It ecites further that the amendment is a legislative and not a constituional matter and that as such it was improperly passed.

It is charged that the amendment entralizes authority without the consent of the people of New Jersey and that it is a violation of their overeign rights. The Volstead act, having been enacted under authority





BILL WOULD GIVE CONGRESS MORE POWER

Substitute for Fess Measure as to President's Hold on Office Introduced.

Washington.-The determining of whether a president is disabled to such an extent that he is unable to perform the duties of his office, would be left to an open official inquiry by the cabinet, by the terms of a bill introduced in the house of Representative Madden of Illinois, republican.

His plan is a substitute for the proposal of Representative Fess of Ohio that this determination be left to the supreme court. Madden believes congress has power to pass such a law under the article of the constitution referring to the "inability" of the chief executive, and does not think a constitutional amendment

Under the Madden bill, the cabinet would be required to begin the open inquiry when the president for a period of six consecutive weeks was unable to perform his duties. The secretary of state would be required to call the cabinet for such purpose. Absence from the country for six weeks, also, would be a cause for the inquiry. So that this bill would not be considered a reflection upon President Wilson, Madden provides that it shall not be effective until March 4, 1921.

GOLD NOW TOO CHEAP TO ENCOURAGE MINING

Startling Facts Brought Out By Economist of Mining Congress.

Washington .- The man with an income of \$2,000 is now actually drawing \$870 upon the basis of dollar value in 1913. This startling fact is brought out in a statement submitted to congress by Harold N. Lawrie, a nationally known economist for the American Mining congress. The purchasing value of the ounce of gold which, under statute can not bring more than \$20.67 has, Mr. Lawrie asserts, shrunken through inflation of currency until it is no longer possible for gold to be profitably produced. The expansion of the national credit has lowered the purchasing power of a dollar through increasing all commodity prices. Based upon the pre-war prices of 1913, these prices gradually advanced from 100 per cent in 1913 to 223 in October, Each increase in credits has been absorbed by a corresponding increase in commodity prices and has resulted in placing the nation upon an artifical plane of living. The gold producer finds the actual purchasing power of his ounce of gold is now \$9 instead of \$20.67. Mr. Lawrie's statement is in behalf of a measure to tax the use of gold in jewelry.

NOTED ATTORNEY DIES SUDDENLY IN DALLAS

Colonel William Lester Crawford Passes Away After 81 Years of Acti-

Dallas.-Colonel William Lester Crawford, pioneer Texan, confederate soldier in the civil war, and for nearly. half a century ranked as the foremost criminal lawyer of Texas, if not the entire south, died Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock. He was 81 years old on Jan. 23, last.

Death came entirely unexpectedly. Although he had been slightly ill during the last two weeks, he had appar ently recovered and had spent the whole day Monday at his office. Tuesmay morning, he arose, ate breakfast and was preparing to leave for his office when he was attacked with disziness. His wife and his daughter-inlaw, who were the only members of him to his bed. 
