Commissioners divvy up fire money

Parmer County commissioners held their regular meeting Wednesday, December 20.

Among items discussed was a new software program for Justices of the Peace and the County Attorney. They also heard a report from County Treasurer Altha Herington and considered a resolution to issue revenue bonds through the Parmer County Industrial Development Corporation to finance a project for Angus Energy, LLC, pertaining to an ethanol plant east of Friona.

Treasurer Herington said that

each year the county budgets \$50,000 for fire department calls in the county. In January she issues \$5,000 each to the Friona, Farwell, Bovina, Lazbuddie, and Rhea fire departments for a total of \$25,000.

The remaining \$25,000 is divided at the end of the year based on how many fire calls the departments respond to out in the county. At the December 20 meeting, commissioners approved disbursements to Bovina, \$3,873.25, Farwell, \$2,288.75, Friona, \$14,330.95, and Lazbuddie, \$4,507.05. The Rhea

Department chooses to accept just the \$5,000 in January of each year.

The fire department disbursements are prorated based on the number of calls made during the year. In 2005 firemen responded to the following number of fire calls in Parmer County: Bovina 28, Farwell 23, Friona 61, Lazbuddie 30, and Rhea 11. The figures do not include first responder calls to accident scenes or fire calls within their respective city limits.

Texas Has Property Tax Burden

As a new year dawns, Texans should be looking forward to exploding fireworks and expanding opportunities. Unfortunately, many families cannot help but feel financially deflated by the property tax bill that has come due for 2006.

Indeed, a new national study shows Texas has the ninth highest property taxes in the nation as a percentage of personal income.

Early January will bring anticipated recommendations for property tax relief from Gov. Rick Perry's Texas Task Force on Appraisal Reform. The state's taxpayers must hope the Legislature will both heed those recommendations, and at the same time return the \$15 billion surplus to taxpayers as tax relief.

For much too long, Texans angry over their property taxes have been dismissed as selfish misers. The conventional wis-

dom has been that Texas is one of the nation's lowest tax states and complainers should just be glad they don't live in Massachusetts. However, the Tax Foundation's national report on property taxes released earlier this month shows Texas homeowners are being drowned in rising property taxes, forcing some to flee their homes for the safer ground of lower appraised property.

The report documents how property taxes have skyrocketed relative to personal incomes. From 1999 to 2005, property tax appraisals in Texas went up 75 percent, while personal incomes rose only 35 percent.

This is the result of rising property appraisals, on which state and local governments have been cashing in rather than rolling back tax rates accordingly. No wonder many Texans are struggling to simply pay their property tax bill.

The report not only reveals that Texas has higher property taxes than 80 percent of other states; it also shows that the property tax burden is particularly severe in several Texas localities.

For example, residents of Houston endure the highest effective property tax rate of any major city in the nation at \$2.99 per \$100 valuation. While other cities had a much higher statutory rate, they had significant exemptions. As a result, Houston's effective property tax rate is nearly three times that of New York City and more than five times that of Denver.

In addition, Fort Bend, Williamson, and Tarrant counties made the Tax Foundation's dubious list of the 20 counties with the highest median property taxes paid as a percentage of the median home value. The other 20 counties were in New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania,

and Illinois.

Relief is already on the way. Legislation passed in the last special session will reduce the current maximum school property tax rate of \$1.50 to \$1.33 in 2006 and \$1.00 in 2007. Just as importantly, starting in 2007, rollback elections will automatically be required when appraisal creep effectively produces a school property tax increase of more than four cents per \$100 valuation.

Now, Gov. Perry's panel is preparing to unveil recommendations that will go further in relieving property taxes. It's widely rumored the proposal will include finally placing meaningful restraints on the de facto property tax increases that can be levied by local governments through skyrocketing appraisals.

In addition to adopting the panel's recommendations for reforming appraisals, the \$15 billion surplus lawmakers will have

in-hand this session should be used to provide an additional 25-cent tax rate reduction. With a stroke of the pen, Texas taxpayers can be given needed relief.

