"MY TURN"

RECENTLY I ran across a list of the top ten things which are most feared among citizens of the U.S. and thought you might be interested to know that the number one phobia in this country is the fear of public speaking.

In second place was the fear of heights. There was a three-way tie for third place: fear of financial problems, fear of bugs, spiders, snakes, etc., and fear of deep water or drowning.

There was a tie for fourth place between fear of sickness and fear of dying. In fifth place was the fear of flying. Sixth place was the fear of crowds. Seventh place was fear of dogs. Eighth place was the fear of driving or riding in a car (having a wreck). Ninth place was a tie between fear of darkness and fear of riding in elevators (falling). Tenth place was fear of loneliness.

This survey on fears was taken several years ago. I think some new phobias might have been added since that time, such as the fear of being mugged, fear of no landfills left where you can throw your trash, fear that your child will take up bungee-jumping, fear of hitting an orange colored barrel out on the highway, fear of having a Democrat in the oval office, etc.

My own personal phobia wasn't on this list either. The staff members at the newspaper office like to tease me about my ZZZZ-phobia. What's that you say? Well, it's not the fear of an attack of African killer bees or the fear of losing sleep because of a loudly snoring spouse.

It is the fear of spelling something with a Z when it should be an S and vice versa. For instance, I could give someone a surpise and it would come with an S, but on the other hand, I could give someone a prize and it would come with a Z. Why is that?

When I first started to school about a million years ago, the teacher told us that we could spell a word correctly if we would sound out each syllable and spell it accordingly. We were also told that S sounds like a hissing snake and Z sounds like a buzzing bee. But in real life it just doesn't work out that way.

For instance the word praise has an S but maize has a Z. The same thing applies to seas and seize. You could organize (with a Z) a group of organisms (with an S). Or you could vandalize something (with a Z) but then you might get charged with vandalism (with an S). If you go to the hospital for surgery you'll want to have anesthesia (with an S) and then you will be anesthetized (with a Z).

You could socialize (with a Z) or you could compromise (with an S.) Then you might analyze something (with a Z) or supervise something (with an S.) Does any of this make any sense?

Oh, sure! I could dig around here for about an hour and finally locate a dictionary. Or I could get out the manual and after about two hours I might figure out how to work the spell-checker on the word processor. But fortunately, the good old boy who lives with me over on Maple Street was the County Spelling Bee Champion of Bailey County in the eighth grade, so it's a lot quicker to just ask him if it has an S or a Z.

Now back to our original topic of discussion, which was "phobias." My husband Bill, suffers from something known as "mistagame-a-phobia." That's the fear of not being anywhere close to a television set during a game of the Dallas Cowboy.

Burning Issue Is Discussed

In a meeting in Plainview, Wednesday morning, the issue of burning has finally been resolved, at least for this year.

Texas Air Control Board (TACB) officials, Texas Corn Producers Board (TCPB) staff, and other area officials were on hand at the meeting to give their opinions.

"All in all, this meeting was a good beginning. We now have a revised set of guidelines that must be followed before the burning of crop residue," stated Carl King, Executive Director of the Texas Corn Producers Board.

Until such time as a definitive policy is set for the future, the position of the TACB is that the farmer must send a written notification to the TACB regional office which certifies that there is no practical alternative, guarantees compliance with the seven conditions of Regulation I (listed below, and contains a map of the site including uses of adjacent lands. The notification must also indicate when the burn will occur. Such written notification must be received by the Regional Office at least five (5) days prior to the burn, and telephone verification of the continued intent to burn must be made to the Regional Office 24 hours prior to the burn. When it appears that several tracts of land are to be burned in the same area at the same time, it may be necessary for the TACB to require the scheduling of burn times over several consecutive days to avoid cumulative nuisance and traffic safety problems.

Compliance with the conditions specified in Section 111.103 will be required, and they are as follows:

1. Burning shall be commenced only when the wind will carry the smoke away from any city, town, residential, recreational, commercial, or industrial area, navigable water, public road, or land strip, and shall not be conducted when a shift of wind is predicted;

2. Burning must be at least 300 feet from any adjacent properties which have residential, recreational, commercial, or industrial use;

3. Burning shall commence after 9 a.m. and be completed on the same day as soon as is reasonably practical prior to 5 p.m.;

4. Burning shall not commence when wind speed is predicted to be less than 6 m.p.h or greater than 23 m.p.h.;

5. Burning shall not be conducted during periods of actual or predicted low-level atmospheric temperature inversions;

6. Burning must be outside the corporate limits of a city or town; and,

7. Heavy oils, asphaltic materials, items containing natural or synthetic rubber, or any material which may produce unreasonable amounts of smoke must not be burned.

