MAIZE DAYS 1992 was probably the most successful celebration Friona has had in several years. We've heard nothing but praise for the way the events were handled. If you failed to get downtown last Saturday, then you missed some really great fun.

A lot of people brought their folding chairs and just enjoyed sitting out under the trees in the park all day last Saturday, while watching their grandkids on the rides and other folks having fun.

The carnival and the art show in the depot were the centers of activity in the park with a large variety of interesting booths scattered throughout the park. The cow patty bingo and the FFA "calf" roping events served to liven things up, while the food and craft booths offered some good prices on their wares.

The bingo calf didn't perform for several hours after he was put into the pen. When he finally did it, everyone in the park rushed over to look at his creation. It was really funny. . .well, I guess you had to be there.

The antique car show at the Community Center was a really nice added event and was well attended.

This is the way it used to be! Someone once said "If it ain't broke, don't fix it." Well, some years ago Maize Days got "fixed" and it has been pretty strung out for the past few years with part of the activities being downtown and some things scheduled out at the Community Center grounds, including the carnival. Our civic leaders, and especially Chamber Executive Secretary Terri Outland, are to be commended for taking the initiative and "putting it back the way it was."

By having most of the events in and around the City Park, the various attractions were able to "feed off each other" as far as the crowd was concerned. A good crowd was in the park throughout the day, and took part in the activities.

Another event that got "put back the way it was" this year was the Miss Friona Pageant. Several years ago it was thought that making the pageant more like the big city pageants would be a good idea. But the girls were asked to enter themselves and then a sponsor would be found for them. The result of this was, fewer girls entered each time until last year the pageant was cancelled altogether from lack of interest, in spite of some really nice scholarship prizes which were offered.

This time, the Women's Division of the Chamber decided to go back to the old way of asking all the interested organizations and merchants to obtain their own queen contestants. It was a big success, with 17 lovely, talented girls entered. In this way, each girl who is entered in the pageant is already a winner because the sponsor thought enough of her to invite her to be their contestant.

We may do things in a small town way, here in Friona. But that's what we are. . . a small hometown. And we think Friona is a really big success at being a small hometown. Having Maize Days the "old fashioned" way has just proved that point.

School Sets Early Dismissal On 25th

Friona schools will dismiss at 2 p.m. on Friday, September 25 in order for the Chieftain band to make the trip to the Chieftains' game at Dalhart, it was announced this week by Superintendent of Schools Hal Ratcliff.

At the regular meeting of the board of trustees on September 14, the board approved submission of a waiver to the Texas Education Agency to allow high school juniors and seniors to be exempt from semester exams for 1992-93 with the following grade averages and maximum absences:

90-100 average, three absences; 85-89 average, two absences; and 80-84 average, one absence.

The board also approved a school to be conducted twice each month on Saturday morning for students who have caused serious discipline problems in grades six through 12.

Also approved were the TTAS and Career Ladder procedures and policies for the 1992-93 school year.

The board accepted a bid by Packard Supply, Inc., to install new windows on the east side of the primary building at a cost of \$35,965.

Approval was granted to engage the firm of Brown, Graham and Company to conduct the school audit for the 1991-92 school year.

Three Sets Of Sisters Have Reigned Over Maize Days

Thirty-four young ladies have worn the crown of Miss Friona since the first Maize Days took place in 1957. The pageant winner was originally called "Maize Days Queen." The title eventually evolved into being known as the "Maize Queen" and finally, with less emphasis on maize through the years, the title was changed to "Miss Friona."

When Freda Lafuente became the 34th young lady to hold the title, she also became the third "sister act" among the former title-holders. Freda's sister Sonia was "Miss Friona" in 1985.

Other sisters who have held the title are: Joy Ingram Osborn (1960) and Teresa Ingram Buske (1973), also Kathy Horton Gurley (1971) and Sunny Horton Ratliff (1980).

