

WOODMEN OF THE WORLD SPLIT DESCRIBED

Legal action to determine which faction shall control the machinery of the Wodmen of the World and the Woodmen Circle is expected to be taken in the Eightieth District Court at Houston next Saturday when injunction suits are brought up for hearing.

The convention at Houston, which began last Tuesday, ended Thursday in an apparently hopeless tangle. Charges of attempted fraudulent voting and switching of ballot boxes were freely made. The convention divided and two sets of officers were elected. Judge R. H. Buck of Fort Worth was elected head counsel of one set of officers. Buck has returned to Fort Worth and Saturday told the inside story of what happened at the convention.

High Rates Opposed

"There has been a good deal of opposition to what members of the W. O. W. believe are excessively high rates especially those charged to old members." Buck said. "It cropped out in the Houston meeting.

The opposition developed a fight when the election of officers and sovereign delegates was called and finally resulted in the imbroglio which put the lodge's affairs in court.

"The ballot box," according to Buck, "was placed in front of the stage in a theater where the convention was being held. It was there until 5 p. m. when the balloting was closed. Head Conseul Jerome B Cochran ordered the escort of the box to place it on his head and carry the box through side doors into the wings and on the stage.

"There were cries of 'lift it over the footlights'. The secort started with the box. Sterling P. Clark, former sheriff of Tarrant County, got up and followed. He asked some of the younger men to go with him.

Boxes Are Changed. "As they passed through the door, it is alleged the first box was put down and another substituted. Clark and the other men grabbed the original box and brought it to the floor of the convention. Cochran announced it was too late to count the votes and asked what should be done with them. I moved that a committee of four, two from each side, be named to take the box into custody. I didn't know there had been an attempt to switch and when some one asked. 'Which box,' I answered, 'Both,' thinking the first box had been filled to overflowing and another box used. Then the announcement was made of the switch. Pandemonium broke loose. A committee of ten was named to take charge. Both boxes were sealed and marked so as to identify the original and the substitute. Sheriff Binford of Harris County was with the committee. --







CREATING A "DOC-TORS TRUST"

Farm and Ranch will concede that the public health must be conserved and protected; that citizens should be guarded against impostors in the profession of medicine and other forms' and methods of healing. Farm and Ranch does not, however. sanction any legislation which will limit the right to minister to the sick and afflicted to any one school of practiice, nor does it endorse any move to draft our laws along the narrow lines dictated by the rules of ethics adopted by certain exclusive medical associations.

The practice of the art of healing has been chief among the professions almost from the beginning of time. Of late years the progress made in discovery has been the means of saving thousands of lives. Yet one must harken back but a few years to remember the time when members of the medical profession refused to give a fever patient a drink of water and cautioned the person suffering from pneumonia to keep the windows down. In those days a doctor's prominence and standing in the community were judged largely by the amount and degree of bitterness of the drugs prescribed, and when the Homeopaths came along with their "sugar pills," the Allopaths fought them energetically both in public and in private. Later the Homeopaths and Allopaths combined to night the Eclectics, and finally, when the Osteopaths put in an appearance with methods of healing which dispensed with drugs almost altogether, the three combined and succeeded in BUSINESS DIRECTORY making outlaws of them in many States for many years. At last the success of Osteopaths in the treatment of many ailments developed a public sentiment which forced their recognition, and at last made the Osteopathy legal. Now comes the fight against the Chiropractors and the practitioners of this school of healing are dragged into the courts almost daily, notwithstanding the living evidence of hundreds who claim they have either been fully cured or benefited by Chiropractic treatment.

Under the pretense of making the present medical practice act enforce-able, the State Medical Association of Texas has prepared amendments to the law and seek their passage for the purpose of completely eliminating the Chiropractors from practice in Texas. This same bill would put all Optometrists out of business and more than treble the practice of the medical eye specialist who is licensed to practice under the act drawn by the State Medical Association.

Active lobbying by the State Medical Association is a feature of every session of the Legislature in Texas and other States. It is disguised as an effort to surround the public with safeguards against unscrupulous impostors, but many are beginning to doubt that that is the real motive. There is a growing sentiment among the people that these efforts to restrict, by legislation, practice of the art of healing and ministering to the sick to certain select schools of medicine, are conceived in either ignorance or selfishness or both. It is common knowledge that the average doctor hesitates to concede any merit to any theory, practice or doctrine not taught in his own school. Therefore, his antagonism to any new thought, idea or practice not originating in his own circle is ex-

plained. The public understands and agrees that the prescribing of drugs, poisonous and otherwise, should be confined exclusively to those who thoroughly understand their nature and effects, but why apply the same rules to practitioners who do not use drugs? Why should Texas refuse to recognize schools of healing that have already received the sanction of other States? Will the Texas Legislature lend its assistance to the creation of a "doctors' trust," or will it grant the citizens of the State the right to choose the treatment they have the most confidence in?-Farm and Ranch.

The Enterprise editor has always believed that every doctor, of whatever sect or method, had something over the other. In fact it is a matter of history that the each and every sect have made absolute cures when others have failed to do any good whatever. Physicians have failed to effect even an emprovement in members of Reeves county families while the Osteopath or Chiropractors are now making a wonderful improvement which would probably cause a combat should one undertake to minimize the ability of these practitioners to either of two of our county commissioners-A. W. Hosie of Toyah and Julius Eisenwine of Pecos. The above is a splendid article and well worth the careful thought of our people.