"The farmer is responsible for smoke that travels across non-public roads used for school bus routes or mail carriers, and the farmer must have flaggers on such roads," said Tamra-Shae Oatman, Small Business Ombudsman, TACB. Additionally, the Texas Corn Producers Board agrees that it is the responsibility of each farmer to notify adjacent neighbors of proposed burning, and limit the size of the burn so that wholesale burning will not be conducted.

The Texas Corn Producers Board stresses that failure to comply with the Regulation I conditions above, or the creation of a nuisance or traffic hazard will result in an agreed Texas Air Control Board order (ABO) with administrative penalties up to \$10,000 for each day or incident of violation. An ABO is a legally-binding document agreed to by the violator and issued by the TACB.

Broadhurst Elected to BGCT Office

Charles Broadhurst, pastor of First Baptist Church, was elected to the Baptist General Convention of Texas Executive Board during the annual meeting of the 2.5 million-member BGCT in Corpus Christi, November 9-10.

The 193-member Executive Board conducts the business of the BGCT between annual sessions.

Texas Baptist institutions include eight universities, two academies, Hispanic Baptist Theological Seminary in San Antonio, seven hospitals and children's homes and homes for the aging in multiple locations throughout the state.

Southern Baptist in more than 5,500 Texas congregations support these institutions through the cooperative Program unified budget, which also provides support for missions causes in Texas, throughout the United States and in 126 foreign countries. The basic 1993 Cooperative Program operating budget is \$63.5 million.

