Walking across America: A Fat Man's Journey

Gary Long walked through Friona Saturday on his way to St. Louis.

This leg of his journey began in Los Angeles. Mr. Long has already walked from his home in St. Louis to New York.

We talked at the Friona Dairy Queen where he was taking a break with his two traveling companions, Dr. Judi Herring of Jacksonville, Florida, and her mother, Mary Herring of Hartford, Alabama.

This is the text on the front of a business card he gave me: "A Fat Man's Journey" My name is Gary Long. I am walking across America to lose weight and bring National Attention to Obesity in America. You can follow my journey by going to my website, www.afatmansjourney.com.

Gary Long is 52-years-old. He has not always been a fat man. Long spent 21 years in the U.S. Army, several of those years as a drill sergeant. When he retired at age 39 he was a fit 180 pounds. He went to work driving 18-wheelers around the country. Over a period of time, during what he calls his food addiction, his weight rose to 400 pounds.

Along with the weight increase he developed diabetes. "I couldn't do anything," Long said. "I couldn't turn over in bed. I couldn't get through normal doorways, and I had to have a truck customized just to be able to fit in the seat." Life became unbearable for Long.

"I reached a point where I just wanted to die," he said. His wife tried to help but he managed to sneak around and eat. He related how he would order a jumbo pizza and a couple of dozen wings and stand outside until the delivery man came so his family wouldn't know. It would take him 15-minutes to get out of bed. If he fell down he could not get up. "It would take 6-8 guys just to lift me back on my feet," he said.

Out of desperation and a sense of helplessness, in De-

ember of 2005 he began to try and walk for exercise. At first he could only manage maybe 100 yards. Then a quarter of a mile. Long told his wife he was going to start walking and either lose weight or die trying. So he decided to walk to New York. He left St. Louis on February 15 with a small backpack and a sleeping bag and tent borrowed from his brother. It took five months and one week and many close calls along the way.

In one instance, while trying to avoid truck traffic on a narrow road, he slipped into a barrow ditch and slid about 10 feet to the bottom. It angered him and made him more determined, he said. Another time, in Illinois, he found himself in an ice storm, sub-zero temperatures, and unable to go on.

"My legs would not move anymore; it was night, and I couldn't go on. I knew I was going to freeze to death right there," Long said. "I said a prayer out loud and asked God to help me because I had nowhere to

turn." In moments, he said, a car stopped and the window rolled down slightly. It was an elderly couple. They handed him a key to their cabin which was about 100 yards up the road.

"They told me to use the cabin and they would come by to check on me the next morning," he said. He made it to the nicely furnished cabin, took a hot shower, and piled on about 12 blankets. "It took me a couple of hours to stop shaking," he said, "but it was the most comfortable I had been since I left St. Louis. My prayer was answered and they saved my life."

His journey continued through Illinois, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, and finally to New York. He came face to face with a bear in a Pennsylvania State Park. His scream scared the bear away. In York, Pennsylvania, he met a woman who put him in touch with Dr. Judi Herring and her husband, Bert, both former Navy doctors.

The Herrings had developed a diet and lifestyle called

Fast-5. It incorporates a 19-hour fast with a 5-hour eating window. The Herrings talked to Long and they struck up a friendship. Dr. Judi Herring and her mother, Mary, decided to join Long on the continuation of his walk from Los Angeles to St. Louis. Dr. Judi is walking with Long. Their goal is 20-miles per day. Mother Mary drives the small station wagon vehicle for support and logistics.

Long says he no longer feels addicted to food. At a small town in New Mexico he had permission to sleep inside what he called a pie store and the next morning all the pies were untouched. He said he weighs about 240 now and his goal is to get to about 200 pounds and

maintain that weight.

His long term goal is to help others with similar obesity problems. "I like to talk to fat people and tell them I am an example that there is hope," he said. He has a website, mentioned above, and may consider writing a book about his experiences. For now he is on a mission to keep losing weight and return to St. Louis. His wife plans to join the group in Oklahoma for the last leg of the trip.

Dr. Judi Herring gave me a copy of her husband Bert's book, "The Fast-5 Diet and The Fast-5 Lifestyle." I have donated it to the Friona Library in case you might want to read it. Or you can go to their website at www.fast-5.com.

Commissioners purchase backhoes

The Parmer County Commissioners Court met in regular session Monday, October 23, 2006 at 10 a.m. in the County Courtroom at the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas.

The first order of business was to consider bids for two backhoes for Precincts 1 and 2. The commissioners traded in the old backhoes for two new ones from Warren Cat in Amarillo.

The commissioners opened and considered three bids for construction of paving improvements on County Road DD. The bids were given to the engineer in charge to determine a recommendation to be awarded.

Salaries for election workers were increased from \$7 an hour to \$10 an hour and the clerk's salary was also increased from \$6 an hour to \$8 an hour.

The commissioners passed the Parmer County Resolution for participation in the 2007 Indigent Defense Grant Program. The grant is \$10,000.

They gave authority to allow the PRPC to make application to Rural Community Affairs for a Non-Border Colonial fund to finance a water and sewer project for two areas around Bovina.

In conclusion the commissioners authorized upgrading the door-lock system from the booking area into the Dispatch Center of the Parmer County Law Enforcement Center and to make improvements to the internet so that the Guardian Security cameras may become fully functional.

The Commissioners will meet in regular session Monday, November 13, 2006 at 10 a.m. The public is welcome to attend.

