District files appeal of unacceptable rating

The Texas Education Agency released its state testing accountability ratings last week. Friona High School was given an "academically unacceptable

campus" rating.
At the FISD Board of Trustees meeting Monday, August 7, Superintendent Jim Parker told the board that the state's testing contractor failed to follow through with corrections to student test coding data submitted by school officials in May as the reason for the rating.

School officials consulted with test contractors immediately following the release of TAKS results last week. According to Parker, the company readily admitted the information submitted in May was in their files, however they had failed to make the changes requested. "Because all data had been processed and released to the Texas Education Agency it was necessary for the district to file an appeal with Texas Commissioner of Education Shirley Neeley to correct the rating, Parker said.

The appeal was filed immediately and school officials are it will be granted. "Aside from an apology from Pearson Testing Service, little can be done to make up for negative media attention focused on our school district," Parker said. He continued, "It is ironic that none of the media folks, aside from our own Friona Star, were calling for interviews and comments last year when Friona ISD was one of the only recognized school districts our size in the Texas Panhandle.

Parker did have good news for school board members. Friona Junior High was rated "recognized" by the TEA. The Primary and Elementary Schools missed a "recognized" rating by one percentage point, according to Parker's report. "Parents, staff, and students are to be commended for their success

Accident at Cargill entrance Monday

A Bovina woman who was getting off work at Cargill Meat Solutions Monday morning about 6 a.m. pulled out onto Highway 60 and was hit by an eastbound Ford Focus. The driver of Focus did have time to hit his brakes but hit the woman's pickup broadside in the driver's door.

DPS Trooper James Perez, who investigated the accident, said the woman saw a line of eastbound vehicles waiting to turn right into the plant entrance, thought they were all turning right, and pulled onto the highway to turn west toward Bovina. Unfortu-

nately the Focus was not turning right.

Trooper Perez said the woman was fortunate that the vehicle that hit her was a small Ford Focus. "If she had pulled out in front of a big SUV, or pickup, or semi- she could have been seriously hurt or killed, " he told her.

First responders from the Friona EMS and Friona volunteer fire department were on the scene to assist with traffic control. Neither driver, both residents of Bovina, were transported to the hospital. They were checked and treated at the scene by Friona EMS personnel.

Drivers also need to slow down and pay attention in school zones. Children may not be looking for oncoming traffic when they step into the roadway, so drivers must remain alert.

"Although school buses are the safest form of transportation for students, the most dangerous time of the journey is when children are entering and exiting the bus," said Col. Thomas A. Davis, Jr., director of the DPS. "When a school bus is loading or unloading students, the law requires that drivers stop on most road-

State law requires approaching drivers to stop when a school bus is stopped and operating a visual signal

dren walking to school or wait- (red flashing lights or a stop ing for school buses-and to sign). Drivers should not proceed until the school bus resumes motion; the driver is signaled by the bus driver to proceed; or the visual signal is no longer activated. A driver does not have to stop for a school bus if it is on a highway with roadways separated by an intervening space or physical barrier. (If a highway is divided only by a left-turning lane, the roadways are not separated, and drivers must stop for school buses.)

Drivers who do not stop for school buses face a fine of up to \$1,000. If a driver is convicted of this offense more than one time, DPS can suspend their license for up to six

"DPS has zero tolerance for vehicles that pass stopped school buses," Davis said. "Drivers must slow down, obey school zone speed limits and stop for school buses to ensure the safety of Texas school

Bovina vandals shoot vehicles and slash tires

In the early morning hours of Sunday, August 6, one or more unknown persons shot windows in 13 vehicles. They also slashed tires on three of the vehicles. A fourth vehicle suffered slashed tires but no window damage.

Jimmy passed the bigger test

Jimmy Statham wouldn't have cared about a TAKS

As I remember, Jimmy didn't care about many of the tests we took during our Hillsboro High School careers. Every time the TAKS test issue flairs up, I think about Jimmy.

The only clothes I ever remember Jimmy wearing to school were second hand jeans and T-shirts. None of us were rich in those days but he seemed poorer than most. He was a quiet guy. Played football but that's about it. He didn't get haircuts real often and I don't remember him ever having a car. I'm not sure what Jimmy's grade point average was but he wasn't in the top ten.

When I went back for my 40th class reunion I spotted Jimmy across the room, standing aside quietly, just like high school. He had on some jeans and a T-shirt. We had a warm handshake and a "hey, how've you been." My thought was he had hung around Hillsboro and had union next year.

been a laborer his whole life. How wrong I was.

