RAILROAD OFFICIALS VISIT PECOS; STUDY TRAFFIC PROBLEMS

Double track from Carlsbad, N. M. to Pecos on the Santa Fe railroad is at least a probability as a result of the visit of General Superintendent Sears of Amarillo and Division Superintendent Smyer of Clovis, to this place last Saturday. Both the men agreed on the wisdom of making this improvement at once to take care of the traffic of the new oil field, already beginning to reach the point of congestion. Definite announcement in the matter are expected within the week.

Division Superintendent Pistole of the T. & P. was here from Big Spring Sunday investigating the trackage situation with a view to adding several miles more of switch track in the local yards.

"We are going to do our best to take care of the new business," said Mr. Pistole, "and will not be caught again as we were at Ranger and the other oil towns along the road. We will have work under way here very soon."

It can't be any too soon, for the track shortage in the yards here is already very noticeable and in a fortnight will be nothing short of glaring. By that time, however, it is expected that the laying of new trackage will be under way.

Mr. Pistole was also investigating the matter of additional service by the T. & P. in the way of a regular Pecos sleeper on all through trains. This is being asked of the company by the Chamber of Commerce through its local secretary here, who has also asked the Santa Fe to provide service for the increasing passenger traffic in and out of Pecos on that road.

REVISION OF TREATY OPPOSED BY FRANCE

WILL NOT CONSENT TO ANY CHANGE THAT MAY WEAKEN HER CLAIMS ON GERMANY.

Paris.—The French government will make determined opposition to any revision of the treaty of Versailles that would modify her claims on Germany, it was learned today.

The attitude of the French government, according to the official point of view, is in perfect accord with the sentiments of the new chamber of deputies. It is held that any further concessions by the French government to Germany would not be tolerated by parliament and if made the government would be overthrown.

The French official view of the economic situation, it was stated in authoritative circles today, is quite the same as that set forth in London; that is, that all Europe must be put on a prosperous basis. The French, however, it was pointed out, are beginning to think their allies have forgotten that France herself is not on a prosperous basis and not in a position to make concessions that would affect her own economic interests to anyone, least of all to Germany.

Premier Nitti of Italy at the supreme council meeting in London yesterday, says "Pertinax" in the Echo de Paris today, formally demanded a revision of the Hungarian draft treaty. Signor Nitti declared that by it 3,000,000 Magyars would be included in the Jugo Slav, Roumanian and Czecho-Slovak States. The correspondent adds that Premier Lloyd George of Great Britain was inclined to support his Italian colleague.

ANTIS IN HOUSE START WAR ON PROHIBITION

Suit Filed in Supreme Court by Attorney General of New Jersey to Declare Amendment to Unconstitutional.

Washington—Siege warfare against the prohibition enforcement act was inaugurated today by "wet" members of the house.

The move of the house anti-prohibitionists came unexpectedly during consideration of an appropriation of \$4,500,000 for prohibition enforcement. After Speaker Gillett had refused to sustain the point of order against the repeal provision raised by Representative Garrett (Dem.) of Tennessee, the rider and its allied motion to eliminate the enforcement appropriation were voted down overwhelmingly.

The bill filed by the Attorney General of New Jersey sets forth that the amendment was improperly drawn, that in twenty-one states the legislatures had not ratified it as provided by their state constitutions and that there is no power in congress to propose a constitutional amendment regulating the habits and morals of the people. It recites further that the amendment is a legislative and not a constitutional matter and that as such it was improperly passed.

It is charged that the amendment centralizes authority without the consent of the people of New Jersey and that it is a violation of their sovereign rights. The Volstead act, having been enacted under authority of the amendment, the petition says, is null and void.

It is claimed that the Volstead act is illegal because by "depreciating and in a large measure destroying the taxable value of real and personal property within the state," it is destructive of the state's free and independent government, because it deprives the state of revenues from licenses, which in 1918 amounted to \$2,442,889, and because it interferes with the internal government of the people and operates to punish them by heavy fines, imprisonment and forfeitures, thus preventing application for licenses for the sale of non-intoxicating beverages which is authorized under the laws of the state.

Industrial Conference Report Soon.

Washington—The report of the second conference named by President Wilson to formulate a program designed to bring about industrial peace will be ready for the president in the near future. The conference expects to complete its work Saturday.

