## Truck Wreck Hurts Two

Thursday Jan 21, a semi was turning around at the roadside park crossover when a pickup pulling a cattle trailer, in the inside lane, slammed into the side of the tractor trailer. The impact knocked the semi over onto its right side.

The pickup was crumpled partially under the trailer and the goose-neck cattle trailer, carrying about 10 head of cattle, was tilted on its right side. The driver was extricated by Friona Firemen who used the jaws of life to remove the pickup steering wheel.

The truck driver was not seriously injured but was taken to PCCH. The pickup driver was taken by helicopter to Amarillo. Fire-men used the jaws of life and help from local cowboys to remove about 8-10 injured cattle from the trailer. No other details were available at press time.

## Star Lites

For the past several years, it cost 32 cents for the first ounce, and 23 cents for the second ounce, or 55 cents. The U.S. Postal Service, in its infinite wisdom, has decreed that since they've raised the one-ounce price to 33 cents, they'll just lower the price of the second stamp to 22 cents.

Say what???? So it still costs 55 cents to send a two-ounce letter first class. Not much gain here.

In fact, the government printing office has had to crank up its presses to put out millions of the new 22c stamps which will be companions for the 33-centers.

I am in the printing business to some extent. I pay a sizeable printing bill every week, and I can attest that printers don't give you your printing for nothing. How many postage stamps will the USPS have to sell to pay for all of the new 33c and 22c stamps that mailers will have to use?

They have also had to print a bunch of very confusing-looking one-cent stamps you can use to finish off your old roll of 32-cent stamps. I guess there are some one-cent stamps. The ones we were sold have a picture of a rooster, and the small print (which my one eye can hardly read) says "The H-rate Makeup Stamp."

Say what????-again. When we went to buy our new 33-cent stamps, we were given patriotic red, white and blue stamps with only a big "H" on them. No indication that they were worth 33c at all. What kind of idiot comes up with these things? Why couldn't they just have printed 33-cent stamps, instead of the "H" stamps? They have known for two years about the rate hike.

Most people we know, who are smart enough to use the U.S. Mails, can tell the numbers 32 and 33 apart, and know right away what they mean. But "H," and "H-rate Makeup Stamp" ??? Give us a break.

I have thought for years that the only people who come out with big profits from the postal rate increases are the bureaucrat fat-cats who have the government printing contracts.

Our newspapers also got in on the rate hike. Along with that comes new postal forms that we submit with our weekly check to USPS. They change the forms two or three times per year, and we always have a nine-month supply of the old forms to take to the dumpster. Try to picture how this is multiplied across the country, and in the metropolitan areas, whose newspapers' needs for forms, etc. make ours look miniscule.

The government printers are the ones who sell the U.S. Postal Service on the idea of starting out with "H" stamps, and then phase these out for 33-centers. The biggest part of the one-cent, or "makeup" stamps sold may never be used. The government printers and USPS bosses don't care. They have just sold the American public a bunch of shiny new stamps--and a year's supply of postal forms (which will be replaced in April with new ones). This one-cent first class increase was just a smoke screen.

One reason the USPS may have needed rate increases is the fact that it lost around \$85 million on new ventures not even related to mail delivery, such as selling coffee mugs, T-shirts, neckties and long-distance phone cards--expanding into areas already covered by the private sector. This was completely unnecessary.

Then, we understand that the Postal Service spent over \$265 million in advertising last year. If your local newspaper had received even a dime of this bad-idea expense, it might be easier to swallow the new rate hike, but alas, we didn't.

Congress tried to block the postal rate hike, passing a non-binding resolution last year opposing the increase. However, the Postal Service Board of Governors overrode congress' objections and raised the postal rates anyway.

Some innovative mailers, perhaps confused by the "H" and add-ons" have reportedly taped a penny on their letters along with their old 32-cent stamps. I by the time these letters tear up the automatic cancelling machines, the post office may have a legitimate reason to raise the rates.

# Combest Upbeat On S. American Trade

Congressman Larry Combest, reporting to a group of area newspaper publishers, said he was extremely encouraged by the prospects of trade, especially involving agricultural products, with Venezuela, Chile and Brazil.

Combest, newly-appointed House Agricultural Chairman, made the trip to South America at the invitation of Cong. Bill Archer, chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, and the U.S. Trade Commission.

