

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
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Letters To The Editor

Dear Editor,

It is appalling to learn and to know that so many local people have not read our Constitution, or do not actually understand it. But this is really not surprising when you learn that some of the million dollar anchor newsmen, some Oxford and Harvard graduates, and the majority of our congressmen and senators do not know what our Constitution says. Congressmen, drawing over a million dollars in tax free salary and expense accounts should know what their obligations and responsibilities are to be a congressman.

We are governed and controlled by the Constitution, as written. The Constitution defines clearly the powers vested to each branch of our government.



As the green leaves of summer change into autumn's golden hues, the vegetables we've eaten for the past several months are replaced with different garden bounty. Fall and winter are my favorite seasons. I love the briskness in the air and the festiveness of the holidays.

Just as the watermelon with its bright green rind and juicy red flesh personifies summer, the pumpkin's thick orange skin and hearty meat exemplifies fall. Although pumpkin can be used to flavor everything from soup to bread to sandwiches, pumpkin pie is one of the traditional symbols of fall.

Fresh pumpkin can be cooked several ways and used in place of canned pumpkin in all recipes.

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To cook fresh pumpkin, cut the pumpkin lengthwise into sections and remove the seeds and fibrous strings. Wash the sections, cut them into smaller pieces and peel off the skin. Place the pumpkin into a large pot and just cover with water. Add a teaspoon of salt and boil for 30 minutes or until the pumpkin is tender when pierced with a fork. Drain and mash the

Small, unpeeled pumpkin pieces also can be baked on a large cookie sheet, shell side up at 425 degrees for about an hour. When the meat is tender, scrape it from the shell and mash. Sliced peeled pumpkin also can be cooked in a microwave oven for 7 to 10 minutes or until

Pumpkin pies can be baked in advance and frozen. To freeze pumpkin pies, wrap the entire pie in foil and place it in a plastic freezer bag; squeeze the bag to remove any excess air, and place time. Pour the mixture over the

flat in the freezer.

Keep these tips in mind when pies. (Note: a basic pastry shell recipe follows the pie recipes.)

To make one teaspoon of pumpkin pie spice, mix 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon, 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg and 1/4 teaspoon ground ginger. Cinnamon and nutmeg also can be combined and used in place of pumpkin pie spice.

* Avoid a soggy pie crust by coating the pie plate with melted margarine or beaten egg white before placing the crust in the dish.

* Ensure a crispy crust by placing the unbaked pastry shell in a pre-heated 425 degree oven for six minutes. Then spoon in the filling and bake according to directions.

Coat an 8-inch springform pan with non-stick cooking spray. Sprinkle the pan with gingersnap cookie crumbs. Soften the gelatin in the cold water, and stir over low heat until dissolved. Add orange juice. Gradually add the orange juice/gelatin mixture to the neufchatel cheese, mixing until well-blended. Add pumpkin, sweetener and spices; mix well. Prepare topping mix according to package directions, using 1 cup milk and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Fold the whipped topping into the pumpkin mixture. Pour over cookie crumbs. Chill until firm.

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
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
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

Wildcats Romp Past Chieftains By 68-20

For a time Friday night, it appeared that the Chieftains could make a game of it against visiting

But every time their fans thought Friona had gotten in position to challenge, Littlefield's Rene Espinoza (number 37) would rip off another long scoring run, to put the Chieftains a little farther back.

Friona held the football for 6:34 of clock time on a nice drive late in the second quarter, to get on the scoreboard. Blair Burney's pass to Brian Herring with 14 seconds left in the quarter made the score 14-6, and lifted the Chieftains' spirits.

Then Espinoza took the kickoff and sped 85 yards up the middle as the quarter ended, and Littlefield had gone ahead, 22-6, just like that.

Espinoza had raced 73 yards on Littlefield's first play from scrimmage to give the Wildcats a 6-0 early lead. He scored four times in the game, gaining 218 yards on 18 carries besides the kickoff return.

A few weeks ago, Espinoza was playing defense for the Wildcats, but was moved to offense after teammate Anthony Goodson became a victim of the no-pass, noplay rule. For his efforts last Friday, Espinoza was named 243 yds, 2 TDs. "Player of the Week" by the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal.

