While it is understandable that many of the problems involving computers which must "roll over" into the 2000s might experience problems, for many of us, the changing of the calendar will simply bring about the usual problem of remembering to write the correct date.

Or the "double genees?" Semeone more greative than myself will surely "double zeroes?" Someone more creative than myself will surely come up with something, and it probably won't be long in coming. Since Ye Editor observes his birthday on December 31, he will have even more folks joining in the celebration than usual. But don't celebrate too much--and we'll see you in 1999 2000. Happy holidays!

George Fryes Are Hosting Tenth Exchange Student

The school year 1999-2000 will be especially meaningful for Aundrea and George Frye of the Black community. The number 10 will also be especially meaningful for the Fryes and a young man from Germany.

Kai Pawlowski, a 17-yearold from Potsdam, Germany, is the tenth exchange student the Fryes have hosted to attend Friona High School. Also, Pawlowski became the first FHS exchange student to play a vital role in varsity athletics, when he became a place-kicker for the football 10 for the Chieftains.

"I guess it was my lucky number," Kai told us this week. Down the stretch drive for the Chieftain football team, Pawlowski kicked three field goals for the team. His 27-yarder against River Road turned out to be the difference in Friona's 26-23 win, its first bi-district win since 1996.

What did he think about American (and Texan) football? "I liked it! People here are crazy about football. We don't even play football in Germany," the outgoing city's water distribution deyoungster said.

He has played soccer in Germany. His first look at a "real" football game was the 1999 season-opener in which he suited up for the Chiefs.

Pawlowski had completed ten years of schooling in Germany, which has a 13year system, not including kindergarten. He said that when he returns home, he will be allowed to take a test, which if he passes satisfactorily, will give him credit for the year he spends at FHS. Otherwise, he will have to take his 11th year there.


He says he likes physics and chemistry the best at FHS. ("The labs are fun"). On the other side of the coin, he says that math is his hardest subject.







GIRL SCOUTS BY Louisa Wilson Is Named "Woman Of Distinction"

Longtime Friona resident Louisa Wilson was one of four people honored as a "1999 Woman of Distinction" at the Scholarship Banquet on December 2 at the University Medical Center in Lubbock.

The Women of Distinction program is sponsored by the University Medical Center and the Girl Scouts of Caprock Council.

The Girl Scouts of Caprock Council instituted the awards program and scholarship banquet six years ago to honor women who have made a direct and powerful impact on the lives of others, particularly Girl Scouts, through their support of and belief in Girl Scouting. Mrs. Wilson's presentation

read as follows:

"Girl Scouts and Louisa Wilson are synonymous in Friona, Texas. Louisa became a Girl Scout leader in 1942 and continued her contributions to Girl Scouting over the next 57 years."

Louisa was born in Des Moines, Iowa September 25, 1906. Her father, Charles Schlenker, came to Parmer County in June of 1906, and bought land. He returned to Texas in October and built a home for his family.

In December, 1906, his wife, Amelia came to Texas on a train with nine children! Louisa was two months old at the time. She graduated from Friona High School, and then attended West Texas State College in Canyon.

Long before December 25 arrived, my Mom would start her sewing and baking in preparation. I never recall any invitations going out, but all the kinfolks knew when and where to be on Christmas Day.

One of the few days of the year I can remember my Dad being home in the morning was Christmas morning.

My sisters were musically inclined, so we would gather around the piano for the traditional carols.

After what seemed to be an eternity, usually would be brought to a close with Dad's suggestion that we read the Christmas story from Luke 2. For a young lad anxious to get to the presents, this activity seemed as if he were reading the entire Bible.

So, after the Christmas story was read, Dad would say, "It's about lunchtime. Suppose we should eat and have the rest of our Christmas later? Well, you can guess which way we (kids) voted. The memories are so numerous and so endearing, I wish there was time and space to share more. 

Changing technology provides new options for people needing vision correction. Excimer laser vision correction or PRK (photorefractive keratectomy) can permanently

correct low to moderate degrees of nearsighted-ness. With a computercontrolled laser, a trained surgeon can reshape the surface of your cornea and change the way you see.

PRK is performed on an outpatient basis; you stay alert through the whole procedure. After numbing the eye with drops, the surgeon uses the laser for less than a minute. During the 24-48 hours after treatment, people frequently experience some discomfort from a gritty sensation in the eye. Typically the patient will notice improved vision three to five days after the procedure. Most people return to work three or four days after treatment and resume all normal activities, including sports, within a week.



From 1558 until 1829, Roman Catholics in England were not allowed to practice their faith openly. Someone during that era wrote this carol as a catechism song for young members of the Church. Each element in the Carol has a code word for a Religious reality which the children could remember:

The partridge in a pear tree was Jesus Christ. Two turtle doves were the Old & New Testament. Three French hens stood for "faith, hope and love." Four calling birds were the four gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John.

Five golden rings recalled the Torah -- the first five books of the Old Testament. Six geese-a-laying stood for the six days of creation. IN FLOWER INDUSTRY **Ellisons Introduce New Marketing Ideas**

Step into the greenhouses during the annual Poinsettia Celebration at Ellison's Greenhouses in Brenham, and get ready to be dazzled. Poinsettias--some 50,000 plants representing about 25 varieties -- fill the benches and tumble from hanging baskets in waves of gorgeous color.

