# LATEST OIL NEWS IN PECOS FIELD

The Bell well is 'to start work Monday, the Laura derrick will probably be partially erected at that time, while other activities in the Pecos territory indicate that the field will be a very busy one within a very short time.

The River well of the Arthur-Pitts company has been pushed rapidly ahead during the past two weeks and is now practically drilled through the 180 foot of salt bed known to lie in that well between 1300 and 1550 feet, and should find the hard lime rock in which a small showing of oil has been had in the River No. 1. The latter well was abandoned because of a bad fishing job and the No. 2, pushed down along side of it. There is an artesian flow in the No. 1, and this flow frequently brings out with it a small quantity of oil.

At times during the drilling of the No. 1, this showing was had, but as it was not steady no effort was made to find the sand, and it was taken merely as a favorable location.

Although no definite decision has been reached in regard to the Bell, work in removing the present string of casing will be started Monday and an attempt made either to mud off or to cement off the water from the heavy gas flow. This flow continues strong, and when the lack of wind carry slight rainbows. makes it safe the gas is lighted at night and flames from twenty to forty feet in length result.

The fishing job on the Tovah Bell was delayed early in the week by an accident to the bull wheel but this was repaired and work resumed on Thursday. A large bit is being used in drilling around the lost bit at hole and permit the lost bit to be straightened sufficiently to allow the horn socket in use to be slipped over the top of the tool.

The present position of the lost bit will not permit the socket to slip far enough over it to grasp the bit an bring it to the top.



reason it is difficult for an editor to establish a reputation. He goes off of one paper and on to another, according to the whim of the owner, bequeathing to the owner such prestige as his writings have brought to the paper.

The signed editorials will be more accurate and less likely to do injustice to those about whom the editor writes; when the identity of the writer is concealed, there is an invitation to carelessness if not to recklessness.

But what the present needs most is and ideal that will lead the writer to express his own convictions or none. No man can afford to write that which he believes to be untrue, whether he is discussing men or measures. If he yields to the temptation to express the opinion of others contrary to his own, he will in time obliterate the truth-discerning-sense and thus cease to be a moral factor in the newspaper world. No one can legally excuse the commission of a crime by pleading he was the agent of another; and so there is no moral justification for the writing of that which one believes to be untrue, merely because he is told to do so. Great editors do not work in the dark; they establish their place by winning the confidence of the public and they hold that confidence by conscientiously guarding the trust reposed







THE TOWNSEND HIGHWAY BILL Washington, D. C., May 19.—"The difference between the Townsend Highway Bill and the Dowell good road Bill is that the former provides cross country trunk lines or boulevards for those who have the money and time to idle away in low distance tours while the Dowell Bill would furnish more local roads available for farmto-market purposes and which are of service to all the people." This statement was issued here by the American Farm Bureau Federation shortly after Congressman C. C. Dowell of Iowa had introduced his bill.

"The Townsend Bill plans to tax communities so heavily through which the highways pass that the local money for road building will be exhausted and the greatest amount of traffic the local nearby travel-will be forced to wallow in the mud. It specified that all highways built under the federal aid shall be 66 feet wide and have a wearing surface of not less than 20 feet. To build such boulevards in some parts of the country would be wasteful and economically not justifiable and a few miles of it would absorb all of the local or state funds available. These boulevards would be built through desert, mountainous country, or where trave is
