
PLAINVIEW GIRL OFFERED HONOR GUARD LIEUTENANCY.

SUBSTITUTES FOR COTTON.

New York Commercial: Whenever cotton is scarce or high in price foreign consumers of American cotton talk of substitutes or of stimulating the production of cotton in some other part of the world. English cotton interests, backed by their Government, have tried for fifty-six years, or ever since the outbreak of our Civil War, to increase the output of raw cotton in Egypt and other parts of Africa, India, Peru and West Indies with some success, but the increase in available supplies so obtained has never kept pace with the increase in the world's consumption, and Lancashine is more dependent on us for cotton today than ever before since Whitney invented the cotton gin. The English textile interests have, at least, not talked about substitutes. They know that the only fiber which can compete with cotton is

Since this European war broke out cotton has been growing very scarce in the Teutonic Empires. The amount smuggled in from Switzerland, Holland and the Scandinavian countries is inadequate and the stocks accumulated before the war or seized in Belgium and Poland are practically exhausted. We now hear of substitutes for cotton. In making smokeless gunpowder wood is used to supply the nitro-cellulose. Such smokeless gunpowder was made in the United States thirty years ago, but it would not stand storage well. When used fresh, wood powder is quite as satisfactory, and the Germans have probably improved the old process used in this country and can get along without cotton in making smokeless powder.

For textile purposes it is said that Germany and Austria Hungary have found a substitute for cotton in the fiber of the common stinging nettle. The nettle may serve as a wartime substitute for cotton, but it is not likely to take its place in peace-times unless the Teutonic powers impose a prohibitive duty on cotton, which is unlikely. We have heard of ramie, nettles and other fiber-producing plants for fity years. There are plenty of substitutes for cotton at a price. Tlax is the best of all. The stalks of the cotton plant itself contain excellent fiber, and then we have nettles, ramies and other plants.

Cotton's position is assured for one simple economic reason: It costs more to prepare ramie, flax, nettles or any other fine vegetable fiber for spinning than the raw cotton costs if the other fiber plants are delivered free of cost at the mill gates. Cotton as it comes from the gin is fit to spin without further treatment. Ginning costs less than nothing, because the seed is so valuable. Europe got along without cotton for centuries, but will not voluntarily try to do so again. IRISH-POTATO CULTURE.

With Irish potatoes retailing at nearly \$3.00 a bushel, this crop has very great interest at the present moment. Irish potatoes should be grown in 116. every garden in Texas. If the yield is greater than the family can consume the surplus will bring a good price on the market, for Texas potatoes will mature in advance of the great crop to be expected from the Northwest.

The following remarks, by W. B. Lanham, horticulturist and chief of the division of plant industry, Extension Service of the A. and M. College, should be heeded:

"Potatoes are often infected with a fungus disease that causes scabby, warty spots on the tuber. These scabby, corky spots are sometimes deep enough to crack open and are often so numerous as to make the potatoes unmarketable.

"As a remedy, avoid all alkali or heavy manure soils, especially soils that have received a heavy application

One mother-daughter canning club in Leavenworth County-a farm bureau enterprise-canned almost 10,000 quarts of vegetables, fruits and meats. Drainage systems have been worked out on a large number of farms in he country, reclaiming otherwise valueless land that is now worth several thousand dollars.

Variety tests of the wheat grown in Leavenworth County showed that Carrell outyielded other varieties by an average of 51/2 bushels an acre in that county. The substitution of this variety for poorer producers is adding materially to the profits of many Leavenworth County farms.

On sixteen Leavenworth County farms, plots of ground were sown with oats treated with formaledhyde for smut control, and similar plots were sown with untreated seed. The average loss by smut on plots untreated was 2 per cent, while on the treated plots the loss was too small for fig-

Similar reports come from all over the many states where county farm agents have been employed.

KANSAS CITY STOCK MARKET IN DETAIL.

KANSAS CITY STOCK YARDS, Feb. 26.—Cattle finished last week with a flourish, and opened strong to 15 cents higher today, top \$11.50, but closed with less spirit, receipts 12,000. Hogs sold 10 to 15 cents higher today, on top of good gains last week, top \$13.05, eight or ten loads at the price. receipts 13 900. Sheep sold firm, medium ewes \$11.80, lambs weak, top \$14.60, receipts 9,000 head.

Beef Cattle, Six loads of prime Kansas cattle! weighing 1,415 pounds brought \$11.50, other good cattle at \$10.90 and upwards, and some big-weight Nebraska steers hung fire around \$11.50 at noon. Short-fed steers sell at \$9.75 to \$10.50, butcher steers \$8.50 to \$9.50, good pulp steers today, not extra finished. at \$10.65 to \$10.80, nine loads of them weighing 1,300 pounds at \$10.80. Cows and heifers are in good demand, and prices hold firm, cows \$6.50 to \$9.50, heifers \$8.00 to \$11.00, bulls \$6.75 to \$8.75, veals off 50 cents from a week ago, best \$12.75. Receipts at all points show signs of shortage, and under normal conditions the market will hold

Stockers and Feeders.

Feeder buyers were outbid by packers on the fleshy steers last week, and the best price for cattle to go to the country was \$10.25, a good many sales around \$10.00, thin feeders \$8.50 to \$9.50, stock steers \$7.00 to \$9.00. Prices are firm today, the yards having been well cleared last week, and today's supply running more to beef than usual.

A string of eight cars of choice heavy hogs from a Central Nebraska shipper attracted attention, six loads of them going at the top price, \$13.05, and two loads at \$13.00. Good heavy hogs sold at \$13.00 to \$13.05, and medium weights, as low as 226 pounds, brought \$13.00, bulk of sales \$12.65 to \$13.00. Local prices have been high as compared with other markets, because packers continue to run short, notwithstanding the fact that they are shipping in a good many hogs from Siouz City, Omaha, Fort Worth and St. Paul. Local receipts are far below normai, although prices here are drawing hogs from distant points, a string of 11 loads here from Southern Iowa last week, also hogs from Colorado, Utah and Arizona, and from Central Nebraska today. Light hogs sell up to \$12.85, and pigs \$10.00 to \$11.50.