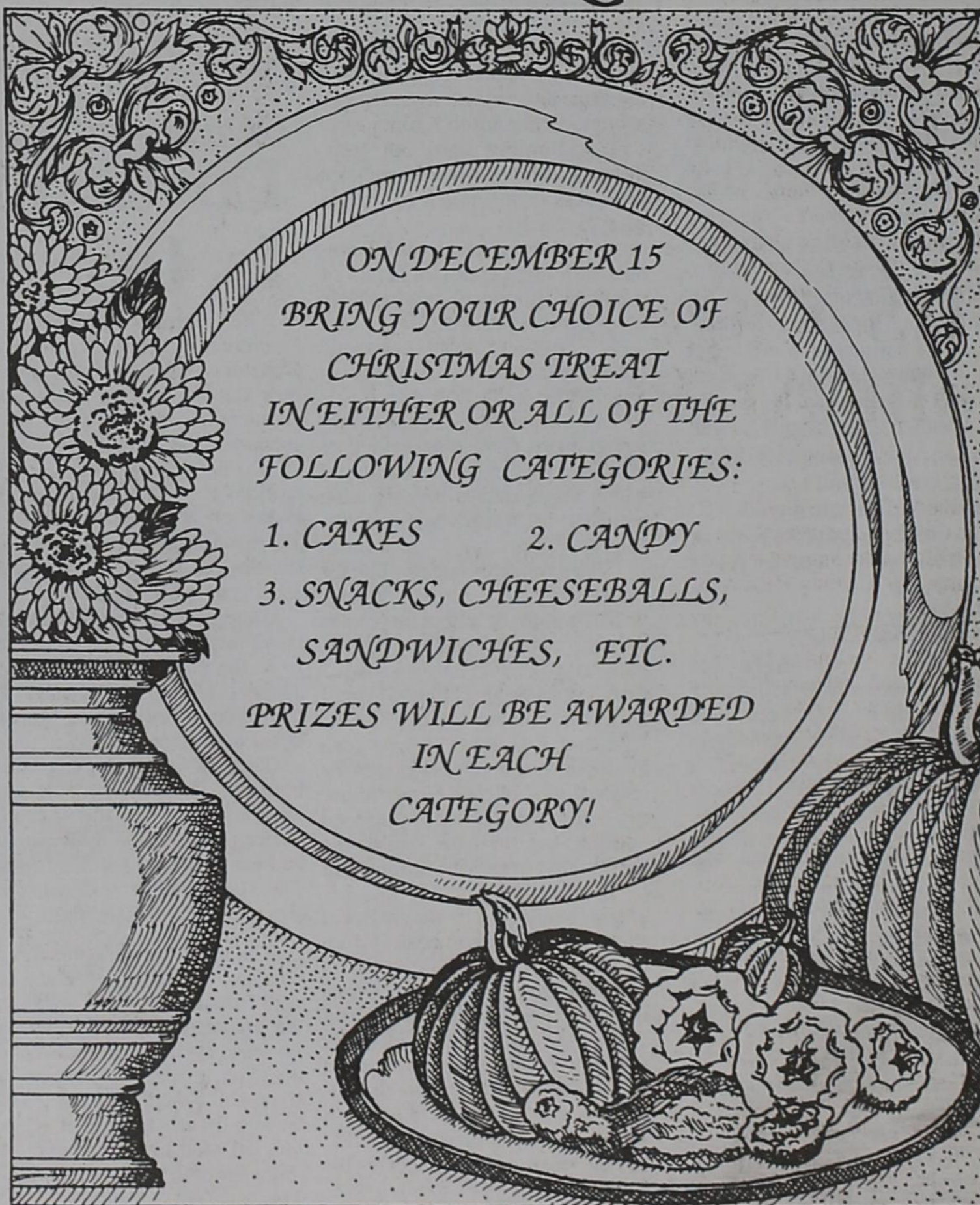

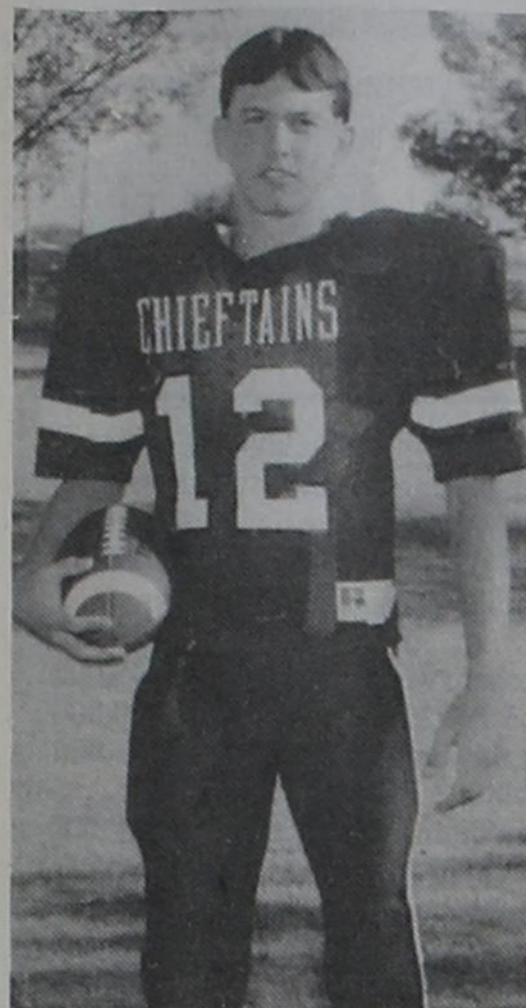

BLAIR BURNEY BRIAN HERRING New Passing Records Set By '92 Chieftains

Although they failed to crack the win column, the 1992 Chieftains never-the-less distinguished themselves as the "passing-est" team in Friona High School history.

The '92 team established new school records in yards gained passing; passes attempted and completed; as well as individual records for passing by the quarterback, and in pass-receiving.

Junior quarterback Blair Burney, the leading passer in the area for class AAA quarterbacks, paced Friona to a new team record in yards gained passing--1,584.

Burney set the individual season record with 1,493 yards passing, almost doubling the yardage by Clay Bandy (768) in 1973.

Burney completed 107 of 273 attempts, getting six touchdown passes and suffering 14 interceptions. In 1973, Bandy completed 45 of 90 passes for a more run-oriented offense, but had eight touchdown passes.

In the receiving department, flanker Brian Herring caught 46 passes for 640 yards. Both the number of catches and yardage are new FHS records. Dale Cleveland had 17 catches in 1973, and Stephen Thornton gained 371 yards in 1987.

Harvey Martinez was runner-up in receiving with 19 catches for 236 yards. Any other year, Martinez' number of catches would have topped the FHS record.

