

ting more for their milk than they are in Chicago. The cost of production is much less in Austin, because we have cheaper feed and do not have to ship the milk hundreds of miles to the consumer. Furthermore every drop of milk sold in Chictgo must be pasturized unless it comes from certified dairies. Factors of feeding, breeding, and sanitation of milk supplies, on the economic side of the question has direct bearing on the amount of milk the dairyman can produce. The greater the value placed on a cow, the more attention the dairyman will give her which in turn means a healthier herd and a better grade of milk.

These matters, it is true, come primarily under the supervision of the Department of Agriculture, and our own experiment stations, but must be taken into considerration by the health officer because, under the Standard Milk Ordinance, the healthy cow is the first requirement of a safe milk. Since the federal government began the tubercolin testing of cattle in 1917, there have been 211,858' reactors. this figures 1-2 per cent reactors which is low compared with some of our northern competitors. But figuring on thebasis of figures last year probably more than 5,000 cows with tuberculosis. It is evident therefore that the health of the cow should be given serious consideration by the health department.
