Some people think of suicide nd on. It's not that they are men tally ill, they just want the pain to stop. They may feel like they have tried everything and nothing helps.
The light at the end of their tunnel is an on-coming train instead of hope.
People who commit suicide do not just suddenly decide to do it. eoding and tearing away at their coping abilities for the things they are facing. They normally give out clues about their attitude about life. long time in deep depression with tatements like, "life isn't worth living," or buying a weapon. Other lues are less obvious, like hoardway from others, slowly drawing way from ohcrs, giving thing
It's important to take the clues you do not see seriously. Ask the person about their thoughts and inou see a suicide, especially if hreats seriously. Don't shrug them ftention. they are just trying to ge
