HUMBLE OFFERS ONE YEAR SCHOLARSHIPS

Houston, Texas — Offers to establish 12 one-year fellowships in the fields of science and engineering have been made by Humble Oil & Refining Company to five leading universities in the southwest and South and to the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, it was announced today.

Three fellowships, one in geology, one in chemical engineering, and one in chemistry, have been offered to the University of Texas; one in civil engineering and one in mechanical engineering were extended to Texas A. & M. College; one in physics and one in chemistry to the Rice Institute; one in petroleum engineering, and one in geology to both University of Oklahoma and to Louisiana State University; and one in chemical engineering to M. I. T.

Humble established these fellowships, the announcement said, because of its interest in the advancement of study in these fields and as a stimulus to stronger teaching and to higher achievement by outstanding students. The Humble Company, along with other industrial units, is keenly interested in the development of men and women who have shown marked ability and promise in the fields of science and technology.

The fellowships will pay the holders the sum of \$1,250 per academic year, and in addition, the fellowships in geology will provide an extra \$500 to cover field work in the summer.

In extending the offers to the several institutions the Humble Company explained that the fellowships would be established on a year to year basis, but that the Company anticipated sponsorship for a period of at least five years.

Recipients of the fellowships will be students who are enrolled in Masters or Doctors degree work, and selection of these stu-

dents will be entirely in the hands of the universities. In the event a candidate is working towards a Doctors degree the fellowship may be granted during any year of his work and is not restricted to his last year of residence at the school.

Selection of the recipient's thesis problem will also be left to the universities, and the problem need not be related to the petroleum industry, but should be in the field in which the fellowship is granted, the announcement said in closing.

CIVIL SERVICE EXAMS

Examinations for jobs in the field service of the Social Security Administration, to be filled in 30 offices in Louisiana, Texas and New Mexico, were announced today by the U. S. Civil Service Commission. Beginning salary for the positions, designated as Field Assistant and Claims Assistant, is \$2394 per year.

Application cards and copies of the official announcement may be obtained from the Regional Director, 14th U. S. Civil Service Region, 210 South Harwood St., Dallas, Texas; any first or second class post office; or from the Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners for the Social Security Administration, 912 Maverick Building, San Antonio 5, Texas.

These are key entrance jobs in the social insurance program because of their direct contact with wage earners, claimants, employers, and the public. Successful performance in these positions is excellent preparation for advancement in the service.

Applications for the examination must be filed with the Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners for the Social Security Administration, 912 Maverick Building, San Antonio not later than Mar. 31, 1947.

"The many properties which bland lard possesses make it superior to other shortenings. It is our intent to acquaint consumers with the true facts and create a lasting demand for this all-important pork product.

"It is well known that the history of lard has had a significant bearing on the history of pork and pork prices. Lard makes up 17 to 20 % of the dressed weight of a hog. The steady decline in lard demand prior to World War II helped bring about the lower prices which prevailed for hogs."

Bland lard's appeal to consumers is based on its versatility. It is pure white, odorless, and highly digestible. It remains creamable at a wide range of temperatures — is neither hard at refrigerator temperature nor soft at summer temperature. It does not smoke even though heated to above 400 degrees F., while other shortenings reach a 'smoke point' at from 350 to 375 degrees. It retains all its characteristics without refrigeration, and the Swift product stays fresh even though exposed to air.

As production is expanded, the merchandising campaign will be spread until it reaches national proportions, he said.

CIVIL SERVICE EXAMS

The Civil Service Commission announced a Student Nurse examination for training at St. Elizabeths Hospital in Washington, D. C. The course covers a 3-year period and students will receive during that time a total allowance of \$752, plus quarters, subsistence, laundry, and medical attention.

This nursing course prepares both men and women to become graduate professional nurses who are equipped to meet the great need for nurses in the psychiatric field. The first class will begin in the fall of 1947. To qualify for the examination, applicants must have been graduated from an accredited high school giving a 4-year course and must have completed at least 16 units of study including 4 units of English, 2 units of mathematics, 2 units of science, and 2 units of social studies. 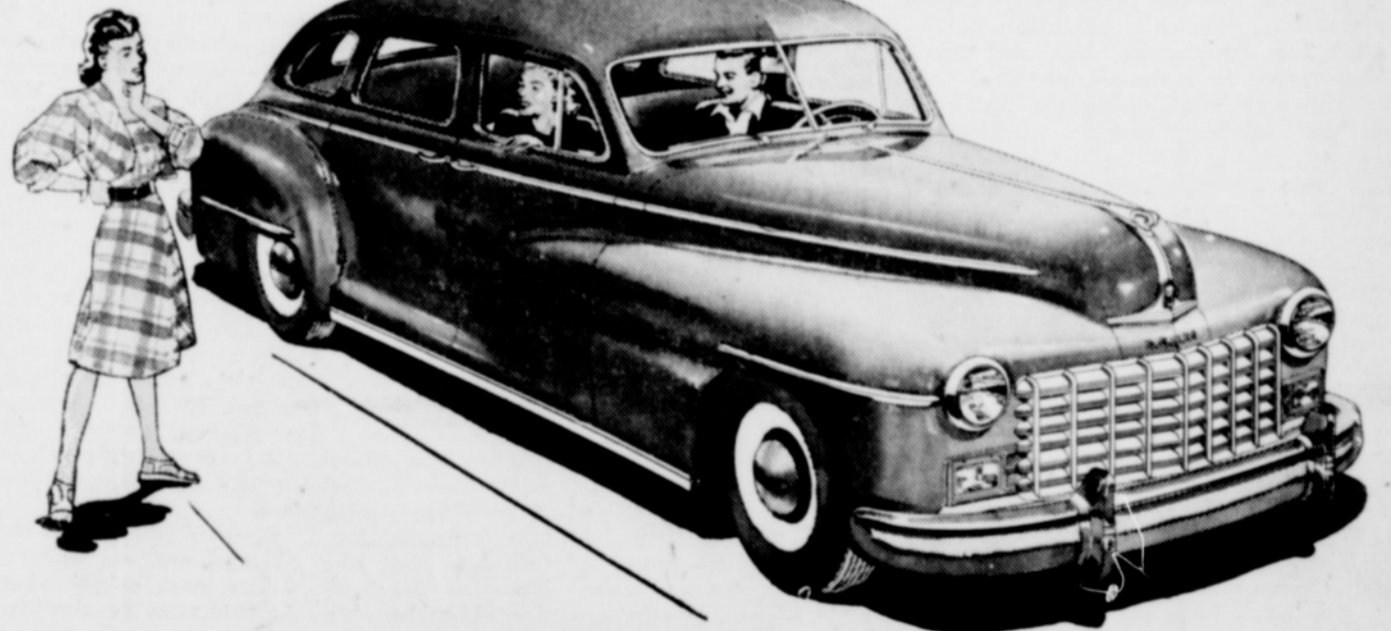