Jimmy told me matterof-factly he had been in the military after graduation where he became an engineer. Then he spent 30years working on government projects around the globe. He named off a list of countries he had lived in that sounded like National Geographic. I felt like apologizing for thinking he hadn't amounted to anything.

Indeed Jimmy might not have passed our high school written tests but he did pass a higher, more important test, that of contributing, doing his part, and making a success of his life on

Jimmy, and millions more like him, was not a standard student bound by standard testing. None of us in the Class of '57 could have predicted Jimmy's career path. At the time we met again he was retired, had moved back to Hillsboro, and spent his time on various hobbies. I hope to see him again at our 50th re- on both the Amarillo and

The point is made again and again that government moguls that sit atop the education pyramid have no business trying to figure out Jimmy's future. Forcing kids like Jimmy to fear tests that are beyond their interest just for the sake of education is wrong.

Let me state my position once again: there are no standard kids. None. All kids, all students, are different in all ways. Some are proficient in math, others hate it. I was one of those. Jimmy didn't seem to have a favorite although I didn't pay him much attention in school. He turned out alright without the benefit of a TAKS test.

In fact, I believe there are no standard school districts, yet the feds and the state are hammering all school districts with the same hammer, intimidating school officials if a district does not come up to standards not of their own mak-

The front page headline Lubbock papers Wednesday said "Teachers call for TAKS overhaul". A subhead said "Schools not able to produce well-rounded students." The teachers' group behind the revolt say the emphasis on TAKS scores is destructive and takes away from a student's ability to learn critical thinking and other essential skills.

Is anybody listening to what the teachers are saying? I hope so. I want to add my small voice to their cause. Get rid of the TAKS test and the alleged accountability system that will fail an entire district because special education students and ESL students cannot pass the standard tests. It is not fair to the non-standard students.

Is anybody listening? I encourage teachers and administrators to keep banging the drum and shouting until somebody does listen. If I can help, let me



Baked beans with pineapple is a hit

A couple of weeks ago my daughter Kirsten McCurry cooked up some baked beans for my granddaughter Hannah's first birthday party. She knew I am not a big baked beans fan: Most baked beans I have had taste too much like baked beans. She said I would like these, and I did.

This recipe, which Kirsten saw on a TV show and found on the Internet, was really good. We think it must be the pineapple that softened the baked bean BBQ taste. But they did not have a pineapple taste. Trust me on that. I'm not a cook, just passing along a neat recipe.

- 4 (16-oz) cans baked beans
- 1 (20-oz) can crushed pineapple, drained
- 1 cup molasses
- 1 cup BBQ sauce
- 2 tablespoons yellow or brown mustard
- 5 slices cooked bacon, crumbled 1 (6-oz) can french-fried onions, crushed
- Salt and freshly ground pepper Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.

In large bowl, mix together beans, pineapple, molasses BBQ sauce, mustard, bacon, and a third of the onions. Add some salt and pepper to taste. Pour beans in 9 by 13-inch casserole dish and sprinkle remaining crushed onions and bacon on top. Cook in oven for 1-hour or until beans brown and bubble. Serve warm.

When Kirsten emailed the recipe she said, "Hey dad, don't

make fun of me in the paper." I don't know whatever gave her the idea I would make fun of somebody. Maybe it's because I helped her out when she was mixing all the ingredients and did some kidding about the pineapple. But I can promise these are some of the best baked beans you've ever tried. Hope you enjoy them as much as I did.





Medicare help for **low-income Texans**

The Medicare Rx Access Network of Texas is reminding thousands of low-income Texans that additional help is available for ment of Criminal Justice The Amarillo Public Library's collection of photographs have their prescription drug costs.

"Even though the initial May 15 enrollment deadline has

passed, there is still time for many low-income Texans to sign up for a Medicare prescription drug plan," said Angela Garcia, League of United Latin American Citizen (LULAC) board member and past LULAC national vice president for the elderly. 'The extended enrollment period is an opportunity to ensure that those who are most in need get help with their prescription drug costs."

Texans who may be eligible but have yet to apply for the Medicare prescription drug benefit's low-income subsidy don't have to wait until November 15 through December 31, 2006 (when the next open-enrollment period begins) to join a plan. They can for the low-income subsidy and receive extra help paying for the coverage.

