The factor that has the most influence on the market value of fixed-income investments is current interest rates. For example, if you 8 per cent, or $\$ 800$ income each year, and interest rates change so hat new bonds pay $\$ 900$, your vestors are willins valuable. The good news is that if year, on new bonds, your $\$ 700$ per nent becomes more your investment becomes more valuable. This
is a typical market reaction to mutual funds whose portfolios consist of many different bonds. The
fluctuations are less obvious, fluctuations are less obvious,
however, because funds own many owever, because funds own many
bonds of different maturities and interest payments, each reacting differently to interest-rate changes. Table A shows how income
and market value can fluctuate on a and market value can fluctuate on
mutual-fund portfolio of high-mutual-fund portfolio of high-
quality bonds. The illustration asquality bonds. The illustration as-
sumes that $\$ 100,000$ was invested into the portfolio on January 1 1975, and all the income was taken in cash. Note that as interes
income increases, the market value income increases, the market value
of the portfolio decreases. Fo oxample, on December 31, 1982 when the income was $\$ 11,213$, an
all-time high, the value of the all-time high, the value of the portfolio dropped to $\$ 78,854$, an
all-time low. Conversely, on De-all-time low. Conversely, on De-
cember 31, 1991, when the income was $\$ 8,758$, very close to the original 1975 income, the market value of the portfolio was $\$ 101,897$, slightly more than the original investment.