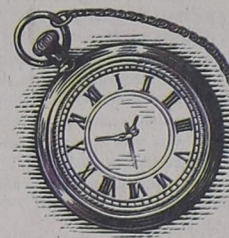
The first cotton bale of 2006

but you can help

Nothing good ever happens when drugs are involved.

Some people would argue with that statement. There are those who think some drugs should be legalized. Others manage to become addicted to legal prescription drugs.

My own dad was one of those. Like many addicts, the addiction wasn't dad's problem. It was the means he used to deal with problems.

In the 1950s and 60s, today's modern illegal drugs, i.e. marijuana, cocaine, methamphetamine, or heroin were not prevalent. I'm sure it was around but in Hillsboro, Texas, we didn't notice. It was later in the century when technology and faster, more efficient transportation came along that drug trafficking became an industry and began to reach all areas of the country.

My dad was born in Hill County in 1915. He was the only boy and had 6 sisters. I don't have a lot of memories about him. His name was Ansel Estes Carr. He worked for the Lone Star Gas Co. for a long time but never seemed to be able to get things together.

Along the way he became addicted to Librium. Back then they called it a tranquilizer. Somehow, by manipulating a couple of doctors, daddy always had an ample supply. During my teen years he was in and out of mental hospitals in Waco or Terrell.

It was at the Terrell State Hospital that he died in April of 1971. By then we had lost track of dad's whereabouts. I was married and had a child and living in Irving. Mother had divorced dad years before and moved to Friona with my

brother Rick who was 14 at the time. My two sisters had moved on with their lives.

He died alone. They said he died of peritonitis. We knew it was more than that. Most of his sisters, my aunts, lived in Ft. Worth. They were notified of his death and had scheduled his funeral without telling our side of the family. An uncle finally broke the silence and called me one night to say, "your dad died and his funeral is tomorrow morning."

We did show up at the funeral to the great surprise of his siblings. The rift in the family never healed. I never saw or spoke to any of his side of the family after that. Only one of dad's sisters is still living today. Only recently have I reconnected with a cousin that is my age. We grew up together and he still lives in Ft. Worth.

My dad has been gone for 35-years. We seldom talk about him anymore at family gatherings. My brother Rick has hardly any recollection of dad. He was only 6-years-old when mother and dad divorced. After 25-years of marriage she finally had enough. Dad couldn't hold it together. The Librium and alcohol and depression drove him away from family and eventually ended his life.

On occasion today I wonder if I could have done more to help him. The answer is that I probably could have. I wish I had tried harder even though I also know it would not have helped much. The truth about drugs is that daddy could not be fixed until he surrendered and decided to fix himself. That time never came.

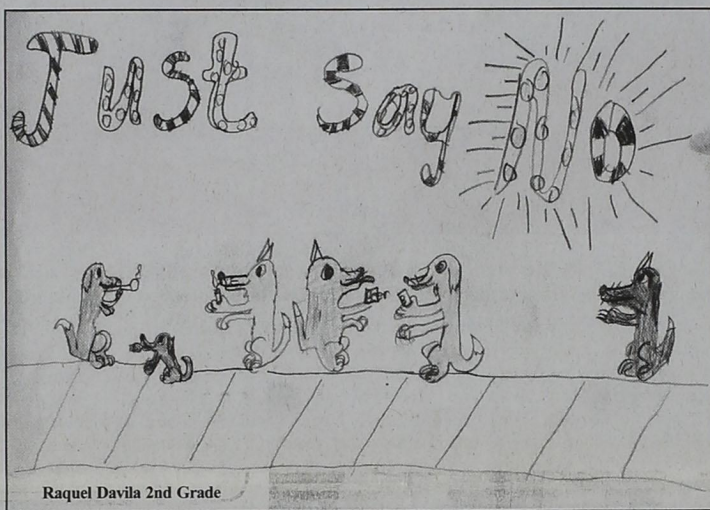
This is Red Ribbon Week. If drugs have not been a part of

your family's life be thankful. In today's world, even here in the relative quiet of rural America, drugs are available. If you don't believe it, ask your kids.

I forgave my dad a long time ago. During my life I have had my own encounters with addictions and the damage the lack of responsibility can cause. The easiest way to fix a drug addict is to get to him or her before the drugs do.

It is a mistake to think drugs can't mess with your life. Maybe they won't. But then again maybe they will. You never really know do you?

Take charge before the drugs do. Talk to your kids. And keep talking until they get the message.

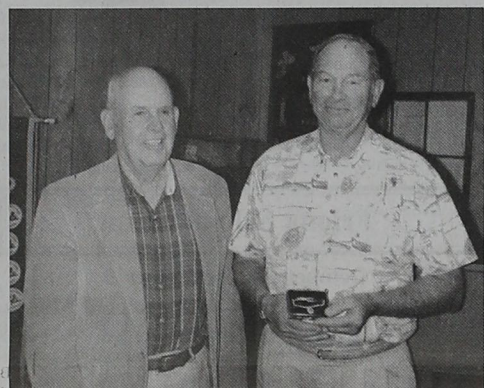

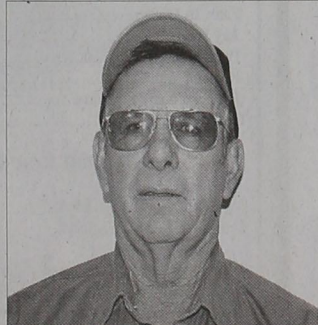

YOUR EYES

Medications and Your Eyes

Your vision is blurry again and you've made an appointment with your new eye doctor. As you complete the form in the waiting area, you wonder whether all this information is really necessary? After all, what does the medicine I take for my blood pressure have to do with my eyes?



