## City Will Stop Extra Pick-up

SINCE YOU'VE NO doubt watched at least some of the Olympic Games, and since wife Carol has already expounded on the every-four-years' gathering of nations in their peaceful way of attempting to show who's superior, Ye Editor thought he'd better get his two cents worth in this week, or it might be 1996 before it would once again be timely.

This competing of nations has gotten to be a problem, on and off the field, with such things as boycotts as in Mr. Carter's case in 1980, and the complete elimination of the Games during the World War II years.

We thought it was unusual for the current Games for the old Soviet Bloc countries to continue competing as one team, and especially under the name "Unified Team." As you know if you have followed international news, the Soviet Union has been anything but "unified" for the past year or two, with some provinces ready to go to war if need be, in order to break away from Mother Russia.

So it's really unfair for the sportswriters, when listing the ranking of nations according to medals won, to group the old Soviet Union as one team, but apparently for Olympic purposes, they had no choice for this particular games. The Soviets continue to pile up an overall lead in total medals won in the Olympics.

The Unified group is still benefitting from the years when they spent millions (billions?) of dollars to build a world-beating team so the Communist leaders could brag and imply to the world that their system was the best on earth. Never mind that millions of their people might be starving to death in the meantime, while money was going to support the elite Soviet sports program.

At least, now that the Soviet government has been overhauled, the sports organization has been done away with. The successes achieved by the Russians at the current Olympics have been a result of "carryover" from this previous system. It will be interesting to see how they fare in 1996, especially when they will be competing under such names as Belarussia, Ukraine, Georgia, etc.

During the last winter Olympics, we heard some complaining by network officials covering the events that there were not enough events during the winter session to sustain viewer interest over the course of the run.

Conversely, during the two-week span of the Summer Games, the reporters are virtually running over themselves, and NBC has experimented with three extra premium channels, in an attempt to cover everything that goes on during the Summer Olympics.

The solution to these two problems is almost so simple that it's frightening. In fact, it's probably so simple that it would be foolish to assume that the International Olympic Committee could be persuaded to consider it.

Here's what you do to alleviate the problem: take a number of the lesser, indoor events, away from the event-rich Summer Games, and give them to the event-poor winter session.

Who said that boxing absolutely, positively had to be competed in the summer. Couldn't a fighter beat up on another one just as easily in the winter as in the summer??

Then there are volleyball (men's and women's), wrestling, table tennis, weightlifting, fencing, handball and judo, just to name a few, which could just as easily be given to the winter schedule, and at least then they might get a little more attention. At the present time, many of these get precious little mention or coverage.

You could even take gymnastics and make the "big switch," to give the Winter Games one more heavy-hitting event. (Then at least some

The City of Friona plans to stop its flatbed truck service to pick up extra trash for city residents, according to City Manager Paula Wilson.

"We just simply don't have the manpower anymore," Mrs. Wilson said. She explained that when the city originally began the service there were 11 men available for this type of work. When longtime employee Pete Hollis retires in September, the city will be down to just six men.

Like every other business, the city has found it necessary to cut back expenses, and one way to do this is to not to replace certain employees when they quit or retire. This is how the difference in manpower has occurred.

The city spokesperson said it took four men a good week to cover the city from one end to the other. "And, as soon as they have finished, it's time to start over," she said.

Among the regular duties that the men employees have to take care of the city's water, sewer, trash and cemetery departments.

## FHS Students Attend AC Science Course

Five Friona High School students attended Amarillo College this summer studying and learning about the diverse career possibilities in the area of engineering.

Ninety students from the Panhandle area participated in this challenging program, which is offered state-wide at many colleges and universities.

Those completing the program from Friona were Alice Black, Carmen Perez, Bernice Salinas, Mariah Scott and Iris Vega. In addition, FHS science instructor Clark Scott served as an instructor, and his son Nathan worked as a teaching assistant.