Thanks to Texas' reputation as a low-tax state, our rate of economic growth has exceeded the national average in recent years, but we cannot afford to rest on our laurels.

Let's make a New Year's resolution: Texans deserve to be secure in their homes, not forced

to live in a house of cards subject to the whims of an unaccountable appraiser. With an overpayment of taxes resulting in a record state surplus, this is one New Year's resolution for which there is no excuse not to keep.

Congress, then and now

As each year draws to a close, it is traditionally the time for reflection. We take stock of where we've been, and set goals for the future.

This is a particularly useful exercise for those of us in government. The U.S. Congress adjourned in early December having achieved some notable accomplishments, while also leaving a great deal of unfinished business.

For the first time in a decade, Congress took a tentative, but serious step to reduce federal spending. I supported the Deficit Reduction Act that cut approximately \$100 billion in projected outlays over the next decade.

As that legislation was being debated, I introduced an amendment that would have addressed fast-growing entitlement expenditures such as Medicaid, Medicare and Social Security, which compose two-thirds of federal spending. Though this common-sense measure didn't pass, I will pursue it again next year.

In the session's final hours, we extended several tax measures important to Texans. One is a \$4,000 annual college tuition deduction, and another is the research and development tax credit that is vital to many businesses in our state.

Most importantly, for those who itemize deductions on their

federal income taxes, we extended the state and local sales tax deduction for two years. This means residents of Texas and six other states that don't have an income tax will be on a level playing field with other states that do.

Working families are paying steadily more for health insurance and medical costs, so I was especially pleased that Congress made important improvements to Health Savings Accounts (HSA). Payments into these accounts can be made with income before it's subject to payroll taxes, so our move to raise the contribution limits should have a big impact.

There were other significant steps forward. We reduced abuse of the legal system by revising class-action lawsuit rules, updated federal bankruptcy laws to protect consumers and encourage responsible budgeting, and safeguarded Second Amendment rights by banning lawsuits directed solely at the legal manufacture of firearms.

And Texas will eventually get major benefits from the Gulf of Mexico Energy Security Act of 2006, which opens more than eight million acres of the Gulf of Mexico to responsible oil and gas exploration and production. The state will begin receiving a portion of offshore royalty payments to combat beach erosion

and other effects on the coastal environment.

I was most proud to help confirm two new members of the U.S. Supreme Court. Chief Justice John Roberts and Associate Justice Samuel Alito both understand well the proper role the judiciary should play in our federal system. I'm convinced they will faithfully interpret the laws made by elected representatives of the people.

As we look forward to 2007 and the 110th Congress, we see a great deal of unfinished business.

Domestically, we must repair our broken immigration system and restore respect for our laws. Though we talked about this issue a great deal for two years, we did not resolve the problem. In a post-9/11 world, we need to know who is coming into our country—and right now, we don't. Furthermore, it's affecting our economy, families, and eroding traditional respect for the rule of law. This situation will only deteriorate if Congress fails to act.

Leaders on both sides have pledged to work in a cooperative manner to address matters that were bogged down in partisanship during the 109th Congress.

The bipartisanship should start with Iraq and the war on terror. Protecting the American people is our first responsibility.

In my view, we will be under the assault from Islamic extremists for years—even decades—to come. We must join together on a strategy to win the war against these terrorists, not simply criticize, delay, or attempt to exploit setbacks for partisan advantage.

We all want the troops home as soon as possible, but our military strategy in Iraq must be based on clear national security considerations. We owe it to all Americans to establish a strategy, and to support it—with one voice.

I am determined to work in the coming year with my Senate colleagues on common goals. For example, I've long sought to bring more Texas sunshine to Washington. So, Senator Patrick Leahy (D-VT) and I intend to pursue open government legislation, to improve transparency and make the federal Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) more effective.

The Congressional delegation from Texas enjoys a well-deserved reputation for working together, Republicans and Democrats, on projects that are vital to our state. If we can expand that model to the entire Congress, and help reestablish cooperation and bipartisanship once again in Washington, 2007 will indeed be a happy new year for our country.

