Attorney General Spitzer "A lot of major songs have been implicated in this and it showed how pervasive payola infrastructure had become. Major artists, major songs, were sent up the charts through improper payments to buy spins on the air that trans-late into sales." That sounds a lot like advertising to me, but I

could be wrong.
Companies like Coca-Cola and Mrs. Baird's pay a premium to grocery chains to have their products in the prime shelf space. Isn't that the same thing as payola? So how come it is illegal? Learned law folks say payola is not illegal but commercial bribery is and payola is

commercial bribery. Huh?
According to the website, the first court case involving payola was in 1960. On May 9, DJ Alan Freed was indicted for accepting \$2,500 which he claimed was a token of gratitude and did not affect airplay. He paid a small fine and was released. His career faltered and in 1965 he drank himself to death

Dick Clark was also involved in the payola investigations during the 1950s and 60s. If you want to find out more about it just Google the word payola. Two of the major recording companies the New York AG is harassing have already paid a total of \$15 mil-lion to settle their part of the investigation.

We have some crazy logic this country. Indians can build casinos on their reservations and take gamblers' money and pay no taxes to the gov ernment. Record companies that want to sell their records pay radio stations to play records and that is illegal even though radio stations and record companies pay taxes.

When all is said and done it is usually the money that wins out. The government doesn't mind legal or near-legal illegal activities as long as they get their cut.

#### A visit to the money factory

Last summer we took a tour of the Bureau of Printing and Engraving in Fort Worth. It sure was fun seeing all that money. The multi-million dollar facility is modern, state of the art and produces more than half (52-54%) of the US currency. Although

it opened in 1991, it didn't get much publicity until a couple of years ago when a visitors' center opened. A website, www.moneyfactory.gov gets millions of hits and provides information on our dollar bills.

Only two places in the world make US paper Washington, DC and Fort Worth, Texas. To see where your bill was made, look at the top of the bill on the portrait side. If there is a small "FW at the top, it came from Fort Worth. If there's no "FW" it came from Washington, DC.

Early this year I talked with Charlene Williams

the CEO of the Western Currency Facility. It produces ones, twos, fives, tens, twenties and fifties. "We actually did all the printing on the new fifty dollar bill and we're doing all the

printing on the new ten dollar bill which will be released March the second," says Charlene. US Currency started having color with the new 20-dollar bill. Charlene says color makes the bills safer, smarter and more secure. She says about 67 percent of our nation's currency is circulated overseas

The Western branch of the BEP employs more than 700 people who take an immense pride in their work. ant to turn out a good product. They don't think of it as money. Engravers go thru a seven to ten year apprentice program before they begin their official duties. Printers and pressmen have a four year apprentice program

The Bureau of Engraving and Printing decided to add a second plant in 1982 after an Air Florida plane crashed into the 14th street bridge in Washington,

DC. "Had that plane been closer to the Bureau," says Charlene, that would have caused a major economic devastation. had already been talk about putting another plant outside the

Washington area. That incident helped to push along that effort. The Bureau in Washington is interesting. It's in what was once an office building that was made into a production facility, so it's a multi-level operation. It's probably the second most popular tourist spot in Washington after the White House

Eighty cities wanted the facility, but Fort Worth wanted it more than the others. Charlene says it's the civic pride that got the plant in Fort Worth. "Fort Worth people were very committed to getting the facility to locate here. They donated 100 acres of property and a 240,000 square feet building. For the first 100 jobs offered here, we had 14,000 applications. When people come to work here, they pretty much make this their Sometimes I ask my employees to guide people on tours because it gives them a chance to talk about what they do and show the pride in their work." The facility makes about 5 billion bills a year. A one lasts 2 months, 5's and 10's last about 3 years, 20's last 5 years, 50's and 100's last about 9 years. Twos have never worn out.







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#### **Foreign Bodies**

What should you do when you've gotten something in your eyes? Should you rub your eyes in an attempt to dislodge the foreign body? First, determine how forcefully the object was propelled toward the eye. If the foreign body is in the eye as a result of a mishap at work, like a flying metal particle, the best advice is to see your eye doctor immediately. The object can then be skillfully removed and checked by the doctor. If the particle happens to fall on the eye gently, as in a piece of lint or dirt, a little irritation and a moist towel may be used to dislodge the matter.

In 1948, the Squaws took a glittering 42-0 record to the state meet. This time the team had avoided their "nemesis," to lose to Stanton, a team they had beaten earlier in the season at the Ropesville tournament, by a score of 32-24. Posting a 45-1 record, the dejected girls had to settle for third place after edging Penelope, 25-24.

In those early years, girls' basketball was regulated by the "High School Girls League of Texas," the brainchild of L.C. McKamey of Hillsboro, who devised the playoff system after persistent refusals by the Texas UIL to sponsor girls basketball. (It was supposedly too hard on the female's body to compete in sports of this nature!)

Sometimes referred to as the "McCamey League," the state tournament was held in Hillsboro most of its existence, and at Waco a few times.

Teams competed on countywide basis, with county champs meeting in a "District" tournament, similar to today's "regional" setup. From 14 to 16 counties were represented in the Panhandle tournament, usually played at places like Hedley, Claude and Panhandle, but never in Amarillo, as far as we know.

There were 16 "districts" across the state who sent representatives to the state meet, meaning there had to be eight games played in the first round—just to get to the quarterfinals (the "usual" size of most high school tourna-




#### FHS band offers Rent-a-Kid

Mr. McGarrity is a native New Mexican author who has written a series of detective novels which take place in our neighboring state. He is no





character, Kevin Kerney, and the supporting cast are like old ultimately the Chief of Police in Santa Fe, who comes across as a real person.