The group left Washington, on January 7, and returned the 16th. "It was one of the most educational trips I have made," Combest said.

Combest was able to meet with high government officials in each of the three countries. He said he was very encouraged about the prospects of trade with each one. He was invited by Archer due to the fact that agricultural products were thought to be an important part of increased trade.

In Venezuela, the U.S. group met with new president Hugo Chavez. "We are considered friends of the Chavez administration. They are in our same time zone, and can receive import products from America days ahead of anywhere else, even their South American neighbors.

Combest felt that Venezuela could be courted as a much better importer of U.S. goods. "Most of their imports come from Texas and Florida already," he said.

In Santiago, Chile, the U.S. delegation met with the country's entire cabinet, and the U.S. Embassy officials and local officials. The Chileans expressed disappointment that their country was not included as part of "NAFTA," which was limited to North American countries.

They have established free trade zones with Mexico and

Canada, and have a very strong economy, one of the strongest in South America, the congressman told the publishers. The U.S. already has a two billion dollar trade surplus with Chile, and could increase that by lifting the current tariff, Combest thinks.

The American delegation arrived in Brazil just at the time the news broke about that country's devalued currency. "We came away with a good feeling about Brazil," Combest said. Brazil's economic leaders acted swiftly to counteract the devaluation of their "real" (dollar), and it was stronger than before in a matter of days.

Combest was able to have lunch with his agricultural counterpart in Brazil, and had a nice visit through an interpreter. "It turns out that he has a sister who is attending Texas Tech at the present time," the congressman said, which gave the couple some common ground.

Combest was also impressed in Chile with the country's social security system, which uses a personal investment system whereby those receiving benefits are given passbook savings accounts. "They can tell at any time how much money they have in their accounts. The system was devised in the middle 1980s, and has worked wonders," the congressman said.

"The Chilean people we met were some of the most


astute, knowledgeable people I have met," Combest said. He wrote a letter through the American Embassy to President Clinton, encouraging him to meet with their officials as soon as possible, and said that the president has already responded.

The Lubbock congressman said that some elected officials are criticized for trips they take abroad, but wants to be up front with those he makes, hence the tele-conference with some of the region's newspaper publishers.

## 70 Yrs. Ago--Jan. 18, 1929

It was a close game for a half. Five players each had a basket, and in addition Sheri Fiel added a free throw as the Squaws got off to an 11-5 first quarter lead.

The teams swapped baskets during the second quarter, with Littlefield narrowing Friona's lead. It looked as though the Squaws would have just a three-point halftime lead, 21-18 when Littlefield scored in the last 30 seconds of the half.

But Crystal Morton was fouled with just 4.4 seconds on the clock. She neatly sank both shots for a little more breathing room at halftime, 23-18.

The Squaws came out in the third quarter and put on a good basketball "clinic." Whitney Ellis sank a turning jump shot to open the quarter, and quickly added a layup on a fast break for a 27-19 Friona lead.

Morton added a jump shot, Jamille Hand made a layup, and when reserve V Laura Wilcox converted a jump shot off a good move against her guard, the Squaws had hiked their lead to 33-19 with 3:33 left in the period.

Diamond Aguirre made a "seeing-eye" hook shot a minute later; Miss Wilcox made a layup from the baseline, and Miss Fiel's turning jump shot at the 13-second mark gave Friona a 39-23 lead. The team had dominated the Lady Wildcats, 16-5 in the third period, and had the game well in hand. The fourth quarter was free-shot time, and the Squaws made five of eight, adding six field goals for good measure, including three by Kayla Smiley.

Ellis led with 11 points. Three players, Smiley, Hand and Dow, each scored eight.

Last Friday the team downed Cooper on the South Lubbock County team's home court, 47-33.

Fiel started on the right foot, hitting three baskets to pace Friona's 13-10 early lead. Dow took over the scoring chores in the second quarter, but the team was still clinging to its 23-20 lead at halftime.

Friona turned up the defense in the third quarter, and got three-point baskets by April Pope and Morton, to hike their lead to 13 points, 37-24. The Squaws held onto this margin for the win.

Fiel's ten points led the scoring, as seven players shared very evenly in the offensive output.

# Chieftains Upend Wildcats By 40-25

Two very unusual things happened in the Chieftains-Littlefield district game here Tuesday:

(1) a visiting radio commentator was ejected; and (2) the game was terminated with about 40 seconds remaining.

