the voter is otherwise qualified, except having paid his poll tax, then he shall be permitted to vote at any election held within the State of Texas. If an affidavit is made, then the affidavit shall be filed with the election officers and shall be preserved in a box or receptacle in the same manner that ballots are preserved. If a voter presents his discharge, then a memorandum of the contents of the discharge shall be made by one of the election officers, and shall be filed by him and preserved in the same manner that affidavits are required to be preserved under this Act; provided, that the terms and provisions of this Act shall apply only to such discharged sailors, soldiers and marines as may have received honorable discharges from their respective branches of the military service.

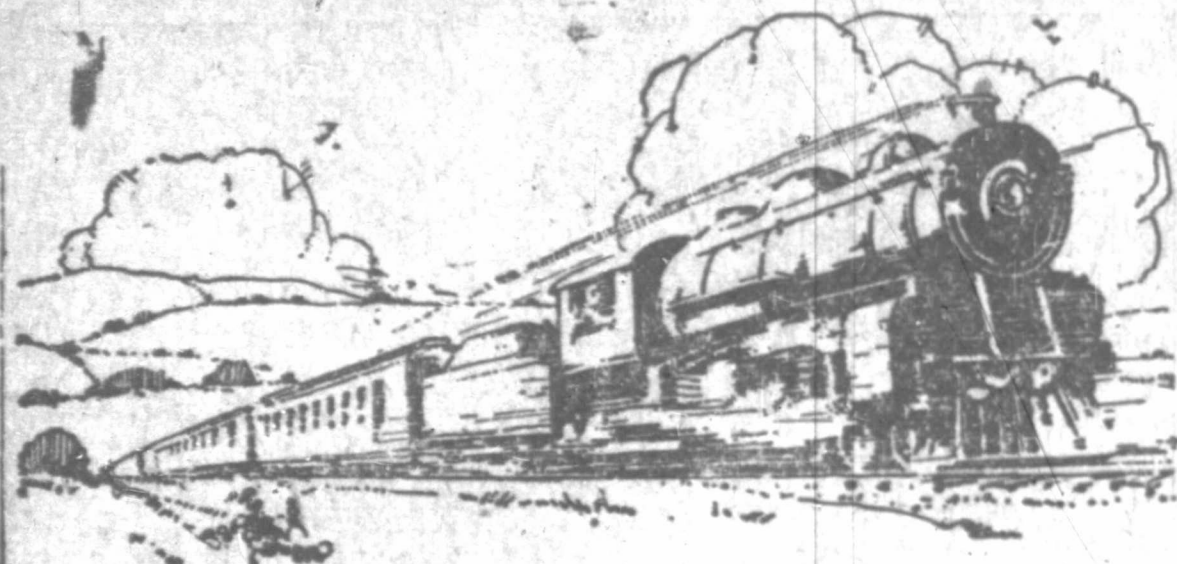

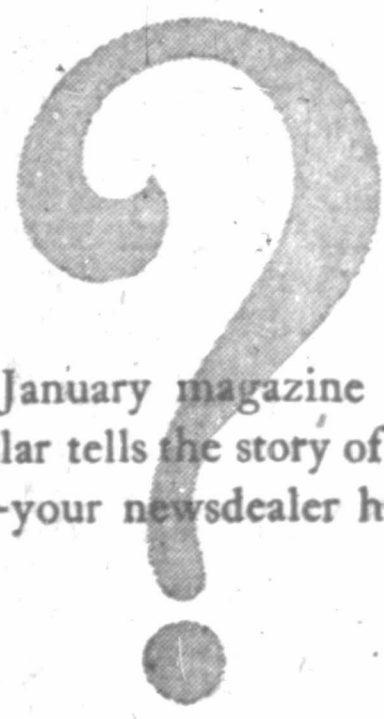

REEVES COUNTY MAN WINS POULTRY PRIZE

Another achievement for Reeves was wrought during the El Paso Poultry Show, which closed last week, when W. E. Peck of Balmorhea, who had on exhibition a pen of choice S. C. Anconas, took first prize for the best pen, demonstrating that this section is well adapted to the raising of fine poultry as well as the best of everything else.