Alice Black received the honor of top problem-solving student and Iris Vega was honored as the top logic student. To qualify for TexPrep, students must show an interest in science and score well in both mathematics and science. The program is free to all seventh through 11th grade students who meet the qualifications.

TexPrep lasts eight weeks and is taught in college classrooms in a college format. Students learn logic, engineering, and physics. Guest speakers begin each day with a presentation on the specific skills of engineering that are required in their area.

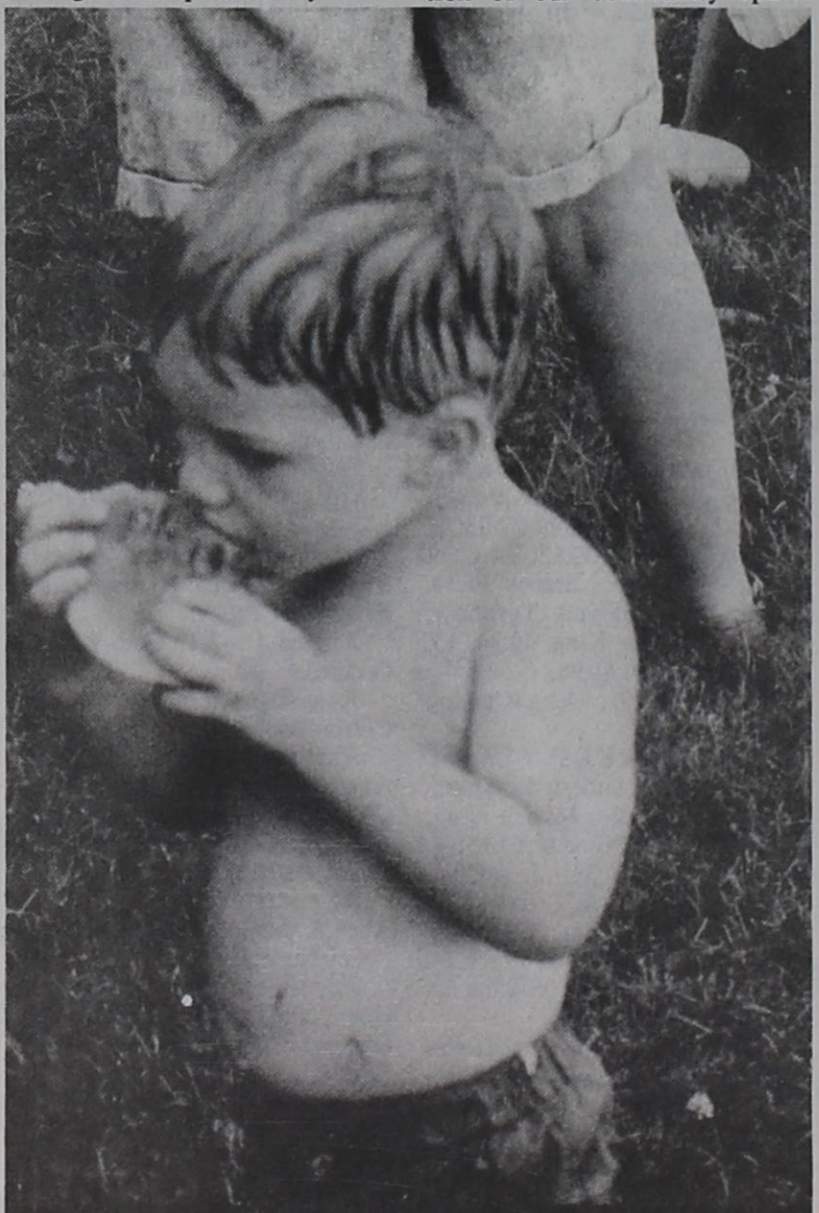

### 50 Yrs. Ago-Aug. 7, 1942

August 29 has been designated by Governor Coke R. Stevenson, the War Production Board and the County USDA War Board as local junk rally day for Parmer County.