Plenty. Of the drugs used to treat bodily disease, many can cause changes within the human eye. For instance, did you know that reduced vision sometimes occurs with certain antibiotics and high blood pressure medications? Antihistamine usage for the common cold can dry up the eyes and blur vision, creating trouble for contact lens wearers. Patients with glaucoma need be particularly careful when using corticosteroids or antidepressant medications. Cataracts can actually develop when steroids are taken over a prolonged period of time.

These are just a few of the eye symptoms that systemic medications can create. Keep your doctor informed of all the current medications you are taking. That way, the doctor will know if medicine is to blame for an unusual finding.

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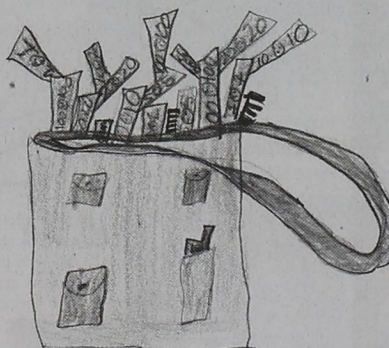

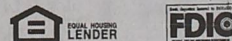

Halloween Safety Tips

Next Tuesday night is Halloween and there will be a lot of trick or treaters out collecting candy. Parents here are a few safety tips to keep your children safe.

1. Plan costumes that are bright and reflective, consider non-toxic makeup as masks can limit or block eyesight.
2. Obtain flashlights with fresh batteries for your children to use.
3. When shopping for costumes make sure they are flame resistant.
4. Always plan and review the route your children are going and do not permit them to ride their bikes or skateboards.
5. Make sure you set a time for your children to return home.
6. Adults should always accompany small children.
7. Remember it is better to stay in a group, walk slowly, and do not run out in between parked cars.
8. Only trick or treat in well known neighborhoods with houses that have their porch light on. Stay in well-lit areas and use the sidewalk to walk on.
9. Never enter a stranger's house for a treat.

The Chiefs received the opening kickoff Friday night at Highland Park. On the first play from scrimmage Octavio Moreno ran 40-yards. The second play was a pass and run from Sawyer Reed to Hector Sanchez, good for 38 yards and a Friona touchdown. Juan Reyes' kick was good and with less than one minute gone in the 1st quarter Friona led 7-0.

That is the way it went the rest of the night as the Chieftains hammered the Highland Park Hornets 50-0, ran up 376 offensive yards while holding the Hornets to just 22 yards and 2 first downs. The Chiefs improved their record to 6-1, 3-0 in District 2-2A.

Speedster Eddie Ortiz scored the second TD on a 35-yard run with 6:23 left in the 1st quarter after a brief game delay for a referee wreck.

Later in the quarter Octavio Moreno stepped off a 24-yard TD run, Reyes' kick failed, and the Chief lead increased to 37-0. A Sawyer Reed pass to Ryan Geries with 35-seconds left in the half was good for a 16 yard TD to go into the locker room with the 43-0 lead.

comes to town. Tulia defeated Bushland 28-14 last week and Muleshoe downed Dimmitt 27-6.

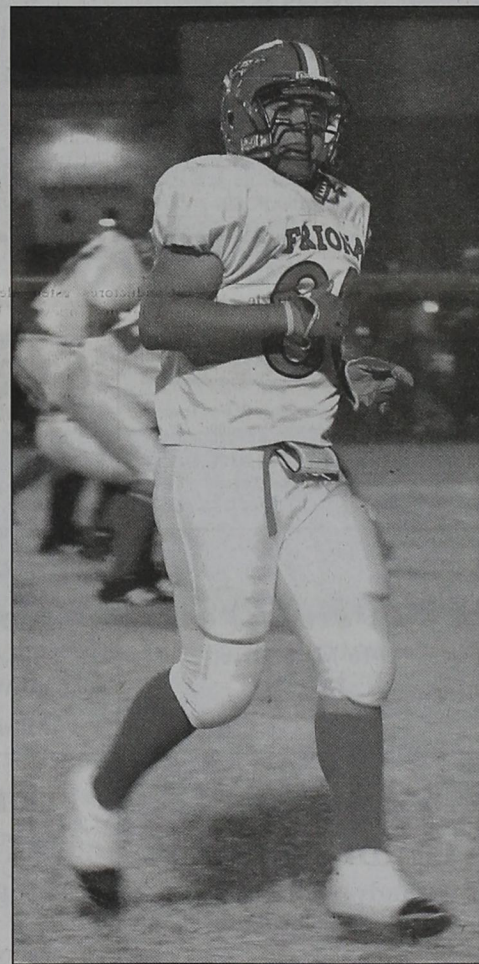

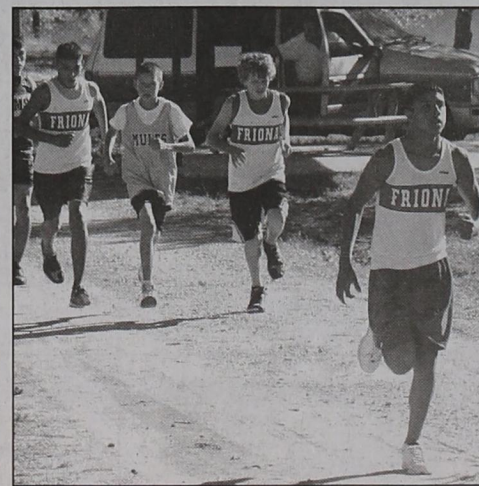

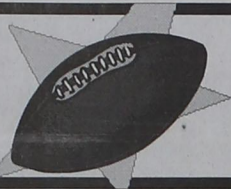

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FRIONA CENTENNIAL MOMENTS

(This is one of a series of weekly articles pertaining to Friona's 100th anniversary, which will be observed throughout 2006)

