

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### **WORK DONE BY THE TEXAS LEGISLATURE**

The Following Is Digest of Legislation Enacted at the Recent Session.

Measures passed by the legislature which closed last Wednesday included one of the large revenue tax bills. The only ones which were passed were that taxing gasoline ic a gallon and the measurement. taxing gasoline ic a gallon and the measure imposing a 2 per cent tax on sulphur. Consequently the call for the special session to consider general revenue measures and other matters the governor thought should have been passed, especially the quo warranto bill, which would have "vested the courts with effective authority to remove from office any officer against whom it can be proven that such officer has failed or refused to enforce the laws." These matters will be taken up at a second special session to be called later by Governor Neff.

House Bill No. 4—Appropriating \$50,-000 for the establishment of a citrus fruit experiment station in the Rio Grande Valley.

Senate Bill No. 34—Authorizing the attorney general to accept money penalties in judgments for violation of the antitrust laws instead of enforcing forfeiture of charter or cancellation of permit of an outside company.

Appropriations.

House Bill No. 645—Making appropriation of \$480,000 to pay miscellaneous claims against the state.

Senate Bill No. 135—Making general deficiency appropriations.

Senate Bill No. 229—Changing the state depository law so as to have a new rating board fix the rate of interest on state funds and then permit banks to qualify which care to pay the interest so fixed.

House Bill No. 279—Reducing the amount of bond depositories in independent school districts.

Senate Bill No. 104—Requiring public districts on the bank are permitted.

Senate Bill No. 106—Permitting a closed bank to appeal to a court for relief such as injunction, when taken in charge by the commissioner of banking. Senate Bill No. 107—Providing a state department of banking and commissioner of banking, thereby separating it from

Senate Bill No. 110—Fixing the minimum at \$17,500 as capital stock for state banks and graduates it upward based on population.







Grain.-Grain prices narrow in an unsettled market during the week with local conditions the principal market influence. Wheat unsettled on the 15th and closed irregular. Corn under pressure early but later buying brought rally and prices closed firm. Closing prices in Chicago cash market: No. 2 red winter wheat \$1.30; No. 2 hard winter wheat \$1.20; No. 2 mixed corn 74c; No. 2 yellow corn 74c; No. 3 white oats 45c. Average farm prices: No. 2 mixed corn in central Iowa 61c: No. 2 hard winter wheat in central Kansas \$1.02; No. 1 dark northern wheat in central North Dakota \$1.01. Closing future prices: Chicago May wheat \$1.19; Chicago May corn 73 5/8; Minneapolis May wheat \$1.18 7/8; Kansas City May wheat \$1.11 1/8; Winnipeg May wheat \$1.14 1/8.

Cotton.—Spot cotton prices advanced points during the week. New York March future contracts advanced 10 points. Spot cotton closed at 30.75c per pound. New York futures at 30.85c.

Hay.-Markets generally steady but increasing receipts reported from central markets. Demand for good hay active in most sections. Prices practically unchanged from Saturdays quo tations except at New York and Chicago where number 1 timothy declined \$1.50 per ton. Quoted March 14: No. 1 timothy New York \$27.50, Philadelphia \$23, Pittsburg \$21.50, Cincinnati \$19.50, Chicago \$22, Minneapolis \$16, St. Louis \$20, No. 1 Prairie Minneapolis \$15.50, St. Louis \$17, Kansas City \$15. No. 1 alfalfa Kansas City \$24.50.

Feed.-Most feed markets quiet and interior demand very light. Prices easier especially for linseed meal and future shipment wheat feeds. Bran quoted for April-May shipments \$2 to \$3 below prevailing prices. Future shipment linseed meal also quoted at sharp discounts. Hominy and gluten feed situation unchanged, offerings small, demand light, prices steady. Cottonseed meal in good supply, inquiry light, prices 50c per ton lower. Storage stocks and supplies in dealers hands considered about normal. Movement fair. Quoted March 14: Bran \$28, Middlings \$27.75, flour middlings \$29.50, Minneapolis; gluten feed \$42.65 Chicago; 33% linseed meal \$45 Min-neapolis; \$47.25 Buffalo; white hom-iny feed \$29 Chicago, \$29.50 St. Louis; 36% cottonseed meal \$40 Memphis \$41.50 Atlanta.





