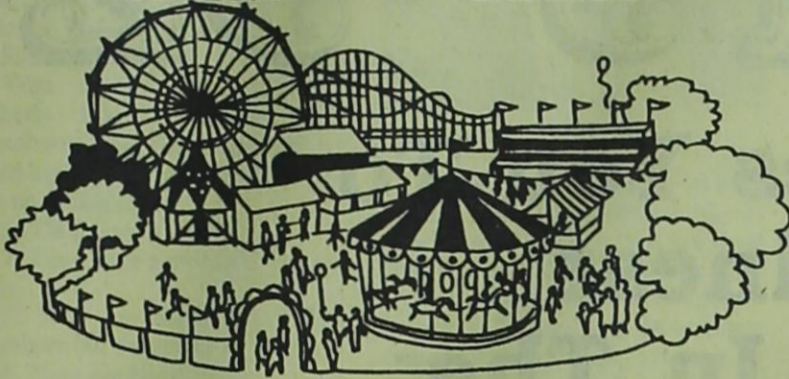

Enrollment Down From '91 Totals

The enrollment in Friona's schools was down slightly from a similar date in 1991, it was revealed this week.

Enrollment on Monday, September 7 was 1228 in the entire system. This was a drop of 31 students from the total of 1259 students counted on September 6, 1991. The decrease amounted to 2.4 per cent.

The number of students in junior high actually increased, from 284 last year to 298 this year. The high school total fell by seven students, from 315 to 308. The elementary total showed the largest decline, from 250 in 1991 to 222 this year.

The fourth grade is the largest in terms of numbers with 108 students, followed closely by the third grade with 107. They are the only classes over the 100 mark so far this school term.

Following are the 1992 enrollment totals, with those for 1991 in parenthesis:

ECU 9 (11); pre-K 30 (37); kindergarten 87 (108); grade 2: 97 (100); grade 3: 98 (109); grade 4: 108 (100); grade 5: 97 (101); grade 6: 107 (96); grade 7: 93 (96); grade 8: 98 (93); grade 9: 92 (83); grade 10: 73 (73); grade 11 (86); grade 12: 76 (73). Totals: 1228 (1259).

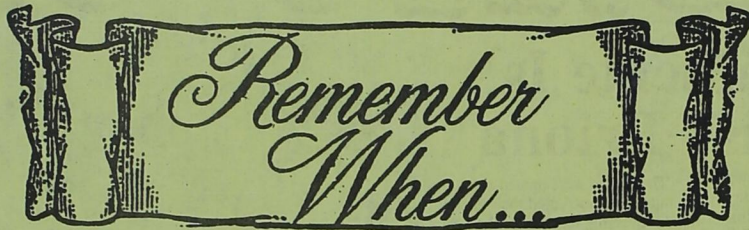

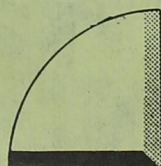

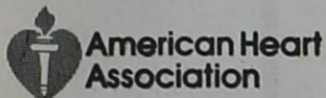
Ingredients To Being An Effective Family Unit

WHERE'S MY SHOTGUN?

Hurray! It's football time, and dove season opened on September 1.

A quick trip to the gun club and a few rounds of trap or skeet will greatly improve your hunting success on that first trip. The eye-hand coordination required to chase down the speedy mourning dove requires practice. You can either practice at the skeet range or in front of your buddies during that first hunt.

Most gun clubs will permit non-members to use their facilities for a slightly higher use-fee. Gun clubs are great fun, but don't be surprised if you suddenly decide to join one. The members enjoy all kinds of hunting, and they are a great source of information on the availability of some great hunting leases.

Just returned from Fort Worth, where my father and I attended the 1992 edition of Hunter's Extravaganza. The entire Will Rogers Coliseum was packed with the newest and best hunting products.