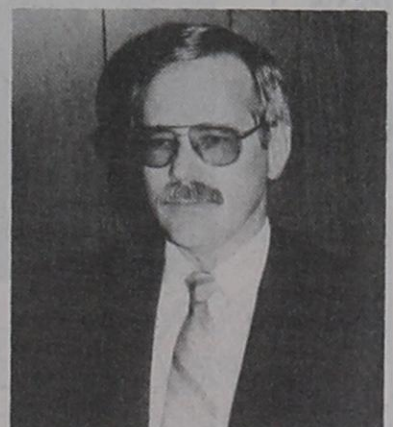
Stover Announces Write-In Candidacy

Tech Student Struck By Automobile

A 19-year-old Texas Tech University student remained in critical condition Sunday after she was struck by a car Saturday night near Jones Stadium.

Kimberly Ann Thomas of Friona suffered severe injuries in the 8:30 p.m. accident in the 900 block of University Avenue. She was in University Medical Center.

Kim, the daughter of Dennis and Linda Thomas of Friona, was in the Intensive Care Unit of the hospital at the Star's press time, and had not fully regained consciousness. She is a 1991 graduate of Friona High School.

Thomas' friend, Jennifer M. Jeffrey, also 19, was treated for injuries and later released from UMC.

The two were crossing University Avenue when they were struck by a 1970 Buick Electra driven by 50-year-old Amelia Alvarado of Shallowater, according to Officer Brent Hackett. The northbound vehicle struck the young women accidentally, Hackett said.

Alvarado was not injured, the accident report added.

60 Yrs. Ago--Sept. 16, 1932

Five new teachers have been secured in place of some of last year's instructors. Three of these are in the grade school department of the school and two are in high school. The complete faculty list is as follows: Glenn F. Davis, grade school principal, piano, voice and public school music; O.M. Stewart, geography and history; G.C. Applewhite, geography and history; Mrs. Arvie Lewis, writing and art; Miss Vivian Boston, fourth grade; Miss Louise Jacobsen, third grade and public school music; Miss Herta Meyer, third and first grades; Mrs. H.B. Whitley, first grade and primary superintendent.

50 Yrs. Ago--Sept. 11, 1942

Enrollment in the Friona schools reached a total of 446 this week as the new term got off to a good start. Largest class in the grade school was the fifth grade, with 65 students. A total of 331 were enrolled in the first eight grades. High school had 115 enrolled, with 49 freshmen, 32 sophomores, 19 juniors and 15 seniors.

40 Yrs. Ago--Sept. 11, 1952

Ground was broken Monday at the Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona, for a \$5,000 addition, providing five more rooms and emergency capacity of nine more beds. Henry White and Bill Hannold are doing the construction and work schedule calls for completion in 45-60 days.

The annual Parmer County Fair is scheduled this weekend in Friona. A big free barbecue will be served

beginning at the park at 6:30 p.m. Presentation of community candidates for Fair Queen will immediately follow.

35 Yrs. Ago--Sept. 12, 1957

Bill Sheehan, 29-year-old lawyer who began his practice in Parmer County seven years ago, is the district attorney for the newly created 154th Judicial District, which was formed September 1 under an act of the Texas Legislature. Sheehan rose to the position through appointment by Governor Price Daniel, and his appointment named him the D.A. for 16 months. The office will then be filled by an elected official.

Crista, now a senior at Friona High School, will relinquish her crown following tonight's events.

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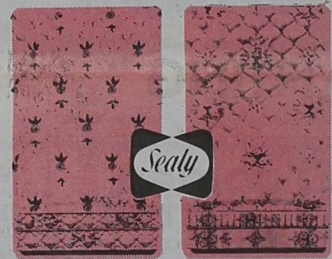
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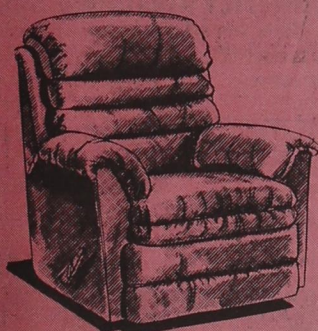

CHIEFTAINS DENIED

Portales Spoils FHS Homecoming, 28-0

The last time Portales visited Chieftain Field, in the fall of 1986, the Chieftains, behind quarterback Daniel Echols, were headed for the playoffs. They sent the Rams home on the short end of a 41-0 score. That game was a homecoming event as well.

You might say that the 1992 Rams team avenged that drubbing, as they turned the Chieftains away from their goal-line again and again enroute to a 28-0 win here last Friday, to the dismay of the local homecoming crowd.