### TEXAS CATTLEMEN **CLOSE CONVENTION**

The 1924 Convention Will Be Held at Houston. Lucas Reelected President.

El Paso, Tex.—At the closing sessions of the forty-seventh annual convention of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers' association Thursday, Houston won out over Fort Worth by a vote of 124 to 49, for the 1924 convention city.

Cyrus B. Lucas of Berclair was elected president. Other officers chosen were: H. L. Johnson, Wilcox, Ariz., first vice president: R. M. Kleberg. Kingsville, second vice president; W. E. Connell, Fort Worth, treasurer; E. B. Spiller, Fort Worth, secretary, and Dayton Moses, Fort Worth, attorney.

Co-operative marketing was discussed by Fred H. Bixby of Long Beach. Cal. Mr. Bixby is president of the National Live Stock association. He declared that the co-operative marketing plan as exemplified by the Texas Farm Bureau federation is the only means to insure orderly marketing.

Invitation for the association to hold its next year's sessions in Houston was extended by Mayor Oscar F. Holcombe of Houston, who headed a delegation of citizens to work for this object.

William Gibbs McAdoo made an ad dress Wednesday, Mr. McAdoo told the convention that cattle raisers should cultivate a more co-operative spirit, "so that not only production but distribution can be controlled." He replied to criticism of him Tuesday by Mr. Turney, who charged McAdoo and former President Wilson were responsible

for present high freight rates. "With the country at war," the former secretary of the treasury said, "rail facilities had broken down. The government was unable to get material and troops to seaboard. Railroad employes, then underpaid, threatened to quit and go into war industries where remuneration was high. Rail executives appealed to me to increase wages so they could retain their emthe increases granted."

The total operating revenue for 1922 was \$194,002,445, a decrease under the preceding year of \$27,665,219, or 12.48 per cent. The operating expenses last year aggregated \$158,733,534, which was \$26,057,367 less than the year before, or 14.10 per cent.

Practically all items of revenue decreased, as all items of operating expense. The ratio of operating revenues to operating expenses was 81.82 per cent last year against 83.36 the year

The operating revenue, compared to 1921, was as follows: Freight revenue, \$142,700,874, decrease \$20,689, 582, or 12.66 per cent; passenger revenue, \$37,438,126, decrease \$6,437,785, or 14.67 per cent; mail revenue, \$3, 365,519, decrease \$377,867, or 21.29 per cent; express revenue, \$5,489,001, increase \$955,347, or 21.29 per cent; other revenue, \$4,999,925, decrease \$1,-125,334, or 16.37 per cent.

Operating expenses, compared with 1921, were as follows: Maintenance of way and structures, \$34,606,092, decrease \$4,420,969, or 11.33 per cent; maintenance of equipment, \$38,678,734, decrease \$5,925,939, or 13.29 per cent; traffic \$4,092,367, decrease \$74,609, or 1.70 per cent; transportation, \$73,258, 046, decrease \$14,762,276, or 16.77 per cent; miscellaneous operations, \$830, 902, decrease \$32,877, or 3.81 per cent; general expenses, \$7,913,490, decrease \$458,115, or 5.47 per cent; transportation for investment, credit \$646,097, increase \$382,702, or 145.30 per cent.

Airplanes to Attack Weevils. Washington.-The boll weevil which has cost cotton planters of the South billions of dollars and has withstood numerous onslaughts aimed at its eradlcation, now will be attacked from the air by army planes in a new method of warfare. Special spraying apparatus will be attached to the planes, which will scatter poison over the fields. Agents of the department believe this is the most practical method yet advanced for the control of the boll weevil and early experiments indicate the system could be adopted with beneficial results over the entire cotton belt.