Hit of the show was a new camouflage pattern called Diamondback. Most commercial camouflage is patterned after plants but the best camouflage is worn by nature's creatures. This unique scale design was developed by Ben Johnson of Rowlett, Texas. Diamondback is good looking and is the perfect gift for any hunter, because Ben maintains excellent quality at reasonable prices. This new pattern is not yet available in stores, but a catalog can be obtained by calling 214/475-5958. A complete selection of Diamondback clothing is definitely on my birthday and Christmas lists.

Hunters, please be careful. Thirteen hunting fatalities and a total of 81 accidents were reported in Texas during 1991. Rifles were involved in 32 of the accidents, shotguns in 42 accidents, and handguns in seven incidents, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife figures. Terry Erwin, recreation programs director, recommends that "everyone take hunter education, regardless of age." A course is required for all hunters born after

September 2, 1971. For more information on hunter education courses, call 1-800-792-1112, ext. 4999.

(a) The board shall hold a public hearing on the proposed annual budget.

(e) The budget is effective only after adoption by the board.

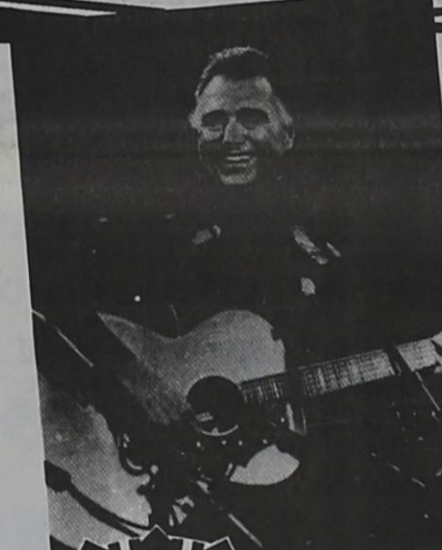

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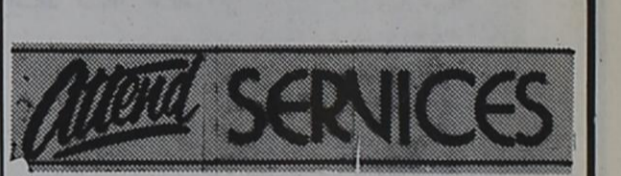

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Mindy Johnson Visits Frutas Family In Spain

One of Mindy Johnson's graduation presents this spring was a trip to Spain to visit the Lopez de Frutas family in Colemenar Viejo, a small village near Madrid Spain.

The Lopez de Frutas family, which consisted of the father, Antonio, the mother, Ana; two girls, Veronica and Estela; and one boy, Alvaro, were Mindy's hosts when she was a part of the Youth For Understanding project in the summer of 1990.

She flew to Madrid June 18 and returned August 13.

One of the highlights of her return visit was taking a six day walk with Ana and Alvaro and thirteen other people, who were making an annual pilgrimage to an ancient cathedral, Santiago de Compostela.

The pilgrimage started at Saria, Spain, went into France and then across the northern part of Spain. The trail has been in use since the ninth century and was rocky in some places.

Mindy reported, "We crossed some Roman bridges and also walked on some ancient Roman roads."

Each participant carried a backpack holding a raincoat, drinking water and snacks. The extra clothing, sleeping bags and other necessities were hauled in a van, which a man drove.

The oldest member of the group was 63 and the youngest was 12. Each day started at 5:30 a.m. and by 7:00 the trek was begun. Walking continued until 1:00 or 2:00 p.m. Mindy was the only teenager in the

group. Each person in the group carried a palo, which was a stick like the ones carried by the original pilgrims. Some of the palos were embellished with a conch, a pilgrims symbol.

When the group arrived in the town, the residents were having a fiesta as the statue of a virgin was carried into the church. Many of the participants wore Galician costumes, which originated in the northwest part of Spain where Santiago is located.

The tour group joined the parade, which featured costume dances, drums, flutes and bagpipes.

Mindy also accompanied the Lopez de Frutas family to Seville, which is in southern Spain, where they attended the World's Fair.

Some of the exhibits she enjoyed most were the reconstructed models of the Nina, Pinta and Santa Maria; the U.S. Space Ship and the

International Pavillion.

