FAMOUS SUNKEN VALLEY OF BREWSTER COUNTY

Senator O'Brien and Dr. G. A. Bullard, a naturalist of Colorado, have heard of the famous sunken valley of Brewster county, and are anxious to make an exploration of the same, provided such a place really exists, and has not already been explored. The report reaching them tells of a sunken valley, rimmed in by a precipitous wall of rocks, 200 feet high, in which trees grow to a height of 200 feet. The valley is further described as being about 100 miles south of Alpine, 20 miles inland from the Rio Grande and practically inaccessible. It is credited with containing a herd of genuine albino deer, the hills possessing good minerals and marbles, the soil in the valley very fertile and the climate warm, suitable for date raising.

Dr. Bullard's idea is to explore the region if the actual conditions should warrant it. He would take pictures, and secure specimens of the albino deer for scientific purposes. He would like to have some authentic data regarding its existence, the best route of approach and such information as would be useful to explorers. Would it be practical to fly in by aeroplane, and could proper landing ground be found? How near could gas and oil be secured should they attempt to fly in?

The Avalanche will state that the U. S. Geological Survey has within recent years compiled a survey of Brewster county, mapping the entire region.

The county abounds in scenes of grandeur and places of interest to scientific men and all lovers of the beauties and wonderful things of nature. No doubt these men would find here many things of interest to them.—Alpine Avalanche.

Probably the above refers to the Canon del Barrego on the ranch of Mrs. Lizzie Crosson, situated about 25 miles east of Marfa, and in Brewster county. This wonderful and picturesque work of nature is a narrow gorge chisled through a lava flow, in length about 1-2 miles and places not exceeding 200 yards in breadth. Where Goat creek enters the canon there is a waterfall about 350 feet high. Here in the upper end the walls are about 500 feet and as the canon emerges into Green valley they gradually rise to the dizzy height of 3000 feet in several places. The only entrance and outlet is from Green valley. At this point one can ride a horse up the canon or valley for about two hundred yards. From there it is an extremely difficult feat to make your way up to the waterfalls. In places the walls are very narrow and in these places there are always pools of water extending from side to side. As the valley widens you find a thick jungle of bush trees and vines. There are in places immense cottonwoods, which viewed from the outer rim from above appear like green dots, but in reality they are 100 feet tall at least.

Mr. Thomas Crosson, who has twice entered the canon, says that once he chased a lion there which he was following as it entered from the Green valley mouth, and that he was certain of getting him there, but while he was going up on one side the lion passed him on the other, and that the brush, trees and vines were so dense, although it was in the daytime, the darkness was so great in the depth of the canon, the lion slipped by unseen.

The Canon del Barrego must be an interesting place to visit—in company and with arms. Unless under circumstances narrated by Bill Burns, who is still living in Brewster county, and claims to have been there when the Mission fathers built Cathedral mountain. Bill says, as Mr. Crosson tells it, that once he was chased by a band of Indians, and that finally he made a stand in the mouth of the canon, among the great boulders scattered and piled up there, a veritable natural breast-work. But the savages routed him out and he took flight up the Canon del Barrego. Finally he stood looking up at the waterfall and around the canon's precipitous sides—there was no possible way of escape, on looking down the canon he saw the

painting savages closing in on him. Mr. Crosson, at this exciting situation as Bill hesitated to proceed, asked: "How did you get out?" "I never did get out of that fix, the d— Injuns just killed me there."
