Family sues Parmer County for \$8 million in 2004 jail death

On February 22, 2004, Phillip Morris "P.J." Griggs, Jr., 22, of Bovina, hung himself from the bars of his Parmer County jail cell. The death, which occurred in the old jail facility, was ruled a suicide. Griggs had been incarcerated since February 1, 2004, on a misdemeanor charge and along with other inmates had been helping with the completion of the new Parmer County Detention Center, which opened in March 2004.

According to county officials Griggs showed no signs

of suicidal behavior during his jail stay. A lawsuit filed in U.S. District Court in Amarillo now disputes that notion. The action was filed February 17, 2006, five days before the statute of limitations expired. The filing asks for a total of \$8 million plus interest, costs, and attorney fees. Defendants are Parmer County, Sheriff Randy Geries, and Wayne Gruben, Chief Deputy at the time and now chief jailer at the new jail.

of Zachary Monzon and administrator of the estate of Phillip Morris Griggs, Jr. and Phillip M. Griggs, Sr. and Brenda Griggs, parents of the decedent. Rosemary Monzon is Griggs' grandmother and Zachary Monzon is his son.

The plaintiff's attorney, Chuck Hester of Hester, McGlasson & Cox in Canyon, seeks money damages to redress and remedy the deprivation of the constitutional rights of Mr. Griggs under the 4th,

The filing alleges that at the time of Griggs' booking in February, 2004, his responses reflected on a diagnostic form warranted a mental health evaluation and follow-up but that no further evaluation or follow-up

Chief Deputy Gruben found Griggs hanging from his cell bars at 2:30 p.m. February 22, 2004. Determining that Mr. Griggs was deceased, he called Sheriff Geries, Precinct 3 Justice of the Peace Pam Haseloff, ford. Haseloff pronounced Griggs dead at 2:45 p.m.

According to court documents, Mr. Griggs was not cut down from the bars until 4:25 p.m. and that emergency medical aid was never summoned.

The plaintiffs are seeking \$5 million against the defendants, jointly and severally, as com-pensatory damages for the deprivation of one or more of the constitutional rights of the decedent and the loss of his life. An additional \$3 million is be-

ages to be awarded to the estate of decedent and plaintiffs.

Also the estate is asking for interest from the date of injury and death, plus other relief as law and equity allows including costs and reasonable attorney's

The county and defendants have 20 days from the date of filing to respond. Attorney Charlotte Bingham of Lubbock will represent the county in the action. She is an attorney for the county's insurance carrier.

Sometime around midnight Parmer County Sheriff's Deputy Billy Williams stopped Juan Flores, 20, of Texico, New Mexico in Farwell for driving while intoxicated. Williams followed normal procedure and handcuffed Flores and secured him in the county vehicle. While Williams inven

managed to slide his handcuffed hands under his behind and down his legs at which time he slid his legs through his arms and unbuckled the seatbelt. He then slid over the console and proceeded to steal the Deputy's

Flores sped away from Farwell toward Lariat on Hwy. 70/84. After multiple U-turns the tires on the right side of the vehicle blew out and the suspect drove into a culvert.

Officers from Texico, Curry County, Texas Highway Patrol, Muleshoe Police Department, Parmer County Sheriff's Office

For a couple of years Plateau Wireless, our regional cell phone provider, has attempted to keep up with the big boys like Sprint and Verizon. For a long time they pretty well had this area of the nation to themselves. Then cell towers started popping up along the pavement and the competition heated

So Plateau moved into the modern age too. Everywhere except in the Friona area. Imagine people all around us taking pictures with cell phones and we were stuck with just talking on them. Texas Pride has Deep Roots By Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison

People learn quickly when someone is from Texas, usually right after they learn that person's name. We're proud to introduce ourselves as Texans. It is a badge of honor we wear with pride, and it is as much a part of our identity as any other element of our background.

I meet a lot of non-Texans who just do not fully appreciate what it means to be a Texan. I explain to them that Texas Pride is more than just a phrase. We are proud of our heritage because it reveals a lot about our character and vision. Our early fight for independence says something important about who we are today.

Texas's march toward freedom became an all-out stampede on March 2, 1836, with a declaration of independence from Mexico. Texas residents were no longer willing to live under Mexican rule, and they were determined to do whatever it took to establish

A 54-member delegation signed the original declaration, including my great-great-grandfather - Charles S. Taylor. The signers of the Texas declaration, like those who signed the American Declaration of Independence in 1776, risked their lives and families when they took that bold step. Since Texas was Mexican territory, they were considered traitors, but the threat of death did not stop them because they were willing to pay any price for the freedom of Texas.

In the battle for independence, General Sam Houston and the Texas Revolutionary Army defeated Santa Anna and his Mexican forces in less than two months. While victory was achieved at the battle of San Jacinto, the siege of the Alamo was a defining moment for the spirit of Texas. Though the Texas army suffered a defeat in San Antonio, their courageous stand gave General Houston valuable time to marshal his forces at San Jacinto.

Colonel William Barrett Travis commanded the badly outnum-bered Texas forces, who fought valiantly until the bitter end against a Mexican army that outnumbered them at least 10-to-1. Despite overwhelming odds, Colonel Travis swore in a letter to the "People of Texas and All Americans in the World" that "I shall never surrender or retreat." He closed the letter with the promise, "I am determined to sustain myself as long as possible and die like a soldier who never forgets what is due to his own honor and that of

his country - victory or death." In the end, this heroic group of 189 Texans inflicted nearly 600 casualties on Santa Anna's Mexican forces. To this day, their valiant stand is a model for schoolchildren of how to remain brave in the face of adversity.