They also went to see El Escorial, a palace built by Phillip II, who also built the Spanish Armada. A mountain was completely hollowed out and a church was built inside it. A massive cross was erected atop the mountain by Franco in memory of soldiers who died in the Civil War 1936-1939.

Some Spanish customs Mindy noticed were the closing of shops from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. for siesta, the simple hair-dos and lack of make-up for teen age girls and the methods of transportation, which included a lot of walking.

A person can obtain a license to drive a moped at 16, but must be 18 before he or she can obtain a license to drive an automobile. She also noticed the scarcity of cars and the different kinds of public transportation.

Anyone going from Colemenar

to Madrid generally rode a bus to the city then took the subway to any point they wanted to go inside Madrid proper.

She also noticed a different pattern in the eating habits of the natives of Spain. For a typical dinner menu, the family generally served several courses beginning with cold soup and ending with fresh fruit.

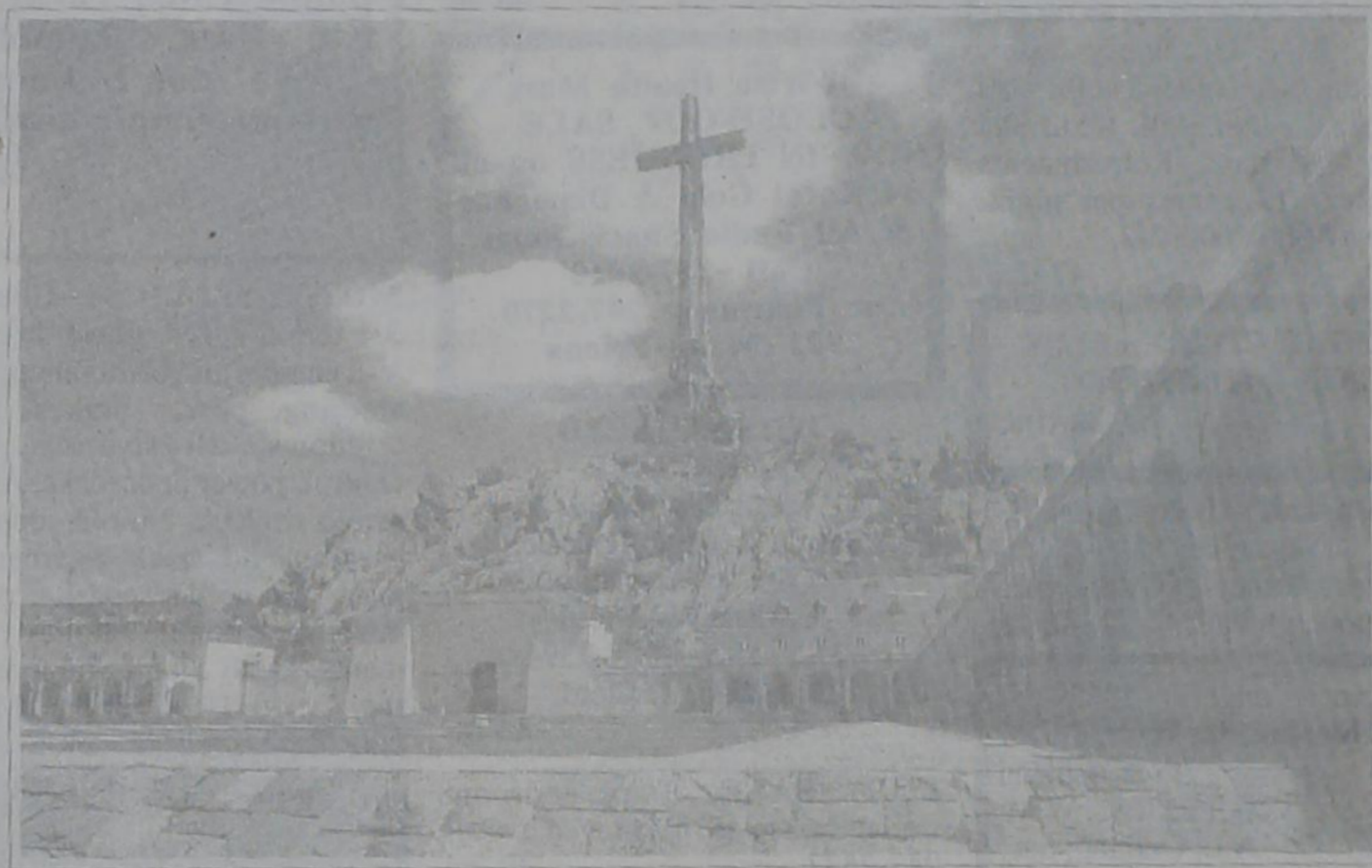
When asked about different foods, she replied, "I had eaten snails when I was there before, but this time I ate octopus and squid."