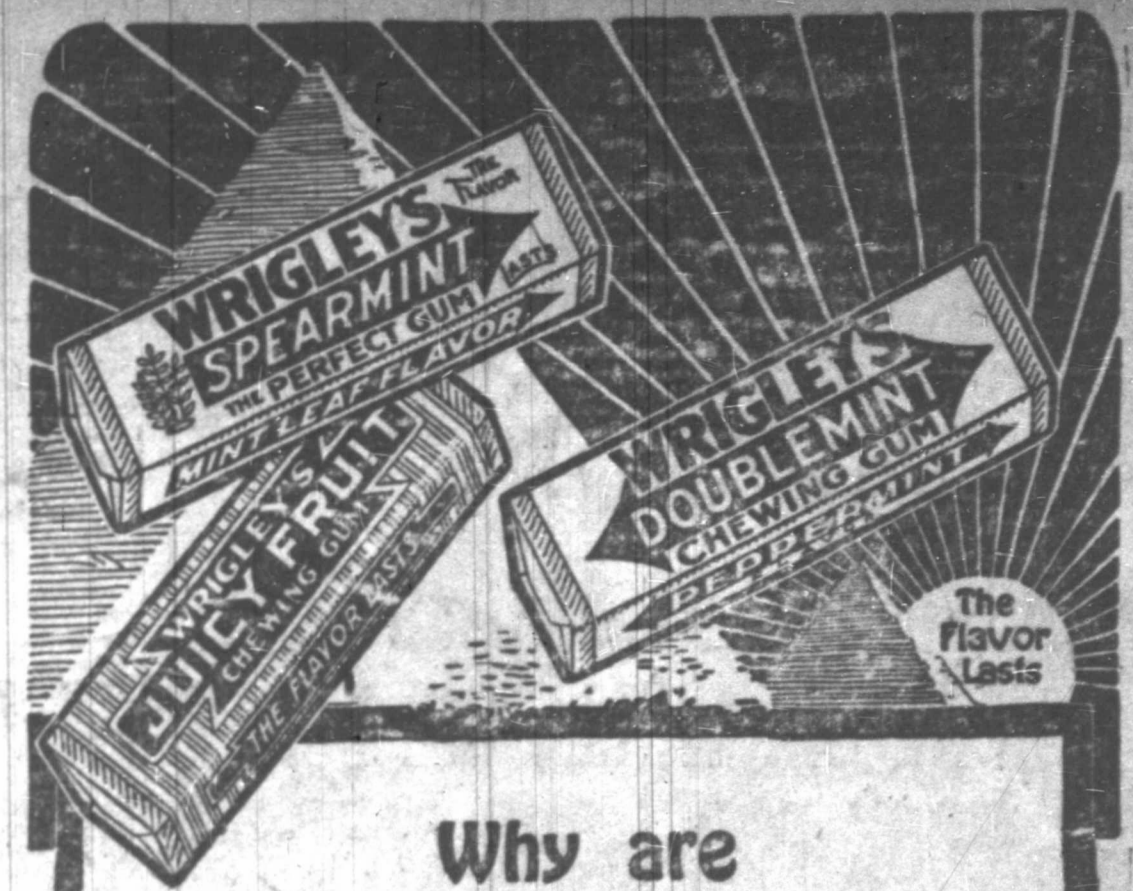

Government Presents Contract for Financing Survey of Red Bluff Dam

The long awaited contract for the financing of the proposed Red Bluff dam and reservoir site, by the city of Pecos and the Pecos Valley Water Users Association of Texas, was received Monday by Secretary J. G. Love of the association. A special meeting of the members of the heads of the different irrigation companies comprising the association will be called by President Casey for some time next week to consummate the contract and put up the required money, the amount of which is \$10,000.

By the terms of the contract the association agrees to deposit the \$10,000 with the disbursing officer of the reclamation service at Denver. Upon notice from the director of the service that the results of the preliminary survey show the project to be feasible and the irrigation of the lands along the Pecos Valley worthy of further investigation, and that additional funds are needed to pursue the survey to completion, then the association will be required to deposit the balance called for with the disbursing officer within fifteen days after receiving such notification. This is a different arrangement from that which the association believed would be granted them, it being understood from the department's first communication that any needed expense over the \$10,000 would be taken care of by the government. However, there is little likelihood of the proposition being turned down on that account, for the raising of this money amounts practically to a loan to the government, and, it is believed, can be collected by the association later as an item of expense in financing the project.

Anyway, the association is given the privilege of setting a limit beyond which they will not go, a blank being left in the contract for the filling in of the maximum amount they will stand for.

The association is further called on to furnish all possible assistance in the way of previous reports, records and engineering data that it has now or can obtain later, in order that such data may be used in the investigation. This provides for the utilization of the undoubtedly wide and thorough knowledge of this project possessed by V. L. Sullivan, the engineer in the

employ of the association, who has made a very painstaking investigation and survey of the dam and reservoir site, the results of which the association is very anxious to get before the department.

The investigation will cover only the points of feasibility and cost of the dam and reservoir at Red Bluff, just north of the state line in New Mexico. The presentation of the contract is taken here to mean that if the report of the engineers is favorable the project will be put through. There has been some uneasiness about objections from New Mexico, where some people along the upper Pecos seem to fear that the use of the water in Texas will interfere with their own irrigation projects, but as it is proposed to utilize only the flood waters of the Pecos these objections are expected to die down, and anyway the government having started something can probably be depended upon to finish it.

The contract specifically states, however, that "all work and expenditure under this contract shall cease whenever the funds to be so advanced shall become exhausted whether said work shall have been completed or not." Meaning we must do a little job of finishing, ourselves, having started.

Which we probably will. The Red Bluff project in the opinion of many affords a better opportunity to Pecos than anything else, even the oil boom, for long after oil is all gone from under the basin the Pecos flood waters will be making two or three bales of cotton on every acre of Pecos Valley land they are ditched over. Few of Uncle Sam's irrigation projects have put more land under the ditch than this, which will reclaim approximately 150,000 acres, reaching from the state line to the lower extremity of the valley, seventy-five miles below Pecos.