Word of the Alamo spread quickly throughout the state, rallying Texans behind the fight for independence. Just over six weeks later, the war was over, with Texas standing tall and victorious at the battle of San Jacinto - but not before another group of brave Texans gave their lives for the cause.

At the battle of Coleto, a group of Texas soldiers led by James W. Fannin were overwhelmed, and he surrendered his command to Mexican forces according to the customs of war. After his troops were disarmed and had peacefully entered Mexican custody, Santa Anna gave an order to execute them, and all 342 men were lost at

This massacre only cemented the determination of Texans to not rest until victory was achieved. Anything less would dishonor the memory of the men who had already paid the ultimate price fighting for Texas. When General Houston's 900-member force overpowered Santa Anna and his 1,300-man army to end the war at San Jacinto, the soldiers cried "Remember the Alamo! Remember Goliad!" in the name of those who had fallen.

Today, Texans are still aware of the debt we owe to those who died in the fight for independence. Because of our gratitude for their sacrifice, we guard our freedoms fiercely.

Santa Anna's capture was met with calls for his execution in retribution for his heinous actions during the war. However, General Houston did not extract vengeance on his Mexican counterpart; instead he showed generosity after his great victory. Such magnanimity is also a trait that defines the Texan character.

For his leadership during the revolution, Sam Houston was elected as the first president of the Republic of Texas, and he established March 2 as Texas Independence Day in 1842 during his second term as president. As we celebrate our past, the legacies of revolutionaries such as Sam Houston and William Barrett Travis continue to inspire Texans today, just as they did many years ago in the fight for Texas' independence.

A couple of pictures she painted hang in her living

She thinks she is the oldest living beauty operator that is working. "I could fix hair every day if I wanted to," she said. In the early days of her career she charged a quarter for a shampoo and set. Some people thought that was too expen-

I recorded our conversation for about 30 minutes and was satisfied I had enough material for a column or program and was

putting away my recorder and microphone when she said, "I gave Bonnie Parker her last hairdo two weeks before she and Clyde Barrow were shot." I got out my microphone and sat down to hear all about that.

We were not busy one day and this lady came in and said 'lock the door and don't let nobody in and don't answer the phone.' She said she wanted her hair done. The other girl in the shop washed her hair, but she was so nervous she could hardly do anything.

Bonnie didn't bother me. I rolled her hair up then put her under the dryer. She kept a towel over her face. She had a half-opened umbrella and kept her hand in it all the time she was in the shop. I tried every way to

see in it, but she always moved it. She knew what I was doing. sure she had a gun in there The county doctor had an office next to our shop and we had a big double door that joined our place to his. When he was

gone, we always answered his phone. His phone got to ringing and Bonnie told us not to answer it. I told her if we didn't, people would get suspicious. Bonnie told me 'you look honest enough. Go ahead and answer it. But leave the door open.' So I went ahead and took the message. While I was on the phone, I wrote a note saying 'Bonnie Parker is in the beauty The doctor came while she was still there and tried to open the door to our shop. Bonnie told us not to let him in. I told her he needs to know where the patient lives. Bonnie let me go to the door and talk to the doctor. I told him Bonnie was still in the shop. The doctor went to the sheriff's office but nobody came. She wouldn't let us finish dying her hair real good, but I went ahead and fixed her hair best I could. She paid us and said 'don't follow me or say nothing.' Then she left. When we thought she had time to get gone, we rushed outside. I figure Clyde was waiting for her and she got in the car and they took off. We went to the sheriff's office and asked why they didn't come over. They said they were afraid we'd get

- Q. What is the best thing to do if an Automated Teller Machine (ATM) does not dole out the correct amount of money, or worse, takes your debit or ATM card without giving it back?
- A. The number one thing a consumer should do is contact the financial institution where the card was issued, not where the problem happened. The issuing institution has the sole authority to undo any adjustments made to a savings or checking account. Be sure to bring in a receipt given to you at the ATM, so the bank can have a copy for their records.

Federal Guidelines regulating the ATM industry generally favor the consumer (you!) but it's important to contact the card issuer promptly so that any improper debits or credits to your account can be corrected in a timely fashion, usually within two weeks.

matter, such as ammonia and plaster of



matter, such as ammonia and plaster of Paris, are more serious because they tend to soften and dissolve corneal tissue. On the other hand, burns caused by acidic chemicals, like battery acid and strong cleaning agents, cause most of their damage within the first few minutes to hours. 

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FRIONA CENTENNIAL MOMENTS

Friona—the Biggest Small Town in Texas—Still Seeking Newcomers 100 years later by Darla Bracken



1923 view of town

Ever since the very beginning, promoters have sought to adequately describe our fair city. In a 1907-08 brochure, Friona was described as "a beautiful little town on the main line of the Sante Fe Railroad...located on gently rolling prairie, with an abundance of the purest water...with a fine hotel, livery stable, two general stores, mail, telegraph and express facilities...and a new bank...and a climate absolutely unsur-passed for healthfulness."

In a map and prospectus of the George G. Wright Land Company, the main attraction was Land For Sale. Land that had been bought by the Syndicate for \$1.50 per acre was now being sold for \$22.50 per acre. Wright, a Kansas City Missouri real estate developer and agent, sponsored Home Seekers Excursion Trains twice monthly to

Prospective settlers were greeted at the Depot and whisked off in touring cars to see the land. The Depot, at first just a box car, served until the building as we know it was built in 1908. The "Merry Widow", a two- coach train, ran twice daily between Amarillo and Clovis, New Mexico.







Museum Concert