Since Mindy's return, she was accompanied to Dallas by her parents, Bob and Connie Johnson, and sister Abbey. She is now enrolled at Southern Methodist University.

She said in concluding the interview, "I've been to Spain to visit the Lopez de Frutas family twice and plan to go back sometime in the future."

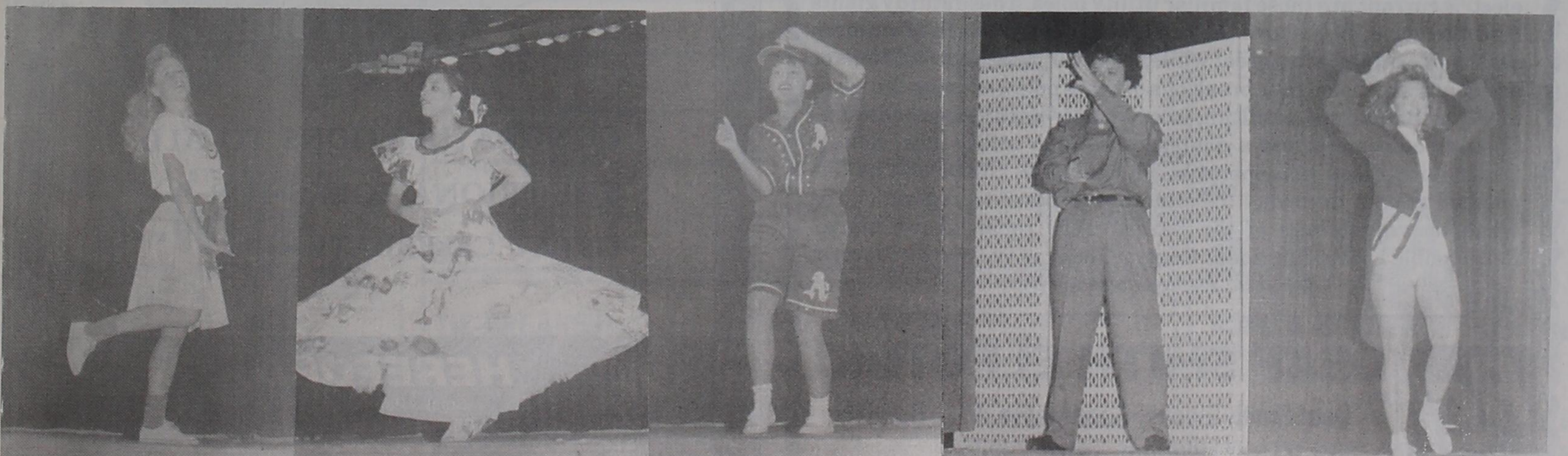

Friona's Charity Aids River Rd. 20-19 Win

A charitable first quarter proved to be their undoing, as the FHS Chieftains dropped a 20-19 decision to Amarillo River Road in their season-opening football game last Friday.

Chieftain fans were heartened by the fact that the team played well both offensively and defensively. The Chiefs had a lead in first downs, 16-6, and in total yardage, 216-114.

But the two early fumbles caused the team to try to come from behind, at a time when they could have been leading the game.

