More than 1,000 houses are inundated in Dallas and 5,000 persons are without shelter. hundred, and \$2,000,000 worth of the west and south have been prostrated or submerged all day and source of the flood. It is impossible to procure a list of the dead.

The sheriff's office, which has largely directed the work of rescue, has no list, but many lives are known to the department to have been lost. The city water works is flooded to the point of suspension for any domestic use, the electric light plants are flooded and the city is in darkness.

Mayor Hay has, by proclamamation, closed all business houses except drug stores. A mass meeting this afternoon organized relief forces and citizens subscribed about \$10,000. Every available piece of river craft is pushing the rescue work. Thousands of head of livestock have perished. The big Commerce street bridge is partly wrecked, 600 feet of the Texas & Pacific railway bridge swept away and tracts and bridges or trestles of other lines badly washed out.