The Rams scored twice in their first three possessions, and although the Chieftains threatened to make a game of it deep in Portales territory more than once, they were repeatedly denied.

Portales covered 65 yards in two quick plays to take a 7-0 lead just 4:08 into the game. Arturo Ontiveros went the last 46 yards to paydirt.

A few minutes later, Jason Crowson swiped a Blair Burney pass, giving the Rams possession at the Chieftain 32-yard line. The Rams had completed only two passes in three games previously, but quickly hit big Luis Cruz for a 25-yard gain to the Friona seven. Leroy Valdez got the TD and it was 14-0 just four plays into the second quarter.

Blair Burney hit Harvey Martinez for a 28-yard gain, and Juan Gamboa rambled for 11 yards to the Portales 20.

A pass interference call gave Friona a first and goal at the Rams' two and it looked like Friona had a sure touchdown opportunity. But four plays lost back to the Portales eight, where the Rams took over.

The visitors added insult to injury when quarterback Cody

Vardeman sped 81 yards up the sidelines before Paco Reyes ran him down. However, Vardeman hit Cruz in the end zone for the TD, and the kick gave the Rams a 21-0 halftime lead.

A short punt by Portales gave Friona the ball at the Rams' 35 early in the third quarter. Runs by Burney and Martinez moved Friona to the Portales 15 where the team had a first down and another threat.

But four plays failed to gain, with one pass bouncing off Martinez' hands, and Portales took over.

Again the Rams used the Friona threat to fuel a drive of their own. They went 82 yards in 11 plays, with Valdez getting the final five yards. Ontiveros was four for four in PATs for the night.

The Chieftains had a good series to start the fourth quarter. Burney connected with Brian Herring for 15 yards; Kelly Jack for seven, and Britt Conklin for 20 and 24, as the team drove to the Portales 14.

But the Rams sacked Burney and two passes fell incomplete to end the threat.

With time running out, reserve sophomore quarterback Jay Belcher of the Chieftains got loose and rambled 76 yards for an apparent Friona touchdown, but the score

was nullified by an illegal block penalty. This turned out to be the closest thing to a score the Chieftains would have.

