Jack Ruunser, New York-to-Frisco horseback excursionist for the Hearst his party, the Daily Panhandle says:

Why Europe Is At War

RUSSIA HAS CONSPIRED WITH SERVIA AGAINST AUSTRIA, FRANCE WANTS REVENGE AND TERRITORY FROM GERMANY, ENGLAND NEEDS PRESTIGE; OLD EMPEROR FRANZ JOSEPH WILL BE HIS OWN WAR LORD IN A STRUGGLE MADE INEV-ITABLE BY SLAV AGGRESSION, EX-DIPLOMAT DECLARES.

This exposition of the war situation in Europe was given to Brooklyn Eagle by an Austrian now living in New York, an exdiplomat. It explains very clearly some of the reasons for the war which Americans do not understand. It should, of course, be remembered, however, that the explanation is from a viewpoint wholly Austrian:





Henry M. Hyde, in Chicago Tribune. They tell of the field marshal, Count von Moltke, that when on that fateful July day of 1870 an excited aide burst into his private office and gasped out the word that France had declared war, the old warrior hardly looked up
