can place advertising, based on the inch rate, in 2,300 homes, virtually circulated among 11,500 people for 50 cents To attempt to reach the same number of people by post card, the only other means of communication, would cost $\$ 115.00$

It can readily be seen that there is no argument from an eco nomic standpoint as the cheapest and most effective way of reach ing the public.
