Pheasant Season: Not Many Birds Locally

By BILL ELLIS

The pheasant season kicks off in Parmer County this weekend, and going by what the experts are saying, hunters are not likely to find nearly as many of the bright game birds at which to shoot as they did in 1997.

The season runs through Sunday, December 27.

"We just don't have any birds to speak of in our area,' said Jack Patterson of the Rhea community. Patterson said he had seen one cock pheasant on his place in recent weeks, and that was about it.

The longtime hunter, and a leader when the pheasants were stocked in the county back in the 1960s said that after last year's good pheasant season--the first in a number of years--he had hoped the bird's population would climb back up.

But several factors leave their nests for extensive periods in order to find drinking water, and this may

challenged the game bird once again. First and foremost was the severe drought that hit the area in early spring and lasted through late summer.

Then, in the Rhea community, what added insult to injury was the hailstorm which hit the last of October, and demolished crops and birds as well. During the "glory years" of the pheasant hunters, as many as 10,000 hunters would invade the area on the opening weekend of the hunt, and come from as far away as Dallas-Fort Worth,

Houston and San Antonio. Governors and other "celebrity hunters" have also taken part. Governor Preston Smith was a regular for many seasons--before and after he was governor.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has estimated that an average hunter coming from outside the area spends in excess of \$1,000, on transportation, lodging, meals, gasoline and so forth. So, if a thousand hunters come into the local area, this could mean an addition of around a million dollars.

With this as the "carrot," perhaps we need to work even harder to keep the pheasant population going in Parmer County.

So with all of the other memorable traditons which surround our most wonderful holiday, perhaps this is one that we can forego.

Immunization clinics offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases are scheduled for November.



Dear Coach Dewitt,

Merry Christmas, Happy New Year, and all the blessings of the season to you and your family.

It is that time of the year The vaccinations are for shopping, greetings, and available at the WIC Office, of course, high school basketball.

We played our last basketball game in 1957, but I have been back on the court for the past four seasons, taking pictures for the newspapers.

It has been fun for me to

relive my high school basketball years and fill a lot of scrapbooks with action pictures of these kids.

Of course, I guess you already know that since I send you the newspaper every week. Let's just say it's my way of giving you something back for what you gave me. I'm just sorry it took me forty years to say thanks and let you know that I love you for it.

You know coach, a lot of things have changed in the game since we played in the 50s. For one thing, when I was a teenager, I thought you were a whole lot older than me. Now that I will soon be 60 are you sure you are only 75?

I remember the lockers in our dressing room at the old Hillsboro gymnasium were made out of wood and chicken wire. So were the benches we sat on to lace up our black ankle-length tennis

I don't remember those shoes having any fancy names either. Another thing, coach, the long bloomers the high schools wear these days are pretty ugly, don't you

I guess you might say that our uniforms were your basic shorts, tank top, and socks. We did have warmup jackets but no long sweat pants as I remember it.

Some other things we did not have in 1950s high school basketball: 3-point shots, glass backboards, dunk shots, comfortable buses, video cameras, Gatorade water bottles, enough towels.

Back then we had the "A" team and "B" teams. We didn't call it varsity and junior varsity.

My memories of our Hillsboro Eagles basketball seasons are hazy in some areas. Maybe too much time has passed, coach. Or maybe I have ended up with only memories that really matter.

I remember being in the Amarillo several months starting lineup my senior you, this is the 100% truth, I moving there from Friona. year. That is a goal that all athletes still strive for. To be in the top five on the team.

But I also remember a teammate named Refugio Rizo that was my substitute. I hated it when you sent him in in my place. There was always that chance he might stay in and keep me on the bench.

Do you remember on our road trips south of Hillsboro when we would always stop at the Chicken Shack in Waco. (That's another thing missing from 50s basketball: McDonald's, Taco Bell, and any other fast food restaurant.)

I can still see and smell those platters of fried chicken

at the Shack. All you can eat, then lick the grease off your fingers for the next 50

It is funny to me how you can remember one play out of the thousands of times we passed the ball. One game I was playing out front.

I had the ball and out of

the corner of my eye I spotted Booger Podsednik under the basket all by himself. Without looking at him, I rifled a pass to him and in one motion he laid it in for two points.

Coach, I can still see that pass as clear as if it were last night. What a beauty. Of course after a play like that, I had to "look over at the old gym and the echoing

As players, looking over at the coach was the way to get through the game. There are several circumstances in which we had to look over, coach:

When the defense or the offense was not working, when the clock was running out and we might need a time out, when we heard you yell, when we didn't hear you yell, or when we just needed a second or two of confidence, we could always look over at the coach.

And coach, I have to tell do not have even one hint of and look over at my old a bad memory of you as a coach, a man, a friend.

I think that is a pretty special legacy for a coach. I am sure that Booger, Bobby,

Duck, and Joe feel the same.

Anyway, I'm sure we broke some rules and made your life miserable from time to time. Blame that on being teenagers.

I also know that whatever you said was gospel. We trusted it and even if it didn't always work, we didn't notice.

With you we never ran out of chances to improve. These days it seems some kids get a limited number of chances and are written off.

Not the Hillsboro Eagles basketball team of 1956-57. We were all fairly poor back then compared to today, but we never knew it.

I loved the smell of that sounds of basketballs bouncing and being around my teammates.

Inevitably, the buzzer sounded and it was time to play. Time to look over at the coach.

There is a life lesson in there somewhere Coach Dewitt. Maybe it is this: Even on the field of life, it is good to pause and look over to the coach.

You touched my life and left a fingerprint on my memory. Coaches should be like that.

This Christmas season I just wanted to stop, reflect, coach and give thanks that a long time ago, I was fortunate to be one of the ones who played for him.