Mr. Peck's record at the show reads as follows: First and second prize on cock; third on hen; first on cockerel; fifth on pullet, and first on pen.

THE LAW AS APPLIED TO WOMAN SUFFRAGE

The following communication from the State Comptroller's office, Austin, dated January 15, and addressed to Hon. John W. Hornsby, County Attorney, Austin, Texas, may throw light upon the question of women paying poll-tax and voting:

Dear sir: Answering your inquiry, with reference to what is necessary to qualify women to vote in the primary elections and to participate in the nominating conventions, held under the laws of this State during the year of 1920, you are advised:

1. Every woman who desires to vote in any primary election or who desires to participate in any nominating convention, shall, first of all, possess all of the qualifications necessary for an elector, such as twelve months' residence in the State, six months' residence in the county, and must vote in the precinct in which she lives.

2. In addition to possessing the qualifications of an elector, she must have paid the same poll taxes and obtained a receipt therefor prior to the first day of February, 1920. The form of receipt now used for male voters shall be used for female voters.

3. In addition to the above requirements, the female voter must have paid, not only the State and county poll tax of \$1.75, but, if she resides in a city which levies a poll tax upon male voters, she must pay the city poll tax. In other words, she must pay the same poll taxes—State, county and city—which are required of male voters.

Female voters, more than sixty years of age, or those who are blind, or deaf and dumb, or permanently disabled, or who have lost one hand or foot, shall be entitled to vote without being required to pay the poll tax, but such female voter, if she resides in a city of ten thousand inhabitants or over, shall be required to obtain her certificate of exemption from the County Tax Collector before the first day of February, 1920.

Female voters who shall reach the age of 21 years after the first day of February and before the day of the following primary election or nominating convention, and who possesses all of the other qualifications of a voter, shall be entitled to vote at such election, if she has obtained a certificate of exemption from the County Collector before the first day of February which shall specify the day when she will be twenty-one years old and contain all the other requisites of a certificate of exemption. Before the certificate of exemption shall issue, the applicant therefor shall make a written affidavit of her age to be administered and certified to by the County Collector who shall file and preserve the same. The same rules as to residence now required of male voters to obtain tax receipts shall apply as to exemptions for both

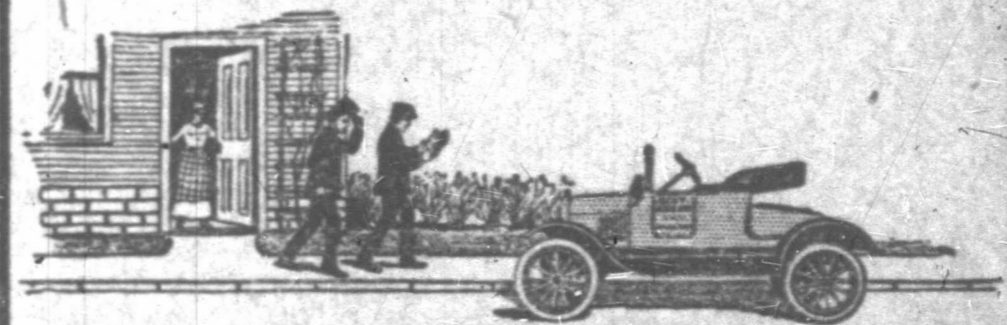

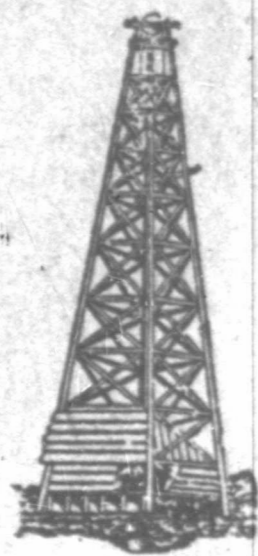