Observations at the post office, store and airport

While standing in line at the post office, I wonder about things. Once I went to buy some stamps and there was just one person in line ahead of me. I was feeling lucky until I realized she had 45 eleven by fourteen business envelopes, each one requiring a different amount of postage. I watched the mail clerk carefully pick up each one, place it on the scale and apply the postage. I had plenty of time to think about things.

During the holidays postal clerks remind me of soldiers in combat or a quarterback in a close championship game. They are cool under pressure. No matter how many people are standing in line they are able to give their undivided attention to the person at their counter. And some postal customers choose the strangest times to get into a conversation with the clerk about church, a vacation, kids or a bargain they found somewhere, totally oblivious to the people waiting in line behind them.

Speaking of the holidays, I went with my son to Circuit City in Dallas the day after Thanksgiving. He bought a new HDTV with surround sound. After he selected one, he asked a store

employee where he could pay for it. The employee replied, "That's the line to pay for HDTV's over there." Twenty people were in line. We stood in line two and a half hours before he got to the cashier. Every check stand in the store had a line in front of it. When we arrived at the store we noticed some trash on the sidewalk outside. People had been camped there all night. One customer said he got there at 2:30 AM because the store was handing out specials a dozen or so at a time. I was amazed at the patience of the customers standing in line. I didn't see any of them giving dirty looks to the cashier or anything negative. I guess they figured this is normal if you're going to shop for specials the day after Thanksgiving in a big city.



Have you noticed at airports the amazing number of people using cell phones? Some people have two cell phones, one for

business, one for family. Some plane passengers have it all together. Some don't. I saw a woman sitting on the floor waiting to board the plane. She had her computer open, was drinking from a quart-size container, eating a sandwich and talking on her cell phone. When boarding started, she somehow managed to carry all her stuff and hand her boarding pass to the attendant. Multi-tasking at its best.

I'll be glad when Southwest starts assigning seats. Passengers first in line always choose to sit in the front of the plane, getting settled while other passengers are forced to wait. I think it's fun to watch the rhythm of exiting the plane after it arrives at its destination. Some people jump up, get their items from the overhead bin and are ready to go when it's time for their row to get off the plane. Some people prefer to remain seated until their row's turn to leave. Then they reach up, get five or six sacks, a piece of luggage and a backpack while other passengers behind them wait. I'm not hurling complaints here...I'm just observing how people do things. Barnett, Monroe chosen for Farm Credit Young Leaders program

"We put this program together to show our appreciation to a few of our young stockholders and all they do to support agriculture and their rural communities," said Jimmy Dodson, chairman of the Tenth District Farm Credit Council. "We hope the program not only thanked them but also gave them an inside look at the Farm Credit System,

how their loans are funded and how their voice can be heard in Washington."

Barnett began farming in 1991, and currently raises feeder cattle and farms wheat, corn silage, cotton and milo. He received a bachelor's degree in agricultural economics from Texas Tech University. He and his wife, Erin, have two children.

Monroe serves on the Parmer County Farm Bureau Board and the Parmer County Stockshow Board. He graduated from Texas Tech University with a degree in agricultural economics. He and his wife, Leigh, have three children.

Happy New Year to everyone from the Friona Noon Lions and Friona Evening Lions Clubs.