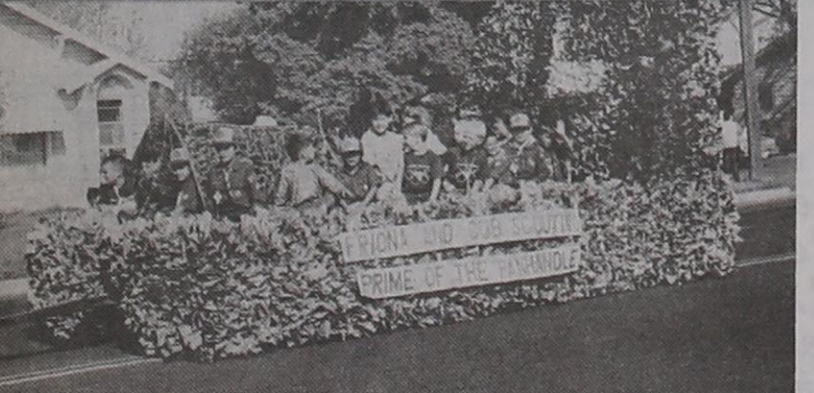

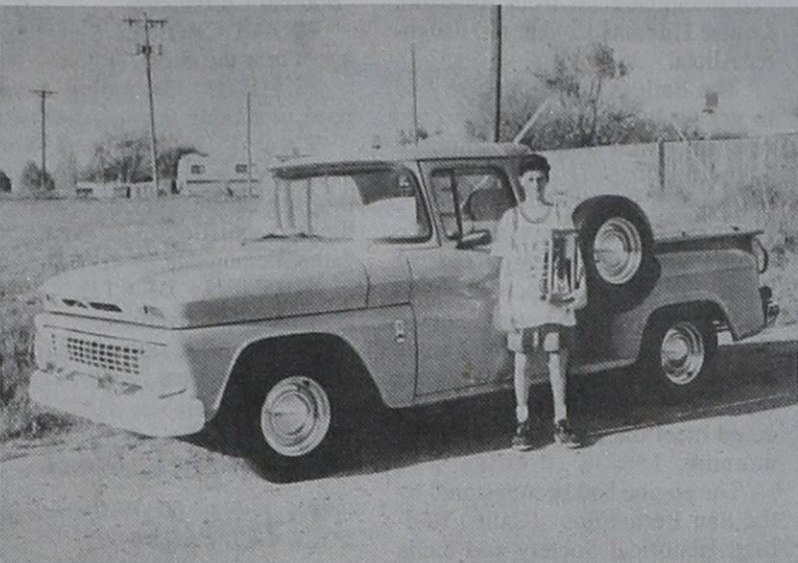

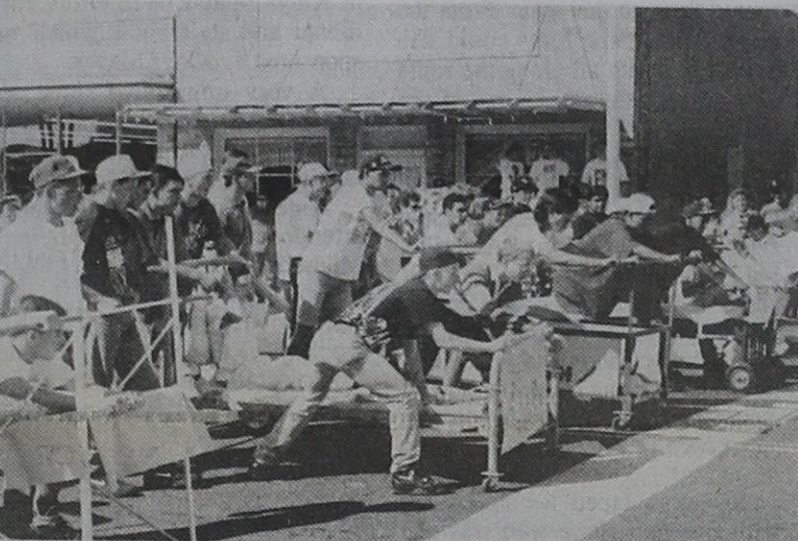

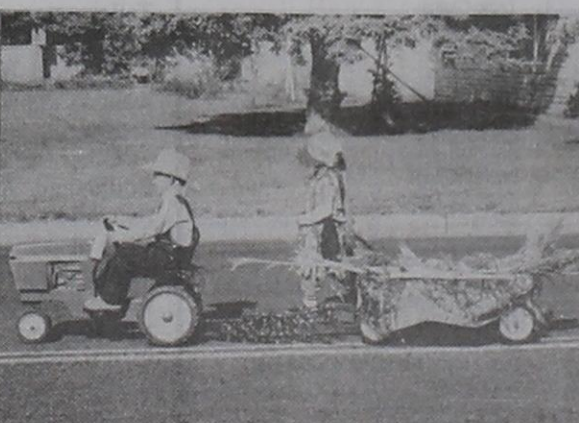

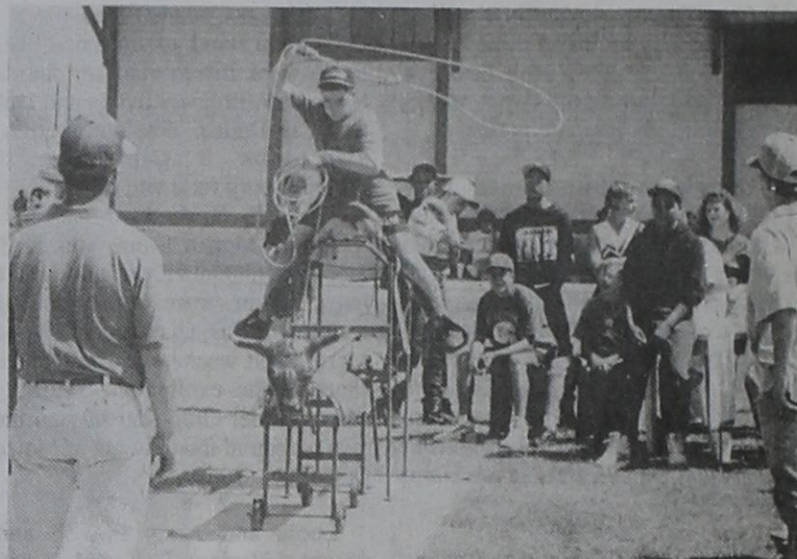

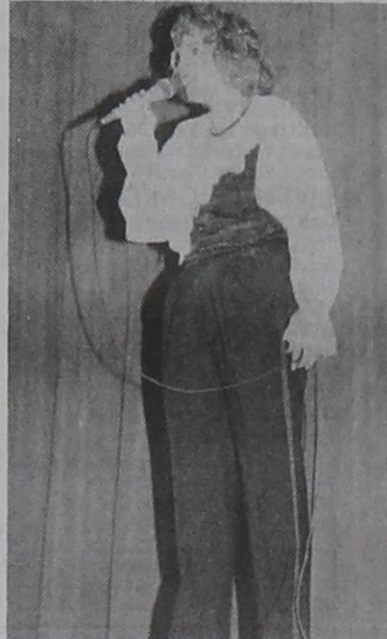

print shop and went out to San Bernardino, California for the 50th wedding anniversary of his brother and sister-in-law, Roland and Beatrice Bailey. Ed and Deloris' daughter, Carol Bailey of Irving, Texas, accompanied her parents on the trip.

On the way back they saw a lot of pretty scenery in Utah and stopped in at one of the casinos in Las Vegas for a short time.

