60 YRS. AGO--NOV. 11, 1932
The West Texas Chamber of Commerce, with headquarters at Stamford, and in which Friona, as a representative, is pushing the move for the reorganization of county government in Texas and will offer and support a definite plan for this at the meeting of the Forty-third Legislature.

Quite a number of sportsmen from various parts of the Panhandle as well as a number of local shooters have been busy around the lakes in this locality since the duck shooting season opened Tuesday of last week.

50 YRS. AGO--NOV. 13, 1942
W.L. Edelman, local representative of the Magnolia Petroleum Co., reports no clues as to the perpetrator of the burglary of his filling station one night last week.

Saturday, November 28 has been set as the date when the judging committee will visit the candidates for the 1942 Gold Star award, the most cherished of 4-H medals. Three clubs have entered candidates. They are Tomilou Turner of the Friona 4-H Club; Barbara Foster of the Oklahoma Lane Club and Laura Seaton of the Lazbuddie Club.

40 YRS. AGO--NOV. 6, 1952
Attending the State Convention of the Farm Bureau in San Antonio Monday will be several members of the Parmer County organization. Going as voting delegates will be Earl Stevenson, Aubrey Ellison, Melvin Sachs, Ralph Smith, T.E. Lovett, and Ernest Anthony. Raymond Euler, Service Representative, will also attend.

The juniors of the Friona High School are working this week in preparation for their three-act comedy to be given here in the near future. "The Campbells Are Coming" is the story of a granddaughter who returns home from college "sophisticated" and announces to all that her fiance Kingston Campbell and his mother are coming for a visit.

35 YRS. AGO--NOV. 7, 1957
The Friona Band attended the ENMU Homecoming in Portales Saturday. They marched in the

homecoming parade, competing with 17 other school bands from this area. The Friona Band was named the winner in their division.

A firm located in Friona this year is demonstrating the beneficial aspects to the city from a local agriculture devoted to other crops besides the traditional grain acreage of the Parmer County farms. The firm is Friona Growers and Shippers. The crops include potatoes and carrots.

30 YRS. AGO--NOV. 8, 1962
The Friona City Council voted Monday night to accept bids for a second overhead water storage tank for the city. In order to provide for a site for the new tower, the council voted to purchase on option lots belonging to Raymond Jones which is just outside the present northern city limits.

Funeral services were held in Friona Monday for Mrs. Fred Carson, 39, killed in a head-on automobile collision near the city last Saturday. Mrs. Carson and a Kentucky woman, Maxine Spencer Banks, were each killed when the automobiles they were driving collided on U.S. Highway 60, two and one-half miles southwest of Friona.

25 YRS. AGO--NOV. 9, 1967
Final approval was given at the City Council meeting Monday for the increase in rates by Southwestern Public Service Company, along with the adjustment in the electrical franchise rate to the city from two to three percent of annual gross dividends.

Friona is faced with an acute housing problem, in the form of a big potential population increase, Friona Chamber of Commerce members told local builders this week. Members of the Chamber, along with building representatives met with officials of Missouri Beef Packers Tuesday to determine approximately how much housing would be required when the giant place is opened and begins production in April of 1968.

20 YRS. AGO--NOV. 9, 1972
Near-record numbers of voters turned out in Friona Tuesday to help re-elect President Richard

Nixon and Commissioner Tom Lewellen of county precinct number one. Lewellen won re-election in a landslide over challenger Forrest Osborn, 838-432.

Friona won a three-way coin toss between themselves, Dimmitt, and Muleshoe, Friday night, and will represent district 2-AAA in the playoffs.

5 YRS. AGO--NOV. 7, 1987

Thirteen retail merchants are participating in the 1987 promotion, during which \$600 worth of Friona script will be awarded in a drawing December 22.

Bobcats Prevail In Rivalry, 32-8

Although Friona Chieftain passer Blair Burney went into the game rated as the top passer for all class 3A quarterbacks in the area, he was overshadowed by Dimmitt's Chad Sandoval last Friday, when the Bobcats scored a 32-8 win over the Chieftains.

Sandoval, a senior, completed 12 of 27 passes for 178 yards to pace the Dimmitt win.

But the Bobcats added 117 yards rushing, and Friona was stopped on the ground, and that was the difference in the game.

Burney did get his average number of yards passing--152, but Dimmitt converted three turnovers into 17 points, and that was the game-clincher.

The Chieftains stopped six Dimmitt drives, including the Bobcats' opening one, when Chris Hanna intercepted Sandoval in the Friona end zone.

7th Braves Run Mark To 7-0

Friona's seventh grade Braves "Red" team downed Dimmitt 32-6 last Thursday evening, to run their season record to 7-0. The team is also unbeaten in district play.

Daniel Cuevas ran for 180 yards, scored a pair of TDs and one two-point conversion. Quint Ellis added 50 yards, scoring a TD and one PAT.

Jesus Mata completed four of five passes for 60 yards, one for a touchdown and one for a PAT. Aaron King completed two of three passes for 20 yards, including a PAT.

Ellis caught three passes for 50 yards, and Orlando Rivera had three catches for 35 yards, one TD and one PAT.

Leading tacklers were Cuevas, eight, Luis Ramirez, seven, Ellis, six; Jeff Hamilton and Sammy Perez, three each.

The team was playing Muleshoe this week, with both teams undefeated in district play.

But three plays after the interception, Friona fumbled the ball back, and this cost the Chieftains as Derrick Thomas raced eight yards on a big fourth down play to give Dimmitt a 7-0 lead.

Friona lost the balls on downs at the Dimmitt 42, but dug in to force a Bobcat punt.

The Chieftains' second fumble allowed Dimmitt to drive to the Chieftain nine. But Josh Snead sacked Sandoval and forced a field goal attempt by the Bobcats that went wide.

Midway through the second quarter, Dimmitt drove 57 yards to score. Sandoval hit Zach Smith

twice for big gainers, and Thomas had timely runs, including the touchdown from a yard out. Baker's kick gave Dimmitt a 14-0 lead.

Friona recovered a Dimmitt fumble, and Burney hit Brian Herring to the Dimmitt 34. Four Burney passes fell incomplete with time running out in the first half. Martinez was open in the end zone on fourth down, but Dimmitt tipped the pass, and held onto their 14-0 lead.

The Chieftains took the second half kickoff and drove 68 yards to get back in the ball game.

Burney hit Kelly Jack for 11 yards, then overcame a sack to hit Martinez for 16 yards and a first down at the Dimmitt 20.

The Burney to Martinez combination worked again for 14 yards to the Dimmitt three, and from there sophomore quarterback Jay Belcher ran into the end zone on a keeper play.

Burney hit Martinez once more for a two-pointer, and Friona had made it a 14-8 game with 8:09 left in the third quarter.

This aroused the Bobcats, who went 77 yards in 12 plays to stretch their lead. However, Dimmitt was able to keep the drive alive when Paco Reyes was called for a personal foul that gave the 'Cats a first down at the Friona 33, instead of third and 19 from midfield.

Sandoval hit Jeremy Casey for a TD and Sandoval ran for a two-pointer to make the score 22-8 with 3:48 left in the quarter.

The Bobcats turned an interception into a quick touchdown in the fourth quarter to hike their lead to 29-8, and much to the consternation of local fans, were scratching and clawing following another interception in the last three minutes of the game, to get more points on the board.

Friona did a good job of holding, but Dimmitt opted to kick a 34-yard field goal as time ran out for the final margin.

The loss continued the Chieftain losing streak at nine games, going into their season finale at Muleshoe on Friday.