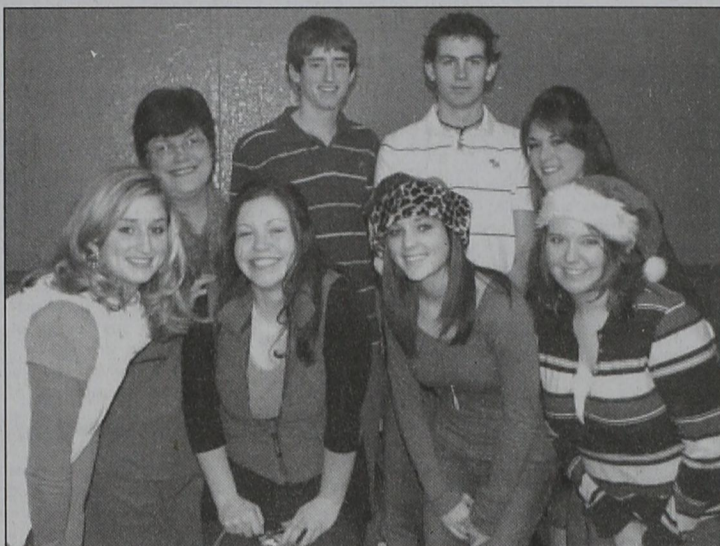

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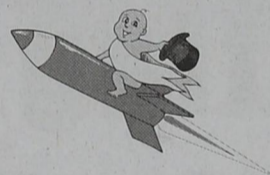

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DPS says update your license

The DPS wants to remind you to make one more New Year's resolution—update the address on your driver license. Keeping a current address on your license provides DPS with the ability to communicate important information to you regarding your driver license. Plus, updating your driver license address is important because it's the law. DPS routinely sends out reminders to drivers when their license is about to expire, information on how to renew their license and even

notification when there is a change in driver license status, such as when your license is being suspended or revoked. Updating your address can also help you avoid a situation in which law enforcement cannot identify your residence to contact a family member or a loved one in the event of an emergency. "It's impossible for DPS to send drivers updates on their license status, if the Department does not have a current address for each driver on file," said Director of the DPS,

Col. Thomas A. Davis, Jr. "Update your address to avoid unnecessary costs and possible charges if you're driving on an invalid license." There are several reasons why it is important for DPS to have your current address. Do you know when your license expires? Many people don't. DPS sends a reminder out to drivers reminding them that their driver license is about to expire and provides information on how to renew your license by mail, over the Internet, by telephone or even the old-fashioned way...in person. While some people (such as CDL holders) cannot be renewed by mail or over the Internet, many others can. Another reason it is important for you to keep your address current is so that DPS can notify you if your license is suspended or revoked. If your address is not current, you may not receive this notification. If you are stopped for any reason and found to be driving on a suspended license, you can be arrested. Licenses are of-

ten suspended or revoked for driving with no insurance, driving while intoxicated, failing to appear in court for a citation, or for failure to comply with the requirements of the Driver Responsibility Program. In the event that you are involved in a car crash or some other type of emergency in which you are unable to identify yourself, law enforcement must rely on your license to determine who you are. If your address is current, they will at least have a starting point in trying to notify your family about what has happened to you. Finally, you should keep a current address on your license because it's required by law. You have 30 days to change your address on your driver license when you move, or you could face a citation. If you have questions concerning your license or how to change your address, please call the Driver License Customer Service office at 512-424-2600.