Like Huge White Sailing Ships

By Darla Bracken

Like huge white sailing ships they rise above the plains in perpetual dry dock on seas of amber waves of grain. Our grain elevators have now been such a part of our identity as a community so long that we wouldn't recognize ourselves without them. This was not always the case. As old-timers liked to say, the only elevator in Friona at first was a 'scoop shovel' powered by the sweat of a man's brow. In early day pictures of 1908, the grain is shown in rows of piles near the railroad (Friona was born on the railroad, a blessing!) By 1916, however, the first grain elevator was built in a contract with George T. Courtright and W. H. Warren on January 27 of that year. The first elevator, a wooden frame and tin metal structure, was erected and ready for business before harvest that year. (This structure was later moved to the Carl Schlenker farm in the Rhea Community.)

Several local businessmen owned half or whole interests in this property and the business including: R. G. Clenin, George Maurer, John Staley,



John M. Teague in addition to the original owners. Later, sole ownership was in the hands of a Mr. Leo Potishman and his associates. Potishman expanded the elevator to include a second wooden structure during his term of ownership and later a concrete and steel structure.

By April 26, 1934 Friona Wheat Growers was chartered with a storage capacity of 30,000 bushels. Charlie Sullivan, the manager of Okla-

homa Wheat Pool which then became known as Friona Wheat Growers, Inc., was the first manager. Wright Williams was manager of Friona Wheat Growers and Friona Consumers from 1935-1937. Guy Bennett became manager in 1938 and served until 1943, when Arthur Drake assumed the manager's position. His term would eventually include 32 years of service.

Two new elevators

By 1949 two new elevators were built one by the Sante Fe Grain Company on the east side of Main and one by Friona Wheat Growers, Inc. on the west side of Main. Sante Fe's new elevator, a concrete and steel construction, contained 12 circular bins each 17 feet in diameter, and 7 star bins, all reaching the height of 120 feet, with a head house of 28 feet, making the total height 148 feet. "This elevator was fully equipped with the most modern machinery for the rapid, safe and economical handling of grain, which equipment includes a conveyor belts for the moving of the grain from pit to the bins and for loading [railroad] cars, bucket elevators are used. The most modern weighing and dumping equipment was also installed."

Storage capacity included 19 bins plus 6 large steel bins, holding a total of 126,000 bushels plus the two older elevators making a total of 50 bins and a total capacity of 515,000 bushels. G. "Preach" Cranfill, Vice-President of the Sante Fe Grain Company, and general manager was assisted in the weighing, testing and bookkeeping part of the busi-

ness by J. C. Wilkison and Jack Tedford. Sante Fe Grain later became Continental Grain Company and was later bought out by Friona Wheat Growers, Inc.

Friona Wheat Growers came into existence sometime in the late twenties and began operations with the purchase of a small elevator owned by John Gischler & son. For the first few years, it was as a member of the co-operative elevator pool, and Friona Wheat Growers, Inc. was chartered in 1934. In 1949 Arthur Drake was manager and he was assisted by Roy Lee Johnson. "The small elevator purchased was soon supplemented by a much larger structure, and more modern equipment. Its storage capacity was enlarged by the addition of several large storage bins, but it was only a matter of a few years until this added capacity was far insufficient to handle the ever increasing of the organization. A new large modern building of concrete and steel construction was erected during the past spring and summer [of 1949]."

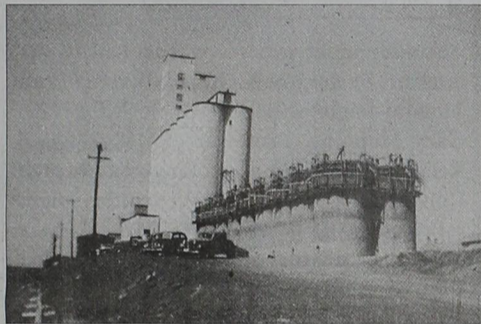
"This new structure, which is one of the largest of its kind in the Texas Panhandle, contains 14 round bins, each of 20 feet diameter, 5 star bins, and 11 overhead bins. The height of the main structure is 120 feet, with a head house 68 feet in height, making a total height of 188 feet. The excavation beneath the super structure is 15 feet deep. Belt conveyors are used throughout the structure for the filling and emptying of bins. A large loading scale with a capacity of one rail car load, is built in

owned by over 600 members." **Modern Expansions**

In 1973 Ron Smiley became the manager of Friona Wheat Growers, Inc. and has now served 33 years in that position, longer than their longtime manager and his mentor, Arthur Drake. Storage capacity in 1980 was 4,709,000 bushels. FWG has expanded with elevators in Lakeview and Rhea and Grady, New Mexico in recent years. In the 21st Century, the elevator also serves as a wireless antenna distribution point for Amonline's high speed Internet access for our community.

