through the U.S. West Telephone Company. The call was traced to the Clovis number at the residence of the three Excel employees. Two of the subjects were talked to by
Sheriff Williams, and they admitted making calls this past Tuesday evening.

It was reported that Ochoa had wanted off from work so he coul attend a party that night.

expensive to the county to deal with these threats as well de to Excel, since the Sheriff's department sends a couple o deputies out to the plant to help with crowd and traffic control.
"I hope this will stop situation, but we will continue to monitor the telephone calls into and out of Excel for some time to make sure," Williams said. are oxcel is a good citizen. They deserved to be treated in this manner by unscrupulous employees," Williams said.
The Friona packing plant had received some eight bomb threats prior to the one Tuesday. The
management had kept the threats on a low-key basis, since it was generally believed that this was a ploy by certain employees to ge some time off. Yet, the threats had o be checked out as if they were
sincere, and the plant's security squad had to be alerted each time.

## Crock Pot Cooking <br> y Carla mckeown

It's always those days when last hour of cooking time. Make you're too tired too cook that you sure there is at least one cup of could most use a hot, home-cooked
meal. meal.
Eating out is expensive and gets
boring after a while, entrees or "TV dinners" just don't live up to the picture on the package. However, there is an alternative: slow cooking.
Basically, there are two types of slow-cooking appliances: the crock pot and the slow cooker. The crock pot is a round pot with heating coils that heat the pot from the sides, almost eliminating the threat generally is a rectangular-shaped pot that is placed on a heating base that heats from the bottom.
put all the food in allows you to put all the food in the pot before
you leave for the day and offers a fulfilling meal when you get home at night. It's perfect for everyone on the go.
Slow c.
Slow cooking also allows you to use less expensive cuts of meat
since the long cooking time results since the long cooking time results Keep in mind the following tips when slow cooking: * Little moisture evaporates during slow cooking, so you may
need to adjust some of your recipes. As a general rule, reduce the amount of liquid in a traditiona recipe by half. For soups, add only enough water or broth to cover the other ingredients. You also may ${ }^{*}$ In most cases, add dairy products near the end of the cooking time to avoid separation.

* If the traditional methods recipe calls for the dish to be cook it on the low setting for 6 to 8 hours.
* Before plugging it in, place the cooker on a dry, level surface. * Rice and pasta are best when

In addition, you'll find hermation about commissions and zealous salesperson discourage you rom reading the prospectus and king questions.

These long-term investment plans, which can tie up your money for 10 to 15 years, often require that up to 50 per cent of the first year's contributions go to paying the salesperson. This
means that if you discontinue the plan or redeem shares early, you could suffer a substantial penalty. According to the BBB, such plans have been barred in California and

ties administrators are considering similar regulations.
