Crane comes into the game with a perfect 11-0 season record, and have been ranked in the state's "top ten" teams by various rating systems.

Friona counters with a 10-1 season record, and is fresh off an exciting 23-21 win over River Road in their bi-district game.

Coach Mike Scott and his assistants watched Crane beat Slaton, 44-0 last Saturday at Odessa. "They are pretty impressive. They have allowed only 34 points all year. They are especially good on their special teams. They do a good job on returns," Scott said.

"Crane isn't particularly large, but they execute well. They can score on any play. We are playing a team that is heavily favored, so we need to relax and play our game.

"This is a fun time of the year for the kids, who have worked hard to get to this point. They need to enjoy themselves. Every game from here on should be a lot of fun," he concluded.






The Women's Division of the Friona Chamber of Commerce has announced the annual Christmas in the Park celebration.

PRIONA PLASHBACKS

...from the files of The Friona Star

70 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 22, 1929 Street commissioner F. W. Reeve has a force of men with tractors and teams employed loosening and removing the dirt along Main Street from the places where it is too high to the low places, thus making it of an even grade in all places. It is Mr. Reeve's plan to thus level the street thus make it perfectly smooth, with grader and drag and thus get rid of the bumps and chuck-holes and allow the water which falls to be carried away by the gutters. Then it is planned to treat the entire business portion of the street with a thick covering of caliche and give it a thorough packing, followed probably with a coat of tarvia or some cheap oil filter. If this can be done, Friona's Main Street will be in A-1 condition and should last several years.

65 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 23, 1934 The annual Thanksgiving service in which all our Friona churches unite, will be held next Thursday night at seven o'clock in the First Baptist Church building. The address will be given by the Rev. H. L. Thurston, pastor of the local Methodist Church. All other ministers in the city will share in the services, and appropriate music will be provided.

60 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 17, 1939 The nicest parade, perhaps, to have ever traversed Friona's streets, was the Armistice Day parade, that was given last Saturday afternoon. The parade was under the auspices of the Dear Bill: American Legion and Legion Auxiliary and sponsored and arranged by these organizations and the entertainment committee of the local Chamber of Commerce.



Coach Scott's Comments:

"I thought we played well. We executed well on offense, and didn't turn the ball over. The riskier you get on offense, the more likely it gets you in a hole. That's why we don't do more fancy things.. You have to give yourself a chance to win." "We kept them off the field pretty well (with our drives).

River Road is a very good team. They're well coached. Their QB (Adam King) is at his best when he's scrambling. You have to contain him. When we did that, it was harder for him to complete passes, or to scramble."
"We responded well. We need to not have low points and get

down on ourelves. The teams that give you the most trouble are the balanced teams. They ran more at the first of the game, and we had to respect the run. Once you have them pinned down and they have to pass, you have a chance to put pressure on the QB.

"Our offensive line played well. You'll have some plays where you don't make much yardage--where you get stopped for two or three downs, but eventually you're going to make things happen. We have a good program--we have been held to under 20 points only once this year.

FHS SURVIVES RALLY

Chieftains Send Wildcats 'Down The River,' 23-21

When you give up 293 yards passing and 371 yards overall, at first blush you might think your team had not played very good defense.

But if you ask any Chieftain fan who was at the game, they'll tell you that Friona played great defense in the last three minutes of their bi-district game against River Road, a game in which the Chieftains scored a thrilling 23-21 win.

It was Friona's first playoff win since the big success of Friona's state-semifinalist team of 1996. And, it was the Chieftains first post-season win over River Road after two failed attempts.

Senior running back Joseph Bandy paced the win, scoring all three touchdowns, including a sparkling 66-yard dash early in the fourth period that gave Friona a nine-point lead. Bandy also played his usual good game on defense, making a possible touchdown-saving tackle against River Road's Steven Beck on the Wildcats' opening drive, a play that sparket the defense to hold River Road and force a punt after they had driven to the Chieftain 36 on their first possession.

Unlike Friona's two previous wins against Muleshoe and Littlefield, where the Chieftains had to come from behind in the fourth quarter, this time the team had taken the lead earlier, and then had to hold the pass-happy Wildcats out of the end zone on two possessions, after they had already scored twice to trim Friona's lead to two points.

On the opening series, River Road QB Adam King completed his first two passes, to wide-out David Ferrill, King's favorite target (he caught 10 passes for 217 yards and a TD), as the Wildcats marched from their own 20 to the Friona 36.


But the Bandy tackle already mentioned, a good defensive play that resulted in Adam King's first incompletion, and a reverse play that the Chieftain defense sniffed out for a loss caused the Road's first punt.

Friona put the ball in play at their own 12, and began what would become a 16-play drive that got the team on the scoreboard first.

Gains by J. Bandy and Noel Grajeda gave the team first downs as they worked for field position, and on what would have been a critical third-down play, the Cats jumped offsides, giving Friona the first down and allowing the drive to near midfield.

Friona QB Nathan King rolled out to the right for 21 yards, and two plays later hit Grajeda, who made a great catch at the near sidelines for Friona's fifth first down, moving the ball to the River Road 21.

But after Bandy gained six to the 15, Friona was hit with a costly "procedure" penalty. N. King fired a bullet toward Landon Martin

at the goal-line, but a Wildcat defender tipped the ball away at the last minute.

King shoveled the ball to Bandy on third down, but Bandy was tripped up after a five-yard gain (needing nine), and it was decision time for Coach Mike Scott at fourth and four.

The decision was to let German exchange student Kai Pawlowski go for a field goal. "Kai" responded with a 32-yard kick through the uprights, his second field goal of the season. It eventually provided Friona with its winning margin, and was his second in a row after two close misses.