Junior runningback Juan Gamboa led the team in rushing with 475 net yards. It's the lowest total yards for a rushing champ in the past ten years at FHS, despite the fact that he gained 135 in the season finale against Muleshoe.

Burney passed for 910 yards in district play, including a season high of 243 yards against Littlefield. He failed to gain at least 100 yards passing only once--against Canyon.

Herring caught at least six passes in five of the team's ten

games, and had three games--Tulia, Littlefield and Muleshoe--in which he gained at least 100 yards receiving.

Herring became the first receiver to lead the team in scoring, with four touchdowns. Friona's 78 points scored were the lowest since the 1990 Chiefs scored only 64 points.

Brian Herring finished as the leader in pass receiving for the area with his 46 catches for 640 yards, both easily the tops in the area.

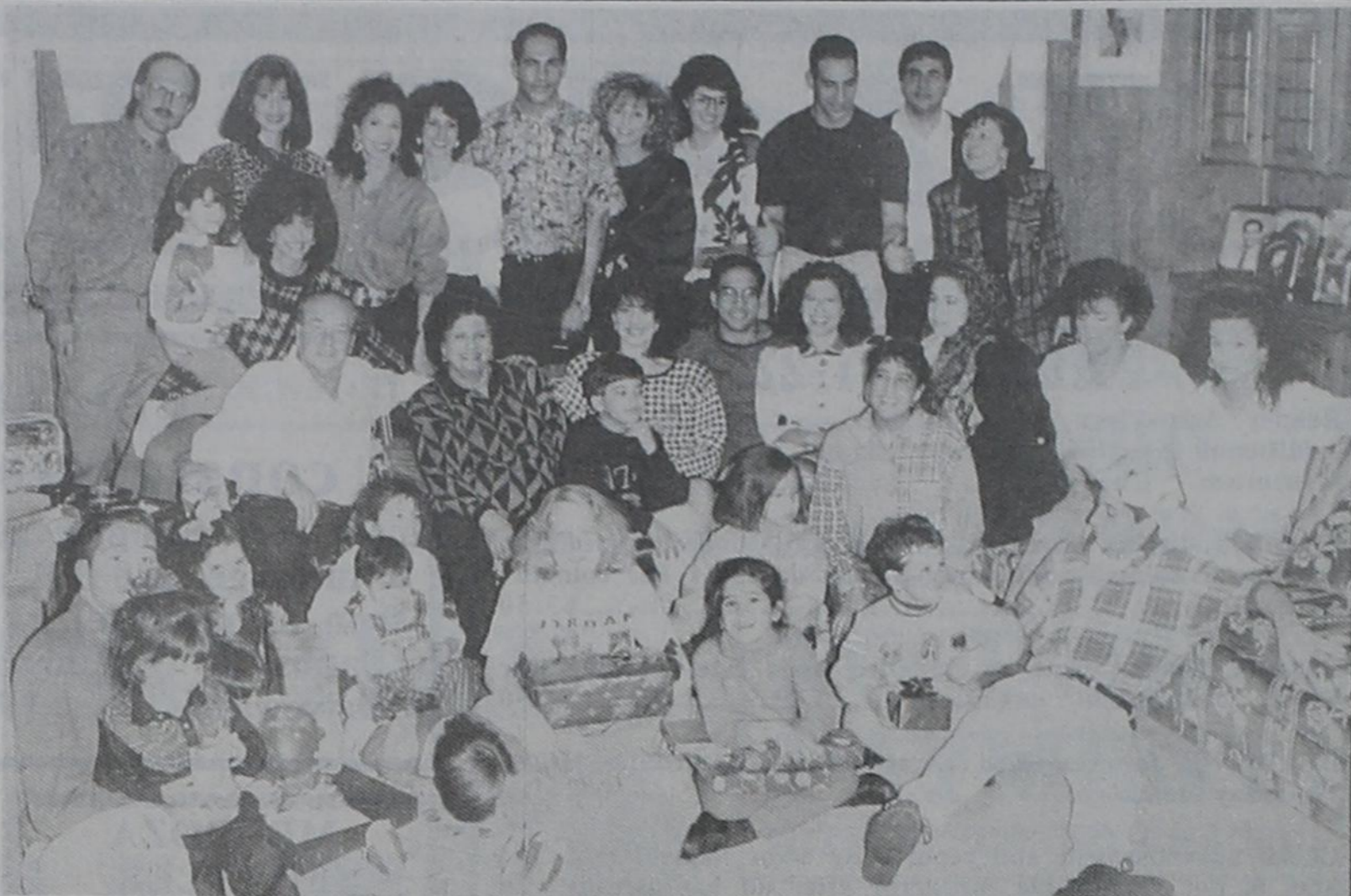

Texas School Children Help Track Monarch Butterflies

Texas school children and other good butterfly catchers are being asked to help a Kansas entomologist determine the migratory patterns of the monarch butterfly, currently en route to Mexico for the winter.

