

NEFF TO SUBMIT LAWS TO

SPEED BOLL WORM FIGHT Austin, May 10 .- Bills amending the pink boll worm laws of Texas will be submitted at the special session of the Legislature, Governor Neff said Monday following a conference of representatives of cotton association and chambers of commerce of Texas in the Governor's office.

The conference was held to discusss plans to avert the threatened Federal quarantine of Texas against the pink boll worm because of the alleged failure by Texas to properly

combat the spread of the insect. The bills will amend the present law so that they will meet Federal requirements, it was announced after the conference. It was also said at the conference that these Federal requirements were not fully understood in Texas and that they would be discussed at a meeting called by the Federal Horticultural Board to be held in Washington next Monday. The Governor will appoint delegates to attend this meeting.





A Joint Resolution of the Legislature of the State of Texas amending Sections of the Constitution of the State of Texas as follows: Sections 5 and 21 and 22 and 23 of Article 4, relating to the compensation of executive officers; and Section 24, Article 3, relating to mileage and per diem of Member of the Legislature; of said State.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Article 4, and Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be so amended

as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 5. He shall at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary not to exceed Eight Thousand (\$3,000.00) Dollars and to exceed Eight Thousand (\$3,000.00) Dollars and no more, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture.

Section 21. There shall be a Secretary of State, of this State at an election to be held fourth Saturday in July, 1921, at which all have printed or written on their ballot. shall continue in office during the term of service
