Field's only two misses were the losses by Texas Tech and Minnesota. Since he was the only one to get 16, he wins the \$20.


Second place went to Eddie Gauna of Friona who was the only player to pick 15 correct. He missed three pro-games: the Minnesota, Detroit and Oakland losses.







The Chieftains bounced back from their first loss of the year a week earlier to score a convincing win over the Shallowater Mustangs in the district opener for both teams last Friday at Chieftain Field.


Friona High School was paced by a near-school record performance by senior Joseph Bandy, who rushed for 240 yards on only 18 carries, 13.3 yards per carry.

This was the fifth highest individual rushing total since such records have been kept for FHS. Bandy scored on runs of 69 and nine yards, and caught a pass from Nathan King on a 22-yard scoring

play. Bandy had eight runs of for a total 15 yards or more, for a total of 201 yards, or 25 yards per play. On four straight carries in the second half, he gained 114 yards. This included the 69-yard TD scamper.

For all of their offense, it took a defensive play to get the team on the scoreboard in the opening quarter. Friona held the Mustangs on their own end and forced a punt. Landon Martin crashed through to block the punt, and recovered it on the Shallowater 19.

**District 2-AAA Standings** It took Friona just three lays to score, with Noel Grajeda carrying the ball all three times. The final one was for three yards and a TD. Trent Cook came in to boot the extra point, and the Chieftains led, 7-0 with 1:44 left in the first quarter. Justin Stone sparked a 12play drive by the Mustangs to knot the score. The visitors kept their drive going on a fourth down pass completion, and Stone got the final 14 yards. He had gotten around end for a 28-yard gain to get the drive started.