West Friona Grain built long metal buildings rather than the concrete elevators of the past when they opened in. New concrete structures have been constructed in recent years by CHS to handle at one time one hundred or more railroad cars of grain imported from other grain producers in the corn belt due to the high demand for corn in our area for feedyards, feed manufacturing, and dairies and because of our lack of enough water to grow enough corn.

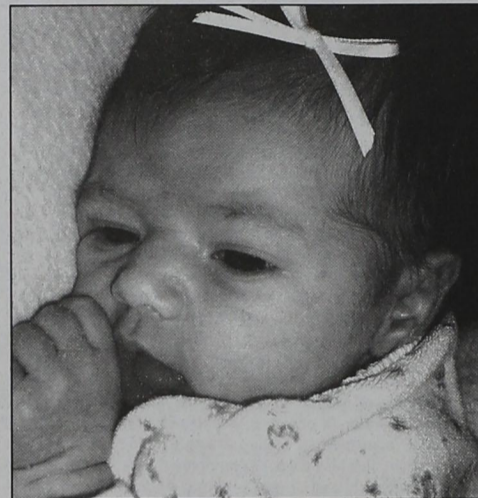

Mrs. Rennells retired as office manager for a mortgage company in California. She was a member of the First Baptist Church of Farwell.

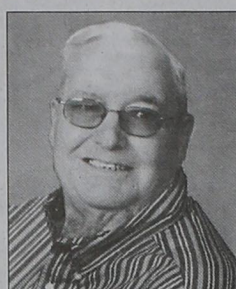

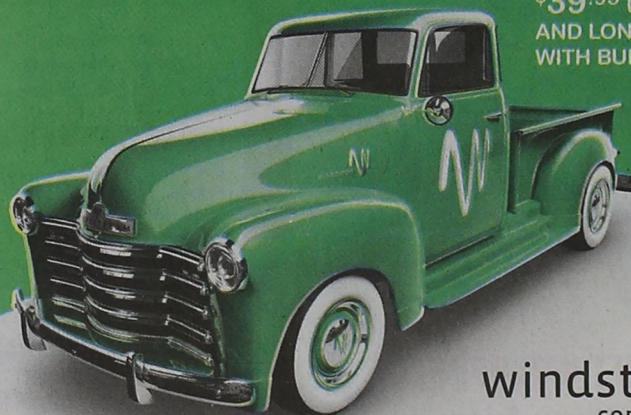
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Thanks Kids!

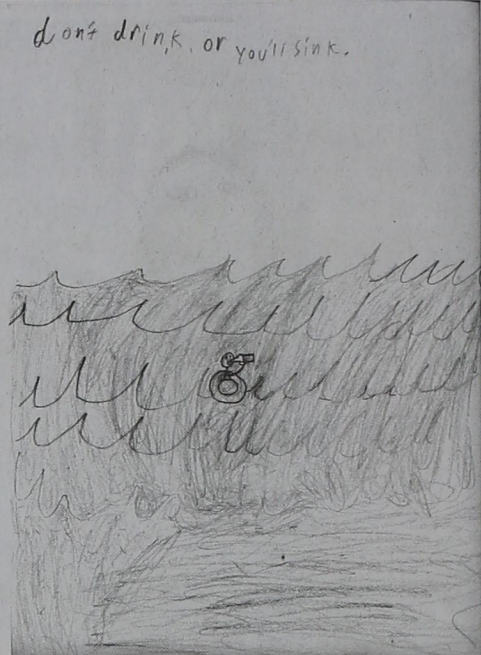

Red Ribbon Week is an important tradition for the drug prevention community, and especially for the DEA. The event that has become a national symbol of drug prevention, began as a grassroots tribute to a fallen DEA hero, Special Agent Enrique Camarena. The National Red Ribbon Campaign was sparked by the murder of DEA Special Agent Camarena by drug traffickers. Within weeks of his death in March of 1985, Camarena's Congressman, Duncan Hunter, and high school friend Henry Lozano, launched Camarena Clubs in Imperial Valley, California, Camarena's home. Hundreds of club members pledged to lead drug-free lives to honor the sacrifices made by Camarena and others on behalf of all Americans. From these clubs emerged the Red Ribbon Week Campaign.

Today, Red Ribbon Week is nationally recognized and celebrated, helping to preserve Special Agent Camarena's memory and further the cause for which he gave his life. The Red Ribbon Campaign also became a symbol of support for the DEA's efforts to reduce demand for drugs through prevention and education programs. By wearing a red ribbon during the last week in October, Americans demonstrate their ardent opposition to drugs. They pay homage not only to Special Agent Camarena, but to all men and women who have made the ultimate sacrifice in support of our nation's struggle against drug trafficking and abuse.

Drug Facts

Methamphetamine is a stimulant drug chemically related to amphetamine but with stronger effects on the central nervous system. Street names for the drug include "speed," "meth," and "crank."

Methamphetamine is used in pill form, or in powdered form by snorting or injecting. Crystallized methamphetamine known as "ice," "crystal," or "glass," is a smokable and more powerful form of the drug.

The effects of methamphetamine use include:

- increased heart rate and blood pressure
- increased wakefulness; insomnia
- increased physical activity
- decreased appetite
- respiratory problems
- extreme anorexia
- hyperthermia, convulsions, and cardiovascular problems, which can lead to death, eu-

phoria, irritability, confusion, tremors, anxiety, paranoia, or violent behavior can cause irreversible damage to blood vessels in the brain, producing strokes.