Midwesterners have tagged tens of thousands of the large orange butterflies which began their annual trek from the north a month ago, according to Dr. Orley "Chip" Taylor Jr., an entomologist at the University of Kansas in Lawrence. He said the program aims at assessing the insects' well-being.

Taylor wants Texans to participate in the monarch census by catching them, checking for a numbered tag on the upper right

wing and reporting the number. That will help Taylor, and others who study the annual migration, determine a more precise pathway for millions of monarch butterflies to their winter home in the dense forests of inner Mexico.

Conflicting reports about the monarch population in the United States have researchers wondering whether the butterflies have been harmed or simply have changed their migratory pathway. In the eastern United States, the low monarch population this year is being blamed on unusually severe weather in Mexico last winter. But researchers in the Midwest report that monarchs there have been plentiful this year.

"Perhaps they winter in another part of Mexico and follow a migratory pathway that is unknown at this point," Taylor said of the midwestern monarch population.

Taylor, who also researches the Africanized honey bee in northern Mexico, said the apparent disappearance of monarchs this summer along the East Coast may have a couple of explanations: either the monarchs changed their northward migration last spring returning almost exclusively to the Midwest or it was primarily the eastern population that died out last winter in Mexico.

Since the early 1930's, the annual migration of monarchs across the United States has been studied by scientists hoping to find out where the millions of butterflies flew. It was not until 1975 that the winter roosting area was discovered near the summit of the thickly forested Cerro Pelon mountain northwest of Mexico City.

This year, researchers there discovered that up to three-fourths of the butterflies apparently were killed by heavy winter rains and extreme cold.

Taylor said that if the monarchs traveling through the Midwest are plentiful, the butterflies may be wintering at a site not yet discovered. Thus he enlisted the help of hundreds of school children and their teachers to tag monarchs flying through Kansas.

He said finding out where the butterflies are entering Mexico from the United States may help determine if there is a different wintering ground for at least a portion of the monarch population.

The numbered tag, which is similar to a grocery store price sticker, is applied to the butterfly after rubbing the scales off a small portion of the right forewing. If handled gently, the butterfly is not harmed by the tag.

Texas school children and others, especially those closer to the southern border, can be a part of the study by catching monarchs to see if a tag is present, Taylor said. If so, the number of the tag should be recorded and reported along with other information such as the date, location, general weather conditions and other observations if any. The butterfly can be released to continue its trip after reading the tag number. Taylor said Texans also may obtain tags to apply to monarchs that have not been marked.

Data about tagged monarchs should be mailed to Taylor, department of entomology, 7005 Hawthorn Hall, University of Kansas, Lawrence, Kansas, 66045. Tags also can be requested from that address.

Monarchs are beginning to show up in Texas and will continue to fly through for three or four weeks, according to Dr. Ed Riley, an entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in College Station.

"The best time to see them is at the end of the day when the sun is low and the monarchs are looking for flowers to feed on. They must have nectar to maintain energy. They cluster in meadows and stay there through the night," said Riley, who already has seen a monarch this season in College Station. "Sometimes they roost in large numbers."

Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by excessive rain and hail are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located at 109 3rd street in Farwell, Texas, FmHA County Supervisor Thomas S. Taylor said today.

Parmer County is one of 47 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the excessive rain and hail.

Thomas S. Taylor said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80% of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000.00 whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for a FmHA emergency loan," Thomas S. Taylor said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until June 28, 1993 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Thomas S. Taylor said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living.

The FmHA office in Farwell is open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday, closed from 12:00 to 1:00 for the lunch hour.

Coffee cakes. Muffins. Tea breads. No matter what they're called, quick breads are just that—quick and easy.