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### 40 Yrs. Ago-Aug. 7, 1952

Mr. and Mrs. V.R. Jordan returned from their trip to California by way of Farmington, New Mexico, where they visited with her brother, Mr. Fred Easterling.

Mr. and Mrs. G.L. Mingus are back at home after spending two weeks in the hospital in Hereford. Both underwent surgery the same week there, and are reported to be slowly regaining their strength.

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### 35 Yrs. Ago-Aug. 8, 1957

A 1957 Ford, appearing to be transporting considerable weight, aroused suspicions of Sheriff Chas. Lovelace Sunday morning, and after investigating, the lawman found that the car contained 25 cases of beer. The car was traveling northeast on Highway 60 between Farwell and Bovina when spotted by the sheriff about 1 a.m. Driver of the car was John Soliz, Hereford, who was tried in Parmer County Court Monday morning for transporting intoxicants across a dry area. He pled guilty to the charge and was fined \$200 and court costs by Judge A.D. Smith.

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### 30 Yrs. Ago-Aug. 9, 1962

A public debate on the merits of the Kennedy Administration's Farm Program is scheduled for Tuesday, August 14, at the Lazbuddie High School Auditorium. Representing the area farmers who oppose the program will be Frank Hinkson of Lazbuddie. Speaking for those who are in favor of the Administration and its farm program will be Paul Lewis, Lamb County farmer.

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### 25 Yrs. Ago-Aug. 10, 1967

A cattle feed manufacturing plant which will make use of cotton burs will be built south of

Hub, it has been announced by a group of Friona businessmen. The plant will manufacture a pellet containing eight per cent protein and four per cent fats. This is more food value than is contained in cotton seed hulls, long used as a source of cattle food, it was pointed out. The feed plant can add molasses to the mix to increase the amount of fat in the pellet. The plant will be located three miles south and one-half mile west of Hub.

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### 20 Yrs. Ago-Aug. 10, 1972

An eight-year-old Friona youth had a narrow escape Tuesday afternoon when he became trapped in a culvert emptying into a tailwater pit just outside the city limits of Friona. Pete Rodriguez, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jose (Lupe) Rodriguez, was rescued from the culvert by Friona Fire Department volunteers and others who rushed to the scene. Young Rodriguez was playing in the irrigation runoff ditch a few yards behind his residence when he apparently decided to enter the culvert, which carries the water into a tailwater pit on the Floyd Reeve farm.

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### 15 Yrs. Ago-Aug. 7, 1977

An attractive bronze plaque was

levelled this week at Prairie Acres Nursing Home, giving details on the facility.

The Friona Independent School District did not receive the advantages of the new finance bill passed in the recently completed special session, and the local Board of Trustees has found it necessary to increase taxes by 8 1/2 percent for the 1977-78 school year.

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### 10 Yrs. Ago-Aug. 8, 1982

An employee of West Friona Grain, Miguel Huerta, 19, suffocated after becoming covered with corn while working at the elevator Thursday afternoon. Don Huckabee, general manager of West Friona Grain, said that there were three employees in the barn, as the barn was being unloaded. They were stationed at the top of the corn, and were helping the corn flow to the bottom, where it is carried out of the enclosure.

Following dinner, a short and informal memorial was conducted by Alicia Rapp and Evelyn Freeland. It was in remembrance of the family members deceased since the 1990 reunion. They were: Margaret and Leland (Jim) Goodwine, Jonathan (Jon) Schlenker, Harlan O'Rear, Sarah Cantrall, William (Bill) Ballard and Charles T. Reeve.

On Monday, all were invited to an 8 a.m. "Breakfast on the Prairie" prepared by Sharon, Elaine and Bill White. Floyd Reeve welcomed the caravan of cars in a unique way. He had arranged bales of hay to spell out "Hi" as they drove through the gate to the high point on the original Reeve ranch. It overlooked a playa lake, lush, green prairie and grazing cattle. Only those who had to make early departures missed the delicious sausage and pancake breakfast prepared by the cooks.

