





SPECIAL SESSION

Latest Proceedings of Special Called Session of Legislature at Austin.

Austin, Tex.-The third called session of the legislature entered the final lap of its 30-day session Monday. Conference committee work will occupy both of the houses the remaining four days of the session, although bills submitted last week by Governor Neff remain to be disposed of.

Austin, Tex.-The emergency school aid appropriation bill was passed finally by the senate Monday on suspension of rules at \$4,000,000 for the next two years after a heated debate. The senate adopted the minority committee report recommending that the bill pass at \$6,000,000 as passed in the house, but later reconsidered this action by vote of 12 to 11. The rural aid appropriation bill also was passed at \$3,000,000.

For a brief period it appeared as though the emergency appropriation would be placed at the same figure as passed last session. The minority report favoring such action was adopted by vote of 12 to 11. On final count the vote stodd 11 to 11 and Lieutenant Governor Davidson voted for adop-

On motion of Senator Darwin, who declared he was paired with Senator Baugh, but voted for the minority report, the vote was reconsidered and the majority report adopted without a record vote.

The vote on restoring the appropriation to \$6,000,000 follows: For-Bowers, Clark, Darwin, Doyle, Fairchild, Holbrook, Parr, Pollard, Strong, Thomas and Watts. Against-Davis. Floyd, Lewis, McMillin, Murphy, Rice, Stuart, Turner, Witt, Wood and Woods. Senators Ridgeway and Wirtz were paired against adoption, with Senators Cousins and Bledsoe.

Vote on final passage was 20 to 3, Senators Wirtz, Murphy and McMillin casting the only dissenting votes. Amendment by Senator Pollard to increase the appropriation to \$5,000,000 claims bills. and one by Senator McMillin to decrease it to \$2,000,000 were lost.

Although it had been expected the rural aid appropriation would be reduced by the upper house, the minority committee report recommending adoption of the bill at \$3,000,000 was adopted by vote of 18 to 7. Vote on final passage was 22 to 3, Senators Murphy, Ridgeway and Wirtz voting against the measure.

The University of Texas must rely upon prospects of striking a producing oil field on its lands in West Texas for carrying out its building program, the house voted Monday when it killed by postponing indefinitely the Bonham bill, which sought to permit a \$6,000,000 loan for building purposes at the university. The bill was op posed by a number of members and the reported oil strike on state lands

was brought into the debate. The loan would have been made to the university by the state at a low rate of interest to prevent a loan by a commercial firm at a high rate.

The house also killed the bill by Stewart of Edwards which proposed a 5 per cent gross receipts tax on dance halls.

His duties will be to look after the interests of association members throughout the state and particularly to watch legislative action at Austin when the legislature is in session. He will also handle advertising matter for members.

FRANCE REJECTS **NEW GERMAN OFFER**

Will Consider Nothing From Cuno Until After Resistance Is Stopped.

Paris.—Premier Poincare absolutely rejected the German reparations proposal Saturday in his first official expression since the receipt of the note from Berlin when he appeared before the senate commissions on foreign affairs and finance to answer a long questionaire on the operations in the Ruhr.

The premier said the French and Belgian governments had agreed not to consider any proposal from Chancellor Cuno unless it was preceded by complete and final cessation of the German passive resistance campaign. He assured the senators that the government's relations with the Belgians were entirely satisfactory, and that everything was going well in the

In throwing her railroads into the balance as a reparations guarantee, Germany is offering the biggest stateowned railway net in the world and one which ranks fourth in mileage, only being surpassed by the United States, Canada-Newfoundland and British India systems. It is even said to be the greatest single economic establishment so far as operations are concerned.

The tracks of the German railroads cover 57,545 kilometers and still lead the European systems in size despite the loss of 7,400 kilometers through the war. The federal government acquired the roads in April, 1920, by paying the various states a total of approximately 40,000,000,000 paper marks.

A liberal estimate by experts places the present valuation of the German lines at 30,000,000,000 gold marks, a noteworthy national nest egg, which is capable of being developed into a much greater asset. On the basis of this valuation the raising of 500,-000,000 gold marks annually on the railroads, as proposed in the German memorandum, would mean an interest rate of only 2 per cent.

The text of the note says: "After full and careful consideration Germany has stated her sincere belief as to her capacity to make payment for reparations. The German government would not be acting fairly and it would not bring the real solution any nearer, if for the sake of temporary alleviation of its political difficulties, it were to promise more

WHAT HAS BECOME OF ITALIAN IMMIGRANTS



Washington.-There are officials in Washington who believe in proper conservation of the national resources of the country, but who say they would like to find out once for all what proper conservation is. In Washington, as presumably elsewhere where people talk about the subject, there seems to be no middle ground of opinion on this subject. Austin, Tex .- A conflict has developed between the federal prohibition law and the bill enacted by the second called session of the Texas legislature, which requires that the sheriff shall Of Those Who Have Been Restored be the custodian of all whiskey seized and be held responsible therefor. This is intended to be a check on the amount of whiskey seized.

Frank M. Cole, federal prohibition director for Texas, has conferred with Governor Neff regarding the situation. According to Mr. Cole the United States district attorneys must have the evidence when they prosecute cases. and if the state law should prove inflexible in prohibiting the sheriff from giving up then prosecutions will be in state or federal courts, according to who made the arrests. Heretofore, because the Dean state law did not make it an offense to possess liquor the federal officers "adopted" such cases where arrests were made by state officers and prosecutions made in the federal courts. It will be impossible to continue this practice if the new state law will not permit the sheriff

a year ago, according to the department of agriculture's monthly report, issued Friday. No reports have been made yet on corn.

Winter wheat shows slightly improved prospects resulting from May conditions, and a crop of 581,000,000 bushels is forecast. This total is a little more than was indicated a month ago and about 5,000,000 bushels less than last year's crop.