Quick breads rely on baking powder or baking soda instead of yeast to make the batter rise into a light bread. No kneading or rising time is needed. The ingredients are mixed together, poured into a pan and baked.

Most quick breads are prepared using the mix-mix method. The dry ingredients are mixed in one bowl; the liquid ingredients are mixed in another bowl. Then, they are mixed together.

The batter should be mixed until the dry ingredients are moistened, but it should not be overmixed. Over mixing will result in a flat end product.

Keep in mind that baking powder and baking soda start to work as soon as they are mixed with the liquid. Make sure the pan is prepared and the oven is pre-heated before the liquid ingredients are added to the dry.

Baking times may vary from oven to oven. The wooden pick test is one of the best ways for determining if the bread is done. You also can test the doneness with a light touch. If the bread is done, it will spring back when pressed lightly.

Try the following recipes for breakfast, afternoon snack or dessert.

DOUBLE CHOCOLATE TEA BREAD

- 2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1/3 cup cocoa
- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup milk
- 1 egg, slightly beaten
- 3 tablespoons melted shortening
- 1/3 cup semi-sweet chocolate baking pieces

Combine dry ingredients and sift into large bowl. Beat together milk, egg and shortening. Stir into dry ingredients only until dry ingredients are moistened. Fold in semi-sweet chocolate pieces. Pour the mixture into a greased 9-inch-by-5-inch-by-3-inch loaf pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour or until a wooden pick inserted into the center of the bread comes out clean.

HEALTHY PEANUT BUTTER BREAD

- 2 cups flour
- 1 cup quick oats
- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup creamy or chunky peanut butter
- 3/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 1 egg

In a medium bowl, stir flour, oats, baking powder and salt. In a large bowl, with the mixer at medium speed, beat peanut butter and sugar until smooth. Beat in egg. Gradually add milk. With mixer at low speed, beat in dry ingredients until smooth. Stir in raisins. Pour the mixture into a greased 9-inch-by-5-inch-by-3-inch loaf pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 70 to 75 minutes or until a wooden pick inserted in the center of the bread comes out clean. Cool in pan for 10 minutes. Remove and cool completely on a wire rack.

APPLE CINNAMON MUFFINS

- 2 cups all purpose flour
- 1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- 2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups milk
- 2 large eggs
- 2 tablespoons molasses or an additional 1/4 cup brown sugar
- Topping: 1/2 cup old-fashioned oats 1/2 cup all-purpose flour 1/4 cup packed light brown sugar
- 4 tablespoons unsalted butter, at room temperature
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon

Combine flour, brown sugar, baking powder, 3/4 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg and salt in a large mixing bowl. Stir in apples until well coated. In a small mixing bowl, combine milk, 1/3 cup butter, egg and vanilla. Stir

milk mixture into dry ingredients just until all ingredients are moistened. Spoon the mixture into muffin tins lined with paper cups, filling each cup 3/4 full. For the topping, combine the almonds, 2 tablespoons butter, granulated sugar, 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon and nutmeg. Spoon 1 teaspoon of the topping over each muffin. Bake at 400 degrees for 20 to 25 minutes or until golden and a wooden pick inserted in the center comes out clean. Serve warm or cold with butter.

OAT STREUSEL COFFEECAKE

- 8 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 1 cup whole-wheat flour
- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 cup oat bran
- 1/2 cup packed light brown sugar
- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- 2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups milk
- 2 large eggs
- 2 tablespoons molasses or an additional 1/4 cup brown sugar
- Topping: 1/2 cup old-fashioned oats 1/2 cup all-purpose flour 1/4 cup packed light brown sugar
- 4 tablespoons unsalted butter, at room temperature
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon

Melt the 8 tablespoons unsalted butter and let cool slightly. Put the flours, oat bran, sugar, baking powder, cinnamon, baking soda and salt in a large mixing bowl. Stir to mix well. Pour the 2 cups milk into a 1-quart measuring cup.

Break eggs into the milk, add the melted butter and the molasses. Beat with a wire whisk to blend well. Put all the topping ingredients into a small bowl and work with your fingers or a fork until the ingredients are mixed and the mixture is in coarse crumbs. To make the cake batter, add the milk mixture to the flour mixture and stir just until well blended. Spread the batter into a greased 9-inch square baking pan. Sprinkle the topping over the surface. Bake at 350 degrees for about an hour or until a wooden pick inserted in the center of the cake comes out clean. Place the pan on a wire rack to cool for at least 30 minutes before cutting the cake into squares and serving.

