Turbulent Weather Threatens Friona

Another round with Mother Nature has left many area farmers with heavy losses.

Many wheat farmers squeaked by with a record harvest, with approximately 75% of the 1992 wheat crop in the elevators before Saturday evening's barrage of wind, rain and hail. But, cotton farmers, on the other hand, have little or no hope of seeing a crop this fall, causing morale to be extremely low in the cotton industry.

Numerous corn crops were battered and lost due to the various sizes of hail that were reported. The hailstones ranged from pea-sized to baseball-size in isolated cases.

Probably the least damaged of the local crops would be the sugarbeets, as they are much more resilient at this point and can take a beating without too much damage.


The heaviest damage was in the Bovina area and locations between Bovina and Hub, where several farmers saw total losses to both their corn and cotton crops.



The Police Department requests that you try to limit your calls to the station during an emergency situation. Also, please remember that 911 is for emergencies only. Any other calls or inquiries should be directed to the regular Police Department phone number.

Please be assured that the Police and Fire Department personnel are in constant touch with the National Weather Service and other surrounding communities and will use whatever information available to them to make sure that the residents of Friona are properly alerted to any threatening weather condition.

The storms moved in early Saturday evening with funnel clouds being spotted northwest of Friona just before sunset. Before the night was over, the area was hit with torrential rainfall, hail, severe lightning, wind and was threatened with several tornadoes. There were three confirmed tornadoes, one unconfirmed sighting and most likely some went unseen.

Up to four inches of rain were received in some areas causing flooding northwest of Friona and north of Bovina. Travel proved impossible to several motorists whose vehicles were swept off the road or simply stalled out in the rapidly rising waters.

Local residents were hit with one severe cell after another until the early hours Sunday morning. However, considering the potential of the storms, Friona folks fared well, as very little damage resulted inside the city limits.

In talking with one local insurance agency, there had not been any claims from inside Friona. Most property damage was in the outlying areas.

All in all, sleep may have been the biggest loss to most of us, and we concede, that is an extremely small price, considering the losses of some of our neighbors and friends.







Phenomenon Of The West Texas Tornado

we have had this year was an F2 strong tornado that occurred in Parmer County, just northeast of Farwell. On the early evening of March 26, strong thunderstorms began to develop along a dryline in extreme eastern New Mexico. Remember, the dryline is a boundary between dry and moist air and is often a trigger for thunderstorm development. As the dryline moved into the Texas Panhandle, one of the storms developed into a strong thunderstorm.

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Damage was reported at 6:35 p.m. cst, and there was still daylight at this time. Based on a lack of visual confirmation and initial reports of damage, it was not clear whether the storm had produced a strong downburst or a tornado.

The mystery was solved very easily with an on-site damage survey. During the drive to Farwell, it was quickly evident that the thunderstorms had produced heavy rainfall. Water had ponded in fields and ditches. Jim Curtis (Farwell Emergency Manager) and Rex Williams (Parmer County Sheriff), were quite nice in providing details on the damage and taking us on an inspection of the damage.

The inspection revealed damage to two residences just northeast of Farwell. At this time the tornado was confirmed based on two pieces of evidence. First, large trees were found to be completely uprooted. Second, a large wooden beam traveled 200 yards and smashed into a constructed home. Further to the brick home.

A couple of people did see the roof fly off the building they were in, but initial thoughts were of downburst winds. As it turns out, the roof was probably torn off by the outer winds of the tornado. The large amounts of rain and lack of visual tornado confirmation, indicate the thunderstorm was a Heavy Precipitation (HP) supercell.

One of the strongest tornados This type of storm produces very heavy rainfall and makes tornado spotting quite difficult. Also, many times the wall cloud can develop on the right front side of the thunderstorm. Therefore, even if a spotter is on the right rear side of the storm, rainfall can obscure the view under the normally rain-free base.

> The following information are excerpts from preliminary Storm Data Tornado reports that are prepared at the National Weather Service in Amarillo.

Strong thunderstorms developed along a dryline in extreme eastern New Mexico March 27. As the storms moved east into Texas one of the thunderstorms developed into an HP supercell. A tornado (F2) developed in the thunderstorm and touched down just northwest of Farwell. At this location the tornado damaged two residences. A NWS survey revealed evidence of small to large missiles.

West facing windows were completely blown out from both residences. In one of the homes, the wind moved through the attic areas and pushed out through a ceiling located in the garage. At this same residence, a large tree was uprooted and a travel trailer was upended and destroyed.

