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GOVERNOR CALLS SPECIAL SESSION

Redistricting Bill Will Be Considered; Better Support For Public Schools Of The State.

Austin, Texas, June 17.—Governor Neff issued the call today for the special session of the thirty-seventh Legislature to convene in Austin, at 9 o'clock Monday, July 18. The Governor had formerly announced that he would call it for July 11, but after a conference with certain department heads he issued the call for July 18.

In his proclamation the Governor gave seven reasons for convening the legislature in special session and the bills he would submit, which are:

First, to make appropriations, within the available revenues, for the support and maintenance of the State Government and State institutions.

Second, to provide additional revenue and make appropriations out of same for the better support of the public free schools of the State.

Third, to enact legislation providing for the repeal of the suspended sentence law and amending the State prohibition law so as to make same more effective and easier of enforcement.

Fourth, to provide an effective law for the removal of officers who willfully and corruptly refuse to perform their official duties in the enforcement of the law.

Fifth, to provide for the consolidating of overlapping departments

and the abolishment of useless offices and positions for the purpose of securing to the people of Texas a more efficient and economical administration of the government.

Sixth, to re-district the State into senatorial and representative districts as provided by the constitution and as recommended by our party platform.

Seventh, to consider and act upon such other matters of vital importance as may be represented by the Governor pursuant to section 40, article 3 of the constitution of Texas.

The third and fourth named reasons constitute the Governor's "law enforcement program." The amendment to the Dean prohibition law included in the suspended sentence repeal bill, is the measure which caused the break between the Governor and the Legislature at the regular session, the house resenting his criticism given to the press condemning their action for killing the bill.

The fourth named item is the Johnson enforcement bill, giving the Governor more power to remove officers in Texas. It is also apart of his program. The second item is the rural school aid bill which he vetoed after the regular session had appropriated \$4,000,000 for that purpose.

BILL HOLMAN SHOT TO DEATH ON STREETS OF DEL RIO

Bill Holman, well known citizen of Del Rio, was killed on Main Street, Del Rio, yesterday evening about 7:30 o'clock. Five shots from a revolver penetrated his body and he died instantly, shortly after the shooting James Cornell of Sonora, district judge of that district, surrendered to officers.

The fatal affray took place on the sidewalk near Rockwell's Jewelry Store at a time when hundreds of people were in that vicinity. There is a difference of opinion as to the number of shots that were fired, some claiming that as many as seven reports were heard, but five

entered the body, one being in the face, which it is generally believed was the first.

The two principals to the fatal affair had had trouble on one or two former occasions. Some claim that this had feeling dated back to a time several years ago when both were residents of Sonora, but some two or three months ago the quarrel was renewed here in Del Rio and friends of both parties have felt that it was dangerous for the two to have a meeting.

Judge Cornell arrived from Brackett with Mrs. Cornell a few hours before the tragedy and had taken rooms at the St. Charles Hotel. He was on the program for an address before the Convention of the Sheep and Goat Raisers.

At the immediate time of the fatal meeting he was talking with a friend on the sidewalk. Something attracted his attention and he looked around. At that instant Mr. Holman was seen coming down the street. No words were passed from the best information we can gather, but there seemed to be an understanding between the two that the crisis of the long standing trouble had arrived. Both were armed and the unfortunate affair followed with the results stated above.

The deceased leaves a wife and several children, highly respected citizens of this community. The remains were taken to Sonora for burial, where Mr. Holman lived for years, accompanied by the sorrowing relatives.

Judge Cornell went with officers and friends to Brackett during the night to await the necessary arrangements for his release on bond.

THE SAN ANTONIO HOT SPRINGS

Once More Becoming The Mecca For Those Seeking Life Restoring Waters.

Before the Mexican revolution the Hot Springs near Candalaria, Texas, were becoming famous, and many were those broken in health who sought these curative waters, but for the last ten years conditions in Mexico have been so unsettled only a few visitors now and then visited the border springs. Reports have recently come from there, however, stating that once more Americans are going there, and that the Mexican officials are extending every courtesy to visitors from this side.

