Heart-Breaking Loss For Squaws Tuesday

Losses can't possibly come any harder than the one the Squaws experienced in their final home game Tuesday when the team hosted

when the team hosted Muleshoe.

Having battled back time and again, the team seemed to have the game won when they led by a point with 4.4 seconds remaining, and had the ball to in-bound.

The Lady Mules managed to tip the in-bounds throw by Friona, then another player managed to save the ball from going out of bounds. Muleshoe's Lindsey Field grabbed the ball and made a shot all in one motion.

The buzzer sounded while the shot was in the air. The ball hit nothing but net, and Muleshoe had avoided the loss and broke the hearts of the Squaws, who scrapped from start to finish in attempt to upset the high-flying Lady Mules. A win would have been the 20th for the Friona team.

Both teams had pressed each other most of the game, and both had several turnovers. Friona had a ton of shots go in and out, especially in the first half. But the Squaws had fought gamely to stay with the Muleshoe girls.

The last-second loss put the damper on a super

The last-second loss put the damper on a super performance by V'Laura Wilcox, who scored three timely baskets in the second half, including five points in the space of 38 seconds, to bring the team from a one-point deficit to a three-point lead with just over three minutes remaining.

For much of the first half, Friona fans wondered if there

Miss Ellis sank a jump shot, and Crystal Dow made a free throw, to pull the team within four, 19-15, at the half.

Miss Dow started off like a house-afire in the second half. She hit a jump shot for a 17-19 deficit, and on the team's next trip downcourt, made a layup off an assist by Miss Hand, to knot the game at 19-all at the 6:31 mark.

The Squaws then stole the ball, Miss Pope got it and drove for a jump shot that gave Friona a 21-19 lead. Muleshoe went the final 3:29 of the first half, and the first 2:31 of the second without scoring a single point-six minutes of clock time.

With the score tied 23-all, Miss Dow made a free throw and Miss Wilcox picked up a loose ball at midcourt and drove for a layup and a 26-23 Friona lead. But Muleshoe scored the final four points of the quarter to regain the lead at 27-26.

The team lost Daniel to fouls, and Nathan King had four. Daniel's 29 points paced the Chiefs.




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
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Out Here