The field goal came on the last play of the first quarter, and the 15-play drive used up 7:22 of clock time, keeping the Wildcats' explosive offense on the sideline for

most of the first quarter. When River Road put the ball back in play, linebacker Grajeda, who was blitzing, foiled a draw play by tackling the runner for a six-yard loss. However, on the next play Friona was flagged for pass interference, giving the 'Cats

new life. But a few plays later, A. King fumbled the ball while pulling out from the center, and defensive end Daniel Wiseman hopped on it at the

Friona 34, to halt the drive. Friona couldn't move and punted. River Road made one first down, but Grajeda sacked A. King for a ten-yard loss and the Chieftains got the ball back.

Bandy gained 17 yards in three plays, but was tackled on a wide sweep for a loss and FHS again had to turn the ball back.

River Road got the ball with 1:47 showing, at their own 31. Adam King engineered a drive in which he passed on seven straight almost went all the way,





FHS "Turned the Corner" In Football During 1990s

by BILL ELLIS

For a school that never scored a post-season football win until 1986, Chieftain football will finish off the 1990s with the best overall record of any team in the Panhandle-South Plains area for the last five years of the century.

Friona had claimed only three district titles in football in 70 years through the 1994 season. Currently, Friona has racked up three district titles in four years (1996, '97 and '99), and four in the past six seasons, when you add the one won by the 1994 team.

Going into Saturday's Area playoff game vs Crane, Friona has posted a 42-6 record for the past four years, an average of 10.5 wins per year against 1.5 losses, an 87.5 per cent winning record.

-- This for a football program that had never won ten games in a season until

When the Chieftains district title.

meet state-ranked Crane on participating in the school's decade, making 110 games in the ten-year period, an extra-season's worth of "bonus games."

Last Friday's exciting 23-21 win over River Road guaranteed Friona its third season in the past four with at least ten wins.

The five-year record is 49-9, 84.4 per cent. For the 1990s, Friona stands with 64 wins against 44 losses and one tie (60%)--this in spite of a decade that started out 2-8 and 1-9 under Steve Williams, and 0-10 for James Morton's first season as head coach.

The current decade is the only one in which Friona will have a winning record for all games played therein.

James Morton is given credit for rebuilding Friona's football fortunes from a "patsy" which every team wanted to play for homecoming to one that is beginning to be hard to secure teams to play Friona in non-district games.

Coach Morton coached the Chieftains to the school's first district title in 30 years in his third year at the helm, 1994. Although the team lost to Childress in bi-district, 20-3, the foundation had been laid,

and it began to pay dividends. The team went 7-3 in 1995, but losses at Shallowater, 27-17, and at Littlefield, 26-15, knocked Friona out of the playoffs with their 3-2 record Shallowater and Littlefield advanced.

But the 1996 season turned out to be the highlight of the century (so far), for Friona football.

After a first-game loss at Littlefield, 21-14, the team began to get momentum with non-district wins over W.T. High and Shallowater. Friona then knocked off all seven of their district opponents in

District highlights included Saturday, they will be a 35-19 win at River Road and a 54-21 win over tenth playoff game in the Perryton in a Saturday afternoon game featuring three touchdown passes from Kyle Grimsley to Angel Vega.

> History was made at FHS in the 1996 postseason, when a school that never had advanced past the area round scored four convincing wins, over Denver City (25-7), Monahans (27-6), Vernon (14-13) and Aledo (28-13).

> When the team played Vernon at Snyder on November 29 of '96, the Lions were ranked first in the state, but that didn't bother the Chieftains, who proceded to outgain Vernon, 246-187 in yardage enroute to the upset win that thrust the team into the state quarter-finals.

Safety Aaron King recorded 10 interceptions during the 1996 season, and saved his best until the playoffs, when he came up with seven thefts in four games. When the opposing team was forced into a passing situation, King considered that he was the "designated receiver."

King got interceptions against Denver City, was Monahans' leading receiver with three catches in the big area win at Lowery Field in Lubbock, had the BIG late interception against Vernon to clinch the win, and got his last two INTs against Aledo in Friona's ground-breaking 28-13 win.

It's hard to realize that a 10-0 team can be disappointed, but that's what happened in 1997, after Friona methodically marched through its entire regularseason schedule unbeaten, and was ready to go at least as far as the 1996 Chieftains had gone, with many of the players back as experienced starters.

After leading for most of the game, the Chiefs were burned by Seminole's big fullback, Toby Shain, who sparked a comeback that shocked Friona, 44-37 in an

overtime game.
Mike Scott became head coach of the Chieftains in 1998, and the success continued. Friona went 9-1 on the season. Their only loss was to Muleshoe in the "Mud Bowl" game that covered two days, giving the Mules the district title.

The team faced River Road in bi-district at Dick Bivins Stadium, Amarillo. Having downed the Wildcats, 31-14 during the regular season at Amarillo, perhaps the team didn't respect the 'Cats enough. Whatever, River Road overcame a 19-7 halftime deficit to post a 27-

That was the second unexpected bi-district loss in as many years.

But the '99 Chieftains repaid the Wildcats for their unkindness of the previous year with their 23-21 win over River Road last Friday in the bi-district contest at Dimmitt.

·The only ownership change occurred due to foreclosure where the owner exercised a timely right or redemption in accordance with State law; or

• The circumstances of the acquisition provide adequate assurance to the Farm Service Agency that the new owner did not acquire the land for the purpose of placing it in

Producers should contact their USDA Service Center for more information.

The sign-up period begins Tuesday, January 18, 2000, and runs through Friday, February 11, 2000.

Farm Service Agency (FSA). These are usually listed in local telephone directories under "United States Government, U.S. Department of Agriculture."