In fact everything is now peaceful along that side of the Rio Grande. In the last issue of the Eagle Pass Guide Mr. and Mrs. K. Milenthal on their return from these celebrated baths stated:

"After enjoying the baths at the San Antonio Hot Springs, Chihuahua, Mexico, for three weeks, Mr. and Mrs. Milenthal returned with a lot of interesting things to say about that section. They describe the baths as probably the most wonderful in the world and the only reason they did not prolong their stay was because of the lack of conveniences. The springs are located in a desolate spot, where it is claimed that even a rattlesnake can't live for want of something to nourish upon. There are no trees or vegetation of any kind and not a river closer than the Rio Grande, which is several miles distant, so that even the peace-

ful pastime of fishing can not be indulged in.

It is a rough country with many tall mountains, which are beautiful to behold, some of these resembling castles, and these afford splendid opportunities for mountain climbing, which is largely indulged in by the visitors.

Development of these baths to make them attractive for visitors by installing conveniences, it is believed, would make them outrival some of the most famous resorts that are now in existence, because of the wonderful curative properties of the water.

These baths are reached by way of Valentine, west of here on the Southern Pacific railroad. From Valentine a road leads to Candalaria, on the Texas side of the Rio Grande, about 46 miles distant, which has to be negotiated by wagon or automobile, and the springs are on the Mexican side. The water is scalding hot and has to be cooled to a certain temperature before it is suited for bathing. It is clear as crystal. There is also a cool water spring nearby where drinking water is obtained.

In the party accompanying Mr. and Mrs. Milenthal to the springs were County Commissioner Hauser of this city, Miles Cavanaugh and Mr. and Mrs. James Lackey of San Antonio and M. R. Bray and Tom Brown of Uvalde, who decided to remain there until Sunday."

SIX AGGIE TRACK STARS GOING TO CHICAGO MEET

Entries will be made in Javelin, High Jump, 100, 220, 440 Dash and Relay.

Jack Mahan of Gainsville, A. F., Dietrich of Dallas, S. H., "Sammy" Sanders of Franklin, W. C., Wier of Georgetown, T. C., Davis of Marfa, and R. L. Harris of Comanche will compose the team of track athletes that D. X. Bible, head coach of athletics will take with him to Chicago on June 18 to enter the National Collegiate Track and Field meet which will be held by the National Collegiate Association.

Mahan and Dietrich will enter the javelin event, Sanders will enter the 440 dash and high jump, Wier will enter the 100 yard and 220 yard dash, and Davis will enter the 440 dash, and Wier, Sanders, Davis and Harris will make up the relay team that will compete for honors in that event.

Mahan has made the best record of any College student in the United States this year in the javelin. His best distance to date is 189 feet 5 inches. He won the Junior A. A. U. championship with the javelin at Olympic team and took second place on the American team in the Olympics.

Dietrich, next to Mahan, has the best distance with the javelin in the Southwest, 179 feet 5 inches, established in the Southwestern Conference meet at Waco, and which broke the record by 20 feet.

Wier, who as captain of the A. and M. track team the past year will enter the 100 yrd and 220 yard dash with a good chance to get a national record. His gin in speed during the past three years has been nothing less than wonderful. He won the 220 yard dash in the Southwestern Conference meet at Waco, his time being 22 and 3-5 seconds.

Sanders was high point man of the Southwestern Conference meet at Waco with 11 and 1-4 points, winning first place in the 440 dash and the high jump. The time of the 440 race was 50 and 1-5 seconds, lowering the Southwestern Conference record by 1 and 2-5 seconds. His height in the high jump was 5 feet 10 1/2 inches.

Davis was third man in the 440 yard dash at Waco.