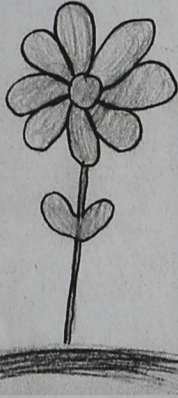
Methamphetamine users who inject the drug and share needles are at risk for acquiring HIV/AIDS.

Methamphetamine is an increasingly popular drug at raves (all night dancing parties), and as part of a number of drugs used by college-aged students. Marijuana and alcohol are commonly listed as additional drugs of abuse among methamphetamine treatment admissions. Most of the methamphetamine-related deaths (92%) reported in 1994 involved methamphetamine in combination with at least one other drug, most often alcohol (30%), heroin (23%), or cocaine (21%). Researchers continue to study the long-term effects of methamphetamine use.

Alcohol abuse is a pattern of problem drinking that results in health consequences, social problems, or both. However, alcohol dependence, or alcoholism, refers to a disease that is characterized by abnormal alcohol-seeking behavior that leads to impaired control over drinking.

Short-term effects of alcohol use include:
distorted vision, hearing, and coordination
altered perceptions and emotions
impaired judgment
bad breath; hangovers

Long-term effects of heavy alcohol use include:
loss of appetite
vitamin deficiencies
stomach ailments
skin problems
sexual impotence
liver damage
heart and central nervous system damage
memory loss

A change in personality—turning from Dr. Jekyll to Mr. Hyde

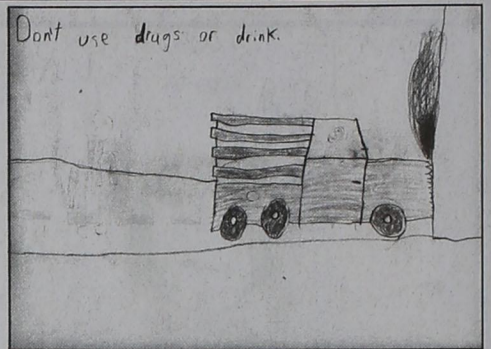

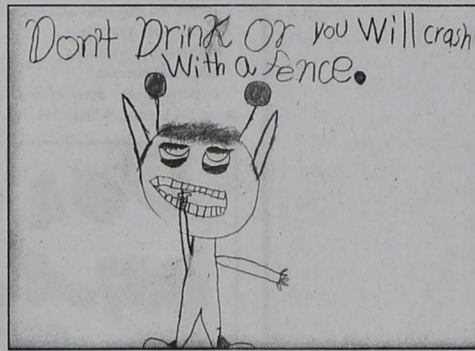

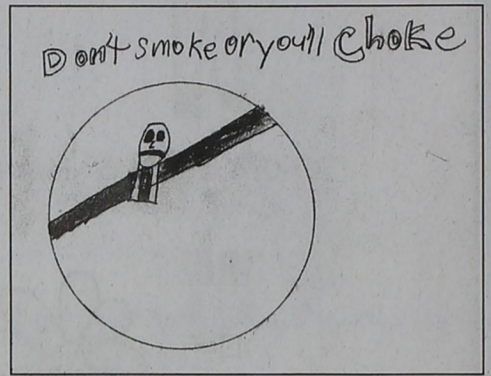

Drug Facts

Inhalants refer to substances that are sniffed or huffed to give the user an immediate head rush or high. They include a diverse group of chemicals that are found in consumer products such as aerosols and cleaning solvents. Inhalant use can cause a number of physical and emotional problems, and even one-time use can result in death.

Prolonged use can result in:
headache, muscle weakness, abdominal pain
decrease or loss of sense of smell
nausea and nosebleeds
hepatitis
violent behaviors
irregular heartbeat
liver, lung, and kidney impairment
irreversible brain damage
nervous system damage
dangerous chemical imbalances in the body
involuntary passing of urine and feces
Short-term effects of inhalants include:
heart palpitations
breathing difficulty
dizziness
headaches

Using inhalants even one time can put you at risk for:
sudden death
suffocation
visual hallucinations and severe mood swings
numbness and tingling of the hands and feet

Remember, using inhalants, even one time, can kill you. According to medical experts, death can occur in at least five ways:

1. asphyxia—solvent gases can significantly limit available oxygen in the air, causing breathing to stop;
2. suffocation—typically seen with inhalant users who use bags;
3. choking on vomit;
4. careless behaviors in potentially dangerous settings; and;
5. sudden sniffing death syndrome, presumably from cardiac arrest.

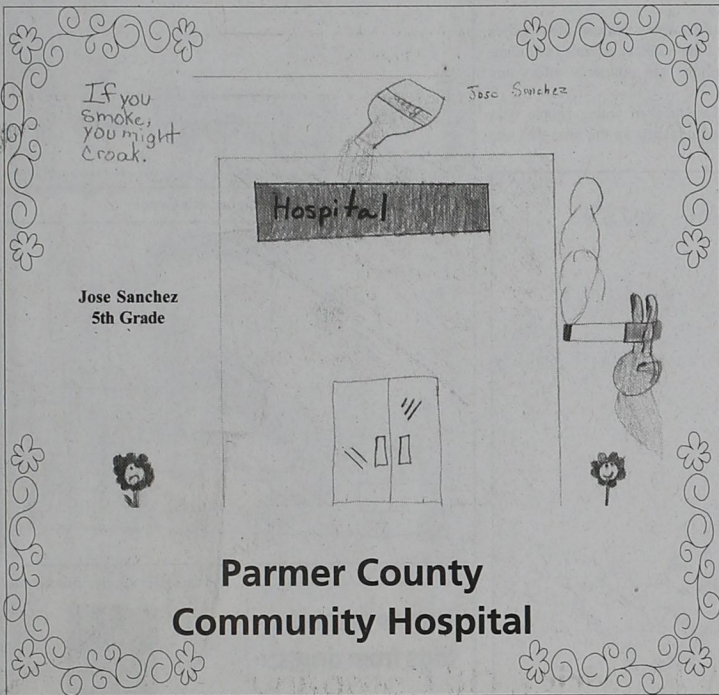
Short-term effects of using marijuana:

