Friona residents who make a habit of listening to the 10 o'clock news and weather report before retiring, then sleeping peacefully for the next several hours or so, had a rude awakening soon after the clock struck 12 on Wednesday night.

High winds, accompanied by various amounts of hail and rain, hit without warning just after midnight and continued for an hour or more. Evidence showed that the storm traveled from the north in a southeasterly direction and the most damage occurred on the east side of town. Much damage was done to crops, yard fences, outbuildings, gardens and windows in buildings over a wide area in every direction from Friona, as well as inside the city limits.

Windows were blown out at Ingram's Department Store and at TLC Service Center on Main Street.

At least two large trees were uprooted in town. One was in front of Kent and Brenda Patterson's home at 1305 Maple and the other at the home of Hoyt and Kathryn

Several power poles were blown down near the country home of Floyd and Betty Reeve, who live southeast of town.

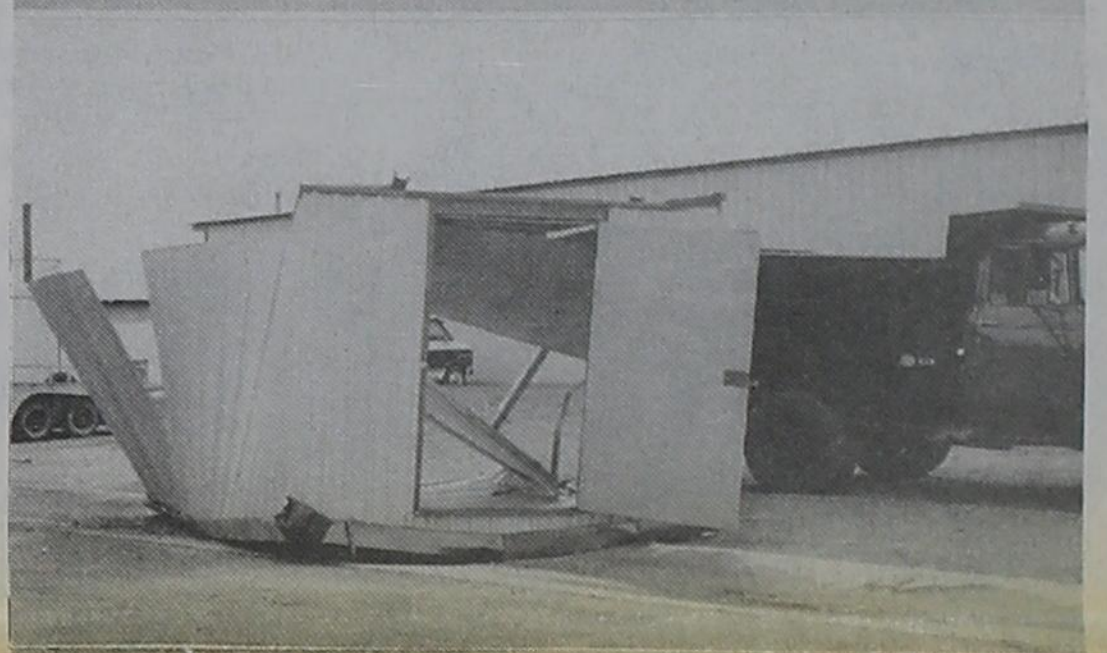
A portion of every backyard fence in the thirteen hundred block of Jackson Street was blown down.

60 Yrs. Ago--Sept. 2, 1932
One of the saddest accidents to ever visit the Friona community was the loss of the lives of Mrs. C.S. Waddell and her two small daughters, which occurred one mile east of Bovina Sunday night as a result of the deluge of waters that visited this locality and that of Bovina that date.

Mr. Waddell, his wife and three daughters had been visiting in Eastern New Mexico over the weekend and were on their way home when they were overtaken by the rain storm which was perhaps the heaviest that ever visited this locality (from 15 to 17 inches west of Friona).