The relay team composed of Wier, Sanders, Davis and Harris that will enter at Chicago is the same that lowered the Southwestern Conference record at Waco by 2 and 1-5 seconds, making the mile in 3 minutes 26 seconds. According to available records the Pennsylvania State relay team is the only one in the United States with a record above that of the Texas Aggie team, their

record being 1-5 of a second lower. They made that time in the relay carnival held at Pennsylvania the past season.

Official reports from the Southwestern Conference meet at Waco which was won by Texas A. and M. with a total of 54 points credited the Aggie team with being the best that had ever been produced in the Southwest, and the competition of these Southwest champions with teams from the West, North and East will be a good opportunity for Southern people to make comparisons where formerly conjectures only could be made.—The Texas Aggie.

C. OF C. BACKS PLAN TO LINK MARFA AND EL PASO BY PHONE

A suggestion which will be taken up with the local telephone company was contained in a letter received yesterday from W. P. Murphy, of the firm of Murphy & Walker, Marfa, Texas.

Mr. Murphy stated that Marfa is out of telephone touch with El Paso. He suggested the building of a line from El Paso to Sanderson, by way of Marfa, to connect at the former place with the line which runs to San Antonio.

Such a line, in addition to putting towns to the south and east in closer touch with El Paso, would give this city a telephone outlet to San Antonio and other Texas cities without being forced to route calls by way of Denver, as at present, it was pointed out.

Business men, and especially the wholesalers, will favor the building of the proposed connecting line to Sanderson, Rufe P. March, publicity manager of the chamber, believes. The matter will be taken up with the telephone company.—El Paso Times.

PROMINENT STOCKMAN KILLED

Jas. Cornell, Judge of Eighty-Third District Under Arrest Charged With The Killing

Del Rio, Texas, June 21.—A tragedy in which two of the leading men of this section were involved marked the pre-opening day of the annual convention of the Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association of Texas last night when W. T. O. Holman was shot four times. The killing is said to have been the result of a long-standing feud between the two men, both influential and reputable citizens of Del Rio.

Mr. Holman was the owner of extensive ranch interests north of Del Rio, between this place and Sonora, raised cattle, sheep and goats on a large scale.

The 63rd District grand jury may be reconvened in order to investigate the tragedy. Holman is survived by four grown sons, who were in Del Rio attending the convention. He is also survived by two daughters and a wife. Holman's body is being held at the family home here. The killing is said to have been the outcome of a dispute had more than five years ago, before prohibition laws were enforced. It is said to have started in Sonora before Holman took an active part in prohibition work.

District Judge James (Jim) Cornell was taken to Brackettville last night shortly after the killing in charge of State Rangers. He was arrested by Sheriff Whistler of Val Verde County shortly after the tragedy. A charge of murder has been filed against him and he will be brought back to Del Rio Saturday for examining trial.

TRADE NAMES MUST BE FILED WITH COUNTY CLERK

A recent law passed by the legislature in regard to Trade names, a brief statement of which is made by the Fort Stockton Pioneer is as follows:

Merchants and companies are prohibited from using trade names in operating their business unless their trade names have been filed with the county clerk under the provisions of a law which becomes effective organized under the laws of this state or any corporation organized under the laws of any other state

Jury Called To Pass on Tragedy
Del Rio, Tex., June 22.—No charge will be filed against James Cornell of Sonora, judge of the eighty-third Judicial District, in connection with the fatal shooting at Del Rio Monday night of W. T. O. Holman, prominent cattleman of that city, pending action by the Val Verde county grand jury, which has been called by A. Gordon French, district clerk, to reconvene Friday morning.

News to this effect was contained in a dispatch received here from Del Rio today.
B. H. Matrin of Del Rio, president of the Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association of Texas, is foreman of the investigating body. Both Holman and Judge Cornell were members of the association and Judge Cornell was scheduled to respond Tuesday morning to the address of welcome at the opening of the annual convention at Del Rio.

The killing cast a pall over the meeting and is more discussed than the problems with which the sheep and goat raisers are confronted.