'If a senior qualifies for the extra assistance, they are offered a special enrollment opportunity and coverage can begin right fine, loss of driver's license for 18 months, 10 days confine-away," said Garcia. "Most importantly, Texas seniors who qualify ment as a condition of community supervision; and confinefor the low-income subsidy will not be subject to a late-enrollment

Beneficiaries who wish to find out if they qualify for the low income subsidy can get assistance by going to a local Social Security Administration (SSA) office, by calling SSA (1-800-772-1213), or by going on-line (www.ssa.gov/prescriptionhelp, then click on "apply for help"). Beneficiaries may also call 1-800-MEDICARE (1-800-633-4227) for help.



If the United States ever gets into a nuclear war with some third world country, like Alabama, I am convinced of one fact. Ants, flies, and car stereos playing loud rap music will survive. Spring and summer is the time of year when pests like ants, flies, and relatives appear from out of nowhere. The most common kinds of ants around here are pharaoh ants and carpenter ants. Pharaoh ants are distinguishable because of their voices. If you listen to them while they carry off your crackers, one crumb at a time, you can hear them mumbling over and over, "Let my

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
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Prairie Acres 30th anniversary coming up

My Life Story

By Jimmy Denson Bradley

Every month, a resident of Prairie Acres Nursing Home or Friona Heritage Estates, writes a story about his/her life's history for the home's newsletter, "The Prairie Times", for printing in this issue. This month we feature Jimmy Denson Bradley.

I was born at Matador, Motley County, Texas, November 8, 1928. My parents were Jesse Denson Bradley and Laura Gertrude Swaringen Bradley. Daddy was the second of eight children and Mama was the second of twelve children. I have six sisters and five brothers.

There was a branch of the Quanah Pacific Railroad that Daddy hauled freight to the business in Matador.

I was 4-years-old when I started driving the dray wagon for the horses to get water. I would whistle at the horses and they would come up. Later Daddy sold the horses to another man. One day I saw the horses, I whistled at them and they came to me. Daddy got on to me about that!

I usually helped Mama wash the clothes. One day this woman and her son were there washing too, her son and I got into a fight. The woman gave both of us a whipping and told us to behave. Mama and I would twist the quilts trying to get out most of the water. We would twist and twist until she flipped me over

We moved quite a bit. I went school at Duck Creek, Girard, Spur and Roaring Springs. I only went half a year at Roaring Springs. That was the 9th grade.

I started pulling cotton when I was 6-years-old. We had to hoe that cotton also. At the age of 10, I hoed cotton and drew a man's wages at \$1.00 a day for 10 hours a day. I got 15 cents hundred weight for pulling cotton. The whole family all worked in the fields. At age 17 I pulled the most cotton I'd ever pulled. It weighed 813 pounds. I left home at 18 to keep from pulling cotton. One year I worked some for the Quanah Acme Pacific

I moved to Deaf Smith County in 1948. I worked for 2 years for Jack Fortenberry at \$90.00 a month plus room and board. I moved

to Amarillo and worked for Ted Lokey's Service Station.

I served in the Army at Fort Sill, Oklahoma. In October 1950, I was transferred for 3 month training at Aberdeen, Maryland as a mechanic to work on big weapons. I came back to Fort Sill and was then shipped to the American Zone near Stuttgart, Germany. I was in the 357th Ordinance Division, then I came back to San Antonio, Texas and got my discharge October 7, 1952.

I married Anna Kate Fortenberry on October 18, 1952 in Clovis, New Mexico. We had met when I worked for her Dad. We lived in Amarillo. I farmed one year at Needmore, Texas, then back to Amarillo, where I worked for Cox Phillip station, did some carpenter work. Later my younger brother, Tom, and I went into the service station business together in Amarillo. I worked at Adrian Wheat Growers for a while, then moved back in 1969 and worked for Mr. Fortenberry until his death. We set up the farm in Sub Chapter S Corporation of which I was President and also I farmed.

I have been struck by lightening 3 different times on the farm. One time I was on a John Deere "D" tractor over on a ½ section of grass pasture. A big thunder and lightening storm came up and got off the tractor and squatted down in front of it when the lightening hit, it just sprawled me out on the ground. About that time, Kate's dad drove up. I got up, I could not talk for a while. Finally my speech came back. Kate's dad used to say, "Son, Son, you're too lucky to live long."