- sleepiness
- difficulty keeping track of time, impaired or reduced short-term memory
- reduced ability to perform tasks requiring concentration and coordination, such as driving a car
- increased heart rate
- potential cardiac dangers for those with preexisting heart disease
- bloodshot eyes
- dry mouth and throat
- decreased social inhibitions
- paranoia, hallucinations

Long-term effects of using marijuana:

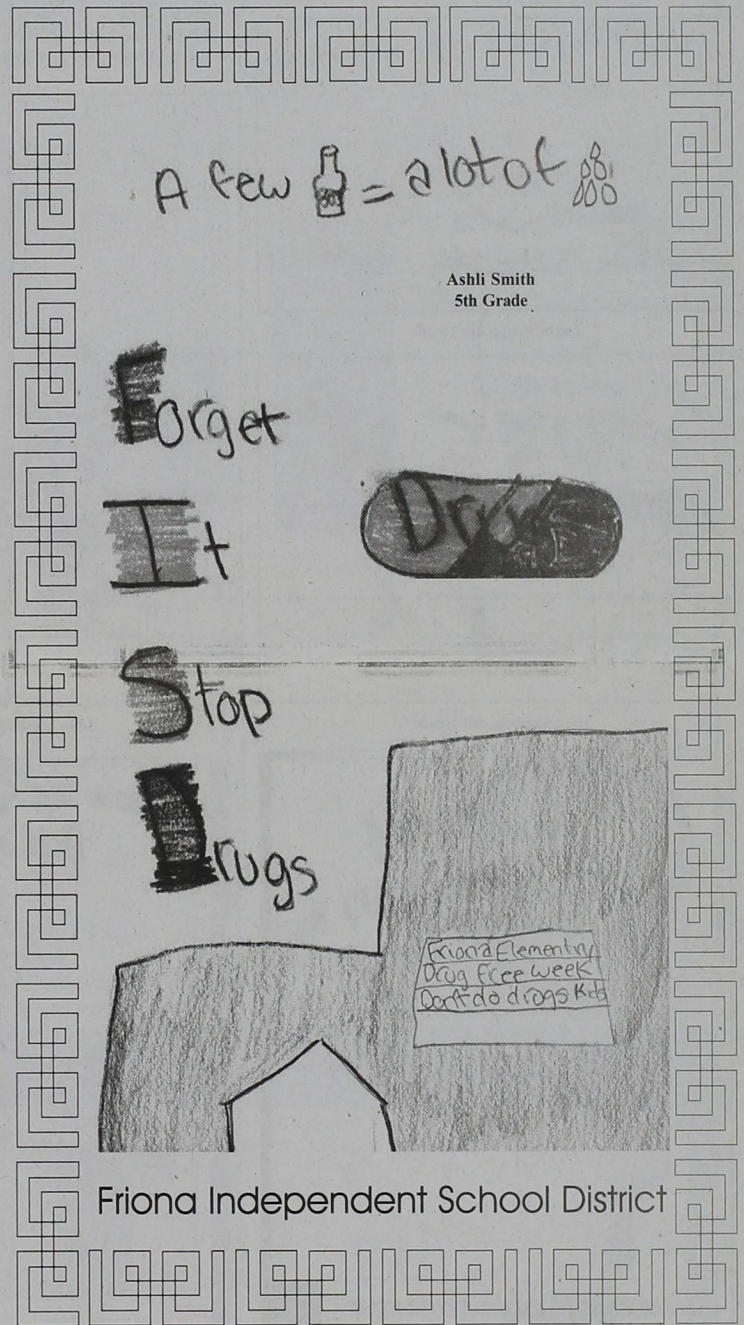
- enhanced cancer risk
- decrease in testosterone levels for men; also lower sperm counts and difficulty having children
- increase in testosterone levels for women; also increased risk of infertility
- diminished or extinguished sexual pleasure
- psychological dependence requiring more of the drug to get the same effect

Marijuana blocks the messages going to your brain and alters your perceptions and emotions, vision, hearing, and coordination.

