PLAINVIEW MUST BUILD SIDE-WALKS AND CROSSINGS.

Postal Receipts Entitle This City to the Benefits of Service, but Improvements Required.

Plainview has been entitled to free mail delivery for some time, and the an application for this service where the city and the citizens show a proper desire for it.

Free mail delivery can be early and ings and sidewalks will do it.

Is it worth while? Will Plainview citizens content themselves with the interminable, but unavoidable, waits at the crowded post office, or will they insist that proper attention be paid to the street crossings, and the non-progressive property owner comply with the requirements by building sidewalks.

At the close of the fiscal year, in March, the Plainview post office had far passed the amount of receipts necessary to secure this service.

The postmaster is ready and anxious to make the application to secure

The inspector who would be sent here would surely refuse a recommendation on account of the lack of street crossings and sidewalks, and it is much better to postpone the request until it is assured that it will be favorably reported upon, as an unfavorable recommendation would cause a greater delay in securing the benefit.



#### **COUNTY FAIR** TO BE HELD

CLUB SECURE EXHIBIT HALL.

Court House Will Be Used for a Place to Display Agricultural Products.

At a directors' meeting of the Commercial Club on Wednesday a number of merchants and business men were present, and a number of matters of vital interest to Plainview were discussed.

It was announced that a County Fair would be held in this city in September, and it was the expressed desire of every one present that the farmers and truck-growers be urged to keep the date in mind and prepare to exhibit some product of agriculture, as it is intended to use these exhibits here and then send the entire collection on a tour of points in the Middle West and North, the trip to be made in time for a return to the

The club has secured the use of the district court room to display the agricultural exhibits, as the term now in session is expected to be the last one held in the present building. The new court house will be ready for occupancy before the next term time.

All phases of the proposition of securing new railroads for Plainview were discussed at the meeting, and plans were outlined and steps taken to carry them out that are expected to produce results in the near future.

A fund was raised to meet the expense incidental to the work of putting the railroad proposition in tangible shape.

#### DEMONSTRATION FARM.

The Campbell System to Be Tried Near Crosbyton.

Examples here practiced should greatly benefit the localities under whose observation it comes.

STATE CONSTITUTION AUTHOR-IZING THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A HOME FOR WIVES AND WIDOWS OF CONFEDER-ATE SOLDIERS AND SAILORS.

House Joint Resolution No. 7.

Joint Resolution to amend Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended in 1903, so as to authorize the grant of aid in the establishment and maintenace of a home for the disabled and dependent wives and widows of Confederate soldiers and sailors and such women as aided the Confederacy, and making an appropria-

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended in 1903, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Article 3. Section 51. The Legis-

lature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, associations of individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever; provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors who came to Texas prior to January 1, 1880, and who are either over sixty years of age or whose disability is the proximate result of actual service in the Confederate army for a period of at least three months, their widows in indigent circumstances who have never remarried and who have been bona fide residents of the State of Texas since March 1, 1880, and who were married to such soldiers or sailors anterior to March 1, 1880; provided, said aid shall not exceed eight dollars per month, and provided further, that no appropriation shall ever be made for the purpose hereinbefore specified in excess of five hundred thousand dollars for any one year. And also Farm and Ranch, an article following grant aid to the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors, their wives and widows and women who aided in the Confederacy, under such regulations and limitations as may be provided by law; provided, the grant to aid said home shall not exceed one hundred and fifty thousand dollars for any one year, and no inmate of said homes shall be entitled to any other aid from the State; the Legislature may provide for husband and wife to rebell packer, since which, shortly after main together in the home; and prorains, it was harrowed, thus closing vided further, that the provisions of the surface, to retain moisture. 


