

Stock Show Sale At All-Time High



may need from two to ten within the 15-county Water inches of water from irrigation and/or precipitation to bring the five-foot root zone soil profile to field capacity prior to spring 1999 planting, according to pre-plant soil moisture data released by the Water District and the USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service (USDA-NRCS).

At the time pre-plant soil moisture readings were made in November/December 1998, approximately six per cent of the portion of Parmer County served by the High Plains Water District needed about two to four inches of moisture to bring the soil to field capacity. Approximately 52 per cent of the county needed four to six inches of moisture, 40 per cent of the county needed six to eight inches, and the remaining two per cent needed from eight to ten inches of moisture.

However, two precipi-tation events have occurred since the 1999 pre-plant soil moisture survey was conducted. Precipitation totals ranging from a half inch to

January. "This precipitation reduced the soil moisture deficit. Therefore, it is extremely important for producers to check soil moisture conditions in their individual fields before the start of pre-plant irriga-tion," said Gerald Crenwelge, USDA-NRCS soil scientist.

A Water District publication, Estimating Soil Moisture By Feel and Appearance, can guide producers in assessing their soil moisture conditions. Anyone within the High Plains Water District service area can request a free copy by contacting the District's Lubbock office at (806) 762-0181.


If it is determined that pre-plant irrigation is needed to bring the soil to field capacity, it is recommended that it be done early enough so that the 1999 crop has a full soil moisture profile to draw on during the growing

Historical data shows that above-average crop yields are more likely when the five-foot root zone soil profile is at or near field capacity.

It is important to keep the soil in a condition that can easily absorb any precipitation that occurs during the pre-plant and growing seasons. In addition, producers are reminded to utilize techniques such as furrow diking to keep rainfall from running off the field.

in the soil, producers should help keep it there by limiting tillage practices that might turn moist soil to the surface, where the moisture can evaporate and no longer be available for plant use," said Crenwelge.

Management Burden Shifts Under Eradication

Some growers who admit that we have a weevil problem say that \$12 per irrigated acre is just too much to pay and they would rather treat their weevils themselves.

If you treat the weevil on your own \$12 will get you only the two overwinter sprays needed to START a personal control effort and leave no money for diapause sprays in the fall. You would also have added expense involved in trapping your fields. In an eradication program you know what your costs will be and the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation handles all trapping and spraying operations and their costs.



Lazbuddie Student Wins **Annual County NRC Award**

Each year, the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District presents a "Conservationist of the Year" award, usually to a farmer who is practicing conservation techniques.

This year, in somewhat of a departure, the Conservation District presented its award to a 10-year-old Lazbuddie fourth-grade student, Montana Leigh Steinbock.

Miss Steinbock, daughter of Charleson and Belinda Steinbock of the Lazbuddie community, first became noticed when her poster won the district's annual contest for Parmer County students, promoting water and soil conservation. She was a thirdgrader at the time.

But it didn't end there.

The winning posters each year are entered in the regional contest which makes up the northern 52 counties in Texas, explained county NRC chairman M.C. Osborn. Parer county's entry by Miss Steinbock won first place in Region 1, and was honored at the region's awards banquet in Plainview last May, where Texas House Speaker Pete Laney served as host.

Next, the poster was entered in the Texas Soil & Water Conservation contest, and again won first place. Parmer County's winner was invited to Corpus Christi last fall, to receive recognition at the state's Soil & Water Conservation convention.

In February of this year, it was learned that Miss Steinbock's much-travelled poster placed second in the National Assn.

Conservation Districts' contest. "There are likely over a hundred thousand entries submitted each year in the United States for this competition. The poster was displayed in San Diego earlier this month at the NACD annual convention," Osborn said in presenting the award.

"Our girl, now a fourth grade student, takes these projects very seriously, doing research on conservation, farming, wildlife and the environment. Her artwork has exceptional detail and interest," the presentor continued.

"For her efforts of promoting conservation through her drawings and for proudly representing Parmer County, the district is happy to present its annual award to Montana Leigh Steinbock," Osborn concluded.

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


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

Immunization clinics offering vaccines that give protection against several child-hood diseases are scheduled for March.



A Cure For Nearsightedness?

Sensational headlines in the daily newspapers sometimes trumpet dramatic new "cures" for one condition or another--including problems as common as myopia, or nearsight-


Radial keratotomy is a surgical procedure in which tiny slits are cut all around the cornea to change its curvature and thus the way it focuses an image on the retina. This surgery is still considered a controversial and experimental technique. Results have been mixed: while some patients can see perfectly, other eyes have been overcorrected, leaving the individual somewhat far-sighted. The corneal ring, a device currently under FDA review, is designed to be implanted under the cornea to effect the same kind of correction.

What's important is that myopia can be corrected. Most people, we have found, prefer to avoid unnecessary surgery or experimental techniques. Corrective lenses--whether eyeglasses or contact lenses-are tried and true to do the job. See your optometrist for a thorough

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