As soon as they got back to Friona, they got word that Deloris' sister, Phyllis Stringfellow, had to have some emergency surgery in Oklahoma City, so they were off again, this time traveling to the east, accompanied by their daughter and granddaughter from Amarillo, Denise Hill and 15-year old daughter Alicia.

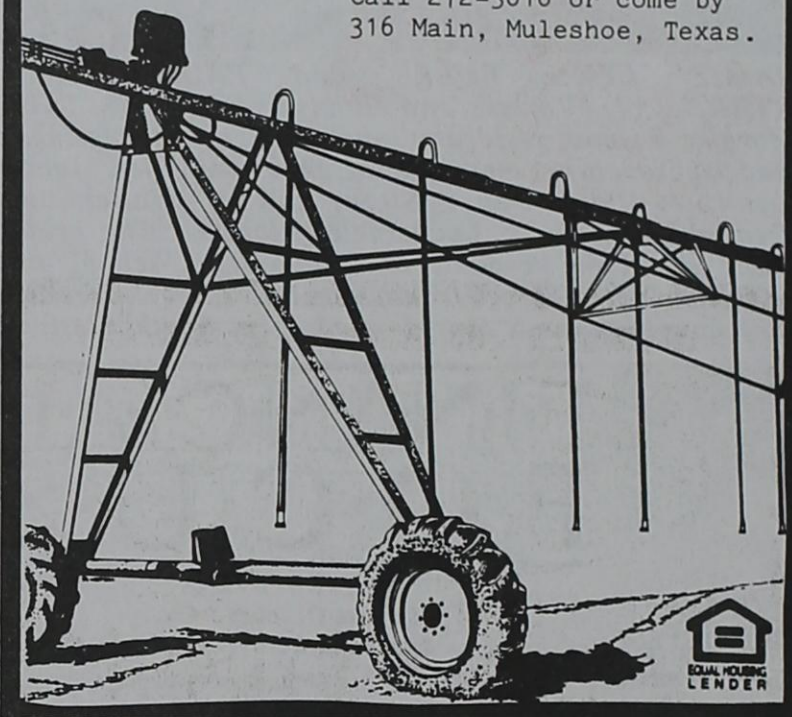

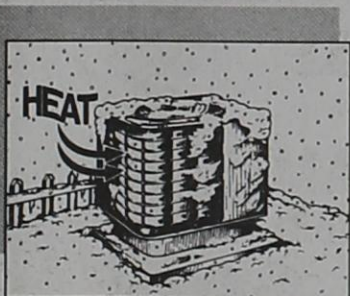

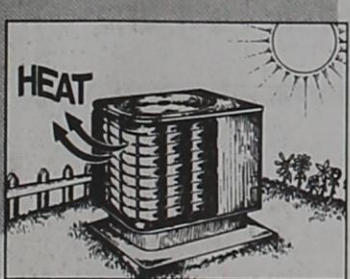

County Is Included In Disaster Aid Area

President Bush, in response to a request from Governor Ann Richards, has declared as a major disaster area 12 Texas counties due to agriculture losses from excessive rain and hail which have affected the area since May 1.

