Why is less meat per capita being eaten in the United States today than was eaten ten or twenty years ago? Have the people gone on a meat eating strike. Nine persons out of ten will reply to the question by stating that the price of meat is so high they cannot afford to buy it, says the Fort Worth Record.

Cattle raising is one of the greatest industries in Texas and the packing houses have made Fort Worth the center of the cattle raising interests. It is to the interest of Fort Worth people that the packing houses be encouraged in every way possible and the people are loyal to them, and yet it is likely that as little meat is eaten in Fort Worth as in any city in the country. It is because the prices are too high or because the people need just a little education along meat-eating lines.

The packer buys his meat on the hoof, say for about 5 cents a pound. In the process of killing and preparing it for market the cost may reach another 5 cents, perhaps a little more. 



Physicians recommend the old method of sucking the poison from the wound in case of snake bite if the other methods are found impossible. The practice is not as dangerous as some might suppose, physicians say, unless there is an open sore in the mouth. It is practically safe to suck the poison into the mouth, for the fluid is retained for the most part in the interior part of the mouth and is not likely to reach any portion which might become infected. The method of treatment is effective in drawing off a considerable part of the poison.





FREIGHT RATES.

(Literary Digest.)

In arguing for lower freight rates, Senator Capper and others have asserted that the rate on wheat from Kansas City to New York was 30 cents a bushel, while the rate from far-off Argentina to New York was only 10 cents. Since such statements were mentioned in the Literary Digest it is only fair to note a reply to them from authoritative spokesmen for the railroads. Pres. Daniel Willard, of the Baltimore & Ohio, told the interstate commerce committee of the senate last month that Senator Capper's assertion "was correct, so far as it went, but it did not go Retail Merchants' Association?-Did the whole distance. People do not eat wheat; they eat flour. And wheat does not grow at tide-water; it grows in land, even in Argentina." Bearing these facts in mind. Mr. Willard made some investigations to find out what the whole rate would be. He discovered that the freight rate on a bushel of wheat in the form of flour would be 48 cents from Argentina to New York as compared with 33 cents from Kansas City to New York.

The terms of settlement of the British strike in the coal mines has had little said of them. 