Friona's first fumble happened on their second play from scrimmage, turning the ball over to the Wildcats at the Friona 17.

It took the visitors just three

plays to score. A pitchout worked for an eight-yard touchdown with only 1:50 elapsed in the opening quarter. The Wildcats missed their kick, but led by 6-0.

The teams traded punts as the quarter moved along. Kelly Jack recovered a River Road fumble, but Friona couldn't move the ball and had to punt.

The Chieftains forced a River Road punt from their own 45-yard line. The punt proved to be a disaster for Friona, which muffed the ball. The loose ball rolled into the end zone, where River Road recovered for a touchdown.

The Wildcats tried to run for two points, but were stopped short. The TD came with just four seconds left in the opening quarter, and gave the visitors a 12-0 lead.

Friona kept the ball for over seven minutes to start the second quarter, as the team strung together four first downs. Ironically, the drive ended when the officials failed to give the Chieftains four downs following a penalty, and gave the ball over to the Wildcats at their 37-yard-line.

A little later, Friona got the ball at the River Road 25 with only 1:09 left on the clock. Blair Burney hit Brian Herring for 16 yards to the nine, and then eight yards to just outside the goal-line.

Two running plays lost back to the five, but more importantly, let the clock keep running as the Chiefs were out of time outs. But Burney connected with Harvey Martinez for the touchdown with four seconds left. Britt Conklin's kick made the score 12-7 at halftime.

At that point, Friona led in first downs, 8-1, and in total yardage, 100-29.

Friona elected to take the ball to open the second half, but it backfired. Martinez fumbled the kickoff, finally covering it at the Friona five. Four plays later, a short punt gave River Road possession at the Friona 35.

Tailback Troy Sanders romped 31 yards for his team's biggest gainer in the game, and Dustin Tebo took a pitchout into the end zone for the important two-point conversion. The Wildcats had stretched their lead to 20-7 with 8:51 left in the third quarter.

Friona blocked a River Road punt late in the quarter, and Burney hit Herring for a ten-yard gain to the Wildcat ten.

Four plays later, Burney again went for Herring near the goal-line, but the ball bounced off the 170-pound senior's fingertips as the team came up empty.

On the second play of the final quarter, linebacker Colby Carthel stripped Sanders of the ball and Jason Medrano recovered for the Chieftains at the River Road 20.

Two plays later, Burney connected with Carthel to the one-yard line. Martinez got the score on the next play. Conklin's kick was blocked, but the score became 20-13 with 10:32 left in the game.

The Chieftains put together a perfect drive the next time they got the ball. The team moved 63 yards. Burney hit three out of four passes, and the runningbacks made ten yards.

Burney hit Carthel in the end zone for the score, and the team called time to discuss its strategy with 4:17 left to play.

Friona went for two points. Burney rolled out to his right as his receivers fanned into the end zone, but pressure from the Wildcats kept the play from working.

River Road had made only four first downs up to this point, so fans figured Friona would get the ball back fairly soon. But the Wildcats managed to put together their longest drive of the entire game—11 plays, and back-to-back first downs for the only time all night. They also completed their only pass of the evening during this stretch.

When Friona got the ball, there were just 41 seconds remaining, and although they gave it their best shot, they could only complete two of four passes to their own 40-yard line.

YOUR EYES



Medicare And Your Optometrist

In today's health-care crunch, senior citizens are glad to know that, under certain conditions, the cost of optometric treatment may be covered under Medicare. Rule of thumb: if a visit to your optometrist is necessitated by or related to a health-related condition, symptom or complaint, the service generally is covered.

Optometric care of diabetics, for instance, would be covered; they need to be examined periodically for early signs of diabetic retinopathy. If side vision is suddenly blurry, the cause might be glaucoma; the testing for that and the eye exam would qualify under Medicare rules. Testing for cataracts is considered a Medicare expense, as are the glasses and contact lenses prescribed for post-cataract patients. Even a visit to check out unexplained headaches should be covered.

In states where optometrists are permitted to treat eye conditions as well as diagnose them, Medicare coverage generally is provided.