Justice J. J. Troop issued a warrant for the arrest of Judge Cornell charging him with the killing of Holman, and J. O. Henry, district attorney, waived examining trial in view of the grand jury's speedy action.

are exempt from filing the trade name.

The first section of the act reads: "No person or persons shall hereafter carry on or conduct a business in this state under any assumed name or under any designation, style corporate or otherwise, other than the real name of the individual or individuals conducting or transacting such business unless such person or persons shall file in the office of the clerk of the county or counties in which person or persons conduct or transact or intend to transact such business, a certificate setting forth the name under which such business is or is to be conducted or transacted, and the true or real full name of the person or persons conducting or transacting the same, with the post office address or addresses of said person or persons. Said certificate shall be executed and duly acknowledged by person or persons so conducting or intending to conduct said business in the manner provided for acknowledgement or conveyance of real estate."

This section means that businesses conducted exclusively in the true name of the owner or owners are not required to make the filing.

The act provides that persons who already are operating their business under a trade name or an assumed name or title will have thirty days after the law becomes effective to make their filing, according to this law.

Section 3 provides that whenever there is a change in the ownership of any business operated under any assumed name the person withdrawing from the business shall file a certificate with the county clerk, stating that he has withdrawn from the company. This section states that "until he has filed such a certificate he shall remain liable for all debts incurred in the operation of the business."

County clerks are ordered by the new law to keep an alphabetical index of all persons filing certificates. A copy of the certificates duly certified "shall be presumptive evidence in all the courts of law in the state of the facts therein contained," the law states. It is provided that the county clerk shall charge a fee of \$1.00 for registration.

Failure to comply with the act constitutes a misdemeanor. Section 6 states that violation of the act would call for a fine of not less than \$25 or more than \$100. It also says that each day any person or persons shall violate any of the provisions of the act shall be deemed a separate offense.

BARBER AND BEAUTY SHOPS—REGULATING AND CONTROLLING THE OPERATION OF

Section 1. Every person owning, operating or managing a barber shop or beauty parlor that is in operation at the time of the taking effect of this Act shall, on or before September 1st, 1921, register his full name and the location of said shop or parlor in a book to be kept in the office of the Texas State Board of Health for that purpose; and every owner, operator or manager of a barber shop or beauty parlor that is first opened for business after the taking effect of this Act, shall within five days after the opening of said shop or parlor register in like manner. In event of a change in the management or in location of any barber shop or beauty parlor aforesaid, the manager of said shop or parlor shall call at, or communicate by United States mail with the Texas State Board of Health within five days after such change takes place and inform said Board of such change.

Section 2. The owner and operator or manager of any barber shop or beauty parlor and each of them, shall equip said shop and keep said shop equipped with facilities and supplies and with all such appliances, furnishings and materials as may be necessary to enable persons employed in and about said shop or parlor to comply with the requirements of this Act.

Section 3. (a) No owner and no operator or manager of a barber shop or beauty parlor shall knowingly permit any person suffering from a communicable skin disease or from a venereal disease to act as a barber or employee or work or be employed in said shop or parlor.

(b) No person who to his own knowledge is suffering from a communicable disease or from venereal disease, shall act as a barber or work or be employed as set forth in this Section.

Section 4. Every manager or person in charge of a barber shop or beauty parlor shall keep said shop or parlor and all furniture, tools, appliances and other equipments used therein at all times in a cleanly condition.

Section 5. Every manager or person in charge of a barber shop or beauty parlor shall cause all combs, hair brushes, hair dusters and similar articles used in said shop or parlor to be washed at least once each day and to be kept clean at all times, and shall cause all mugs, shaving brushes, razors, shears, scissors, clippers and tweezers used in said shop or parlor to be sterilized at least once after each time used as hereinafter provided.

Section 6. No barber or person affected by this Act shall use for the service of any customer a comb, hair brush, hair duster or any similar article that is not thoroughly clean, nor any mug, shaving brush, razor, shears, scissors, or tweezers

that are not thoroughly clean or that have not been sterilized since last used.