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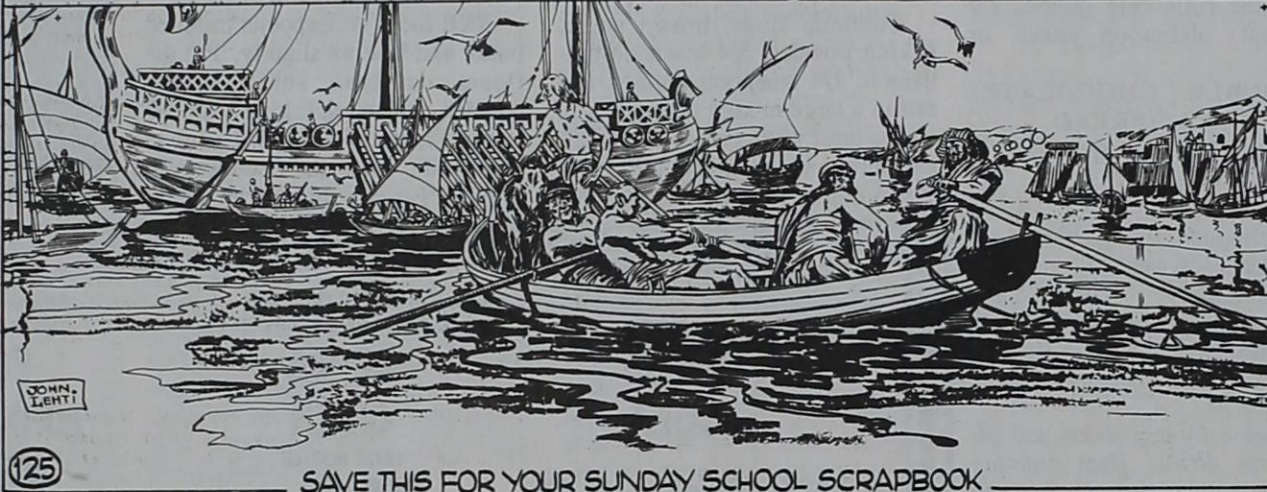
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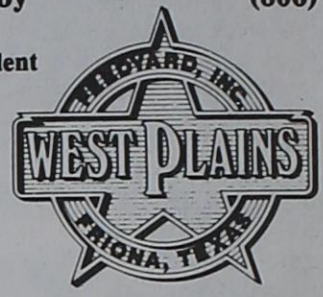

DS1 1.544 Megabits per second (Mbps) Service and Digital Data Service (DDS) will normally be used for the transmission of data communications or large volumes of voice communications between two locations. These services are optional and will not affect the existing rates of customers who do not order these services. The estimated annual effect on GTE-SW's revenues in the first year is \$1,080,567. The estimated annual effect on Contel's revenues in the first year are \$42,383.

DS1 Service

DS1 Service is an intraLATA Private Line Service which provides a dedicated, high capacity channel which may be used for simultaneous two-way transmission of voice data or other digitally encoded customer information signals. DS1 Service provides a transmission speed of 1.544 Mbps and is designed to provide an average performance of at least 95 percent error-free seconds of transmission over a continuous 24-hour period.

DS1 Service is available in and between all exchanges of GTE-SW and Contel where digital facilities exist. DS1 Service is available on a point-to-point intraLATA basis between two Customer Designated Locations (CDL), between a Serving Wire Center (SWC) and a CDL, between a CDL and a point of connection with another service provider or between two SWCs.

IntraLATA DS1 Private Line Service is comprised of three rate elements: DS1 Local Loop, DS1 Transport and DS1 Transport Termination. Each element is described below.

DS1 Local Loop

This rate element is for the cable facilities from the CDL to the SWC. The customer has two payment options for the purchase of DS1 Local Loops. There is a month-to-month plan or term contract Optional Payment Plan (OPP).

The month-to-month payment basis allows the customer to establish and disconnect DS1 Services, without penalty, other than to meet the minimum service interval of one month's service, as needed. Under the month-to-month service, the additional DS1 Local Loop rate applies only when the additional DS1 Local Loop (s) is (are) ordered at the same time and between the same two CDLs as the first DS1 Local Loop.

