KING PASSED AWAY NEAR MID-NIGHT ON LAST FRIDAY.

Prince of Wales, Who Succeeds His Father, Will Be Known as George V .-- King's Funeral on May 20.

London, May 7 (Saturday).-King Edward VII died at 11:45 o'clock last night in the presence of his family. He had been ill less than a week, and only within forty-eight hours of his death had his illness seemed serious.

The Prince of Wales succeeded to the throne immediately, according to the laws of the kingdom, without official ceremony. His first official act was to send to the lord mayor the anouncement of his father's death, in pursuance of custom. The telegram

"I am deeply grieved to inform you that my beloved father, the king, passed away peacefully at 11:45 to-GEORGE."

The physicians soon afterward issued their official bulletin, which was

"May 6, 11:50 p. m .- His majesty, the king breathed his last at 11:45 tonight, in the presence of her majesty. Quen Alexandra, the Prince and Princess of Wales, Princess Royal, the Duchess of Fife, Princess Victoria and Princess Louise, the Duchess of Ar-

The cause of death was given as bronchitis.

in England, the Duke of Fife and the Archbishop of Canterbury were in the chamber where the king died. The king's brother, the Duke of Connaught, with his family, is at Suez, hastening home from Africa. The king's daughter, Queen Maud, of Norway, will start for England tomorrow.

"Gentlemen, his majesty is dead." It was nearly half an hour after the king breathed his last when Lord Knollys came into the office and said to the waiting reporters:

"Gentlemen, his majesty is dead." King George Proclaimed.

London, May 7.-King George V. was proclaimed this afternoon.

The proclamation was approved by privy council at 4 o'clock. The council met in the throne room of St. University. James Palace, under the presidency of the Earl of Crewe.

It will be brightest, so far as the earth is concerned, on May 20, when it may be seen in the western heavens just after sunset.

At that time the head will be nearest the earth, a trifle of 14,000,000 miles away. Attendant phenomena will be best observed from the islands of the Pacific ocean.



material development of Texas. "Instead of having 13,000 miles of railroads, Texas should have 30,000, and I believe in a policy that will encourage this railroad building.

"I say this not for the railroads, but for the people who are benefited by them. I believe in a State policy that will encourage all legitimate investments in Texas and one that puts those interests in Texas out of business that do not want to obey the laws of the State.

"I believe that corporations should be placed under the criminal law and that they should not be allowed to oppress the poor, but none of us can prosper without the aid of capital, and I would not oppose them except when they oppose the law."

The speaker dwelt at some length on the need of reforms in our superior court practices, and especially the system of pleading now in vogue. He declared for radical reforms in our Courts of Appeal, both civil and criminal, and said: "The people are being devoured by civil taxes to support procedure in civil cases." The speaker's remedy for this evil was to simplify pleadings, to reduce to more simple issues and save time in determining just what points of law were involved in a case, thereby effecting a saving of time, expense and trouble.