Section 7. Every barber or other person affected by this Act immediately after using a mug, shaving brush, razor, scissors, shears, clippers, or tweezers for the service of any person, shall sterilize the same by immersing them in boiling water for not less than a minute or in the case of razors, scissors, shears and tweezers, by immersing them for not less than ten minutes in a five percent aqueous solution of carbolic acid.

Section 8. No barber or other person affected by this Act shall use for the service of a customer any towel or wash cloth that has not been boiled and laundered since last used.

Section 9. Every barber or other person affected by this Act shall cleanse his hands thoroughly immediately before serving each customer.

Section 10. No barber or other person affected by this Act shall, to stop the flow of blood, use the same piece of alum or other material for more than one person.

Section 11. No barber or other person affected by this Act shall use a powder puff or sponge in the service of a customer unless the same has been sterilized since last used and no finger bowl shall be used unless the same has been sterilized since last used and fresh water or other liquid placed therein.

Section 12. No barber or other person affected by this Act shall permit any person to use the head rest of any barber's chair under his control until after the head rest has been washed and boiled since having been used before, or by clean, new paper or similar clean new substance.

Section 13. No barber or other person affected by this Act shall shave any person, when the surface to be shaved is inflamed or broken out, or contains pus, unless such person be provided with a cup, razor or lather brush for his individual use.

Section 14. The owner and the manager of any barber shop or beauty parlor and each of them, shall keep a copy of these regulations, to be furnished by the State Board of Health, posted in said barber shop or beauty parlor for the information and guidance of persons working or employed therein.

Section 15. The word "barber" as used in these regulations means any person who shaves, or beard, or cuts or dresses the hair or face of any person. The word "barbers' apprentices" means any person having a license of a barber shop or beauty parlor or person working or employed therein.

Section 16. It shall be unlawful

for the owner or manager of any barber shop or beauty parlor to permit any person or persons to sleep in any room used wholly or in part as a barber shop or beauty parlor, and no person shall pursue the barber business or be employed in a barber shop or beauty parlor in any room used as a sleeping apartment.

Section 17. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Act or failing or refusing to comply with the provisions of this Act, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine of not less than ten dollars (\$10.00) nor more than \$50.00 or imprisonment in the county jail for a period of not less than thirty days, nor more than ninety days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 18. A barber shop is any place where the work of a barber is done for pay, and may or may not include a beauty parlor or any work of a beauty parlor. A beauty parlor is a place where hair-dressing or manicuring of finger nails or massaging the skin, or shampooing, or washing the scalp of hair, is done for pay and may or may not include work or business of a barber.

Section 19. The expression "person affected by this Act" shall include any person working or employed in a barber shop or beauty parlor or acting as a barber, beauty specialist or manicurist. The word "persons" shall include persons, firms, corporations and associations of persons.

Section 20. The fact that there is no adequate law governing the operation of barber shops and beauty parlors at the present time, creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the constitutional rule requiring that bills be read on three several days be suspended and said rule is hereby suspended, and that this Act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and it is so enacted.

AN ORDINANCE

An Ordinance Amending Section 2 of an Ordinance heretofore Passed by the City Council of Marfa, Texas, being an Ordinance Regulating Service Cars, Jitneys, and Cars Driven and Operated for Hire within the City of Marfa, Texas, requiring a license tax to be paid by the drivers or owners thereof; providing for the payment of such license its issuance

by the City and a penalty for the violation thereof without procuring such license.

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Marfa, Texas:

That section 2 of an ordinance heretofore passed by the Board of Commissioners of Marfa, Texas, on the 6th day of May, A. D. 1919 being an ordinance regulating the operation of service cars, jitneys and cars for hire in said City and requiring the payment of a license tax thereof, and providing a penalty for violation of the provisions of such ordinance, be amended so as to read as follows:

Section 2.