Atmos Energy Share the Warmth program

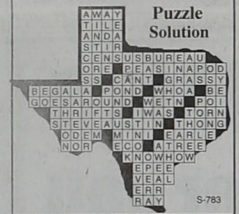

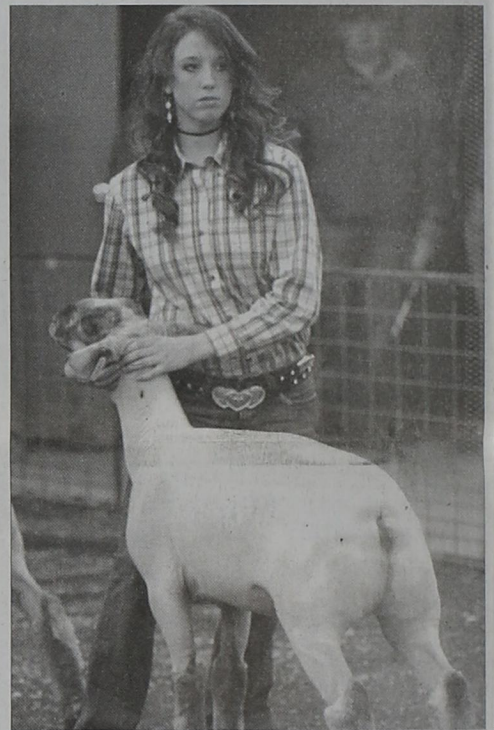

What Is Astigmatism?
 Did you know that approximately two-thirds of Americans have a condition called astigmatism? In this optical condition, the front skin of the eye, called the cornea, is irregular in its shape. If a person were to measure the roundness of the cornea, the astigmatic eye would have two different curvatures. In other words, this "front skin" of the eye has a steep curve and a flat curve, much like a football. It's not perfectly round.
 The effect of astigmatism is to cause images to form near the retina, but not on the retina. This results in blurred vision. People with uncorrected astigmatism who do a lot of reading or computer work will often complain of headaches and eyestrain. 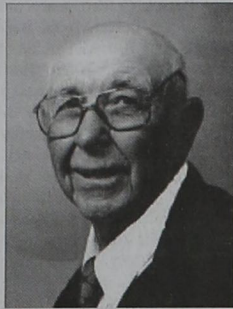

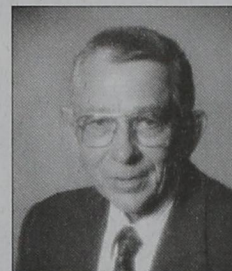

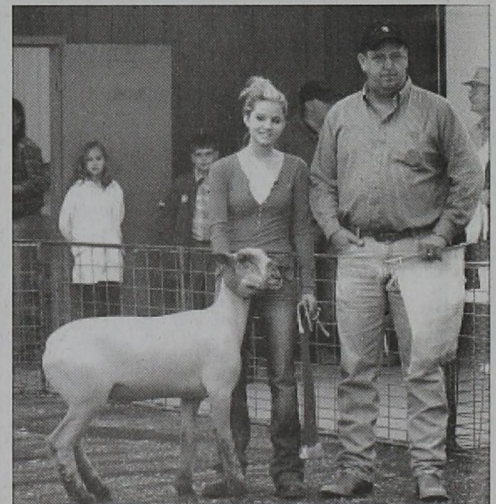

Hash Browns and the Gospel: Scattered, splattered, smothered, and covered

It was a traumatic and extremely noise-deafening experience when I moved from being a young married adult without children to a diaper-laden and French fries-between-the-seats young married adult with children. Before I had children, I ate in restaurants that actually had cloth napkins and breakable dishes, and where Styrofoam was a foreign word. These restaurants contained no playground, and the waiters didn't hover over our table like a crazed minstrel group to sing "Happy Birthday" in a manner that would make tap-dancing sumo wrestlers seem wonderfully artistic.

Eating out with young children required driving un-

der a golden arch or fighting our way past a man in a mouse suit to enter a circus-gone-mad arena and eat pizza with all the flavor and texture of a manhole cover. Those were the days.

I mention food because the seven stages in a person's life coincide with the seven major food groups. Babies like baby food - various-colored runny foods that temporarily fit on a little spoon and will enter the baby's mouth only when the feeding parent makes absurd and embarrassing boat, plane, or train noises. Many parents make other embarrassing noises, but those don't help the feeding situation.

Preschoolers prefer lightweight food. This is any food that can be easily thrown, pitched, or crammed. Older children like

finger foods. These are food items that can be held with fingers, strategically placed underneath the table when parents are not looking, and given to a smiling dog. The dog quits smiling when the child tries to slip him pickled okra.

Young teenagers eat medieval food - food that can be catapulted during a food fight. Older teens prefer food that can be consumed in mass quantities, such as pizza and cheese dip. College students enjoy cheap, greasy food that can be paid for by parents and eaten after midnight. Adults eat cafeteria food. This is food on display under a dirty, plastic sneeze guard.

There is a popular eatery that offers hash browns cooked six different ways: scattered, smothered, covered, chunked, diced, and

topped. But no matter how you order them, they are still hash browns. The church has done the same thing with the gospel story. The good news of Jesus has not changed in two thousand years, but how we serve it has. We have found new ways to meet people at their greatest need. Sounds sort of biblical, doesn't it?