In route back to town, the caravan made a brief stop at the old house made of adobe bricks by the late Floyd W. Reeve, his sons and neighbors in the mid-twenties. It was there that Floyd S. 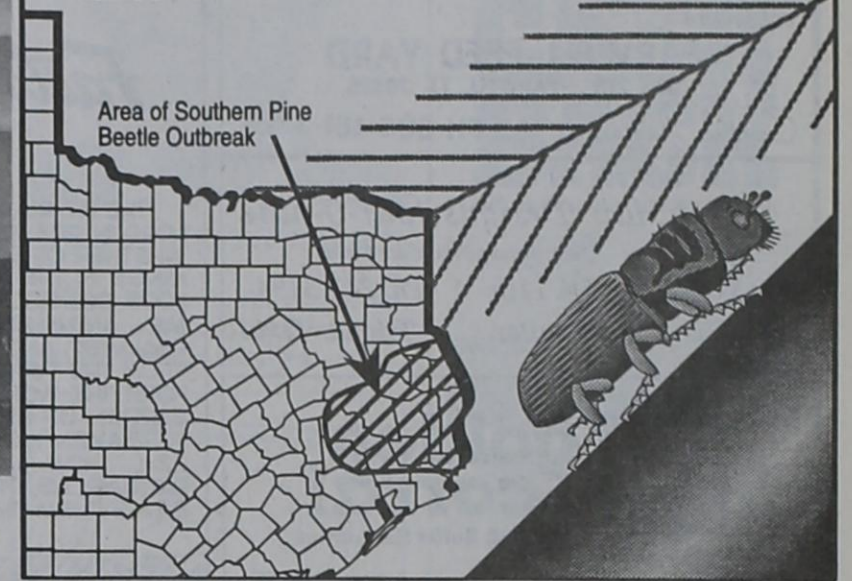

## Detecting Infatuation

I came across some material at a seminar the other day that I thought you might benefit from. I have written about this type of thing before, but this has a different slant that might help if you are in an infatuation-type relationship.

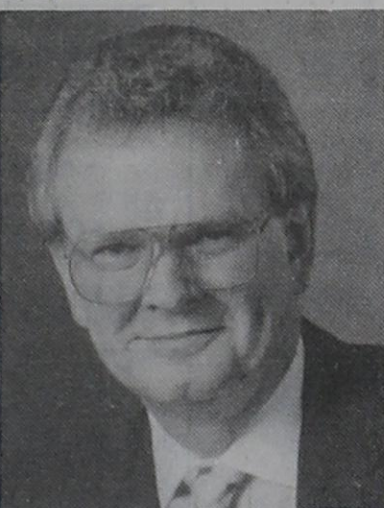
Infatuation is a strong attraction between two people. It can lead to strong physical reactions and preoccupation. It is not the same as love. Being infatuated occurs with someone you don't really know. You can't deal with reality and be infatuated at the same time. When one comes in, the other fades.

Infatuation brings about such a strong physical reaction that many confuse it with love. The reaction or feeling tends to verify in the person's mind that this must really be serious due to the feelings they are experiencing. It's like, "How can something that feels so right be wrong?"

There is usually a mixture of pleasure and pain. You feel on top of the world and then suddenly you are depressed. It is hard for the infatuated person to see the reality of things. They have the tendency to distort or bend reality. Infatuation is not a good state of mind to be in when making serious decisions. Our thinking is clouded. The infatuation will end, but the consequences of those decisions may not.

We usually have an ideal type of person in our mind. When we become infatuated, we are usually tapping into that ideal type fantasy. We experience a "glow," and it's hard to examine those feelings because of the fear of having to give up the ideal.

What usually happens is that something causes us to come crashing down and reality hits us hard. It's easier if we can gradually exa-

mine our feelings--the shock isn't so bad. If you find yourself in a relationship that is built upon infatuation, don't despair too much--it does show that you are emotionally alive. I'm not sure some people are.