On reaching Bovina, Waddell found that the bridge crossing Running Water Draw was destroyed. He then tried to go east from Bovina, but coming to the place where the Ozark Trails Highway (Hwy. 86) crosses this same draw, the Waddell automobile was swept from the roadway. Waddell managed to escape with the youngest daughter, Billie May, but Mrs. Waddell and the two older children, Virginia, six, and Vivian, four, were swept downstream in the darkness.

Search parties on Monday failed to find the bodies. In fact, 20-year-old Richard Caldwell of Bovina drowned while trying to help find them.

One of the bodies was found at the bridge built across the stream last winter due south of Friona, about 11 miles from where it was thrown into the water. The body of Mrs. Waddell was found two miles further east.

(The Star's four pages are filled with other accounts of near-tragedy caused by what was possibly the biggest flood in the area's history, which turned our usually empty draws into rampaging rivers.)

30 Yrs. Ago--Aug. 29, 1957
A U.S. Air Force four-engine fuel transport plane crashed Wednesday morning at 10:04 a.m. six miles north and four west of Bovina. The plane's crew, six airmen, had bailed out near Hereford. The crash, which scattered debris for approximately 3/4 of a mile in a swath 50 yards wide, was on a farm owned by A.B. Wilkinson, who lives in Bovina.

25 Yrs. Ago--Aug. 31, 1967
Bill Morgan, former Chief of Police in Friona, accepted the position once again this week as Ken McDermitt resigned to pursue other interests. McDermitt had held the position since June of 1966.

20 Yrs. Ago--Aug. 31, 1972

daughter, graduated in 1968.

