CONGRESS TO TAKE UP WORK FOR NEW YEAR.

(Continued from Page 1.)

ator Walsh appointed. Democrats appear to favor Senator Walsh's plan.

Emergency immigration legislation is to be taken up tomorrow by the senate immigration committee, which is to take up the house bill, virtually to prohibit all immigration for two years.

Final action on the bill to revive the war finance corporation, designed to aid agricultural interests, is expected this week. The bill is now before President Wilson, and, if vetoed, a plan is under consideration to pass the bill over his veto.

Clayton Bill Veto.

Early disposition is planned by the senate of the presidential veto last week of the bill to suspend operation of that portion of the Clayton anti-trust law restricting in a measure railroad purchase of materials from concerns in which their officers are interested. The bill is lying on the vice-president's desk.

Another spirited senate struggle, set tentatively for January 10, is brewing over the Poindexter anti-strike bill which passed the senate without debate and with only a few senators present. Sentiment for adequate consideration is widespread. Senator Poindexter, Republican, Washington, author, is confident of re-passable.

Inquiry into coal prices is, to be resumed this week by the reconstruction committee. Alleged profits of government officials in coal sales to the army, shipping board and other agencies are to be under investigation.

Development of the government nitrate plant at Mussel Shoals, Ala., promises lively debate this week in connection with committee elimination from the sundry civil bill of an appropriation of \$10,000,000 for the project and with the pending senate bill proposing a government corporation to operate the plant.

Soldiers' Bonus Legislation.

Soldiers' bonus legislation is to be given further consideration this week by the senate finance committee.

Inquiry into marine cable questions will be resumed January 10 by the interstate commerce sub-committee.

Whether an attempt to secure ratification of the \$25,000,000 treaty with Colombia, growing out of American acquisition of the Panama

Canal, is to be made during the present session, has not been determined by senate leaders, but an address on the subject is planned tomorrow in the senate by Senator Thoms, Democrat, Colorado.

Recount of votes in the Michigan senatorial contest between Senator Newberry and Henry Ford will be begun Tuesday by the senate privileges and election committee.