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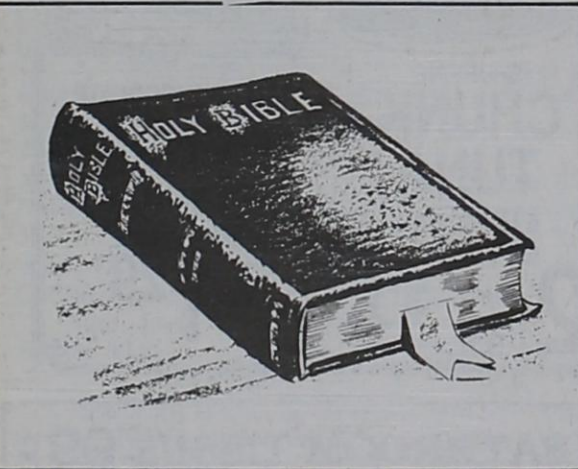

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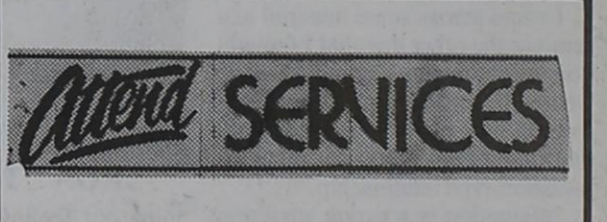

## Plane Crash Claims Johnny Lovelace

A Parmer County native, Johnny Lovelace, 50, and his daughter LuAlice, 26, were killed last Friday night when their twin-engine airplane crashed short of an airport runway near Ruidoso, N.M.

Lovelace grew up at Farwell. He was an all-sport star for the Steers in High School, then played quarterback for the Texas Tech Red Raiders from 1960-62.

He lived in Coppell, a Dallas suburb, and was owner/operator of a plastics manufacturer.

Lovelace was born August 28, 1941, in Clovis, N.M. He was the son of the late longtime Parmer County Sheriff Charlie Lovelace and Alice (Guyer) Lovelace.

Survivors include his wife, Barbara Lovelace of the home; a daughter, Brenda Sherwood of League City; a son, John Lovelace of Plano; three grandsons of League City; and two brothers, Jerry Lovelace of Houston and Leon Lovelace of Grapevine.

Services were held Tuesday at the Trinity Fellowship Church in Richardson, with Dr. Carl Anderson officiating.

All three of the Lovelace brothers were sports stars at Farwell High School, and all three went on to play football for the Texas Tech Red Raiders.

"He was a helluva guy," said Richard Willis, who roomed with Lovelace during the 1961 season. "He was a big, old lumbering boy, about 6-4 or 6-5, and the thing I remember most was the kindness and softness of him."

"To be that big and that type of guy was something else. He was always able to pick out the good things in a person," Willis said.

"The thing I remember most of all about Johnny was that he was more concerned about his brothers playing well than about himself playing well," said Guy Griffis, who roomed with Jerry Lovelace at Tech. "All three of those boys were good football players and very, very close."

"I went to school with Jerry and Leon. Johnny was already through when I got here, but I got to know Johnny well while rooming with Jerry. He was a super, super guy."

"Johnny was a big, strong boy," said former Red Raider athletic director Polk Robison. "He was a good football player. I remember his daddy was a sheriff in Farwell, and the whole family would come to all the games."

"They were a fine family, and each one of those boys did well while they were at Tech," Robison concluded.

Lovelace coached for awhile at the high school level after his college football career before moving to the Dallas area.

The accident occurred at 8:15 p.m. (CDT) at Sierra Blanca Regional Airport northeast of Ruidoso, according to the New Mexico State Police. Lovelace was piloting a 1966 Cessna Model 377A. The airplane circled the airport and was preparing to land from the south when it crashed at least a half-mile short of the runway in wooded terrain, said airport manager Lloyd Wayne.