The owner or driver of such automobile, as herein required to be registered, upon registering the same shall pay to the said City of Marfa, Texas, a license fee of \$10.00 which shall and constitute the annual license fee for the registration of such car, such fee to be due and payable on the first day of July, 1921, after the passage of this ordinance, and upon the first day of July of each year thereafter unless otherwise provided by ordinance. The owner or driver of any automobile registered and licensed under the provisions of this ordinance shall maintain a stand only at such place or places in the City of Marfa, as shall be designated by the City Commissioners, and the license herein provided for which has been issued to any such owner or driver shall be subject to cancellation by the City Commissioners for the violation of any of the traffic ordinances of the City of Marfa by such owner or driver, provided, however, that before such license be cancelled such owner or driver shall be convicted of the violation of such ordinance in court of competent jurisdiction.

All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby especially repealed.

It is learned from press reports that the W. O. W. insurgents led by Claude Wilkinson, are still keeping up the fight against W. A. Frazer, the Sovereign Commander. By injunction it is now sought to prevent him from presiding over the National Convention, which convenes in New York City on July 5.

The governor has said in explaining the purpose of his tour:

"This speaking trip may not be of any special benefit to those who listen, but it will certainly be helpful in many ways to me. It will aid me in knowing the conditions and needs of the people generally, and will help me from many angles to properly solve the problems in which they are interested. There is no schooling for public servants that is equal to that which comes from an intimate acquaintance and an exchange of ideas with those who compose the rank and file of our citizenship."

"The more I see of public official life the more I am impressed with the thought that a person is not qualified to hold an office of responsibility as representative of the people who does not live close to the people."