The OPP plan allows the customer to select a term of service (1 YR, 3 YR and 5 YR) with lower monthly rates associated with longer term contracts. If the customer selects an OPP, additional DS1 Local Loops may be ordered and installed at the Additional DS1 Local Loop rate between any SWC and CDL covered by the OPP, at any time during the term of that OPP.

DS1 Transport

This rate element is for the mileage sensitive charges for transporting a DS1 signal between Serving Wire Centers. Transport occurs only when the two CDLs being connected are served by two different SWCs.

DS1 Transport Termination

This rate element is for the equipment to terminate DS1 Transport at the SWCs. This charge applies only when DS1 Transport is required for the service configuration of the customer. One transport termination charge applies at each end of the DS1 Transport.

Digital Data Service

Digital Data Service (DDS) is an intraLATA Private Line service which supports synchronous, full-duplex transmission between the CDL and the SWC or the point of connection with another telephone company at transmission speeds of 2.4, 4.8, 9.6, 19.2 and 56 kilobits per second (Kbps). DDS provides a transmission path for digital data signals within the same LATA.

DDS Service is available in and between all exchanges of GTE-SW and Contel where digital facilities exist. DDS Service is available on a point-to-point intraLATA basis between two CDLs or between a CDL and a point of connection with another service provider.

IntraLATA DDS Private Line Service is comprised of three rate elements: DDS Local Loop, DDS Transport and DDS Transport Termination. Each element is described below.

DDS Local Loop

This rate element is for the cable facilities from the CDL to the SWC. The customer may establish and disconnect DDS Local Loops without penalty other than the minimum service interval of one month's service, as his/her needs demand.

DDS Transport

This rate element is for the mileage sensitive charges for transporting a DDS signal between SWCs. Transport occurs only when the two CDLs being connected are served by two different SWCs.

DDS Transport Termination

This rate element is for the equipment to terminate DDS Transport at the SWCs. This charge applies only when DDS Transport is required for the service configuration of the customer. One transport termination charge applies at each end of the service.

Investigate the Rating of Your Insurance Company

At one time, life insurance companies inspired the unrelenting confidence of consumers and policy holders. However, when some major national insurance companies collapsed, policy holders began taking a serious look at the financial strength of the insurance companies that had promised to protect them. Investors today are beginning to personally investigate their insurance company rather than simply accepting the word of company agents.

The problems of troubled insurance companies cannot be attributed to any one thing. Many of their financial problems, however, are due to investment portfolios that turned sour. For years, falling real estate values have plagued insurance companies that invested too much of their assets in real estate in an attempt to diversify their portfolios. Add to that the "junk bond" crisis of 1990, and some insurance companies saw previously sound investment portfolios become major concerns.

The American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) recently addressed members' concerns about the insurance industry. The general conclusion was that there is no cause for panic or "for the multibillion-dollar bailouts as in the banking and thrift industries."

Henri Bersoux, a spokesman for the American Council of Life Insurance, a Washington-based trade group, assured AARP members that the insurance industry is still healthy and profitable.

Some experts, however, believe that Bersoux's statement is too broad. Joseph M. Belth, a recognized authority on the insurance industry, states, "You're buying a company, not the industry." So, as a consumer, what can you do? There are ways to protect yourself, including finding out more about the company and the investment you have chosen.

One way to do this is to investigate insurance company ratings. Belth suggests relying on firms that are in the business of evaluating the financial condition of

insurance companies. He looks to four major rating agencies for this data: A.M. Best, Standard & Poor's, Moody's, and Duff and Phelps.

In addition, one can look beyond the ratings to the financial and general information published by these agencies. They often delve into how the insurance company's assets are invested as well as the general business trends of the company, which give more in-depth information to use when evaluating quality.

For example, if the contract is paying an interest rate far above most other comparable rates, the company may be incurring additional risk to provide those higher returns.

The information provided by rating agencies can assist you in finding out more about your insurance company. Although Belth is confident about these ratings, he also points out that they are opinions. Therefore, he likes to see at least two different ratings before deciding on a company's stability. He advises selecting companies that have the highest ranking from at least two rating services and that are ranked no lower than fourth from any source.

If you are concerned about the quality of your insurance company or want to monitor it in the future, rating agency information, as well as a knowledge of what you own, can help.