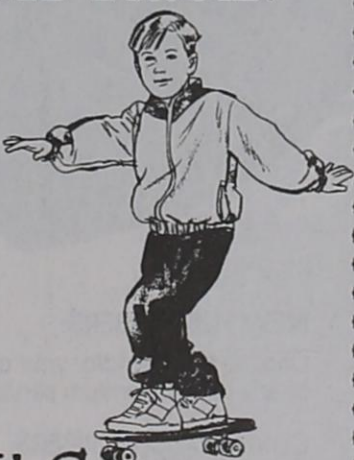

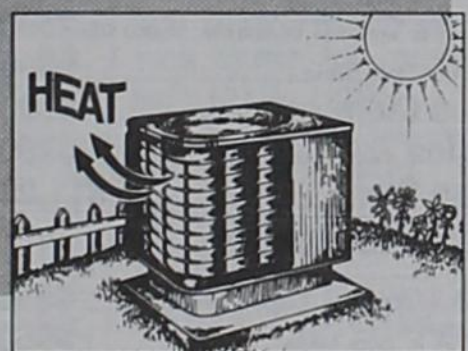

### The Dow Is The Stock Market's Barometer

The Dow Jones Industrial Average (DJIA) is one of the most common and frequently quoted indicators of the stock market's direction.

The DJIA, more often called "the Dow," first appeared on May 26, 1896. It was formulated by Charles H. Dow, co-founder of Dow Jones and Co. and first editor of *The Wall Street Journal*. It consisted of 11 companies whose stock traded on the New York Stock Exchange. Their size and number of outstanding shares represented a large enough base to meaningfully reflect the direction of the market as a whole.

Today, the Dow is an average of prices of 30 stocks traded on the New York Stock Exchange. The Dow stocks are still selected by the editors of *The Wall Street Journal*. The average is calculated using a divisor that is adjusted regularly to reflect stock splits and dividends. By adjusting the divisor, the index remains comparable from one day to the next.

Critics of the Dow say that the popular stock market indicator is too small a sample of stocks to accurately reflect the overall movement of the market. Additionally, the Dow is price-weighted, which means that the higher-priced stocks make more of an impact on the average than the low-priced stocks. Table 1 shows how a 10 per cent change in a \$100 stock (\$10) causes a greater change than does the same variance in a \$30 stock (\$3). With the same percentage movement for

both stocks, 10 per cent, the \$100 stock moves the entire Dow average 5 per cent, while the \$30 stock moves it only 1.8 per cent.

Proponents of the Dow say it is a proven, long-range market barometer. They point to the amazingly similar movement of the Dow's 30 stocks compared to the Standard & Poor's 500 stock index.

As economic conditions change and corporations jockey for importance, the editors of the *Wall Street Journal* replace old Dow companies with new companies that are more representative of the nation's and the market's direction. In 1991, for example, Navistar, Primerica and USX were replaced by Disney, J.P. Morgan and Caterpillar.

Sometimes companies lose their place on the Dow only to regain importance later. For example, National Steel replaced Coca-Cola in 1935. In 1959, Aluminum Company of America replaced National Steel. Then in 1987, Coca-Cola made a comeback and bumped Owens-Illinois. International Business Machines is another giant that lost its place in 1939 and returned in 1979.

The list goes on, with the companies always being selected on the basis of financial soundness and a proven track record. They must also have a large number of shares in the hands of individuals rather than industrial holdings.

The Dow was the first market barometer and is still the bellwether of the professionals. That's why when you ask, "How's the market doing?" you will probably get a Dow report.

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Intraocular lenses may be implanted during surgery to permanently replace the lens that was removed. Additional correction may be needed in the form of eyeglasses.

Contact lenses may be worn in the affected eye to replace the lens removed. Soft lenses are usually prescribed if they can offer the necessary correction.

Glasses can take over for the missing lens. They enlarge the image seen, but may restrict side vision.

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