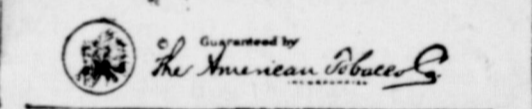

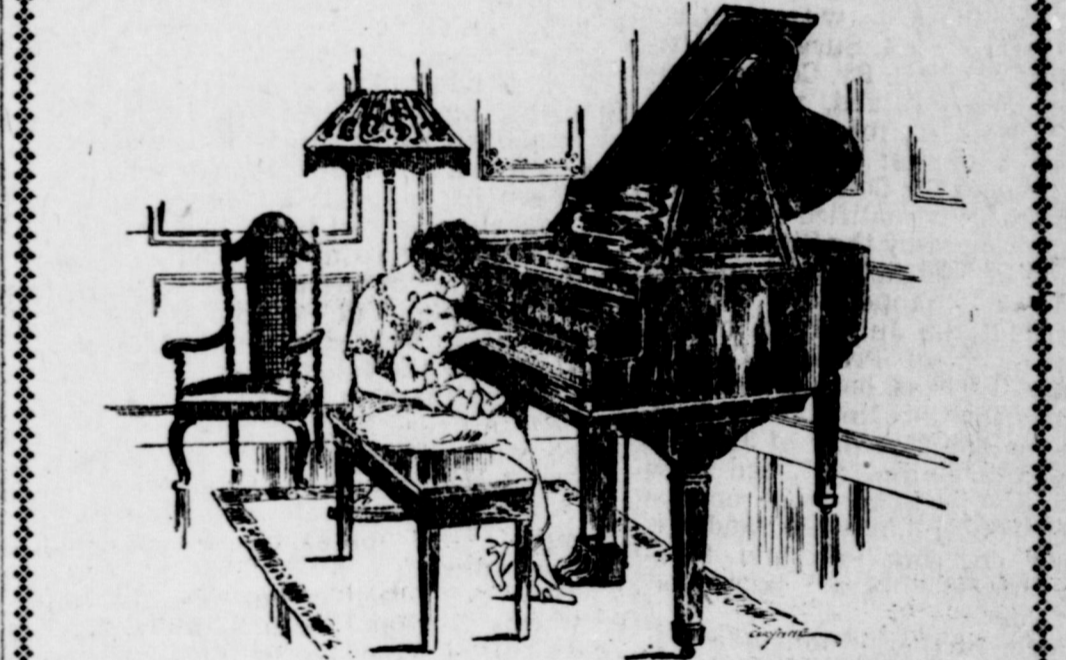

POTASH DISCOVERED IN DEEP BORINGS MAY EQUAL THE FAMOUS DEPOSITS OF GERMANY

Austin, Texas, June 14.—Discoveries of beds of potash in two wells recently drilled for oil in West Texas, one situated near Midland and the other southwest of O'Donnell and northwest of Lamesa in Dawson county, are regarded as being of the greatest industrial importance from a national as well as a state standpoint. According to a report made by Dr. J. A. Udden, director of the Bureau of Economic Geology and Technology of the University of Texas, under whose direction a field geologist has been investigating and gathering data on possible potash beds in West Texas for some time past, the discoveries in the two wells aforementioned indicate that that part of the state has potash resources equal to the famous potash deposits of Germany. It is recalled that about two years ago while drilling a wildcat well for oil near Tahoka, Lynn county, the drill went through a bed of so-called salt, said to have been two hundred feet thick. In view of the fact that it is only by analysis that potash may be determined, it is thought this substance may have been potash. It is regarded as significant that this well is within about twenty-five miles of the well in Dawson county where potash was found. There are also large basins and "salt" lakes in the region to the west of O'Donnell where considerable expositions for potash have been done during the last two or three years. In test borings in one of these basins, upon the ranch of S. F. Singleton of Tahoka, potash analyzing 12 per cent was found almost from the surface down to the bottom of the hole, two hundred feet. The United States Geological Survey has been working with the Bureau of Economic Geology and Technology in the search for potash in West Texas. It is stated that much difficulty is experienced in getting oil operators to save the cores of their wells so that the different formations which are penetrated may be analyzed by these government laboratories. The importance of doing this is shown by the results of the analysis of the borings of the two wells where potash was found, it is pointed out.