As the tornado continued northeast, it destroyed power lines and power poles. Seven miles northeast of Farwell, the tornado completely totaled an old wood northeast the tornado lifted a quonset type barn completely over and

Second only to AIDS, Lyme disease is the fastest growing infectious disease in the country-cases of the disease have been reported in all states, with the exception of Hawaii, Alaska, and New Mexico. A greater incidence of Lyme disease is found during the summer months, when people tend to be outdoors.

The disease is caused by a tiny infectious spirochete which lodges in ticks. These ticks (which usually feed on forest and marsh animals, such as deer and mice) can then bite and infect humans.

"In the majority of cases, a bulls-eye shape rash appears anywhere from three to 32 days after the bite," Dr. Johnson said. Other symtoms of the disease include fatigue, fever, headache, chills and painful joints and muscles.

Prompt treatment with antibiotics is successful in most cases. "But, if left untreated, the disease can lead to arthritis, irregular heartbeat, meningitis, facial paralysis and other nervous system complications," Dr. Johnson said.

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

Emergency Farm Loan Applications Accepted

farm loans for losses caused by early freeze, low water temperature, and heavy rainfall are being accepted at the Farmer Home Administration office located at 109 3rd Farwell, FmHA Acting County Supervisor Edward C. Luebken said today.

Parmer County is one of seventeen in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the early freeze, low water temperature, and heavy rainfall.

Edward C. Luebken said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000.00 whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit form private commercial lenders, the interest is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Edward C. Luebken said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until February 2, 1993 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Edward C. Luebken said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It

costs the postal customer time and money to repair or place, mailbox vandalism sometimes causes the loss or destruction of valuable and important mail.

U.S. Mail receptacles and the mail inside are protected by Federal law from theft, damage, and destruction. The violations are felonies which carry penalties of between three to five years imprisonment and/or fines between \$1,000 and \$2,000 per incident.

Through the year it has been discovered that the vast majority of incidents of mailbox vandalism are the result of juveniles playing pranks. Juveniles, those under the age of 18, cannot be prosecuted in Federal court, so frequently, even though vandalism is a Federal offense, the local sheriff or police are called upon to investigate. They can respond quickly and usually have a good idea which individuals are most likely to be involved. In addition, juveniles can be prosecuted for vandalism of mailboxes under the State law concerning criminal mischief.

The best way to prevent the destruction and vandalism of mailboxes is through education. Parents with young children should take a few moments to explain the importance of an individual's mail to them. They should also let their older children know that what may be intended as harmless prank is actually against the law and that everyone involved loses; the prankster who can end up in jail; the customer who has to pay for the repair or replacement of the damaged mailbox and mail; and the community who pays the local sheriff or police to investigate the incident.

It's your mail-protect it. Any act of vandalism or information concerning vandalism of mailboxes should be immediately reported to the local sheriff or police, your local postmaster, and the Postal Inspectors at 806-762-7821.

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Rising Costs Demand Rising Income

Comparing fixed-income investments to equity investments is much like comparing apples to oranges. Neither is better than the other, and each serves a unique purpose.

With that said, consider inflation, an economic fact that has been, and will probably continue to be, with us for many years. Inflation is rising prices. Faced with rising prices, investors must either seek more income or accept a lower standard of living.

While you are employed, your income generally increases with inflation. When you retire, however, more income comes from Social Security, a pension or individual investments. Historically, those who have funded their retirement with fixed-income investments such as certificates of deposit, fixed annuities or bonds have seen the buy-

thetical investment made in 1976 of \$200,000 in an eight percent bond. Each year you would receive \$16,000 in interest. But, what happens to the purchasing power of that income? The cost of living has increased 141 percent. What a dollar bought in 1976 costs \$2.41 today. Of course, the \$200,000 nest egg is still there, but that also buys less than half of what it once did.

On the other hand, look at the results of the same \$200,000 hypothetically invested in a diversified portfolio of common stocks as measured by the Standard & Poor's 500 index. For needed income, assume a withdrawal of six percent each year based on the value of the account at the end of the previous year. For example, your first withdrawal would have been \$12,000 (200,000 x .06 = 12,000), somewhat less than the \$16,000 paid from the fixed-income investment. Your six percent income withdrawals would have been: 1980, \$11,697; 1985, \$17,313; 1990, \$33,374. During this period (1976-1990), the equity investment would have paid out \$252,126 in income equity investments. The bad news compared to \$240,000 from the eight percent fixed-income investment. The good news about fixed-income investments is that they generally begin with more income. Any fluctuation of principal is not as apparent as with stocks or other is that the income does not grow with inflation, and the principal, terms of buying power. What is the alternative?

Ownership of carefully selected common stocks or mutual funds has proved better able to withstand inflation. Although fixed-income investments may temporarily provide higher income, in the long run investors generally suffer a loss unless their portfolio includes equities potential to preserve purchasing power.

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