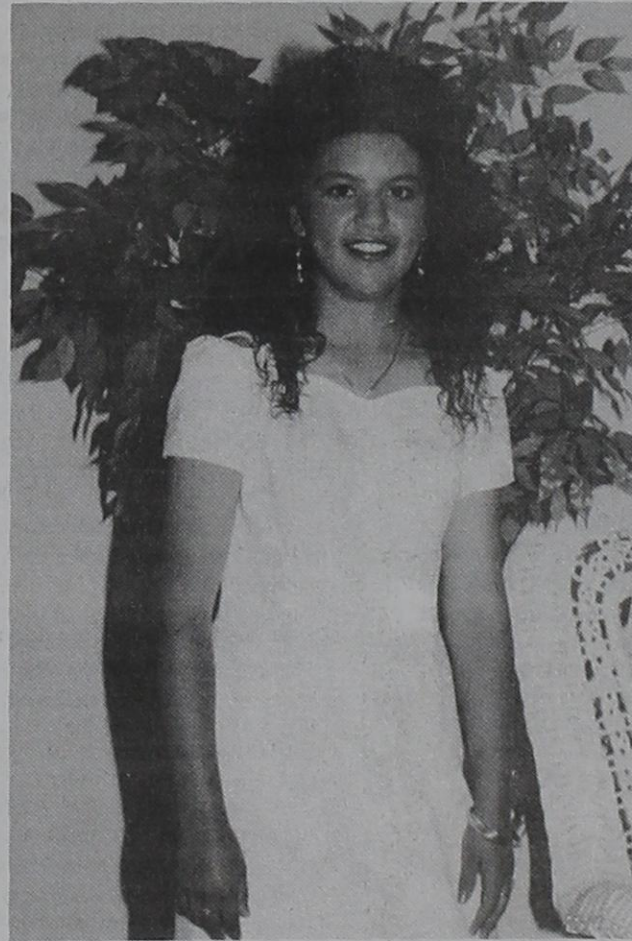
10 Yrs. Ago--Aug. 29, 1982

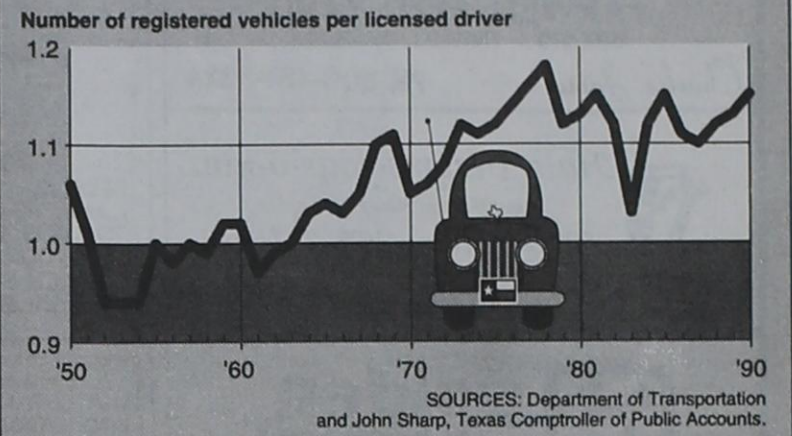

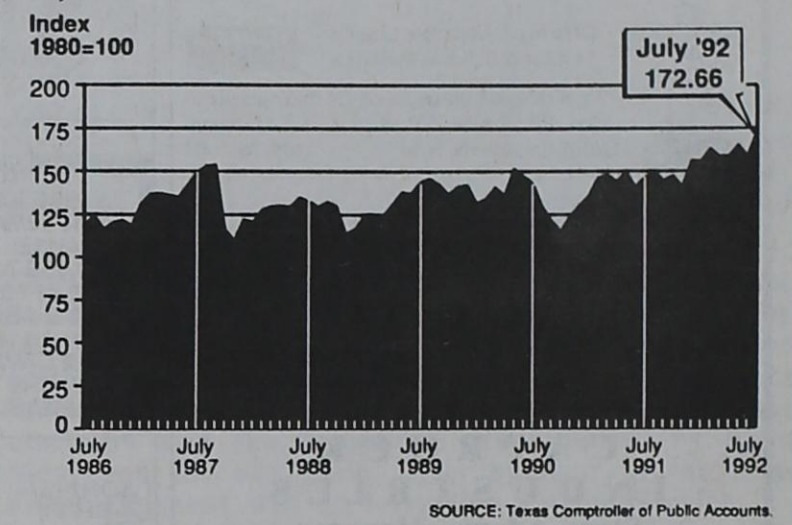
Registered vehicles pass licensed drivers

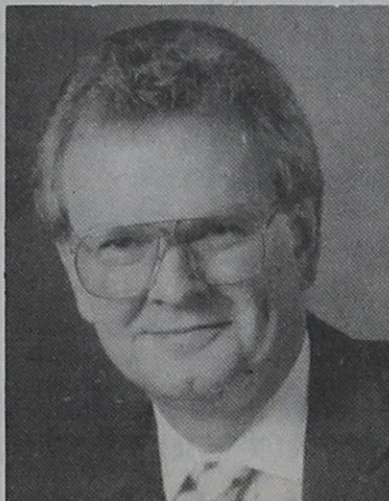

'Cheering Up' Is Not Always Easy

Depression can cause people to have a feeling of being in a "dark pit" with no way out. They may feel there is no hope for their situation to change and that things will only get worse.

Everyone gets the "blues" at times. This type of depression is not long lasting or doesn't have much depth. It usually subsides in a matter of hours or a few days.

Depression that can be a problem is the type that is on-going. There is a continued or increasing withdrawal from activity or people. A person may lose interest in their personal grooming and other once-favored activities. A person may begin to have thoughts of suicide.

Depression has been defined as "anger turned inward." Depressed people are hurting people and they usually feel that there is no way it will stop. The cliché's people are prone to say are normally not helpful. Things like "cheer up, things could get worse," or "snap out of it," etc. Believe me, if a depressed person could snap out of it all of a sudden, they would. Somehow, just knowing things could get worse is not a real motivator for me to feel good about things!

If you are depressed and you feel it is beginning to affect your life adversely, get some help for it. I would suggest seeing a professional counselor and/or getting a medical check-up. Sometimes there can be a chemical imbalance. There is help.

