There was a recent four-hour televised discourse on the 100 most influential people. . those who have made the most enduring mark on hu-



manity during the millenium now ending. Don't worry, I'm not going to run through the entire list, mainly because I didn't think about jotting them all down.

My Good Old Boy guessed it right! We were getting down to about the top 15 with Thomas Jefferson, Thomas Edison, Louis Pasteur, Leonardo Divinci, Galileo, Einstein, Columbus, etc. when Bill said "I wonder if they're going to leave out Mr. Gutenberg?"

Then they got to the top five with Shakespeare, Charles Darwin, Martin Luther, Isaac Newton, and the number one person who had the most impact on life as we know it, was none other than Johann Gutenberg. We think of him as the inventor of the printing press. Actually he was the inventor of moveable type, which sped up the process of printing books, making them less costly. In the year 1450, for the first time, the ordinary person could buy affordable books and learn to read. Gutenberg had ushered in the modern world of mass communication.

Wouldn't Johann be surprised at what has grown out of his idea of making each individual letter into a raised character on a small piece of metal that can be reused over and over again! With the onslaught of printed books came the education of the common folks, followed by freedom of expression via Area Finally newspapers, magazines, then radio, television, and now every person in the world has the privilege of expressing themselves to the rest of the world on the internet.

By the way, we recently got to see one of the few remaining Gutenberg Bibles on display in a large glass case at the Huntington Library in Long Beach, California. About 200 were originally printed and we understand that very few are "Indian Summer," featuring known to still be in existence.

We must not overlook the humble typewriter, which was also an offspring of Gutenberg's moveable type. In 1873, the first typewriter was being manufactured and sold on a large scale. Now, on the eve of a new millennium, young children are learning to type as soon as they learn their A-B-C's, in order to facilitate their use of computers. Just because we live in a world of word processing software and laser printers, does not mean the typewriter is a total dinosaur. It has not yet passed on in the manner of the buggy whip or the bustle skirt. I don't know of a single school, office, home office, or business firm that can do without a typewriter. Sure, they'll do the biggest part of their business on computers, but when it comes to making a quick memo, filling out forms, addressing envelopes, or making individual mailing labels, the typewriter is still a necessity. The good old electronic typewriters are still available, mostly second hand, at a few mom-and-pop typewriter stores in the bigger towns. But newer models with word processing features and memory functions are on the shelves of all appliance stores and the price tags are much smaller than buying a computer.

65 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 9, 1934 The members of the Friona PTA held their annual Halloween Carnival at the high school building last Friday night, October 26. The king and queen were crowned with the usual ceremony. The king was George Taylor of the senior class, and the queen was Lois Presley of the junior class.

60 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 3, 1939 The people of Friona were horrified this week when they learned of the death of R. H. (Reube) Kingsley, who had been terribly burned Wednesday morning in the west part of town. The burning occurred about 10 o'clock when a can of blasting powder exploded in the little workshop where Mr. Kinsley was working. Kinsley had workmen engaged in building a new garage at his home, and the can of powder had been used the day before in blowing a stump from the ground where the foundation was being built.







High Plains cotton fields the process by which future provided Plains Cotton rates are calculated accu-Growers, Inc. (PCG) the rately reflect the situation in unique opportunity to "put a face" on the unique factors that define cotton production in this area.

PCG's efforts, in conjunction with the National Cotton Council of America (NCC), was to provide researchers from Montana State University (MSU) additional information about the differences that exist within this growing region as well as to provide a better insight into the complicated roles management and environment play in the production of cotton.

The economists from MSU have been contracted by the USDA Risk Management Agency (RMA) to develop alternative methods for determining crop insurance premium rates for all crops. At the present the time the USU team is working on cotton rates in the Texas and Oklahoma region.

Their efforts have already resulted in the new premium rates that will be implemented in the Mid-South, several Southeastern states and the Far West, for the 2000 crop year.

PCG, which has been closely following the recent developments in this area of the crop insurance reform process, arranged the meeting in order to provide High

A meeting and tour of premium rate structure and the High Plains region.

### \* \* \* \* \* \* \*

The first round of emergency assistance payments to producers included as part of the FY2000 agriculture appropriations bill have mostly been made as of this writing.

Now the work of implementing other portions of the emergency assistance program, can begin. Producers in several parts of the Texas High Plains could qualify for assistance under the disaster program which is expected to help offset crop losses incurred in 1999.

It is anticipated that the 1999 Crop Loss Disaster Assistance Program will follow rules similar to those used for the 1998 single year **Crop Loss Disaster Assistance** Program.

Another key part of the puzzle for cotton is the reinstatement of Step 2 of the cotton competitiveness provisions of the 1996 Farm Bill. It is hoped that a final decision on Step 2 is not far off and that it is made retroactive to October 1 as originally intended by Congress.

Other provisions important to cotton include doubling of the Loan Deficiency Payment/Marketing Loan Gain payment limitation from \$75,000 to \$150,000 per entity and the inclusion of an additional \$400 million for 2000 crop year crop insurance premium subsidies.



## Aging And **Changing Eyesight**

Do you sometimes wish that you had longer arms so you could hold a book further away to see the print clearly? By the time most people reach the age of 50, they have difficulty reading printed materi-



als like a restaurant menu at close range. This is called "presbyopia," from the Greek language meaning "old eye." It's a normal part of aging. As people get older, the crystalline lens in the eye hardens. As a result, the eye can no longer focus sharply on nearby objects.

Generally, by around age 45, reading glasses are required. If near- or farsightedness is also a problem, bifocals or corrective contact lenses may be recommended by your vision care professional.