In the aftermath of the wild and woolly basketball game, Friona came away with a 40-25 win, to remain unbeaten in district play at 3-0.

To say it was a "hard-fought win" would be an understatement. The game was fairly physical throughout, and the referee blew the whistle and called it "over," to prevent a player being hurt.

--It was almost too late, since the game's final play saw burly Littlefield post player slam into Friona's little playmaker, Nathan King on an intentional foul.

"I told the boys at halftime that we were still in the game, and that the first couple of minutes of the second half were critical, that if we could score quickly, we could be right in it."

"They did a great job, and Justin really attacked the basket. The win was a tribute to the team's hard defensive play," Coach Hayden Merrett said.

It was a most unusual game. Littlefield bolted to an 8-0 lead. Friona finally broke the ice when Justin Daniel made a layup with 4:57 left in the quarter. Daniel came back for a free throw and short jump shot to bring the Chieftains within one, 8-7. Littlefield led, 11-7 at the end of one.

If Friona was cold in the first quarter, then "frigid" might describe the second quarter. Daniel scored the team's only points with a

follow shot mid-way through. Good defense by the Chiefs kept Littlefield to only an eight-point lead, 17-9, at the half.

What do you do when your opponent holds you to a paltry nine points in a half? Why, hold them to just eight in the second half. Littlefield's Steven McCain made a layup just ten seconds before the game was ended, or the 'Cats would have been shut out in the fourth quarter.

Daniel paced the second-half, comeback, making three of four at the line, sinking a reverse layup and following his own miss with a basket that tied the score at 20-all with 2:12 left in the third.

The big point-man scored another lay-in ten seconds later, and Friona had its first lead at 22-20.

Play had been intense all night, with the tight man-to-man coverage, and it got worse real soon.

Littlefield had regained the lead on a three-pointer by Randle Morris (10). Daniel got it back with a follow shot 28 seconds into the fourth, 24-23. Suddenly the 'Cats felt like fouling the Chieftains.

Friona was cold at the line to start with, but got enough chances that they at last warmed up. Reserve Adolfo Avalos came in to hit two of four at the line, and a very timely basket that turned into a three-point play with just 2:50 remaining that virtually locked up the game. King fed Avalos with a perfect pass on a fast break. That made Friona's lead 34-23.

The 'Cats were content to try to make three-point baskets, and just weren't hitting them. Friona went into a "control" game with about four minutes left, and it worked to perfection.

The Chiefs hit six of seven from the line in the final 3:12 of the game. At the 2:50 mark, Avalos spotted Daniel wide open under the basket and whipped a pass which Justin turned into his final points and a 36-23 lead.

Daniel had one of his best games with 20 points, and also made some sparkling defensive plays. The win pushed Friona's season record to 13-8.

Littlefield came into the game with a 16-6 season record.

"We did a good job stopping Littlefield's penetration. When Landon Martin took their charge, they quit attacking, and this also threw off their outside shooters, who weren't hitting the basket," Merrett said.

"We had some shots in the first half, but they just weren't falling. I thought we could come back, and we did."

The Chieftain coach pointed out that in three district games the Chiefs have given up only 112 points, a defensive average of 37 points.

Last Friday the team traveled to Lubbock Cooper and came home with a 45-42 (Continued on Page 6)





In the second half, Friona's defense shut down Randall's attack and scored three goals. Scores and assists were attributed to Fidel Sanchez, Gabriel


Eubank, Jose Pina, and Luis Garcia.



## YOUR EYES

### Floater

Are you suddenly seeing what appears to be an army of black gnats swarming around you? Just about everyone occasionally sees floaters (they can look like spots, specks or hairs) in their field of vision. These are nothing more than bits of your eyeball's inner fluid floating into view. As you age, the gel-like substance inside the eyeball liquifies. It causes the sensation of dark spots or squiggly lines.



Eventually, the spots will disappear on their own, but in the meantime, you can get rid of them by exercising your eyes. Simply move your eyes up and down.

Sometimes floaters can indicate a bigger problem which could ultimately threaten your eyesight. If the floaters persist, happen frequently or come on very suddenly, see your doctor. If they appear after you've been hit in the head or eye, it's also important to see your doctor.