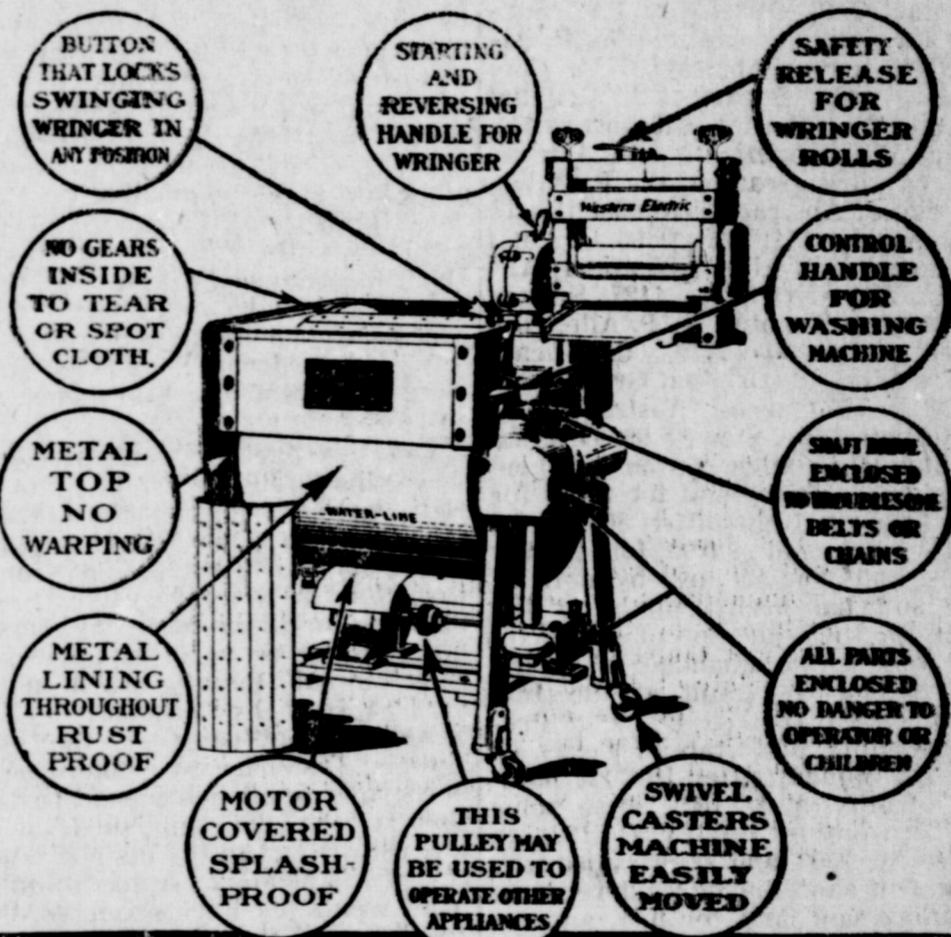

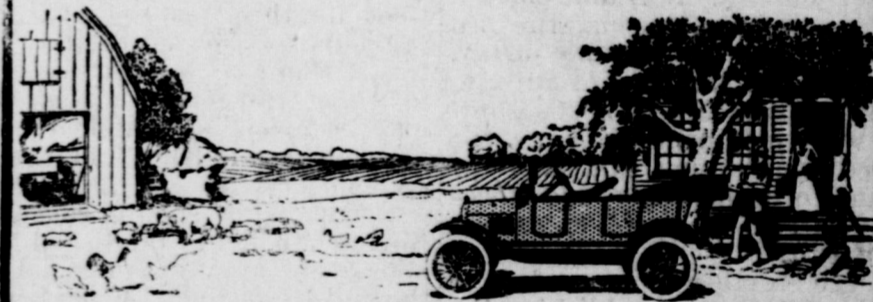

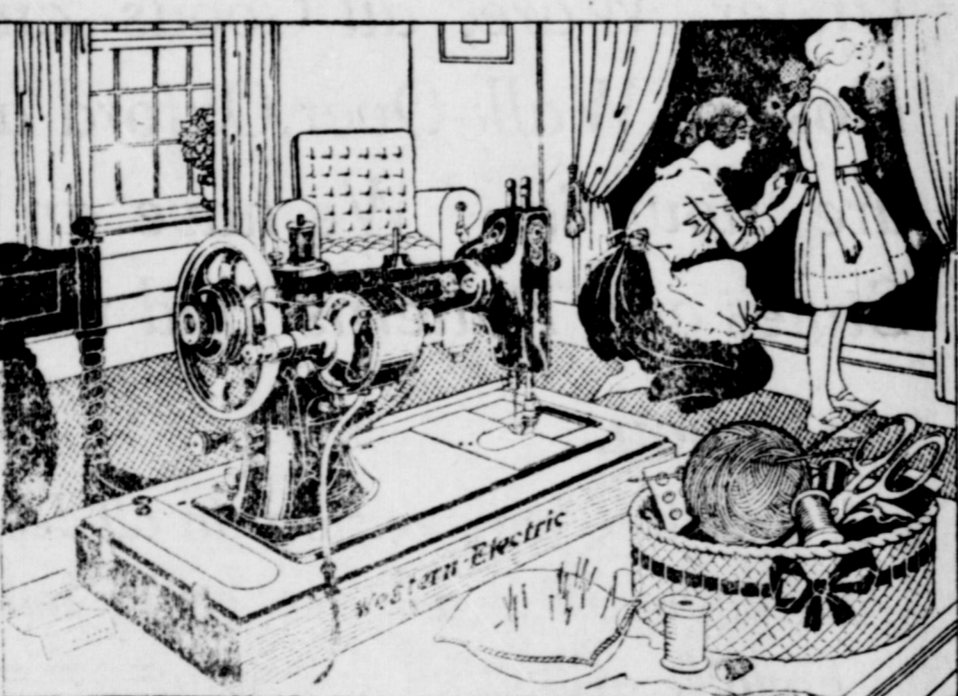
