The cargo was designated as "mixed freight," but did not contain any dangerous chemicals, Williams said. It was the same crossing at which Gary Dale Green, 39, was killed on October 14, 1992, when his tractor-trailer rig was struck at about 11 a.m. by another east-bound freight. County Supports Bush By 60.4 %

Parmer County voters gave their support to President George Bush in the general election on Tuesday, by a 60.4 per cent margin. Bush received 1,829 votes to 637 for Bill Clinton (21.0 per cent) and 564 for Ross Perot (18.6 per cent).

Friona went for Bush by 63.8 per cent, Bovina gave the president a 51.2 per cent margin, and Farwell was in the Bush column by 59.5 per cent.

Tuesday's turnout was an alltime record in Parmer County, as a total of 3,098 people went to the **Poppy Day** polls. This was approximately 80 per cent of the total registered vote. In the last presidential election, 1988, only about 70 per cent of the registered voters took part in the

challenger Randy Geries.

Doris Herington withstood a writein challenge by Jerry Stover to win by 1,630 to 1,065.

The Bush-Quayle ticket was the winner in every one of the county's voting boxes, as well as in the early voting box.

Geries won only the Farwell and

with 1,789 votes, to 1,197 for Oklahoma Lane boxes, and those by a 59 per cent margin. Williams County tax assessor-collector won the other seven county boxes, plus the early voting box, by a combined 66.8 per cent.

Although Stover was able to win only one voting box, Rhea, with his write-in campaign (31-24), he managed to stay close in several others. He received 45.7 per cent of the vote at Oklahoma Lane, and 43 per cent at Bovina.

Parmer County voters joined those statewide in supporting Barry Williamson in his win over ointee na Guerrero in the Railroad Commissioner race. Williamson received 1886 vote in the county, 66.2 per cent. Local voters also went for Craig Enoch in his victory over Oscar Mauzy, with 1704 votes, 64.3 per cent. County voters also supported former state senator Jack Hightower in his win over John Montgomery, 1422-1323, and supported Amarillo's Morris Overstreet, first black elected to a state office, over Sue Lagrade, 1413-1233. That was 53.4 per cent for Overstreet.

James sings of real-life experiences as a husband, father, friend and a child of God. "A friend once told me not to say one word on stage that I didn't live at home," he said.



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



ENGINEERING assistance is provided to any landowner or landuser from Soil Conservation Service through your local Parmer County Soil Water Conservation District.

Some examples of ENGINEERING assistance are, Basin Terraces, Diversion Terraces, Parallel Terraces, Water Ways, Windbreak designs, and Pipeline designs.

If you have some water erosion problems, such as small gullies on dryland or irrigated land and if you are interested in water conservation, you might want to consider your land by building terraces or diversions.

1993 Ford Probe Has New Design

The all-new 1993 Ford Probe offers a contemporary design and a higher level of technical sophistication, according to Terry Wilcox of Friona Motors in Friona.

"The design has been changed by increasing the overall length and width, along with the wheelbase and tread," Wilcox said. "The front overhang has been shortened by moving the cab closer to the front of the car. This gives the windshield a greater slopc, thus increasing the interior space."


The sporty coupe is available in two models--Probe and Probe GT-each with its own multi-valve engine and individual styling cues. Driver-side air bag supplemental restraint system is standard on both.

Probe GT has a new twin-cam 24-valve V-6 with a cast aluminum block and cylinder heads. It generates 164 horsepower at 6000 rpm and 156 foot-pounds or torque at 4000 rpm. A five-speed manual transaxle is standard, and an electronically controlled four-speed automatic transaxle is optional.

The standard Probe has a new 2.0-liter four-cylinder engine with twin overhead camshafts, four valves per cylinder and an aluminum head. It produces 115 horsepower at 5500 rpm and 124 foot-pounds of torque at 3500 rpm. It can be teamed with a five-speed manual transaxle or an optional four-speed automatic.

The 1993 Probe has a more aggressive stance than the previous model, a result of increasing the tire tread width more than two inches and lengthening the wheelbase almost four inches. Lowering the cowl (base of windshield) height nearly three inches and pulling it forward almost four inches has produced the sleekly assertive "cabforward" look.

The interior has been designed to complement the exterior.








need to show their Social Security card, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Social Security numbers already are required for Commercial's Driver's Licenses, which the DPS began issuing in September 1990.

"We think this new policy will make it harder for an individual to fraudulently obtain a driver's license," explained John Hall, DPS driver's license inspector. "This should pay off by reducing crimes where a fake identification is important, like hot check cases. It also should make it much more difficult for a minor to obtain a license with an incorrect year of birth."

Only Social Security cards issued by the federal Social Security Administration will be accepted, Hall said.

"I realize almost everyone knows his Social Security number by heart, but we need to see the actual card issued by the U.S. government, not a commercial-produced metal or 'flea market' card," the inspector said. "If you do not have the government-issued card, income tax documents, W-2 forms, payroll or other employer records may be presented."

Applicants for DPS Identification Cards also will be asked for a Social Security card, but it is not a requirement for the ID card, Hall said.

The inspector said Social Security numbers would not be printed on driver's licenses and were for DPS internal use only.

Signs explaining the new policy will be posted in DPS Driver's License offices across the state, he added.