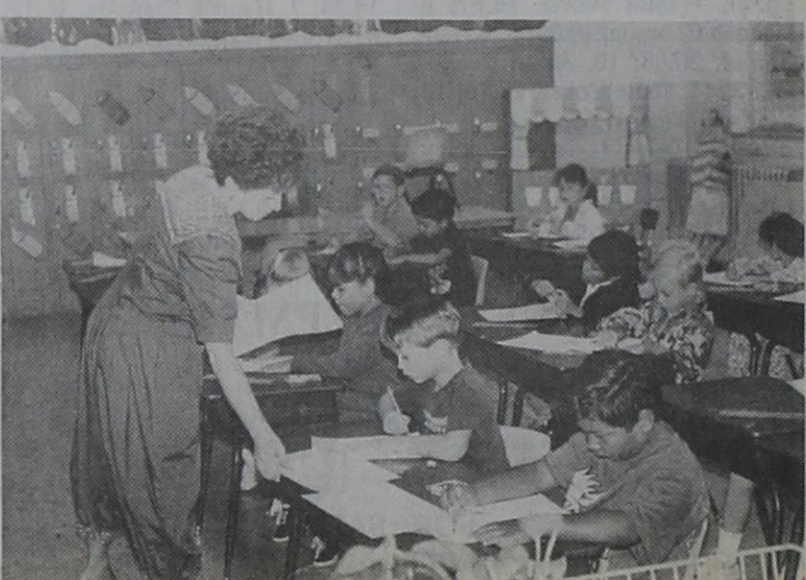

As Investments Change, So Do Broker Profiles

Faced with declining interest rates on certificates of deposit (CDs), more people have been looking elsewhere to invest their money. Major New York Stock Exchange member firms and regional firms are reasonable alternatives to banks and other savings institutions because they offer a wide range of investments, from secure U.S. Treasuries to higher risk oil investments. How prudently your investments are selected, however, can depend on how carefully you choose your investment representative.

Today you have a wide selection of brokers and firms from which to choose. Of 1,400 brokers recently surveyed by *Registered Representative* magazine, 57.1 per cent represented national firms and 25.3 per cent represented regional firms. The rest were primarily independent brokers. Only 1.7 per cent were discount brokers, down from 2.5 per cent in 1989.

Once you select an investment firm, don't be pressured into doing business with the first broker you meet. Experience, education, age and how the broker is compensated should be considered before you make a decision. The largest group of brokers surveyed by *Registered Representative* magazine (34.9 per cent) had between five and nine years of experience. Only 15.2 per cent had more than 20 years of experience, and more than 23 per cent had been registered less than five years.

In 1989, about 21 per cent of the brokers surveyed were age 30 or younger. In 1991, that age group dropped to 12.8 per cent. About 65 per cent of today's brokers are between 31 and 50 years of age. Ten per cent of all brokers are female.

Brokers' compensation has always been a point of discussion. Can anyone be objective when paid by commission? Unlike many industries, the commission a broker earns as a percentage of the money invested is relatively small. Your broker's long-term success depends more on how well he or she services your account than on a hefty, one-time commission. Because of this, more than 69 per cent of brokers are compensated by commissions only. The total asset value of their active accounts typically range up to \$30 million. A select 5.8 per cent have accounts totaling \$100 million or more.

Education is a growing concern in the investment industry. The number and complexity of today's investments and the ever-changing economy demand education as well as experience. In 1991, 81.5 per cent of brokers were college graduates, and about half of those had post-graduate credits or degrees. Roughly 18.5 per cent were high-school graduates or had only some college credit.

The complexity of investments is moving more brokers into specialized areas other than just trading individual stocks. For example, 46.4 per cent of brokers surveyed in 1989 concentrated on trading stocks. Today that number is 21.8 per cent. More than a quarter of the brokers today have no specialization. Mutual funds and financial planning each account for about 14 per cent of the specializations reported. It is important to know what, if anything, is your broker's specialty. If that focus does not coincide with your objectives, look for another broker.

None of these credentials, of course, guarantee your broker's performance. They should, however, offer some criteria to consider in making your selection.