I have a lot of memories to tell. I have never met a stranger. I

love to play dominoes and forty-two Kate and I have two children: Beverly Jane Bradley McCoy

and Jeffery Dean Bradley. We live on the home place in Northeast part of Deaf Smith

County in the Bippus-Simms area



Under state law, the dollar amount of school taxes imposed on the residence homestead of a person 65 years of age or older or of the surviving spouse of such a person, if the surviving spouse was 55 years of age or older when the person died, may not be increased above the amount paid in the first year after the person turned 65, regardless of changes in tax rate or property value.

Notice of Rollback Rate: The highest tax rate the district can adopt before requiring voter approval at an election is 1.077400. This election will be automatically held if the district adopts a rate in excess of the rollback rate of 1.077400.

The upstairs rooms were built for that purpose. The Fourth of July celebration generally brought all the neighbors to the Star Ranch for a rodeo. Also on Sundays when the weather was pretty the neighbors would gather here for baseball games or to ride brones for amusement and pass time as there wasn't any place to go and the means of transportation, which was horseback, in wagons or buggies, was too slow to travel any great distance for a Sunday

Due to the fact that the Star Ranch headquarters was one of the earliest settled and established ranches in this part of the country, it was more or less a stopping place for people who were crossing the country. I remember as a child seeing some coming toward "During that same period of our place either by horseback, wagon or buggy. I knew that we were going to have company for a day or two because there was no other stopping place for many, many miles. On several occasions people from back East were crossing this part of the country on their way to New Mexico to file on land, would stop at the ranch to get water and feed for their livestock and make camp. The traveling school house

"I do not know what year the first school was built in our district or how much territory the district covered. Durthe Bill Hall family moved into our district some three miles west of where we lived. were three children of school age in the Bill Hall family and they went to school with my older sister, Mabel Pearl Reed. The school house was about three miles south and east of our home, which was some distance for children to travel by foot, or by buggy or horse back. Due to this fact the school trustees and men of the community got together and decided that something should be done about the situation. They discussed the matter and figured out a location that would more evenly divide the distance that children would have to travel to A date was set and the school house was moved to a new location which was only one-half mile east of our house. This new location made it very convenient for my sister and me to walk to school; however this did not Within a last very long. couple of years the Charley Benton family moved into the western part of our school dis-Therefore the little school house had to be moved again to keep it in the center of the school population. This time the building was located three miles west of the Star Ranch Headquarters. During the eight years (1915 to 1923) that I attended the Star Ranch School the school building was

solidated with other districts and the little school building was moved to the present lo cation of Lazbuddie High School, which is some two miles west of the original school ground."

*Ben Curtis was the second manager of the Star Ranch from 1903 until it The Star sold in 1908. Ranch was located about 2 miles northeast of Lazbuddie. Original ranch was 65,136 acres or just over 160 sec-



*W. O. Reed bought four sections of land at the Star Ranch in March 1907. Frank L. Reed purchased land in 1908. Martha Ann told that directions and locations around the ranch were given according to the names of the windmills. There were about 30 windmills on the ranch. A few of the wind-mills were: Red Tower, Keefer, Four-mile, Carter Corner and Cottonwood-important, for they meant water for thirsty stock and humans in a dry country. ous outbuildings, bunkhouses for cowboys and corrals for the horses completed the Star Ranch Headquarters site. There was also a half dugout at Red Tower Camp that was put there by the Syndicate in the 1890's.

Don't forget to get your own family history down on paper or recorded! It is so interesting to read these first hand accounts here one hundred years later. DB





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

Caffey attends cowboy camp meeting

Kim Caffey of Friona traveled to Ft. Davis, Tx, August 1-6 to attend the 116th annual Bloys Cowboy Camp meeting. Caffey attended for the first time as an infant in 1941, he says. He has missed attending only two years since then and that was while he was in the U. S. Army. Bloys Cowboy Camp meeting

Bloys Cowboy Camp meeting was founded in 1890 by a group of local ranchers and their families and the first preacher was the Rev. W. B. Bloys, a circuit riding preacher of the day. Today Baptist, Methodist, Presbyterian, and Christian (Disciples of Christ) churches are represented.

There are six cook sheds on the grounds and Kim says the main activities, other than church, are eating and siting around visiting with family and friends. The annual camp meeting is attended by approximately 5,000 people although no one has ever managed to take an accurate census.

Kim's sister, Cynthia Caffey Cotton, is also a life long attendee along with her entire family and so far, one grandchild. He relates that the weather in the Davis Mountains was great. "It rained every day but Sunday and temperatures were in the 60's and 70's" he said. He says he tried to bring some of the weather home but couldn't break it to lead, and it wouldn't follow.
