FLOOR OF LAKE ERIE BEING SWEPT TO-DAY.

CONNEAUT, Ohio, Aug. 24.-The floor of Lake Erie to-day is being swept with huge electrical magnets in Marquette and Bessemer No. 2, which went down off Conneaut harbor during a terible storm on the night of December 9, 1909. The ferry carried a cargo of coal valued at \$35,000 and a crew of thirty men, all of whom were lost.

The work has been undertaken by a syndicate of business men from Windsor, Ont., who have taken a sixexpect to realize handsomely if she is recovered. E. L. White, an electrical engineer of St. Thomas, will direct the search from the large yacht Berthis, which has been equipped with special apparatus for the work.

In the Crimean War the allied armies lost four times as many men through dissians in 1877-1878; it was only 1 to 2 among the Japanese in Manchuria, thanks to their excellent hygiene.