After all, isn't that what Jesus did? He chunked common religious customs of the day to spend time with sinners. Instead of coming to destroy the law, He topped it. Self-righteous Pharisees could not trap Him - He verbally diced them into little pieces. Ultimately, Jesus's blood covered out sins. Like hash browns, the gospel is not fully understood until it is shared - one way or the other. The gospel, fixed in definition and flexible in demonstration, is scattered to the world...and smothered with love.

"Oh, you'd better watch out!"

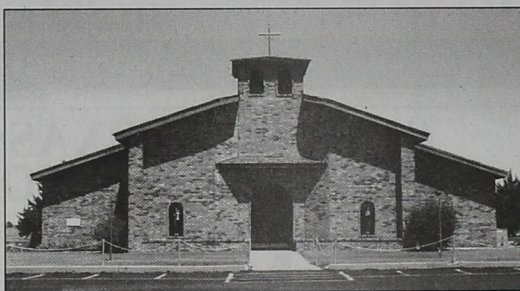

GARY SCOTT HICKS, 650 County Road 21, Muleshoe, Texas 79347-4809, has applied to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) under General Permit No. TXG920000 for authorization to operate a new dairy facility at 7,200 total head, of which 4,000 head are milking, in Parmer County, Texas. The notice of intent was received by TCEQ on August 29, 2006. No discharge of pollutants into the waters in the state is authorized by this general permit except under chronic or catastrophic rainfall conditions or events. All waste and wastewater will be beneficially used on agricultural land.

The proposed facility will be located on the south side of County Road Y, approximately 0.5 mile west of the intersection of County Road Y and County Road 22, said intersection is approximately one mile north of the intersection of County Road 22 and Ranch Road 145 in Parmer County, Texas. The facility will be located in the drainage area of the Double Mountain Fork Brazos River in Segment No. 1241 of the Brazos River Basin.

A copy of the notice of intent, application, the Executive Directors technical summary, and the CAFO general permit is available for viewing and copying at the **Parmer County Courthouse/County Clerk's Office, 401 3rd Street, Farwell, Texas 79325.**

The Executive Director of the TCEQ has made a preliminary decision to approve coverage of this facility under General Permit No. TXG920000.

PUBLIC COMMENT. Written public comments may be submitted to the Office of Chief Clerk, at the address provided in the information section below, within 30 days of the date of newspaper publication of this notice. In addition, the public may request a public meeting. If significant interest exists, the Executive Director will direct the applicant to publish a notice of the public meeting and hold the public meeting. The applicant must publish notice of a public meeting at least 30 days prior to the meeting in a newspaper of general circulation in the county in which the CAFO is proposed to be located. The Executive Director will consider all relevant information pertaining to whether the applicant meets the requirements of the general permit and will issue a written determination as to any final action on the notice of intent for coverage under the general permit.

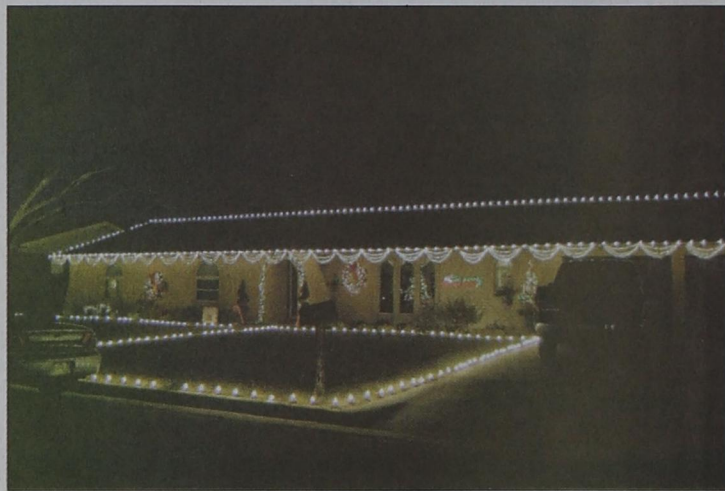