TENT CITIES TO GIVE BOOM LOOK TO PECOS

Three tent cities to care for the hundreds of new visitors expected in Pecos as a result of the recent impetus given the oil boom by the showing made by the Bell well, are soon to rise in Pecos.

The Chamber of Commerce has secured tents and cots and has erected twenty-five tents on the lots just west of the court house. M. A. Turner, formerly city manager of Ranger, has ordered fifty tents he owned at Ranger to be rushed here, and plans to install them on lots north of the T. & P. depot. The members of the Southwest Syndicate have also ordered forty tents they own at Ranger forwarded here, and will erect them in the southeast part of the city.

These tent cities, which are common in other oil fields, will provide beds for the rush of investors in the new Texas oilman's Eldorado, until the several hotel propositions which are now under way materialize and the visitors can be taken care of indoors.

Many patriotic Pecos citizens are offering every available space in their homes, and so far the city has been able to care for all its visitors, but a number of housewives have been forced to move the cot from the dining room before serving breakfast in the morning.

The hotels and the Chamber of Commerce has directed many to beds during the next week, and any housewife who has any unoccupied beds will be doing Pecos and her visitors a service by registering their rooms at the Chamber of Commerce or the hotels, so that late arrivals may be directed to them.

LIBRARY EXTENSION

Extension of library service to the 60,000,000 persons in the United States today who have inadequate opportunities of obtaining good reading matter, self-education and promotion of better citizenship through good books, are the principal aims of the "Books for Everybody" move-

ment of the American Library Association now under way in every state in the Union. The enlarged program adopted by the association forecasts a time when every man, woman and child in America will have free and easy access to all that is best in the world of books.

Encouragement of technical libraries in industries, of more books for the blind in the standard Braille type, and the expansion of the county library system, are other phases of the movement on which much stress is laid. Greater and more flexible service to the merchant marine, coast guard stations and lighthouses; translation of the best books about America into the various foreign tongues for the benefit of the 15,000,000 new Americans, financing of libraries and service to ex-soldiers, sailors and marines in hospitals of the United States public health service—these are projects put under way by the association in its broad program.

Opportunities for self-instruction in all lines of human endeavor and a broader general knowledge through reading and study courses to be prepared under the direction of skilled librarians are available under the "Books for Everybody" movement. It is a program of better citizenship through universal adult education. To carry out the work of the association for the next three years, a fund of \$2,000,000 will be obtained, not through an intensive drive, but by individual efforts of librarians, library trustees and friends of libraries.

ANOTHER MISSISSIPPI SYNDICATE TO DRILL

The Sunflower Syndicate, a group of Mississippians who hold units in the Dixieland Syndicate's drilling proposition on section 20, block 2, (where the Bell producer was brought in) will put down a well on their combined holdings in section 30, a little more than a mile west of the Bell well. WARNS SOUTHWEST AGAINST I. W. W.

The "Oil Weekly" warns the oil industry that the I. W. W. are preparing for a membership drive in the oil fields of the southwest. Two organizers are reported headed for the fields of Texas "prepared with literature, arguments and necessities of all kinds."

To those familiar with the trail of fire and blood left by the I. W. W., wherever they have "worked," the "necessities of all kinds" will mean more than mere words. In the northwest it has meant fire and murder; in the central east it has meant bombs and conspiracy against constituted order.

In the southwest its meaning should never be allowed to become plain. The two I. W. W. organizers who are reported to be heading for the oil fields of the southwest are nothing more than advocates of arson and bloodshed by the declaration of their own principles, and as such are as dangerous as mad dogs in a thickly populated community.

To the workmen in the field and in refinery the triumph of I. W. W.ism ultimately means the destruction of the properties from which the workmen derive their bread. It has already meant this in Russia.

Hunger, bloodshed, disorder, despair, bolshevism and I. W. W.ism are synonymous terms.

Among the alien miners and steel workers and forest workers of the northwest and the east and central east, bolshevism found fertile ground. Unaccustomed to improving their

condition except through bloodshed and sabotage, many of these aliens turned a willing ear to the purr of the bolshevist skunk whose very presence is not to be allowed in an atmosphere of clean Americanism.

But among the workers in the oil fields of the southwest it is inconceivable that these I. W. W. organizers will be met with anything but the rebuff which their principles warrant. There may be a few radicals in the fields and refineries—there always will be, it seems—but the rank and file of the field and refinery workers will show a larger percentage of native-born Americans than almost any other industry. The oil industry is an American industry, and is carried on by Americans.

The present union of oil field and refinery workers has declared itself against radicalism and I. W. W.ism through its official publication in several instances, and with the assistance of this organization the industry should have no difficulty in keeping bolshevism and sabotage out of the field and refinery.

Don't let them get into the fields. Nip the "membership drive" in the bud and turn over the I. W. W. organizers to Texas courts who believe in law and order and who are not to be accused of the taint of socialism and bolshevism.