On the Friona touchdown drive, accomplished against a tough Wildcat defense, the Chieftains survived three fourth down plays. Burney passed 15 yards to Harvey Martinez on one of those instances.

Another time, Littlefield was guilty of a personal foul when the Chieftains had punted, and then sophomore quarterback Jay Belcher raced 17 yards to the Wildcat seven on a fourth down from the Littlefield 25.

Littlefield scored two secondquarter touchdowns to take a 37-6 lead with only 48 seconds left in the first half.

But after the kickoff Friona came up with a big play of their own. Burney pump-faked, then hit a streaking Herring just past midfield. He covered the rest of the distance untouched for the touchdown. casserole, pinto beans, Spanish Burney hit Britt Conklin for two points and a 37-14 halftime score.

The Burney to Herring pass play covered 77 yards. That was just two yards shy of a Joe Malouf to Rod Owen 79-yard play against River Road in 1979--the longest pass and run play in at least 30 years at

half, the Chiefs surprised the 'Cats with an onside kick, recovering at the Littlefield 46.

Friona proceded to drive 46 yards in six plays. The big gainer was a 30-yard pass from Birney to Chris Hanna. That brought Friona within 17 points of the 'Cats at 37-20.

But it also was Friona's last hurrah of the night. Littlefield went on to score 31 unanswered points.

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





Long-term Bond Investors **Understand Market** Fluctuation

Facing a decline in income on Certificates of Deposit (CDs) and other conventional bank investments, many investors are seeking higher income in quality government or corporate bonds and mutual funds that invest in these securities. Historically, high-quality, fixedincome investments such as these have offered a steady, reliable source of income.

Unlike traditional savings, however, your principal investment, although returned in full at maturity, can fluctuate during the life of the investment. At any given time, your investment could be worth more or less than the amount you originally paid. To most investors, this is acceptable if the income continues uninterrupted. After all, most investments-homes, rental property, common stocks, etc.--are subject to market fluctuations.

The factor that has the most influence on the market value of fixed-income investments is current interest rates. For example, if you invest \$10,000 in a bond that pays 8 per cent, or \$800 income each year, and interest rates change so that new bonds pay \$900, your bond becomes less valuable. Investors are willing to pay less for a bond that provides \$800 interest than they are for a bond that pays \$900. The good news is that if rates drop to 7 per cent, or \$700 per year, on new bonds, your investment becomes more valuable. This is a typical market reaction to changes in interest rates.

The same scenario applies to mutual funds whose portfolios consist of many different bonds. The fluctuations are less obvious, however, because funds own many bonds of different maturities and interest payments, each reacting differently to interest-rate changes.

Table A shows how income and market value can fluctuate on a mutual-fund portfolio of highquality bonds. The illustration assumes that \$100,000 was invested into the portfolio on January 1, 1975, and all the income was taken in cash. Note that as interest income increases, the market value of the portfolio decreases. For example, on December 31, 1982, when the income was \$11,213, an all-time high, the value of the portfolio dropped to \$78,854, an all-time low. Conversely, on December 31, 1991, when the income was \$8,758, very close to the original 1975 income, the market value of the portfolio was \$101,897, slightly more than the original investment.

Finally, see how the annual income from this bond portfolio closely follows the fluctuations of short-term CD rates. Typically, a fund can maintain a higher payout than the CDs because the bond portfolio consist of a wide range of maturities, giving it more pre-dictability than highly volatile short-term interest rates.

Long-term investors who understand how interest rates affect the market value of high-quality bonds generally enjoy the monthly income enough to overlook the market fluctuation of their principal.

Reading **Problems**

The youngster who has difficulty learning to read--or who just doesn't like to--often has a vision-related problem. Even the child who scores 20/20 on a school vision test may have

problems with the near visual skills that are vital for reading.

The optometrist has the special skills to determine exactly what's wrong and to correct it. Testing may discover, for instance, that the child cannot focus on small print. Others may habitually hold a book too close to the eyes or too far away. Dyslexia, in which letters seemed turned about or twisted, may be the problem.

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