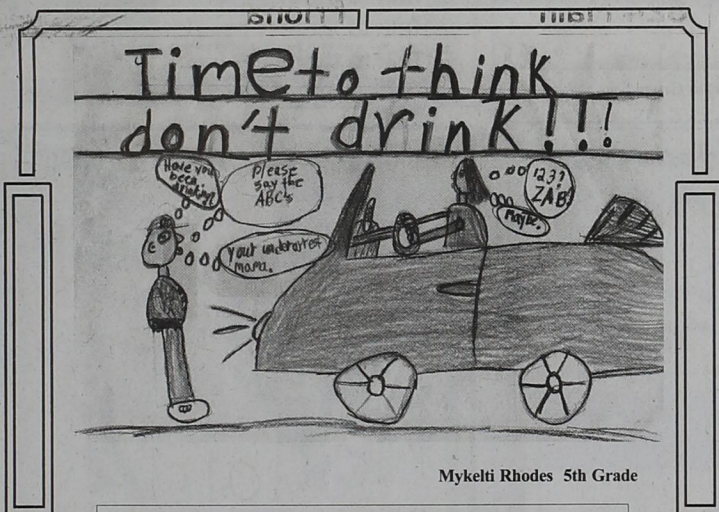

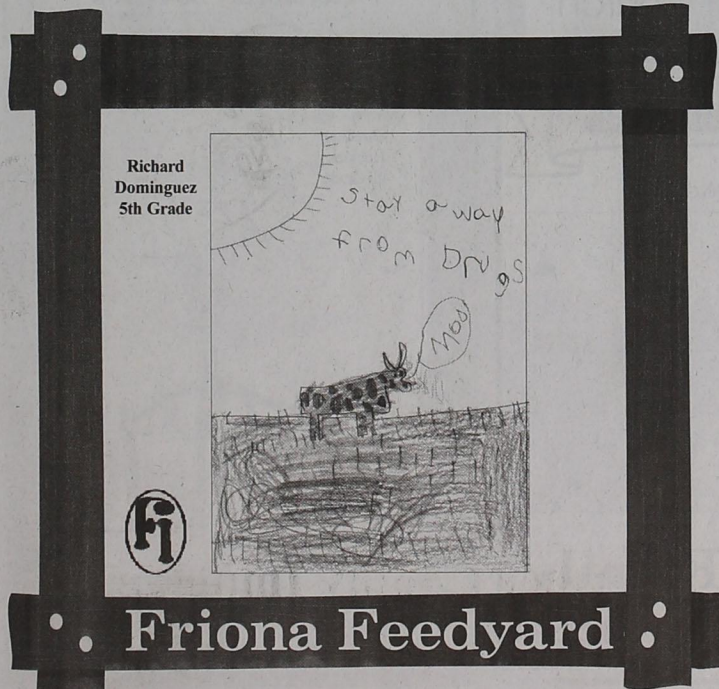

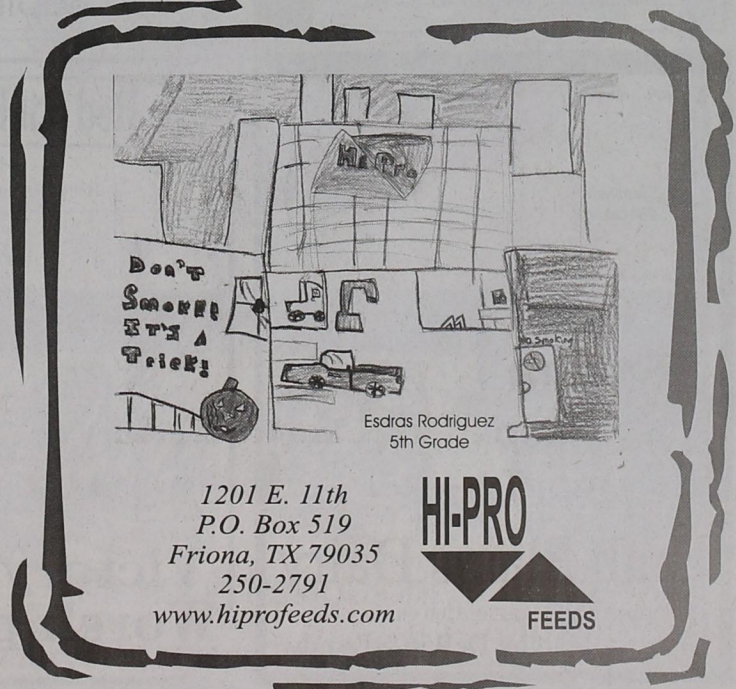

Drug Facts

Although many people smoke because they believe cigarettes calm their nerves, smoking releases epinephrine, a hormone which creates physiological stress in the smoker, rather than relaxation. The use of tobacco is addictive. Most users develop tolerance for nicotine and need greater amounts to produce a desired effect. Smokers become physically and psychologically dependent and will suffer withdrawal symptoms including: changes in body temperature, heart rate, digestion, muscle tone, and appetite. Psychological symptoms include: irritability, anxiety, sleep disturbances, nervousness, headaches, fatigue, nausea, and cravings for tobacco that can last days, weeks, months, years, or an entire lifetime.

Risks associated with smoking cigarettes:
 diminished or extinguished sense of smell and taste
 frequent colds
 smoker's cough
 gastric ulcers
 chronic bronchitis
 increase in heart rate and blood pressure
 premature and more abundant face wrinkles
 emphysema
 heart disease
 stroke
 cancer of the mouth, larynx, pharynx, esophagus, lungs, pancreas, cervix, uterus, and bladder

Cigarette smoking is perhaps the most devastating preventable cause of disease and premature death.

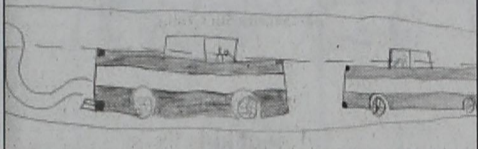
Smoking is particularly dangerous for teens because their bodies are still developing and changing and the 4,000 chemicals (including 200 known poisons) in cigarette smoke can adversely affect this process. Cigarettes are highly addictive. One-third of young people who are just "experimenting" end up being addicted by the time they are 20.
