JAMES BRYCE BIDS U. S. FAREWELL

England's Ambassador Hopes British. American Friendship May Be Extended to Other Nations.

CIVIC STANDARDS RISING

Retiring Britisher Points Out Great Advance by United States in Last Six Years.

James Bryce, on the eve of his departure for home, after six years as ambassador to the United States from Great Britain, said his farewell to the American people Friday night, April 25, in an address before the Pilgrim Society of the United States, at New York City. Mr. Bryce referred with feeling to his cordial relations with the three Presidents who had been in ton and expressed his appreciation of the kindness with which he had been

Mr. Bryce expressed the hope that the friendship existing between America and Great Britain might be extended to embrace other countries.

"With good will and with a conviction that one of every nation's highest assets is that sense of national honor which will make it live up to its intertween nations can be adjusted, and I am sure that any questions between your country and mine will be adjusted in that way."

An Admirer of Root and Bryan. 

CONTROL OF CODDLING MOTH AND FRUIT TREE BORERS.

By E. A. MILLER, Assistant Entomologist and Plant Pathologist of the Texas Department of Agriculture, at Austin.

The coddling moth, causing wormy apples, which last year destroyed nearly all of the fine fruit, is present again this spring, to repeat its work of destruction unless the growers get busy at once and spray their trees. I visited the Plains country last April and urged growers to spray, and those that followed instructions matured a good crop of delicious apples, while those who failed to spray lost nearly all of the fruit because it was wormy and dropped prematurely.

It is a pity to let this fine fruit go to waste, especially since the apple worm is one of the most easily controlled insects we have, if the people would only spray as directed. Spraying and not to spray means all the difference- between a good crop and a complete loss.

I am thoroughly convinced that this Plains country is well adapted to the growing of fruit, but the people must realize that they have to combat the insect pests, the same as they do in every other section, and there is absolutely no use in taking a chance on these pests, especially the apple worm and the borers.



Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Sections 49 and 52 of Article 3 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter

read as follows, to-wit: Section 49. No debt shall be created by or on behalf of the State except to supply casual deficiencies of revenue, repel invasion, suppress insur-rection and defend the State in war or pay existing debts, and no debt created to supply deficiencies in cur-rent revenues shall ever exceed in the aggregate at any one time five hundred thousand dollars. The Legislature, however, shall have power to authorize the issuance of bonds to be approved by the Governor for the purpose of purchasing additional ground and erect necessary buildings for the University of Texas, including a medical department, an Agricultural and Mechanical College and all departments and activities of a complete university of the first class. The revenue received from the permanent University fund shall be available for the payment of interest on these bonds and for the creation of a sinking fund for their redemption at maturity, fund for their redemption at maturity and the Legislature shall also have the established a record of \$6.25.

CITIZENS CELEBRATE

RAILROAD BUILDING.