The declaration specifically cites the need for unemployment assistance to relieve economic hardship created by a devastated cotton crop in affected counties.

Those counties include Bailey, Briscoe, Castro, Cochran, Crosby, Floyd, Hale, Hockley, Lamb, Lubbock, Parmer and Swisher.

In her request for the disaster declaration, Governor Richards told the president that the disaster has affected thousands of migrant farm

workers as well as employment associated with ancillary services such as cotton gins and trucks.

According to Ed Laundy, disaster recovery manager for the Governor's Division of Emergency Management, the estimated value of cotton crop loss to date is more than \$320 million and lost wages total more than \$7 million.

As a result of the declaration, representatives of the Division of Emergency Management, Texas Employment Commission and the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) are establishing a Disaster Field Office in Lubbock to coordinate initial response to the declaration and associated assistance.

Unit Investment Trusts Offer A Convenient Way To Invest

Unit investment trusts (UITs) are often confused with mutual funds, but they are actually quite different.

Like mutual funds, UITs represent a portfolio of securities that can reduce risk through diversification. Unlike mutual funds, however, UIT portfolios do not change after the trust has raised a set amount of money and is closed. This allows the sponsor to supervise the trust rather than manage it the way mutual funds are managed. Although the benefit of a fixed portfolio may seem insignificant, it offers a stable income stream until the trust is terminated.

According to the Investment Company Institute, which reports on mutual funds and UITs, more than 90 per cent of UITs today are invested in tax-exempt, municipal bonds. There is, however, a growing segment that invests in taxable utility bonds and common stocks.

As you might expect, UITs offer many of the same features as the individual bonds that make up the portfolio, including a fixed income stream, protection of principal and a stated maturity date. Many UITs are also backed by an unconditional and irrevocable insurance policy that remains in force as long as the insured bonds are held by the trust. The insurance applies to the timely payment of principal and interest. As a result, the trust receives an AAA rating, the highest mark of investment reliability from Standard & Poor's.

Because UITs are not managed, they are not subject to the management fee charged by mutual funds. There is a sales charge at

time of purchase, which could range between 3 per cent to 5 per cent and is divided between the broker and the trust sponsor. There is usually no charge to sell the trust, and there are no additional fees such as the 12B-1 fees often associated with mutual funds. UIT costs are included in the original purchase price.

Why not just buy individual bonds? Individual bonds are an important part of any diversified investment strategy, but UITs offer professionally selected bond portfolios, usually insured, that are convenient to buy and sell. Unit trust portfolios are diversified through the number of bonds and selection of bonds with different purposes and from different geographic locations. These levels of diversification offer added protection for your principal.

In addition, account maintenance functions such as safekeeping of securities, collecting and disbursing income, and keeping records up to date are handled by the trustee. Your investment payments are issued the same day of each payment period, so planning and budgeting is easier. Finally, the amount of your interest payments remains approximately the same as long as all of the bonds selected for the portfolio remain in the trust.

Unit investment trusts are sold by prospectus, so make certain you get one. The terms of the trust, along with the portfolio, are defined in the prospectus. Your broker should explain the payment schedule you select, when to expect your first check and all subsequent checks, and the amount of each. If stable, tax-free insured income is your investment objective, you may find UITs a convenient way to invest.

YOUR EYES

About Smoking



Everyone knows that smoking is bad for you and the people around you. It's been associated with emphysema, lung cancer and other problems. Did you know that smoking is bad for your eyes, too?

Most obviously, smoke irritates the eyes and eyelids, especially of those wearing contact lenses. But nicotine and carbon monoxide may also cause the blood vessels in the eye to constrict, reducing oxygen supply, which affects the ability of the eyes to adapt from light to dark and may also affect peripheral vision.

Yet another problem was discovered by research at John Hopkins University: scientists found that smokers were twice as likely to develop premature cataracts (before age 70) as those who didn't. Stopping smoking can reverse the risk.

What can you do? Don't smoke, and avoid areas where others do. Your optometrist may suggest eye drops to relieve the discomfort of irritation from smoke.
