

AS TO WEST TEXAS A. & M.

In asking for an independent A. & M. College for West Texas, that section west of the 98th meridian has met some opposition. Dr. Bizzell, president of the present A. & M. College, is opposed to such a move, as are the regents of the old school. West Texas will do well to secure an adjunct school. It has been the intention of the board of regents for many years to ask for secondary A. & M. Colleges as soon as they thought the plan could be carried through successfully.

It will be remembered that some two years ago Mr. Walton Potcet, then with the Extension Service, stated, while visiting in Plainview, that such was the case, although he was not speaking in official capacity at the time. Mr. Poteet was for a number of years a regent of the Texas A. & M. College, and has been closely in touch with the school.

What the campaign committee will do toward framing a bill is problematical, but it is practically certain that some concession will necessarily be made and the hope of securing a co-ordinate school dispensed with, at least until some constitutional amendment may be made, which in our judgment postpones it indefinitely. Hale County now expends enough money in keeping up ordinary roads to maintain first-class roads. The initial cost of permanent roads can be met with a bond issue, and money now available will be ample to maintain these roads in a first-