Looking around, it's easy to see why the poinsettia is America's biggest-selling flowering potted plant. Vibrant specimens welcome the holidays in bright red, pale pink, muted coral, and creamy ivory. Close inspection reveals poinsettias with marbled bracts in combinations of crimson-and-white and pink-and-cream.

Other discoveries include poinsettias with "petals" shaped like oak leaves or curling in clusters like some roses. To the delight of visitors, other plants enrich the breathtaking scene. Chrysanthemums--numbering thousands--boast pompon blooms in lavender, lilac, gold, and white.

Christmas cacti catch the eye with flowering cascades in coral and pink. Azaleas, too, are memory-makers, eswith red-and-white-speckled blooms. "These flowers look like peppermint candy," says artist from Houston.

or devour lip-smacking good barbecue while enjoying performances of Christmas music. Lectures by horticulturists on plant-related topics provide opportunities for learning.

Ellison's information booth pecially tabletop varieties is the place to glean poinsettia facts and fancy during the weekend festivities. Look for a display of Marge Harris, a watercolor poinsettia-growers' paraphernalia and for Cathy Ganske, But for the 5,000 or more an experienced greenhouse visitors who attended the technician known to Celetwo-day Poinsettia Cele- bration-goers as "the lady with the answers." Cathy usually brandishes a ruby-red beauty while explaining poinsettia phy-siology. "The colorful parts of the poinsettia are modified leaves called bracts," she says. "The true flowers are l other gift items. At a display of exquisite v poinsettia varieties, also shows bystanders the steps Ellison's follows to coax three-inch cuttings into glorious holiday plants. "We begin in March when the starter stock arrives from plant breeders," she says. Once these patented cuttings form roots, onlookers learn, growers start a regimen of pinching, cutting, transplanting, watering, and fertilizing. In fall, workers shroud the greenhouse roofs with black plastic. Turning day into night prompts poinsettias to blush with color in time for holiday markets. As the poinsettias' hues intensify in November, Ellison's begins shipping them to wholesalers for distribution to florists, supermarkets, and

nurseries in Austin, San Antonio, Bryan-College Station, Dallas, Fort Worth, and Houston. Some plants will flaunt their beauty at the Governor's Mansion and the State Capitol; others will decorate the George Bush Presidential Library at Texas A&M University in College Station.

Although Ellison's ships the majority of poinsettias by mid-December, the color in the greenhouses only momentarily wanes. Daffodils, hyacinths, tulips, and miniature roses welcome flower-lovers in February. Easter lilies unfurl in March. Hydrangeas announce May. Azaleas, kalanchoes, gloxinias, African violets, chrysanthemums, and foliage plants create a sensation with tourists nearly every month of the year. In all, the dedicated team at Ellison's grows 135 species of flowering and foliage plants that develop and bloom at just the right times.

The ongoing bouquet beckons families, garden clubs, and school kids, who inspect the flower-filled greenhouses on guided tours given year round. The 45-minute treks begin and end at Ellison's Garden and Tourism Center, a shoppers' haven filled with gift items as well as plants. (The only time shoppers can purchase gift items and plants at the greenhouses is during the November Celebration.)






Joel Roberts Poinsett, an amateur botanist, probably knew the legend. When his





Jack Patterson Recounts Christmas '44 in Germany


We grew up poor, Ona and I, in the Blue Ridge Mountains of Georgia. But we didn't know we were poor until we were grown up, got married, and left there.

I was the 11th child in a family of 19. Fifteen of the children lived to be grown. I know what it's like to sleep at the foot of the bed. There were sometimes as many as four of us kids in a bed at one time.

We lived in the last house in Hell's Hollow in Fannin County, Georgia, on the border between Georgia and Tennessee. If you were in a wagon and were planning to go further on up into the hills from our house, you had to stop and get out and walk the rest of the way. So I guess you could say that our place was pretty remote.

Each one of us had a nail on the mantle up over the big fire place and that's where we'd hang up our stockings for Christmas. We each got a stick of hard candy and an orange, and that was a real treat. Oranges were special and we were sure glad to get them. The only time we ever saw an orange was at Christmas time. It was better than all those electronic toys that kids get for Christmas now days.

As one of the younger kids, I had to learn to hold my own with the older ones. Hunting, shooting and fishing was a way of life for us. We didn't do it just for fun. We learned to hunt and fish as

Germans at the Battle of the Bulge. The Germans launched their surprise attack on December 16, working their way through the Ardennes Forest to force that bulge in the Allied line from Belgium and Luxemburg to a depth of about 60 miles. The winter of '44-'45 was the worst winter on record in Germany. It wasn't windy like it is here, so the snow came straight down and it was knee deep. I was never so cold in my life. The reverberating roar of those guns and exploding shells went on continuously all day long without stopping. The noise slacked off a little bit after dark, but not much. The constant roar and the

cold really took its toll. Our forces finally got it ironed out by about the end of January 1945. That was my most miserable and memorable Christmas.

I missed getting home for

soon as we were big enough, so we would have enough to eat. You had to be able to shoot a rabbit in the head because the body was going to be part of your dinner. I guess that's why I still enjoy hunting and fishing. It's in my blood.

Growing up under those circumstances, was probably the Lord's way of preparing me for that memorable Christmas of 1944 when I was in Germany helping General Patton try to stop the about three Christmases in a row. I went into the service just before Christmas '42, and got out in September '45. But the real heroes were the ones who gave their lives or came home crippled up for life.

After that experience, those Christmases back home in the Blue Ridge Mountains with 13 kids getting an orange in their stockings, seemed mighty close to heaven on earth.
